In Defense of the Defense Vehicle

1/9/17 Caucus & 1/11/17 Council Meeting

PERTH AMBOY - R-17-1/17 - Authorizing the Perth Amboy Police Department to acquire a Navastar MaxPro MRAP Vehicle from the Federal 1033 LESO Program.

This \$65,000 vehicle only cost the City \$6,500 (shipping cost) because the Federal Government no longer had any use for it. It was offered to any municipality instead of it being scrapped. It is a Humvee and Military Rescue Vehicle.

Business Administrator Adam Cruz further explained

that it can be used in water rescue up to 5 feet of water.

During the 1/11/17 Council Meeting Resident Stephanie (Rodriguez) Márquez-Villafañe came up to speak about this vehicle, "Why do we need such a heavy duty vehicle for such a small City? It's for use on the battlefield. Why are we getting it for free? Is it because the government feels it's unusable or they think that the City will be more crime ridden? With this vehicle, maybe the gangs will be getting more heavy duty artillery. Who can operate this heavy duty and wide vehicle? And what about traffic congestion? I don't think people will like such a scary looking vehicle in town. It might not be able to go down low tonnage streets. I don't think this vehicle will be of help to the City."

Council President Bill Petrick agreed that Stephanie (Rodriguez) Márquez-Villafañe had a lot of valid points.

Historical Society Looking to Take Next Steps in South Amboy 1/11/17 Council Meeting

By: Joseph L. Kuchie SOUTH AMBOY - Mary Szaro, the President of the South Amboy Historical Society, spoke to the city's council members last Wednesday about the future of the organization.

Szaro spoke of the city's rich historical history and the steps the organization has taken since being founded in 2011. She now believes that they are ready to take the next steps that will benefit South Amboy moving forward.

"We are now in a solid and steady position to propose a major historical initiative that will benefit our community for generations to come," Szaro

According to Szaro, the initiative would include three interlinking objectives:

- 1. Incorporating a historical preservation element into the city's new Master Plan.
- 2. Establish a historical preservation commission via a city ordinance.
- 3. Acquire a designed location for a Historical Society of South Amboy History Center.

"We are all caretakers of the historic future of this city," Szaro said. "We can't regain what was already lost but we can take action to ensure we will leave a legacy and a promise to all citizens past present and future that the history of South Amboy is a priority.

"This initiative is long overdue for the city of South Amboy and it's our historic responsibility to finally make it happen before it's too late," she added. "We won't get a second chance to preserve our history if we don't protect the few things we have left right now."

Mayor Fred Henry and the council all praised Szaro's work as President of the His-

torical Society, and gave her their full support in doing their best to make this initiative a re-

"A lot of other communities are looking at us as an example of what can be accomplished," Henry said. "As a former history teacher, it's great to see these things going on."

"Believe me, I would love to have a home for a Historical Society museum type of thing...we all know these things cost money," he continued. "If you don't ask you don't know. I got in touch with [Middlesex County] Freeholder Director [Ronald] Rios and he said to put together proposals and this is what we are in the process of doing."

"These are just great things for the city of South Amboy and it's been a great accomplishment over the years and I thank you for your part in that," he added.

Business Administrator Camille Tooker also noted that she received Szaro's request for a historical preservation commission, and it will be put on the agenda to discuss at a business meeting in February.

The council also congratulated Mayor Henry for being named the Grand Marshall for this year's St. Patrick's Day Parade in South Amboy on March 19th.

"Mayor Henry has dedicated his life to the city of South Amboy whether it's as a teacher or as an elected official...it's a well-deserved honor," Council President Mickey Gross

"I want to thank the parade organization for the honor of being Grand Marshall this year," Henry said. "It's something I did not expect but greatly welcome."

All council members were in attendance.



Our Perspective on the Women's March on Washington 1/20/17-1/22/17

Red Cross Critically Needs Donors After Winter Weather Adds to Severe Blood Shortage

NEW JERSEY - Following several rounds of severe winter weather in many parts of the country, the American Red Cross urges eligible blood and platelet donors to help restock its shelves to overcome a shortage.

