2016 Perth Amboy Mayoral Candidates

PERTH AMBOY - On Thursday, October 27, 2016 The Amboy Guardian held its Mayoral Forum at Temple Beth Mordecai. Over 400 people attended.

The following are excerpts from some of the questions asked of the candidates.

Illegal Housing:

Sharon Hubberman: The situation of illegal housing is very sensitive. Many families cannot afford to pay property tax (so they rent out spaces in their homes illegally) Our average rents are \$1900/Mo compared to Woodbridge Township which is \$1800/ Mo. This the reason people choose to live in an attic or a basement. I will not stand by Code Enforcement to trespass on people's property. The solution: we need to have a Rent Leveling Board.

Miguel Nunez: We are a community of poor families. We need to sit down with the developers, investors and residents so our residents can live with dignity.

Joel Pabon: I've gone to see illegal housing myself. It's especially hard when you see children living in these conditions, especially with extension cords are hanging down. The First Responders are in jeopardy. It's (illegal housing) been going on for years. The Fire Department should work with Code Enforcement. It's a safety issue for the residents. The Fire Department and Code Enforcement should be working together. Wilda Diaz: Code Enforcement and the Fire Department and the Department of Recreation all work together. I want to thank our Directors. I know how hard you work. They are working 6 days a week to address any issues. We show compassion and educate the people instead of punishing them. We want to show them how to be safe in their units. We are an urban city and our population is growing just like other urban towns. The people want to live, work and play in







One Last Chance & The Final Word

For those of you who didn't have a chance to go to the debate on October 25th where only one candidate appeared (Sharon Hubberman), or the October 27th debate held at Beth Mordecai, you have an opportunity to see the four candidates on Tuesday, November 1, 2016 at Olive Street from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. (see Page 14 for more details).

Regarding the debate at Beth Mordecai - Yes, we have read some of the comments left on Facebook and contrary to certain individual's comments - IS WAS NOT **RIGGED!** It was not exactly what we had envisioned like we had at the first debate and we also had a couple of surprises.

First of all we need to thank those involved that made this debate happened. We had stated a few weeks earlier, because October being a very busy month, we didn't think we could pull off a debate this year. We received a call in mid-October from Ron Miskoff who said that Rabbi Saks had contacted him about the Amboy Guardian having a debate because many of the residents felt it was needed and we had a successful debate in 2012 held at the same location. It was ironic in 2012 Beth Mordecai was not the first choice for the debate. Our first choice was a much smaller place and thank God we chose Beth Mordecai because more than twice as many people showed up for the debate, than the first place could hold.

We have to give kudos first and foremost to Rabbi Ari Saks. He was there three hours before the doors were to open setting up the microphones and he was able to accommodate all that we requested. We also would like to thank Messengers of Peace Founder Stephanie Rodriguez (Marquez-Villafane) who manned the clock and her mother, Nilda Rivera who passed out and collected the index cards from the attendees. The two of them did the work of four people and were cool, calm and collected.

We had also asked those in attendance to please hold their applause until after the debate was over, so some of you were at fault, too for not following those rules. Once it started, it was hard to stop. Emotions ran high, which is a good thing because it shows people care about the issues. This the first time since we've been publishing that a Sitting Council Member challenged the Mayor in an election.

People came over to us and said that at times the audience was out of control and we agree. That's why I went up on stage to try to rectify the situation to no avail.

We realize that some of the candidates seemed to be hitting below the belt and should been warned. We specified in the rules of the forum no disparaging remarks to the other candidates. And we realize that there were too many rebuttals. There was supposed to be one rebuttal per candidate per question.



took the brunt of the bullets was Mayor Diaz, because that is the position that all of her opponents want and she wants to retain. In 2012, there were 5 other candidates who were vying after the position. It was easier for her back then, because she was only going for a second term. Although the field had narrowed down, she was hammered because of the third term she is seeking.

