Garcia, Ortiz Accuse Board of Unethical Practices

By: Katherine Massopust PERTH AMBOY - At the 7/24/14 Board of Education Meeting Board Members Maria Garcia and William Ortiz questioned the Board on the hiring of certain individuals, especially the hiring of a new Director of Personnel and Evaluation replacing the position of HR Manager. This position was newly created to correspond with State mandates and a cause for controversy at the Meeting. Oritz and Garcia felt that the former HR Manager did not receive a fair shake at the job. On the Addendum which was a late addition to the Agenda was the hiring of Dr. Debra J. Sheard as Director of Personnel & Evaluation.

Board Member William Ortiz drilled Interim Superintendent Dr. Vivian Rodriguez on this matter. "For every other job posted, it was done for 10 days. This particular job was posted for 28 days. That's almost three times the usual amount of days. Why did it take so long?"

Rodriguez answered, "It's a very important position."

Ortiz asked, "How many candidates were interviewed?" Rodriguez answered, "I can't recall."

Ortiz asked, "How many times did you interview the candidate?"

Rodriguez answered, "Two times"

Ortiz continued drilling Rodriguez, "When was the candidate first interviewed?"

Rodriguez answered, "I can't recall. I was on vacation. I came back."

Ortiz asked, "When did you get back?"

Rodriguez answered, "I'm not sure. I think it was July 15th. I interviewed the candidate with an Administrative Assistant from HR. I don't remember what date."

"She never applied until the 17th. The job listing ended the day she applied. She didn't

complete the application until the 18th. She was interviewed before she applied for the job. I believe that is illegal," Ortiz insisted.

"I am asking you to hire this individual," Rodriguez answered.

The Board Attorney then stated, "A motion to table must come forward. There is no debate."

Board Member Ortiz then motioned to table the hiring of the position; Garcia Seconded. Board Members Dianne Roman, William Ortiz and Maria Garcia voted "yes." Board Members Milady Tejada, Ken Puccio, Sam Lebreault, Anthony Bermudez, Israel Varela and Obi Gonzalez voted "no." Motion does not pass."

Ortiz continued, "We are voting on a person - that is against the law."

Stern said, "The Board President has a right to close the debate."

Ortiz continued, "We do not live in a dictatorship."

Board Member Maria Garcia added, "This is a very important job. We need to debate this. We should allow people to debate to come to the right decision. We need to debate."

Ortiz insisted, "The Personnel Committee drops it in (the agenda) the day before. It's disturbing that the Board wants to constrict me. Everyone gets 10 minutes to debate," citing Robert's Rules.

Board Attorney Stern said, "The Board is not bound by Robert's Rules of Order."

Rodriguez then read from a prepared statement. The following are some of the ex-

Making New Jersey Energy Strong: PSE&G to Upgrade Gas Facilities In South Amboy And South River

News Release July 25, 2014 NEWARK - With approval of its Energy Strong program, Public Service Electric & Gas Co. (PSE&G) is upgrading gas facilities in South Amboy and South River.

The utility will be installing new gas mains, as well as upgrading associated service lines that carry the gas to homes and businesses. Beginning on or about August 11, work will take place Monday through Saturday between the hours of 7 a.m. to 8 p.m., conditions permitting. The project is expected to be complete in November.

Customers will be notified when work is about to begin in their area. This upgrade is part of PSE&G's recently approved Energy Strong program to strengthen and protect the state's electric and gas infrastructure from severe weather. Customers can find a list of affected streets at www. pseg.com/energystrong.

As part of Energy Strong, PSE&G will replace 250 miles of older cast iron main with new plastic pipe in or near flood areas throughout its service territory. This year, the utility will replace the first 88 miles, with the remainder scheduled for replacement in 2015. These new pipes will prevent water from entering the mains, increasing the reliability of gas service in these locations.

"We're working to start building the resiliency into our systems needed to withstand the kind of severe weather that has devastated our state in recent years," said Ralph LaRossa, PSE&G president and COO. "The gas pipes we are replacing were impacted by flood waters from Hurricane Irene or the storm surges

from Superstorm Sandy. Once this work is done, our gas system in these areas will be better protected during future storms."

To upgrade the mains, it will be necessary to dig trenches in the roadway to install the new pipe. As a result, there may be road closures and/or detours. Local police will be on the scene to direct vehicle and pedestrian traffic. At the end of each workday, the trenches will be filled in. Plates will be secured on any other open areas so people can safely drive and walk.

Once the gas mains are upgraded, PSE&G will need to access customers' homes to connect their service and meter to the new main. PSE&G will contact homeowners to arrange a date and time to do the work. During this reconnection, customers will be without gas service for approximately four hours. We regret any inconvenience this may cause.