Since Dec. 1, about 300 blood drives across 27 states have been forced to cancel due to inclement winter weather, resulting in more than 10,500 blood and platelet donations going uncollected.

Blood donor Jim Taylor knows how it feels to have a loved one waiting for a transfusion. His son Aaron was born with a rare liver condition. In the short two months of his life, he received 115 blood products. Taylor said each transfusion gave his family more time with Aaron, so he encourages others to give.

"When the Red Cross says there is a shortage, they are not exaggerating," said Taylor. "I now know from experience that what they are saying is somewhere there is a father waiting on the donation that will save his son's life. When the Red Cross asks for help, what that means is a new dad is praying for a miracle."

At this time Lt. Sulikowski PAPD came up to give more information about the vehicle, "It's eight and half feet wide, weighs 41,000 lbs. and has 8,000 miles on it. It's a left-over from the Iraqi war. Instead of destroying the vehicle, the government offers it to any municipality. They give you a checklist of the vehicle and it uses diesel fuel. It can be used for an active shooter rescue. I hope and pray that nothing like Orlando happens here."

Council President Bill Petrick wondered, "If we decide to take this vehicle, then change our minds, can we sell it?"

Lt. Sulikowski answered, "No. It has to go back to the Federal Government." Sulikowksi added, "This vehicle can be used to transport personnel to a protest site, but we can't use it against the protestors. It can also be used in hazardous weather rescue. It can also be used in a crisis situation."

Former Councilwoman and Resident Lisa Nanton agreed with Stephanie about this vehicle, but she also wondered why the Council voting on this vehicle if it's already here.

B.A. Cruz answered Nanton, "This is not a purchase, but was acquired through a grant. The reason it is on the agenda is because they need this on record to show that the Police Department did receive this vehicle.

Resident Jeremy Baratta said, "Do we need a tank in the City? Think about it."

B.A. Cruz responded, "Remember, this vehicle is for emergency purposes only and it's about keeping Officers safe on the street."

Others who were in support of the Police Department acquiring this vehicle included Former Councilman and retired Police Officer Kenneth Balut. "We forgot about the terrorist attack that happened recently six months ago and 9-11-01. This is why we need vehicles like this."

During the Council Comments, Councilman Jelmin Caba addressed Stephanie Rodriguez and other concerned citizens, "I'm not in favor of a Police State, but we have to remember about that terrorist who lived in Perth Amboy. If this vehicle can save one life in the City, then it will be worth it."

PERTH AMBOY - Former Councilwoman Lisa Nanton had a problem with Communication No. 13 where Law Director Louis N. Rainone told the Council that they were in violation of the Faulkner Act by continuing to use the services of Attorney Robert Tarv-

Tarver was the attorney hired by the Council to conduct an investigation into the appointment of former Business Administrator Peter Pelissier.

Rainone said that when Tarver submitted his report to the Council on September 2016, Tarver's services should have been concluded.

During the public portion of the Council Meeting, Nanton said, "This is a conflict of interest and ludicrous and the Council needs to ignore this (Communication No. 13). You hired this lawyer legally."

There was a late starter that was added: R-25-1/17 - Authorizing the Law Offices of Robert L. Tarver, Jr. to take appropriate action to recoup any and all funds improperly disbursed or paid relative to the hiring and retention of Peter Pelissier as Assistant Business Administrator.

There was a motion to table

this item made by Councilman Jelmin Caba.

Resolution R-24-1/17 Authorizing extension of all 2016 contracts for the provision of professional services not to exceed 60 days.

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez is the one who wanted this resolution singled out separately for further discussion stating, "This calls for a full Law Director and wouldn't an interim required to be full time?"

DeCotiis Attorney Judy Verrone who was sitting in told the Council, "The Mayor will determine my hours."

Gonzalez questioned this and said, "We will have to go to court about this because we passed an ordinance requiring we get a full time Law Direc-

B.A. Adam Cruz responded, "We are not recognizing that ordinance."