Joel Pabon was a target also, but not as much as the Mayor. There are two things that Wilda Diaz and Joel Pabon have in common. They both upset the applecart when they were first elected and they did that by walking the neighborhoods and speaking individually to residents just listening to their concerns. Secondly, they both have a track record as elected officials where people can go back and look at decisions that they have made. Sharon Hubberman and Miguel Nunez are no babes in the woods when it comes to politics. They have both run for political office before; Hubberman for Mayor in 2012 and Nunez for Council in 2012 and 2014 so all four candidates know what they're getting into and have spoken in front of large audiences before and should be well aware of all the hot topics in town, even without having to give them a list.

PERTH AMBOY - Resident and former City Councilman Ken Balut came up to speak about what he calls his favorite subject - the YMCA. He asked the Council if they knew the total amount of damage when the pool leaked recently. "The Y owes us about \$1.5 million since it opened up in 2008. Their pensions have gone up between 7% to 8%. Their Director put \$10,000 into the pension system, yet the Mayor testifies against employees' pension benefits. When is the Y going to be put in the City's budget?"

Balut continued and said, "Kenny Ortiz (Department of Recreation Director) is getting a nice salary. He should run the Y. Did any of the Council Members see any of the damage from the pool leaking? You should ask for the pictures and reports from the damage. If they are hiding information from you, it's unethical."

Councilman Joel Pabon wanted to know if the City has paid any monies to the Y related to the damage (pool leaking).

Business Administrator Adam Cruz stated, "We haven't paid anything to the Y yet related to this damage."

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez said, "We want to see a full report on the problem, including photos."

B.A. Cruz responded, "Sure."

During the Public Portion, Balut came up to speak again about an upcoming promotion of a Sergeant in the Police Department who was skipped over before and now cannot take the Lieutenant exam. "You were lucky you weren't sued."

Councilman Bill Petrick corrected Balut and said, "The Council wouldn't be sued. It would be the Administration that would be sued."

Balut continued speaking and said, "Under the former Police Chief, we had more police at the meetings than we had on the street." into that much detail).

It's Déjà vu All Over Again

Mayoral Candidate Sharon Hubberman came up to speak. She wanted to know if there was any progress about what to do about the buses at the Train Station. She also admonished all the candidates who did not show up at the Mayoral Forum (run by the Messengers of Peace) that was held on October 25, 2016. "Shame on all of you candidates. There were many tough questions that I would love of hearing you answered. As elected officials, I thought you would have shown up, especially to support the Messengers of Peace who do so much."

B.A. Adam Cruz responded to Sharon's questions about the buses at the Train Station, "Each bus is charged \$50 a month to park there."

Resident Linda **Ferreria** (who lives in the Budapest section of town) came up to speak about street cleaning. "It's a waste of money. You get a ticket if your car is on the street at the time their cleaning. If we were given advanced notice of when sweeping will be done on our street, it would at least give us time to move our cars."

She also wondered if the Department of Public Works started giving out new garbage cans. "Only the stores have them and not the residents."

She also had concerns about private school buses that are parked on residential streets.

B.A. Adam Cruz said, "The City is looking to buy a new sweeper next year. We have an ordinance of no buses on City streets after 6 p.m."

Resident Lois Lane came up to speak. She had a question about the renewal of application process for handicapped parking spots. "The application says that doctors have to put down a reason why the applicant has have a handicapped spot and that this request had to be put on the doctor's letterhead. They're asking for information that has to be protected under a patient's rights. What is being asked on the application is illegal. Some of the pages with the application are obsolete. I have to pay \$25 for the doctor to fill out the sheet with the certification." City Clerk Elaine Jasko explained that, "For mobility disability, the doctor has to certify that. When you brought back the application, it was just with a prescription attached which was not acceptable." Ms. Lane was told to see Ms. Jasko at the end of the Meeting to get more details. Businesswoman who is running for a seat on the Council

came up to speak. She said that she along with her running mates attended the Board of Education Forum which was held on 10/24/16 at Perth Amboy High School, Eagle Avenue. "We told them (The Messengers of Peace) in advance that we will not be attending their Mayoral Debate because no one else (the other Mayoral Candidates) will be there."

