Christie Got the Money Administration Mismanaged Funding But the Buck Stops With the Gov

Sandy Bill of Rights At Stake

PERTH AMBOY - On Wednesday 2/19/14, there was a press conference held at Perth Amboy City Hall. This conference was attended by Senate President Stephen Sweeney, Congressman Frank Pallone and Assemblyman John Wisniewski along with others who were there to talk about the Sandy Bill of Rights. Perth Amboy was chosen as a kickoff tour to explain this bill to the public.

This Bill is a result of helping residents who have been having problems getting needed funds to help rebuilding residences or finding permanent housing.

It has been 18 months since

were at a standstill.

This Bill has in place a provision to help minorities. Some minorities reportedly were turned down for programs at a higher rate than others even though they were equally qualified.

The major bullet points of this Bill will help a quarter million NJ residents affected by the storm. The list includes individuals, businesses, and whole communities that suffered major damage.

Perth Amboy Mayor Wilda Diaz made opening remarks. She spoke about the \$10 million worth of damage inflicted

these residents were displaced by the storm and how it imfrom their homes and they pacted the residents and businesses. She then introduced President Stephen Senate Sweeney.

> Sweeney gave his explanation to why this bill is needed. "People are on a waiting list for assistance but have no idea of what number they are on the list. People were brought in from the outside who weren't knowledgeable on what to do. You can't blame the Federal Government for this. We got the money from them. A contractor was hired and then fired by the Christie Administration. This fired contractor was

JCP&L Support Much **Appreciated Snow Removal Discussed Again**

The Issue That Perseveres

By: Mariyah Wojcik SOUTH AMBOY- Jersey Central Power & Light (JCP&L) made a donation to the South Amboy St. Patrick's Day Parade, and city snow removal issues were addressed in greater detail at the city council meeting on Feb. 19.

Gerald Ricciardi, area manager for JCP&L community and customer relations presented Mayor Fred Henry with a check to be spent on South Amboy's annual St. Patrick's Day Parade. This year, the company donated \$500 to the event, which will take place on March 8.

"JCP&L has been a true friend to the city," said councilman Mickey Gross. "It has become popular for politicians to take shots at our power companies, but I am proud of JCP&L's involvement in our community."

Henry also acknowledged the help of JCP&L.

"The St. Patrick's Day Parade is always a big event for the city, and we appreciate the help," said Henry.

Gross recalled the company's involvement in the Superstorm

Sandy recovery effort and stated that JCP&L was a great help in providing for the welfare of the residents of South Amboy.

"When the mayor and the council said that we needed ice and water for our residents, they said how many truckloads do you need? Not bags or gallons, truckloads," said Gross.

Conversation quickly shifted to the growing controversy over snow removal. The approval associated with the donation was replaced with outrage and anger both from the council and city employees as well as residents.

In a statement made before the meeting was opened to the public for comments, Henry referred to the city's snow removal response, which has been criticized heavily in recent weeks.

"It's not a perfect science," said Henry. "People shoveling snow into the streets and refusing to move their cars did not make this an easy job for city employees. They did a good job with the resources

given \$10 million to go away." Sweeney thanked Pallone for getting Federal money.

"The problem is that the programs set up with this money has been mishandled by the Christie Administration. After all this time people are still on a waiting list for funds."

Sweeney said, "About the contractors that were fired and given that \$10 million. They would have to sue me to get that money."

Congressman Frank Pallone said, "Union Beach was hit very hard. Some people are getting money from nonprofit groups because they are not getting it from the government. The money that the Christie Administration has been giving out has been mismanaged. We don't know why that contractor was fired and who replaced them."

Assemblyman Wisniewski acknowledged how quickly Mayor Diaz and Congressman Pallone took immediate action after the storm hit. "It's been 18 months and the devastation is still there. This Administration (Christie) has not been able to give answers, but we have learned a lesson on what not to do."

Others who were there to support the bill included: Mike McNeill (Chair of the NAACP State Housing Committee) and Staci Berger, President and **CEO** Housing and Community Development Network of New Jersey.

Some of the speakers relayed some of the complaints told to them by people applying for assistance. This included being told that they were disqualified for certain programs because they didn't have proper documentations.

In another case, someone reported that they felt that they was being treated like a criminal when they applied to the state for assistance.

The greatest impression was from the speakers who spoke from their personal experiences.

Perth Amboy resident George Bonilla who lived on Front Street (one of the most devastated areas in Perth Amboy) for over 30 years has been out of that home for 18 months.

Bonilla told his of experience when he went to apply for different programs, "A lot of times they told me that I earned too much money. Fortunately, the long term recovery group was able to give me money to pay for a rental. We're always giving money to other countries. But what about us? This should not be happening in America. I'm still paying on a house that I can't live in. The insurance companies want their money regardless."

There was a question and answer period.

Sweeney was asked if Christie were to blame. Sweeney said, "I don't blame Governor Christie personally, but I blame his Administration. They used outside contractors instead of inside contractors and inside non-profits. He should have sued the contractors instead of giving them \$10 million after firing them. Funds were brought in, but are sitting on the sidelines."