Verrone continued, "It's the Mayor's power to veto the ordinance (calling for a full time Law Director) under the Faulkner Act)."

Gonzalez shot back, "We need our own lawyer. I'm concerned that the Mayor violated an ordinance. We should not recognize a part time Law Director."

Councilman Fernando Irizarry remarked, "We need representatives to protect us."

Councilman Joel Pabon was frustrated, "We keep playing the same game over and over. We're not even looking for a full time Law Director."

During the last public portion, Resident Kenneth Balut had a question for Councilman Caba, "You should have known about Pelissier during your campaign. Quinones-Perez said she was working on the Mayor's campaign - which was yours. Quinones' picture was on your campaign literature. You should tell the citizens where your campaign money (the PAC) was coming from. Did you get money from Fairfield Insurance? Is the Mayor trying to take over the Board of Education?"

Business Owner Virginia Lugo came up to speak, "You're (the Council) supposed to look over what the administration is doing. Your former Law Director blatantly lied. She wrote a contract for a storage company. We need to have an attorney that the Council can trust."

A Resident from Elm Street came up to speak. She was

TRENTON - On Saturday January 21, six thousand women, their families, and their allies arrived in our state's capital city to participate in the Women's March on Trenton. At the Patriots' Theater at the Trenton War Memorial, small groups of women and allies took to the stage to share their personal reasons for attending the march. These individuals spoke on behalf of the diverse coalition of activists, communities, and partnering organi-

zations represented at the march. Many speakers touched on issues that featured prominently in the mission statement of the Women's March on New Jersey, including reproductive access, racial justice, affordable housing, access to education, and climate change.

"At Planned Parenthood we believe that access to health care should not depend on who you are, where you live, how much money you make, or your race or immigration status," said Christine Sadovy, Advocacy Director Planned Parenthood Action Fund of New Jersey. "The right to control our own bodies and plan if and when we want to start a family is fundamental and we will not allow it to be taken away. We will not go

Marchers also heard from keynote speakers including Congresswoman Bonnie Watson Coleman, Luanne Peterpaul with Garden State Equality, professor Dr. Dalia Fahmy, Congressman Donald Norcross, immigration activist Diana Meija, and SEIU New Jersey State Council Executive Director Lizette Delgado.

"It's an honor to stand with women from across our state and around the country to defend women's rights, human rights, and civil rights," said Congressman Norcross. "We're joining together to send a clear message that we will continue to fight for our values and that discrimination of any kind will not be tolerated."

Following the program at the Patriots' Theater, the marchers took to the streets, where they marched to the steps of the New Jersey State House. There, New Jersey Assemblywomen Pamela Lampitt, Elizabeth Muoio, and Shavonda Sumter spoke to the crowd about the importance of taking action. Finally, the march concluded with a powerful speech by Trenton civil rights legend Edith Savage-Jennings.

"The massive number of women marching today in Trenton, Washington, and around the world could be the largest mobilization of women in history," said Phyllis Salowe-Kaye, Executive Director of New Jersey Citizen Action. 



\$47 Million Investment



Tom's Tax Tips

Knowing "The Line" Creates **Opportunity**Courtesy of Tom Ploskanka

A simple way to think about your 1040 tax return is focusing on a single line, your Adjusted Gross Income (AGI). Anything "above the line" creates an AGI that can yield tax opportunities or tax consequences for anything "below the line." Being aware of "the line" and the impact it has on your tax return can help you make better tax decisions throughout the year.

Understand the line. When you hear "the line," it's referring to both the last line on page one and the first line on page two of your 1040 tax return. The AGI line is made up of W-2 wages, tips, and other income; interest and dividends; capital gains/losses; alimony; pensions, annuities, and social security income; and business activity profits and losses. It also includes a number of miscellaneous items that can reduce your AGI such as educator expense, moving expense, student loan interest, and alimony paid.

The list of things that impact AGI can be lengthy. What is important, however, is understanding that this single line has a tremendous impact on what your final tax bill will be. It's also important to consider below the line impact.