A Resident from Alpine Street, who comes to the Meetings to complain about a judge and a member of the Police Department says that no one ever wants to help him.

At this time Deputy Police Chief Larry Cattano came up to speak to address this Resident. "Any internal affairs matters are confidential and we are forbidden to discuss them. We can discuss your specific incidents in-house only. We set up meetings two times for you to come in to discuss your problems, but you never showed up. You can call me to set up a meeting. We can also give you guidelines for picketing."

At the end of the Meeting, the Council made comments. Fernando Gonzalez addressed the placement of gas meters in front of people's houses. "I'm concerned because these meters are protruding too far into the street."

Business Administrator Adam Cruz spoke next and said, "I reached out to City Engineer Jeff Rauch. The City has no control over where gas meters can be placed. Jeff will set up a meeting with Elizabethtown gas to discuss this problem."

Cruz also updated the Council about streets that are having problems with bumps after being repaved by utility companies that did work. Blacktop is being replaced with concrete to solve this problem."

Councilman Joel Pabon who is running for Mayor touched on the problem of the gas meters. "I don't believe for one minute that the gas company couldn't find another spot to place these gas meters other than on the front of people's homes." Councilman Bill Petrick agreed and said, "The gas companies would not do this in other towns." He went on to name some of the more affluent towns.

Tom's Tax Tips

The Taxing Side of Divorce

Getting divorced? Amid all the upheaval, taxes are not likely to be foremost on your mind. Yet overlooking the tax consequences can be costly. Here are some of the basics.

Your filing status will change. No matter if you get your final divorce decree or separate maintenance on January 1, December 31, or any date in between, as a calendar-year taxpayer, you're considered unmarried for the whole tax year. That means you can only file as single, head of household (if you otherwise qualify), or qualifying widow(er).

Not all payments or receipts are taxable. You can deduct alimony paid to a spouse or former spouse under a divorce or separation decree, whether or not you itemize deductions. However, voluntary payments made outside a divorce or separation decree are not deductible. Alimony you receive is taxable in the year you get it.

Child support payments are neither deductible to the payer nor taxable income to the recipient.

Property settlements incident to divorce generally don't have income tax consequences, although exceptions apply.

You may not be able to claim your dependents. Generally, you must be the custodial parent to be able to claim your child as a dependent. What's a custodial parent? You're considered a custodial parent if your child lived with you for the greater number of nights during the year. However, even if you're not the custodial parent, you can claim your child if your former spouse releases the dependency exemption to you. When that's the case, you'll need to attach Form 8332, Release/Revocation of Release of Claim to Ex-

1. **Town Improvements** - Yes, we continue to address the maintenance and improvements to assets and infrastructure, protecting the environment, becoming a Sustainable Jersey Community, maintaining our low crime rate, preserving our quality of life and maintaining a financially stable City through responsible ratable growth. In addition to all of the above, we routinely respond to concerns and requests brought to us by our constituents.

2. **Businesses** - The South Amboy Business District easily lends itself to development that would welcome businesses that patrons would visit rather than reach online. Many retailers today are transitioning to an "online" presence rather than a bricks and mortar establishment. For these reason restaurants, personal services and entertainment venues are preferable as well as specialized shops and services and those businesses related to the Arts.

3. **Parking Meters** - It has been the opinion of this administration that in South Amboy parking meters would actually hurt business. We have taken steps to designate areas of parking that have limited occupancy time. We have also designated fifteen (15) minute parking areas in certain areas located in the business district to provide for a fast turnaround. We have created "pocket parking" along Broadway. With technology what it is and the parking system available, we see a need to change the way we think about parking in our City. Also, being a New Jersey Designated Transit Village and an extremely walkable community, we are looking to include more bike lanes and pedestrian pathways, especially in the areas where development such as the Intermodal Transportation Center, commercial and residential development is taking place.

