Competition is Fierce

Perth Amboy Applies for Transitional Aid Topics of Discussion at 2/22/12 and 2/27/12 Meetings

PERTH AMBOY - At the Special Meeting on 2/27, Business Administrator Greg Fehrenbach gave a presentation of what conditions must be met by the City if they are granted Transitional Aid from the State. At the Council Meeting of 2/22 he said it took six people to fill out the transitional aid application. "The twenty-nine page memorandum includes state monitoring of contracts, hiring, etc. which the Mayor and Council would have no control over, if we are accepted for this aid," Fehrenbach stated.

Some of the focal points of transitional aid would include grant is set up if certain conditions are abided by. There would be a placement of a monitor. Labor contracts in place cannot be touched. If contracts expire a monitor can participate in those cases. A monitor can preside over vacancies or new positions, salaries of non-union employees, capital improvement and budgets and modification of that services.

Fehrenbach stated that in some instances such as in Hoboken the State monitor raised taxes 45% without the local government body voting. The monitor is basically concerned is that the bottom line

is met.

In another instance the monitor stopped all services except for the police, fire and EMS.

"If we are accepted for Transitional Aid it would be for one year to provide for additional property tax relief. We are one of the ten most municipal property taxed towns," Fehrenbach stated.

The following towns such as Newark, Irvington, Paterson, Trenton and Asbury Park are always the prime candidates seeking this aid. Lindenwold was one of the towns applying for additional aid at the same time Perth Amboy.

The aid that Perth Amboy is making a loan to the City. A requesting is \$2 million which would be applied towards the 2012 City Budget. Fehrenbach said that the introduced budget came in \$4.4 million below fiscal year 2010. "This is the first time in fourteen years that the tax levy has dropped. This budget is also \$1.5 million less than the 2011 budget. The decrease in property tax levy is \$1,187,000. " said Fehrenbach.

> The proposed Citywide 2012 municipal budget is in the total amount of \$70,787,201. Mayor Wilda Diaz stated this budget will stabilize property taxes by trimming the cost of government services. "There was a lot of unnecessary debt

created by the prior administration due to illicit mismanagement," Mayor Diaz stated. "This is something my administration has been dealing with and we have consolidated our resources within the Police, DPW and Fire Department which has reduced overtime, accumulated leave liabilities and responding quicker to emergencies dealing with public safety. Even with all of this going on, we still have a excessive debt."

One of the financial objectives is to look into the YMCA service agreement and obligations.

At several Council Meetings, the Council members and residents have voiced their concerns about the many change orders that have occurred in regards to the Public Safety Complex on New Brunswick Avenue. Some of those change orders have applied to the repairs, modifications, and upkeep to the swimming pools at the YMCA. The City has met with President and CEO of the YMCA Steve Jobin to resolve these issues.

Each city department head also presented their budgets to the B.A. at earlier hearings. Fehrenbach made suggestions when necessary to any department as to what additional information was needed for him to make a determination if there was a way they could consolidate or eliminate certain functions.

B.A. Greg Fehrenbach stated that the City had borrowed \$4 million initially to help pay off money owed to Middlesex Water and that is down to \$2 million.

The Parking Utility Surplus is to be used for structural improvements to the Jefferson Street Parking Deck.

Council President Kenneth Balut stated that it was the lo-

Traffic and Street Lights Questioned at South Amboy Council Meeting

SOUTH AMBOY - In what is becoming a recurring theme, the traffic and street lights around South Amboy were once again discussed and debated at last week's council

Last month, business administrator Camille Tooker noted that there were 57 street lights out around the area, but the city was working with Jersey Central to fix the problem. At the last meeting, Tooker explained that she met with the lighting company and progress was being made.

"The city met with Jersey Central last week to discuss the lighting, and our issue is a priority on their list," Tooker said. "However, we are not the only town they service and they have to operate on a budget, so it's going to take time."

Despite the progress, resident Tom Cross was not satisfied with the work being done. Cross has attended a number of meetings in the past few weeks in an attempt to have something done about the lighting problem.

"We pay for this service in our taxes, and according to the bill list we are paying \$13,000 a month to light the city," Cross said. "Those lights are

consuming energy whether they are working at full capacity or not, so it doesn't matter how many times we report it if they don't fix it."

Resident Vince Mackiel also voiced his concerns on the lack of lighting in the area, questioning what has changed around the city since they first met with Jersey Central. Tooker was able to give him information, explaining the new upgrades to city hall and the firehouse.