Phase outs. If your AGI is too high, you could be in for an unpleasant tax surprise because so many of your "below the line" tax benefits can be phased out. This could include losing up to 80% of your itemized deductions, all of your exemptions, and access to most credits.

Alternative minimum tax. A high AGI can subject your tax return to a below the line calculation using an alternative tax table.

Marginal tax. Your AGI can subject some of your income to higher tax rates up to 39.6%. Understanding the importance of "the line" on your tax return can help clarify suggested tax planning actions. How much can you add to your AGI and still be subject to a lower tax rate? Does an increase in your AGI phase out other tax bene-

This Week in World War II 75 Years Ago

The Japanese on January 23 land 5,000 troops at Rabaul, defended by 1,400 Australians and New Guinea militiamen. The battle is the start of the New Guinea Campaign. Kieta, on Bougainville, the largest of the Solomon Islands, falls to the Japanese. In the Philippines, the Japanese overrun U.S. troops' first defensive line on the Bataan Peninsula. One small Allied victory is scored as the Japanese troop transport Nana Maru is bombed and sunk by a Dutch Brewster Buffalo fighter plane in the Makassar Strait between Borneo and Sulawesi Islands.

In the Dutch East Indies, four U.S. and Dutch destroyers on January 24 attack Japanese troop transports off Balikpapan, Borneo, sinking three of the five vessels. The other two transports are able to land their troops. After a brief battle, the Japanese overwhelm the Dutch garrison. The Dutch, though, had previously partially destroyed the petroleum refinery there. In retaliation, the Japanese massacre many of the Europeans that are captured. American troops land in Samoa, as part of a strategy to stop Japanese expansion in the Pacific. In Washington, the U.S. government authorizes the equipping of its own merchant ships and those of Allied nations with weapons and U.S. Navy gun crews.

On January 25, the Japanese land at Lae, the capital of New Guinea. In Russia, the Red Army encircles 5,500 German troops near Kholm, southwest of Leningrad. The so-called Kholm Pocket will be successfully defended by the Germans for 105 days until relieved, with ammunition, food and other supplies air-dropped by the Luftwaffe in the interim. In Malaya, Gen. Archibald Wavell authorizes British and Commonwealth troops to leave their last defensive position, at Batu Pahat, and retreat 75 miles to Singapore, on the southern tip of the Malay Peninsula. In North Africa, the British 2nd Armoured Brigade is almost completely destroyed by Rommel's German onslaught near Msus, Libya.

The first American troops to land in the European Theater of the war disembark at Belfast, Northern Ireland, on January 26. In Washington, D.C., the Roberts Commission, a board of inquiry empaneled to investigate the attack on Pearl Harbor, finds Adm. Husband Kimmel (then Commander, U.S. Pacific Fleet) and Lt. Gen. Walter Short (then Commander, Hawaii Dept.) guilty of dereliction of duty. Both are already out of the service; both receive death threats as a result of the commission's report.

Japanese troops in Borneo capture Singkawang on January 27. The submarine USS Gudgeon becomes the first U.S. Navy vessel to sink an enemy warship, as she destroys the Japanese submarine *I-73* with three torpedoes. In Europe, Soviet forces under Marshal Semyon Timoshenko continue their advance into the Ukraine, capturing Lozova, in the Kharkiv region. German Luftwaffe ace Wilhelm Spies, credited with 20 aerial victories, is shot down and killed over Sukhinichi, Russia, south of Moscow.

German and Italian troops recapture Benghazi, Libya, on January 28. Brazil and Paraguay break off diplomatic relations with Germany, Italy and Japan.

On January 29, Japanese troops capture the provincial capital Pontianak, Borneo. In Iran, representatives of Great Britain and the Soviet Union sign a treaty of alliance, which opens a supply route to the U.S.S.R. for the Allies through Iran. The U.S. Coast Guard cutter USCGC Alexander Hamilton is torpedoed and sunk off Reykjavik, Iceland, by German sub *U-132*, killing 26 Coast Guardsmen.