4. Term Limits – I don't think term limits are necessary. It takes a few years to really understand the needs of the community and work well within the system. If residents are unhappy with their representative, they have the right to vote for someone else or encourage some other candidate to run in the primary. That is our democratic process.

5. **Housing** – We believe in quality, not quantity. We need to continue to utilize smart growth as we view any project. We need to attract age oriented individuals to minimize the impact on our school system. The waterfront housing worked well as we secured high ratable with little impact to the school system. South Amboy was never an industrial community. With the creation of the train station and the upcoming ferry service, we are connecting workers to their jobs.

6. **Employment** - We have seen situations where a business opening will be solely run by its proprietor and we have seen businesses that have hired a large number of people from the community at large. We have also had expansions in existing businesses that have allowed the hiring of additional workers. There is no reason to believe this trend will change, however, employing the "smart growth" process of Redevelopment projects also offers job opportunities for the building trades during the construction of their projects. Needless to say, we also encourage business to consider tapping into our local talent pool to hire local residents.

7. **City Assets** - Comments that we hear from residents primarily indicate that they feel the city is clean with safe streets but we see the need to improve the status quo. We both walk the City frequently and as we observe areas in need of attention, we point these areas out to code enforcement or others to get speedy attention to the need. Over the years we have seen improvements to our infrastructure. These included bridges, roads and sewers. We can now focus on the Broadway business district. The creation of the Arts District will undoubtedly attract new business, which is already occurring with the opening of "Raise the Bar" and "Soul Sisters Cakery Café" ribbon cutting tomorrow, Saturday, October 29. When you also consider our YMCA, the train station and County Waterfront Park, we feel we are blessed but will continue to be open to and seek further improvements to quality of life for residents and visitors.

1) **Town Improvements -** I haven't been to the arts district yet so I really can't predict if it will be a success. I do know when the presentation was made to the council there was concern from the residents about parking and I don't see that being resolved. The open hours are limited and they close early. There is a lot of room for other businesses on Broadway but there is no success. I heard Dunkin Dounuts and Subway are closing. That would be a disaster. 2) **Businesses -** I would like to see businesses that well established and could withstand the growth pains of South Amboy. We missed the boat on Amazon. They are building a warehouse in Avenel and hiring 3500 people. I have done some research and Pet Supplies Plus is expanding along with Great Harvest Bread Co. They are looking to add 60 stores in the northeast. All products are made by hand adding more employees to the businesses. Pet owner spend over 350 million dollars just around the holidays.

3) **Parking Meters** - First you have to address parking. There Re some spaces that are currently unused and/or in need of demolition. Make them municipal parking lots and charge an affordable amount to residents and let the city offset taxes. Every time this topic is approached there is never a solution.

4) **Term Limits** - I do believe term limits are necessary. If the same people are always there the same ideas or lack thereof continue. I especially think they are necessary because as evidenced in the 2010 mayoral race the elections are not always honest. Is it rigged? Perhaps.

5) **Housing** - Absolutely no more housing is needed here. There is too much already and no matter how they are classified they aren't selling. There are too many foreclosures. We need a new firehouse and other businesses not housing. What they should do with existing empty properties is convert them to "over 55" housing. They should come up with a new idea for the Manhattan Beach Project. In December 2014 they had to sign the contract by the end of the year. Nearly 2 years later ...nothing.

6) **Employment** - I go to the council meetings and I am unaware of any new businesses coming to town. A bar reopened but don't see anything adding to the workforce.

7) **Town's Assets** - When I came here from Brooklyn 11 years ago I saw promise and hope. The waterfront is beautiful but when you get to Broadway it is disappointing. The new train station has its challenges because if you park in the lot and want to go to Broadway you have to go up one staircase and then down another and go back again. If you drive you have to find parking. Another challenge. When I have to take the train during the week I have to take a taxi because there is no parking. Parking seems to be a common denominator of all of the problems.

I don't think it is hopeless or impossible to turn this town around. We do need some new people and new thinking.