"We met with Jersey Central about fixing Broadway, but we have already seen improvements to lighting near city hall and the fire house," Tooker said. "They have installed 'cobra lighting' on existing poles by the train plaza and have also fixed general lighting near the YMCA. Work is being done."

"Cobra Lighting" is a type of LED light that can be placed on top of streetlights to improve lighting in the area. Most of these lights can illuminate an area for hours on one charge and can sustain an average lifetime of 100,000 hours.

Another issue raised at the council meeting was traffic lights, as resident Mary Bouchard questioned the tim-

Board of Ed Forum Meeting 3/3

tendent of Schools Dr. Janine Walker Caffrey presided over the community Board of Ed Forum Meeting held at the James J. Flynn School on Chamberlain Avenue. While the audience consisted mainly of educators and some former board members there was a very small group of residents in attendance from the neighborhood. Dr. Caffrey presented several slides outlining where students needed academic improvements in various subjects. The most glaring point of her presentation was that last year only 522 students graduated. At the beginning of their freshman year that class had over 700 students enrolled. The dropout rate of over 200 students was a focal point of this meeting and many in attendance suggested solutions to this problem.

Board Member Obi Gonzalez voiced her concerns of the lack of parents who were absent from this meeting especially since it was held on at a Saturday at 10 a.m. Several of those in attendance agreed that many students drop out of school because they need to work to help out their families financially.

Gonzalez continued, "I was a high school counselor but social workers are needed more because they have more specialized skills. That's where the money should go. We need ongoing sustainable programs - not ones that come and go. (referring to the \$39) million from the state) Programs are needed where the parents and students can participate together. Let's open up the school libraries - especially on weekends so we can engage the parents social issues concerning them (for example housing and work issues). I am hoping with each subsequent Board of Education Forum Meetings that more parents will come out."

A concerned parent who is also a substitute teacher said, "We should reach out to the churches and have these announcements made about these meetings. A lot of parents are very religious and this is a good way to communicate to them the importance to come to the regular school board meetings and these community forum meetings.

Mr. Cilia who is the Principal in the Flynn School stated, "I am a product of the Perth Amboy School System as is my mother. An extended school year and day would be welcomed by parents." He offered up that he has been an educator for 29 years. "Our after-school programs has a waiting list. All of our activi-

> Dr. Caffrey agreed, "We need to make up a lot of ground and the summer slide is where our kids fail. Because of our economic background we need 200 school days - not just

> One teacher agreed with Cilia that we need to link with other schools to see what they are doing to have a large number of parents coming out to support their children in their after-school activities."

> Many classes have a high number of students where as the Richardson School is under enrolled. Board Member Milady Tejada said, "We need community inpu to discuss challenges and what this \$39 million should be used for. The STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) needs to be emphasized and also students should be taught to respect one another. She stated that when her son was in High School that two days before school started there was a program put in place where students were taught how to interact with one another in a respectable way."

> Educator Virginia Morales said, "There is something that happens to the students in the Middle School where they are growing up too fast. Fifth Grade is too young to be in a middle school setting and the students need to be monitored more closely. More parents are interested in prom issues instead of learning issues and I advise that more teamwork needs to be emphasized among the students."

A young woman by the name of Damaris (a former participant in a DARE program under Kenneth Puccio) has a young daughter of her own now. She also is a community organizer in New York. "There are so many social issues going on outside the high school which is affecting the students behavior in school." Damaris stated. "There should be more summer programs going on." She said, "When I graduated high school, two days later I was attending Middlesex County College. A lot of students come to empty homes after school. My six year old comes home bored and says she would rather have me teach her. I take my special Ed son to New York."

Tejeda said, "My son is also special Ed and we must encourage them to do better instead of lowering the bar for them." To which Damaris agreed.

"There is an empowerment program in New Brunswick geared toward working toward special education student. They do a great job," Damaris

Board VP Kenneth Puccio acknowledged Virginia Morales and Damaris from when they attended the DARE program when both young women were students in the Perth Amboy School System. "I'm also a Juvenile Detective and it's heart-retching to see what kids deal with and school is their sanctuary. Teachers are the most important part of this equation. If students are coming from abusive circumstances you have to tell them that you care - even putting your arms around them."

Dave Benyola of the Department of Human Services in Perth Amboy stated that he knows how much kids worry about losing their homes because a lot of times when parents come into his office for housing assistance they were often accompanied by their children.

Virginia Morales agreed with Benyola. "There are also that a lot of parents are immigrants and they are afraid if they come into school about matters pertaining to their children's education they fear that they will be deported."