Congressman Pallone interjected, "It is the Governor who

is responsible for how his Administration is running these programs."

Sweeney also said that, "Integrity monitors were put in place with this bill, which is something that we asked for a while ago. We have to get the money we have sitting here now to the people."

Staci Berger said, "People who are renters and homeowners are vying for the same

A question was asked about the money used for the commercials featuring Governor Christie with his family (Stronger than the Storm).

Staci Berger said, "We can't recover any of the CDBG funds used for those commercials but we need money to help people get back into their homes."

Sweeney also said, "We passed bills that the Governor vetoed but I'm pretty sure that the Governor will pass this Sandy Bill of Rights intact."

Another problem was that literature printed in Spanish had inadequate information and misinformation.

This Bill would also impose fines on anyone who violates any clauses in the Bill.

Continued From Page 1 that they had to work with." Ken Feeley, a resident, disapproved of the mayor's com-

ment and made compelling statements based upon his personal experiences during the most recent storm. "They (city workers) do as

good a job as they can, but it's still a bad job," said Feeley. "My street was like a hockey rink, my neighbor had to get out his plow on his time to clear snow, and I had to help push people's cars down the street because they were stuck and sliding."

Although Feeley alleged that no salt had been placed on the city streets, James Charmello, a city employee, disagreed with the statement.

According to Charmello, all of the city streets had been salted in the middle of the night, but the salt is only activated with sunlight, and therefore had little effect until morning. The rate of snowfall. as well as the small number of crew members involved, all contributed to what residents thought was a lack of action.

"The crew did the best they could, and that's what they did," said Councilman Donald Applegate, who agreed with Charmello.

The meeting came to a close without any agreement between the council, Charmello, and Feeley.

With snow in the forecast for the coming weeks, residents will soon find out if better snow removal policies or larger, more efficient crews will be implemented.



The Plight - 3 Points

What many people forgot is that a person's rental property may be their only source or a major part of their income. It will be a hardship on them. So what list would they be put on? Will there be programs geared to them specifically? This is something to ponder.

I know people who have lost their summer homes which they would rent out part time. Some of those people have told me, "Thank God I still have a roof over my head." Even though they will miss their home away from home, but they have other income to fall back on.

Point 2 - It's not only outsiders who are unscrupulous. As I was listening to Senate President Sweeney he mentioned an outside contractor that was fired by the Christie Administration and was given \$10 million to go away.

Statement from **Proprietary** House on Dissolution of M.O.P.A.

Mr. Ward recently wrote a letter listing the accomplishments of M.O.P.A. and noted its dissolution. I am the current head of the Proprietary House Association and in that capacity I had attended several M.O.P.A. meetings between February and June of 2013. This is the reason that I had contacted the City administration to inquire about the rumor that the group had been dissolved and to ask what happened to their funds. I was advised that it was the position of the administration that M.O.P.A. was an independent body and that I should contact them. I sent a letter to their mailing address 260 High St. A short time later I received an e-mail from the administration informing me that a meeting was going to be held to dissolve M.O.P.A. I would have liked to attend the meeting but as with most of their meetings it was held in the afternoon.

I would first like to point out that Mr. Ward is a past president of the Association, but he was removed for cause and has and a copy of a bank statement showing a balance of approximately \$59.00 for December 2013.

The reason that I inquired about the finances of M.O.P.A. is that on two separate occasions they solicited donations stating the intended purpose of benefiting the Proprietary House and or the Association.

A request for donations was made on City stationary with the City seal and with the mayor's name to support a yearlong celebration of the 250th anniversary of the building of the House. As I had stated previously the City states that they are an independent body and indeed they are a New Jersey Non-Profit corporation. It would appear to me that City stationary was used to create the belief that this was a City sponsored organization. I must also point out that there was no yearlong celebration.

In January of 2013 a letter was sent out seeking donations for repairs to the damage done to the Proprietary House by Sandy so that the museum could be reopened. There was no damage to the House and the Museum was never closed. Mr. Ward did send a letter to the state offering to pay for some needed repairs to the building, none of these repairs were required by Sandy and all repairs have been made without any assistance from M.O.P.A.

Mr. Ward also stated that grants were made to all three museums in the City. Since we knew of no such grant to either the Association or the state I asked Mr. Ward what he was talking about. He stated that over \$600.00 was spent on a lobbying effort for the passage of a bill that would bring state monies to the Association. The issue of the bill is much too

complicated to get into here. I have no idea what these lobbying efforts consisted of.

The February meeting which I attended had a treasurer's report and a statement from Mr. Ward that several thousands of dollars were raised as a result of this letter about Sandy dam-

I am seeking to find out what happened to the money raised in name of the Proprietary House, because we had not seen any of it.

One last point I would like to make is that Mr. Ward stated that M.O.P.A. was responsible for the renewed ceremonial ringing of the Liberty bell on the Fourth of July. He is clearly very mistaken. The ringing of the bell was revived in July of 2001, at the request of Mr. Livingston a descendant of one of the signers of the Declaration. The first few years of this ceremony was a small affair done by myself and Pastor Wayne Brady and grew as time went on.