I think a South Amboy Business Association would be a good idea. Business owners could share ideas and help each other address problems. They could approach the administration as a cohesive group wand add more strength to problem resolution. They might also be able to share the cost of advertising with co-op ads. More marketing is needed.







money is used to make repairs to our parking lots. We have a vibrant business district. In downtown Woodbridge, stores are closing. Our business are expanding. They are no longer just on Smith Street but also on Hall Avenue, State Street and Amboy Avenue.

Sharon Hubberman: If you can't make a decision about parking meters - how can you make executive decisions? We should make sure that we have accessible parking for people who want park downtown. Buses are parked in the train station. They should not be parked there.

Homeless: Perth Amboy and New Brunswick are the only cities in Middlesex County that participate in a program to take in the homeless in severe inclement weather. Because of this, other Middlesex County municipalities send their homeless to us which puts a strain on our resources. What solution do you have for this problem?

Wilda Diaz: We have taken a proactive approach and have teamed up with social services. Some of the individuals that are homeless have health and mental issues. The Recreation Department also takes some of them in. Our Police Department, especially our Police Chaplains help feed the needy. We seriously help people who need us. We have been in talks with the other cities about doing their part.

Sharon Hubberman: Being raised as a Roman Catholic, I believe in helping and feeding people. Our homeless rate is 8% while the coutny is .26% We have to look at our own people who are losing our homes. We need to reach out to other communities and let them know it's their duty to help their own. Let's look at our property taxes to help our residents keep their homes.

Wilda Diaz Rebuttal: In Perth Amboy we are blessed to have the Salvation Army, God's Army Ministry an the YMCA who are helping the homeless and to seek housing for them. Sharon Hubberman Rebuttal: People have been on a waiting list for affordable housing for a long time, and then they find out that there number on the list has been dropped down greatly which means they have to wait even longer for affordable housing. Joel Pabon: At the end of the day we do a little bit too much. Other towns know that we will take care of their homeless and that's why they send them to us. We need to talk to the Freeholders about this. I do agree with the Mayor that we take

care of our own, but we can't take care of those who are sent here from other towns.

Miguel Nunez: I've seen a lot of homeless and people on the streets. There is just no place here for all of them anymore. **Recreation:**

Sharon Hubberman: Going to Board of Education Meetings we need to provide our young people with something to do which is both entertaining and educational. I know there is a separation between the City and the Board of Education, but they need to collaborate to increase the activities for our children. The Board of Education said they have a hard time working with the Mayor.

Joel Pabon: I have to kudos to Kenny Ortiz, the Director of Recreation and the Department of Public Works who make sure the parks are in shape for the activities. These people work 7 days a week. There was a study that said we need more recreation for the amount of people here. We have small parks. What I like to see is to have big parts built on those properties.

Wilda Diaz: Recreation is not only about sports. We have to think not only about having programs about literacy and scholastics. We have art activities and also activities for adults such as Zumba classes. There are programs for families, too.

Miguel Nunez: This should be happening all the time, not during just campaigning.

Historic Buildings: In the past, many historic buildings have been demolished. There is a remnant of a very historic city owned building on the corner of Rte. 35 and Smith Street which is scheduled to be demolished for a redevelopment project. This building is one of the last remnants of Eagleswood (a famous artist colony and progressive school in Perth Amboy for all races and sexes in the mid 1800's). It is a vital part of Perth Amboy's historic past. What would you do to preserve this building? Can we move it across the street to City owned property or move the development across the street to City owned property and make it a welcoming center? Joel Pabon: This is very important. We have a lot of history here and I just found out the value of this property. We lost too many historic homes. There was a house torn down on Convery Boulevard and a fast food establishment was put there which eventually went out of business. We definitely need to look into this. Wilda Diaz: I'm a history buff and we've had funding to save or renovate our historic building such as the Library, Ferry Slip and Kearny Cottage.For historic site, it is our responsibility to restore it and have archeological digs to make sure there is nothing valuable on those sites. I happy to report that another historic structure next to City Hall is scheduled to open soon.