"You have to address personal problems that students have at home." Puccio chimed in. He used himself and Edwin Nieves, Vice Principal of the High School as prime examples of having teachers who cared so much about them that it turned their lives around for the better. cal Financial Board that put us in this position by approving bonds requested by the prior administration that should never have been granted.

Fehrenbach told the governing body had exactly four weeks and two days from February 27, 2012 (when the special meeting was held) to get this budget together.

Any amendments to the budget must have a public hearing by April 4, 2012.

ing patterns of the light on Washington Road and Feltus Street. She believed the light coming from Washington Road was changing too quickly and South Amboy residents were suffering.

"The light on Main Street and Feltus coming from Washington Road is 20 seconds, yet if you're driving down Main Street the light is a minute and a half," Bouchard said. "I think South Amboy residents are the one's who are being taken because it takes at least four lights to get across these roads."

Bouchard was also concerned about residents being able to cross the busy street, explaining that 20 seconds was not nearly enough time for senior citizens to get across the road safely. She told the council she had looked into it before, but was told it was not a city issue but a state issue.

"I don't think 20 seconds is enough time for a senior citizen, myself included, to walk across Main Street safely," Bouchard said. "I was told that this wasn't South Amboy who was in charge of the street lights and that it was a state issue, but I still think it should be looked into."

The Applicability of the Bill of Rights Those who attack part of the

The statistics report an increase in crime and violence after the 1968 Gun Control Act became operative. Maybe political oppression is one cause of crime and violence, not inanimate tools.

CorporationSince moving to Perth Amboy about five years ago, I have noticed that the City administration repeatedly launches large initiatives with the objective of organizing a group of volunteers to come together and create a non-profit entity to be in charge of, and fund, the project. This formula is effective up to a certain point. Some recent examples that come to mind are the 325th Anniversary Gala of Perth Amboy, the establishment of the Ferry Slip Museum, the creation of the Arts Council (charged with creating a citywide arts plan and managing the Arts Gallery), the restoration of a vibrant Tennis Program and management of the new tennis complex and, the largest one to date, the \$10M fundraising project for the restoration of our public library.

I would like to suggest another approach. The City should create a permanent nonprofit entity called the Perth Amboy Community Development Corporation to handle community development initiatives. These are serious projects for both our quality of life as well as resulting economic activity. In the current format, many volunteers join multiple initiatives and end up feeling burnt out or overwhelmed, and the project could lag in spite of everyone's best efforts. It could be more effective to create one organization, one leadership structure, one overall community and economic plan, one grants management office and one system that manages all of the towns volunteers. This

approach would produce more "bang for the buck" for each grant received, each volunteer work hour spent, each college intern utilized, each fundraising event or initiative held, each marketing/promo effort made, and the desired improvements would be realized sooner. Plus, the same funders would not have to decide between competing municipal community projects for their limited donations. When you consider the fact that the positions of Community, Economic, Redevelopment, Urban Enterprise Zone and Business Improvement District Director are all vacant, serious consideration should be given now to the formation of the Perth Amboy Community Development Corporation by our municipal leaders.

At that time an ecumenical council presided over by Pope John XXIII was convened at the Vatican in Rome. A few thousand clergymen from all over the world arrived to take part. I was one of the

Among these the priest facing the congregation during the service, the service being conducted in the people's language and not in Latin and the Priest greeting the people as they left the church. Later as I left the church I remarked to the priest, "Father, you preached a wonderful sermon. I woke up refreshed." He smiled. He also had a sense of humor!

When my mother's fellow bingo players at local churches heard of my trips to Rome they asked that I bring them back some souvenirs. I was glad to comply. The shopping stand at the Vatican was where I purchased pockets full of rosary beads. The nuns were very friendly. To them I was known as Signor Pietro!

At the games my mother passed the beads to her friends. No charge! Shucks! They were cheap enough in those days. However divine help or prayer has not affected games





AMBOY SPOTLIGHT: THE LINDBERGH CASE & TENNIS CENTER

The Case That Never Dies-The Lindbergh Kidnapping at their Hopewell estate that ing circles and wavy lines?

It was on March 1, 1932, a night of gloom and rain, at the Lindbergh estate, located on a long dirt road's end, in Hopewell, NJ, that Charles Lindbergh, Jr. (Charlie), 8 months old, was found missing by the maid.

Not a sound, no baby's cry disturbed the night. A ladder was discovered perched outside the nursery window. Bruno Richard Hauptmann, determined to be the sole perpetrator, was arrested 2 ½ years later for kidnapping baby Charlie. Hauptmann was eventually convicted and sentenced to death by electric chair. He was executed April 3, 1936.

How was it possible for one person to climb a ladder, enter the Lindbergh baby's nursery and, while holding the baby, descend the ladder to escape undetected?