For everyone's safety, PSE&G crews will be using work area protection including traffic cones, utility work signs, and barriers to allow the job to be done safely. The utility reminds motorists to slow down and follow detour signs when driving through the construction area.



cerpts from the prepared statement: "The district is going in a different direction. By 2015-2016 we will be required to have an evaluation system. The Superintendent of Schools is clearly committed to the role for providing feedback. We will monitor the value of principles and ideals." Then she added, "I believe we have done a good search and have an excellent candidate before us. We have a committee achieving in place including a Director of Personnel. It has been a collaborative community effort district wide. The person recommended has certification and has worked behind the field in the trenches. I hope the public and Board understands the direction we take. I believe I have given you the correct information and presented it to the Board. I must respectfully disagree to your line of questioning, Mr. Oritz. I believe we have done a good search and have an excellent candidate before us."

Board Member William Ortiz stated, "Questioning the Superintendent does not constitute a debate. We are voting on a person that is against the law. I have to be fair. I will bring action. We do not live in a dictatorship."

Stern answered, "The Board is not bound by all of Robert's Rules of Order. Robert's Rules can offer help. Robert's Rules cannot be used as a means to filibuster. The Board is bound by their by-laws. There is respect for the office of Board President and the Superintendent of Schools."

Ortiz said, "The Board does not follow the rules."

Stern answered, "Your opinion is on the record. 10-142 regarding any matter involving employment or terms of employment. Anyone who applies for a job must be discussed in closed session as to not debate someone's reputation in public."

Board Member Maria Garcia then asked for a vote to go to closed session to discuss the matter in private. Ortiz seconded it. Only Maria Garcia and William Ortiz voted "yes" with everyone else voting "no." Motion did not pass.

Board Member Anthony Bermudez asked for a vote to close this discussion. Board Members Dianne Roman, Maria Garcia and William Ortiz voted "no" while Board Members Milady Tejada, Ken Puccio, Sam Lebreault, Anthony Bermudez, Israel Varela and Obi Gonzalez voted "yes." The motion passed and the debate was closed.







Avoiding Summer Skin Problems

Summer is in full swing and hopefully your fun hasn't been jeopardized by anything that causes itchiness, redness or swelling. There are a few summer-specific skin conditions or, as they are known to physicians, "summer dermatoses," that we should all keep on our radar.

Of course, the most common summer skin ailment is sunburn. It is important to stay protected and use a sunscreen with a UV rating of at least 30, but there are a few other heatrelated skin issues that you might not be thinking about, but should be.

Contracting poison ivy or poison oak can really put a damper on a day in the great outdoors. The medical name for these issues is contact dermatitis, which refers to any condition that occurs when touching something leads to a rash or allergic reaction on the skin's surface. Contact dermatitis causes itchiness and redness. Severe cases can cause blisters, hives or swelling.

The best way to prevent contact dermatitis is to be hyper aware of your surroundings. Google what poison ivy and poison oak look like. Be careful when camping, hiking or walking. Avoid tall grasses and stick to the paths. Treat these contact issues with overthe-counter hydrocortisone, but if the rash is more severe you may need a prescription strength steroid from your own dermatologist or family physician.

Bug bites are annoying and can also lead to more serious health issues like Lyme disease or West Nile virus. Scratching a bug bite until it bleeds can lead to infection.

A bug's decision-making process to bite or not bite is more complicated than you might think. Carbon dioxide production, and the lipid mix on the surface of the skin, are what attract bugs to humans. Mosquitos find humans by determining where carbon dioxide is being produced. As humans, producing carbon dioxide is pretty much unavoidable (we can't exactly stop breathing to prevent a mosquito bite). Each person's lipid mixture is a bit more varied. Everyone has a different composition of lipids on the surface of the skin, made up of cholesterol, triglycerides, ceramides and other fats. Certain lipid mixtures are more appealing to bugs. This is why it is common for some people to get bitten more than others.

Unfortunately, your skin's lipid mix is based on genetics. You can't change your DNA, but there are some preventative measures that everyone can take to avoid summer bites. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends using bug repellents that contain DEET, picardin or oil of lemon eucalyptus. Sleep inside or in a screenedin area like a tent. If you have a bug bite that is unusually itchy or feels painful, contact your family physician or dermatologist.

If you live in workout clothes or spandex, you could be at risk for developing folliculitis. It is particularly easy to contract this bacterial infection in the summer months. Bacteria thrive in warm, moist dark conditions, like sweaty t-shirts or damp bathing suits. Folliculitis looks like red bumps or pustules and is commonly found on shoulders, thighs and bottoms. Folliculitis can be itchy or burn. Folliculitis can also be contracted in hot tubs. Be sure that every hot tub you spend time in is properly chlorinated.

If you are sweaty, rinse off. Change out of tight clothes after exercising and try not to wear spandex all day. If you plan to be out for the whole day and it is very humid, bring a change of clothes. An antibacterial cleanser can help prevent and treat folliculitis. If you notice something that looks like folliculitis, contact your family physician or dermatologist. More severe cases require an oral antibacterial.