Sharon Hubberman: We need to preserve these sites. I hear they're talking about putting affordable homes on that site. Rutgers University said we need to preserve these sites. Perhaps we should put a University there instead. Thomas Mundy Peterson (The First Black American to vote under the 15th Amendment) - We need to have a statue put in place for him, and on more than one site.

Miguel Nunez was asked a question by the Moderator: You are the owner of a business called Turismo Immigration and Tax. What personal experience in your business helped prepare you to become Mayor?

Miguel Nunez: I'm in touch with the people in Perth Amboy and how they feel because they come to me when they have to contact their relatives or friends in other countries. They feel comfortable talking to me about their needs living here.

Mayor Diaz was given several subjects to respond to. She chose to speak about the Muncipal ID Program.

Wilda Diaz: It helps all residents, especially those who don't speak English. We encourage people to speak two languages.

Joel Pabon was asked if his experience as being a Board of Education member in the past would benefit him if he were to be elected Mayor.

Joel Pabon: There definitely needs to be better communications in the City and The Board of Education. The Mayor's position has nothing to do with the inside workings of the Board of Education. Wilda Diaz: I will not support wasting money on changing the dates of elections and bogus environmental studies. Sharon Hubberman: It took a long time for the property to be found for a high school. In the past we had a Superintendent who ruled like a dictator. The people who are there now are making progress. Wilda Diaz Rebuttal: The SDA (School Development Authority) made it clear that they would not build a school on a contaminated site. This is state money that is being used.

Army Recruiter Risks Life to Save Truck Driver



Press Release 10/28/16 NEWARK – On the morning of Tuesday, October 11th, First Sergeant (1SG) Michael Huson was conducting his normal business driving to one of the seven Army Recruitment Centers that he manages. As he was exiting the highway, he passed a tractor trailer completely on its side along the side of the road. At first glance it appeared to have been placed there out of the way of traffic to be recovered at a later time. As he drove by, though, he noticed the wheels were still moving and smoke was coming from the vehicle. He immediately exited his vehicle and rushed over to the overturned tractor trailer.

Upon approaching the vehicle, 1SG Huson instructed a bystander to call 911. He noticed movement in the cab and a body on the driver side door that was now the floor of the cab. He went to the back of the cab to climb up to open the top door and get inside. As he was about to climb up, he noticed fuel pouring out of the passenger fuel tank to the ground near the exhaust stack that was now on the ground. He did not let this deter him, though, and continued to climb, lifted the passenger side door up and found an injured female looking up at him and an injured driver beneath her. Another citizen then arrived at the vehicle and climbed up to help, holding the door as 1SG Huson entered the cab. Upon positioning himself in the cab, 1SG Huson helped the female passenger climb out and, at that point, realized that neither the driver nor his passenger spoke English. Luckily the individual holding the door was able to act as a translator, providing guidance and comfort to them.

After helping the female exit the vehicle, 1SG Huson turned his attention on the driver, and noticed that his legs were pinned. Since he couldn't be moved, 1SG Huson administered first aid and assessed his condition. The driver had head trauma from his head hitting the window and there was clearly something wrong with his upper body. After a little work, 1SG Huson was able to free the driver's legs and made him as comfortable as possible. There was no moving him up in his condition so with the help of the interrupter, they kept him alert and awake.

Approximately 25 minutes later, the police and fire departments, with EMS, arrived. They decided to cut out the window, requiring 1SG Huson to cover the driver and himself with a blanket to protect them from debris and glass. Once the window was removed, both were able to be evacuated from the overturned vehicle.

The entire time 1SG Huson was the only one ever in the cab. Later one of 1SG Huson's subordinates informed him that it took several hours to clear the road and that the vehicle had caught fire. When asked why he decided to stop and aid these individuals, 1SG Huson stated "It was the right thing to do. We fight the good fight daily with civilians and our reputation in communities, I hope my actions are a display of our character, as any Soldier in my company would have done the same."