Why were the Lindberghs

Tuesday night? They were normally there only on weekends. Was Charles Lindbergh ever implicated in the kidnapping? Why were there no curtains on the Lindbergh windows since Charles Lindberg had a dubious relationship to fame and wanted extreme privacy. Why did the Lindberghs restrain baby Charlie by securing his blanket with large pins to the bed at night?

Why was Agatha Christie inspired by the Lindberg case to write "Murder on the Orient Express"?

Why was Perth Amboy's own David Wilentz, New Jersey's Attorney General, appointed by Governor A. Harry Moore to be the prosecuting attorney? Why did William Randolph Hurst pay Ed "Death House" Reilly, a flamboyant bon vivant from Brooklyn, to defend Hauptmann?

Why did the ransom notes contain symbols of interlock-

Why was J. Edgar Hoover suspicious of Charles Lindberg?

Why did Al Capone offer to help solve the case?


These and many other fascinations surrounding Lindbergh kidnapping were presented by Lloyd C. Gardner, Ph.D., author and Professor of History at Rutgers University. The event was on sponsored by Perth Amboy Ferry Slip Museum on March 4 at the Raritan Bay YMCA Theater. Some of these questions can be answered and more curiosities discovered in Dr. Gardner's book "The Case that never Dies-The Lindbergh Kidnapping" and on his blog at: casethatneverdies.blogspot.

Public Input Valued and Incorporated into The New Tennis Community Center Plan

PERTH AMBOY - Ken Ortiz, Director of Human Services and Superintendent of Recreation, opened the "Tennis Anyone? Public Comment Session" by stating the goals for the rebuilt tennis complex: to offer tennis, to teach discipline, manners and etiquette through the program and to restore the glorious days of Perth Amboy when it had a robust and well-respected program with 23 tennis courts total. Other services at the center would be homework assistance, art activities and anything positive to deter the use of drugs, tobacco or alcohol by children.

The 3200 sq ft building, partially constructed already, will have one large community room (with seating for 200 people), public restrooms, a small office and a concession stand. Director Ortiz will be seeking a United States Tennis Association (USTA) organization, in the form of a branch club of USTA with a 501 (c) 3 status, to run the center as well as collect dues, fundraise, apply for USTA grants and provide instruction. The full scope of the club's responsibilities is still not determined.

The Phases of the project are: 1) construct the building (with insurance monies, completed by end of April 2012); 2) build the East courts (East of Brighton Ave.) planned as

two adult and three child-sized courts and start tennis play there by Sept. 1, 2012 and 3) restore the surrounding gardens that were fire damaged, beginning in Sept. of 2013. Phases 1-3 are not tax-payer based and incur no debt. The third phase (Est. 83K) will be a team effort of the project engineer and the Royal Garden Club.

The 4th phase is economically challenging – build five adult sized courts on the West side of Brighton Ave. The estimated cost is 290K. Public questions abounded about the Board of Education entering into a reciprocal agreement and assist with some funding - this process had been started but not completed. Engaging the BOE will be researched and pursued. Citizens were encouraged to attend BOE meeting and raise this topic. "You 'young guys' organizing and pushing for this would make a huge difference," said Councilman Joel Pabon. "Ask to meet with the BOE Athletics and Co-Curricular Committee. Going in as a group is healthy: we don't want to have to wait 3-4-5 years for the West courts."

At this point, the public stated it would actually be better to complete the West courts first as more people could utilize them and play sooner than by completing the East courts first. A discussion ensued, a vote was held and Director Ortiz stated the West courts will

be completed before the East. It was refreshing to see how welcome community knowledge was and how it influenced public space decisionmaking for the benefit of all.

Jonathan Lopez, Perth Amboy resident, stated that "The BOE needs to step up". He added, "I play a lot of tennis. All sports are equal but so much focus is given to football and baseball and these are not lifelong activities, as is tennis." Donna Patel reminisced about how "We would all go on a bus to the US Open for years and years." Captain Howard Yellock, local USTA Team, urged speed as "I am being pushed out of USTA they won't send matches here because our courts are so bad." Dr. and Mrs. Wolf from town spoke about how much talent is here and how hosting competitions is so important. "These kids could be super stars; they need exposure."

Resident Gina Jernick added that "Police presence is crucial or it won't be controllable." Councilman Joel Pabon added that "Programs with adult supervision reduce crime. Mayor Diaz is adamant on police presence." Resident Maria Garcia summed it all up: "People who have played tennis here love it – the view, the breeze. We can bring this back on a grand scale if we concentrate."