Pallone Announces \$9.8 Million in Federal Funding to New Jersey for Low Performing Schools

Press Release 10/25/16 WASHINGTON, DC -- Today, Congressman Frank Pallone, Jr. (NJ-06) announced that the state of New Jersey will receive \$9,824,640 in federal funding through the Department of Education's School Improvement Grants (SIG) program. These grants are awarded to states for lowachieving schools districts that show the greatest need for assistance and the strongest commitment to using the funds to raise student achievement. "Improving our schools is one of the most important and necessary things we can do to ensure a better future for our children and communities,"

said Pallone. "I am pleased that the Department of Education has awarded this federal grant to New Jersey and given our state the opportunity to improve the schools that need it most."

Since 2009, the SIG program has invested over \$7 billion to improve 1,800 of the country's lowest performing schools. Data from SIG has shown that schools that receive grants are improving faster than other schools, and particularly improving in math and reading proficiency. This year, the program awarded a total of \$427,500,000 to states and territories of the United States.

This Week in World War II 75 Years Ago

On October 31, 1941, while escorting an eastbound convoy from Newfoundland, the American destroyer USS Reuben James is torpedoed and sunk by German submarine U-552 near Iceland, killing 115 of the crew of 159. This is the first loss of a U.S. Navy vessel in the European Theater of the war. The Luftwaffe flies 45 bombing sorties over Moscow. SS Gen. Erich von dem Bach-Zelewski reports to Berlin: "Today, there are no more Jews in Estonia." Carving of the Mount Rushmore National Memorial, in the Black Hills of South Dakota, is completed. Construction had been started by Danish-American sculptor Gutzon Borglum in 1927, and was continued after his death (in March 1941) by his son, Lincoln Borglum.

On November 1 President Roosevelt announces that the U.S. Coast Guard will immediately move to the jurisdiction of the U.S. Navy — a transition of authority usually reserved only for wartime. German forces in the Crimea take Simferopol, an important communications center. The Rainbow Bridge over the Niagara River, connecting the U.S. and Canada, opens to traffic.

The Finnish conquest of East Karelia is completed on November 2 with the Soviet withdrawal from Kondopoga, in Russia. A Vichy French convoy of freighters and passenger ships is captured north of Madagascar by British cruisers.


The Germans take the Soviet city of Kursk, south of Leningrad, on November 3. They also cut the railroad line between Leningrad and Vologda at Tikhvin.

German advances in the Crimea continue, with the city of Feodosia, on the Black Sea coast, being captured on November 4. New regulations in Greater Germany deny Jews sick pay, accident insurance, vacation pay and pensions. They may be fired without notice and may not become apprentices. In the U.S., Fiorello LaGuardia is elected to a third term as mayor of New York City. Also holding the federal position of Director-Office of Civilian Defense, LaGuardia spends three days each week in Washington, D.C., and four in New York City.

From Tokyo, the Japanese government dispatches a top diplomat, Saburo Kurusu, to Washington on November 5 in an effort to negotiate a settlement with the United States on their various issues. In the meantime, U.S. code-breakers continue to intercept all Japanese diplomatic messages. In Japan, Adm. Isoroku Yamamoto issues to the Imperial Navy's Combined Fleet Top Secret Order No. 1, detailing the plans for the attack on Pearl Harbor.

On November 6, Soviet leader Joseph Stalin addresses the people of the Soviet Union for only the second time since taking over the leadership of the country in 1922 (the first time being earlier this year, on July 2). He states that even though 350,000 Red Army troops have been killed in German attacks so far, the Germans have lost 4.5 million soldiers (a gross exaggeration) and Soviet victory is near. German troops begin experiencing frostbite on the Eastern Front. (Because the Germans expected the U.S.S.R. to fall within weeks of their invasion in June, many German troops have no winter clothing.) In Rivne, Ukraine, the Germans kill between 15,000 and 18,000 Jewish residents in a pine grove in nearby Sosenki Forest.