In 2009 when M.O.P.A. became involved I was un-invited from participating.

As a representative of the Proprietary House Association I would like to know what happened to the money raised in our name and have not received a satisfactory answer to that question.



Pallone, Menendez Announce \$10.8 Million for Continued Middlesex County Utilities Authority Projects

News Release 2/11/14 WASHINGTON, DC — Today, Congressman Frank Pallone, Jr. (NJ-06) and U.S. Senator Robert Menendez (D-NJ) announced that the Middlesex County Utilities Authority will receive more than \$10.8 million in federal funding for continued projects as a result of Superstorm Sandy. The funding is being provided by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) via the Sandy aid package Pallone fought for in Congress.

"These grants help to lessen the financial hit that our local governments still face as communities continue to recover from Sandy," said Congressman Pallone. "As we continue to rebuild, we have a unique opportunity to improve our public infrastructure so it is stronger and can withstand future storms. I am grateful that FEMA recognizes the importance of these ongoing efforts in New Jersey."

"This funding will help rebuild a critical public facility severely damaged by Sandy," Sen. Menendez said. "I remain committed to ensuring our state continues to receive the resources necessary to ensure New Jersey maintains its path to full recovery, better and stronger than before the storm."

The Middlesex County Utilities Authority will receive \$10,801,817.51 in federal funding for continued repairs to the Sayreville pump station that was damaged as a result of Superstorm Sandy. The Sayreville Pump Station was inundated by floodwaters rising nearly four feet above ground level in October 2012. While over 50% of repairs to the damaged facility have been completed, there are repairs that still need to be made

to ensure that the station can withstand future storms. The work to be done includes repairing all large pumps, replacing small pumps, cleaning, lubricating and repairing all switchgear, removing and replacing actuators, and completing the replacement of all wiring and motor control centers

This grant is in addition to the \$2.4 million that the Middlesex County Utilities Authority received in 2013 to repair the damaged pump station, provide bypass pumping for the Sayreville sewage treatment plant, and install and operate a surge diversion facility to minimize surges to the pump station in the event of a future storm. The Middlesex County Utilities Authority pumps sewage from 30 municipalities in Middlesex and Somerset Counties.

Pallone Announces \$9.4 Million in Federal Funding for New Jersey Schools

WASHINGTON, DC —Today, Congressman Frank Pallone, Jr. (NJ-06) announced that low-achieving schools in the state of New Jersey will receive \$9,485,864 in federal funding through the Department of Education's School Improvement Grants (SIG) program. New Jersey is one of nine states across the country that will receive more than \$71 million in funding through the SIG program.

"Our children and our communities should not have to wait for better schools," said Congressman Pallone. "I am pleased that the Department of Education has selected New Jersey to receive this federal grant and given our state the opportunity to improve the schools that need it most. It is our responsibility to improve the education of all students and give every child the best chances for the future."

These grants through the SIG program are awarded to state educational agencies (SEAs) that then make competitive

subgrants to school districts that demonstrate the greatest need for the funds and the strongest commitment to use the funds to provide adequate resources in order to substantially raise the achievement of students in their lowest-performing schools. Under the SIG program, an SEA must allocate at least 95 percent of its school improvement funds directly to the school districts.





Tax Facts

Use IRS Adjusted Numbers For 2014 Tax Planning

Certain tax numbers are adjusted by the IRS for inflation each year. Here are some of the 2014 tax numbers you'll need to use as you get started with this year's tax planning.

- The standard mileage rate for business driving decreases to 56¢ per mile for 2014. The rate for medical and moving mileage decreases from 24¢ per mile to 23.5¢ per mile. The general rate for charitable driving remains at 14¢ per mile.
- The maximum earnings subject to social security tax in 2014 increases to \$117,000. The earnings limit for those under full retirement age is \$15,480. For those at full retirement age, there is no earnings limit.
- The "nanny tax" threshold increases to \$1,900 for 2014. If you pay household workers more than this amount during the year, you're responsible for payroll taxes.
- The "kiddie tax" threshold for 2014 remains unchanged at \$2,000. If your child under age 19 (under age 24 for stu-

dents) has more than \$2,000 of unearned income this year (e.g., dividends and interest income), the excess could be taxed at your highest rate.

- The maximum individual retirement account (IRA) contribution you can make in 2014 remains at \$5,500 if you're under age 50 and at \$6,500 if you are 50 or older.
- The maximum amount of wages employees can put into a 401(k) plan remains unchanged at \$17,500. The 2014 maximum allowed for SIMPLE plans remains at \$12,000. If you are 50 or older, you can contribute up to \$23,000 to a 401(k) and \$14,500 to a SIMPLE plan.
- For 2014, the maximum amount that can be contributed to a health savings account (HSA) increases to \$3,300 for individuals and \$6,550 for families. Those 55 and older can contribute an additional \$1,000.
- The alternative minimum tax exemption for 2014 is \$52,800 for singles and \$82,100 for couples filing joint returns.

St. Peter's Episcopal Church takes Ash Wednesday to the Perth Amboy Train Station

PERTH AMBOY - On Ash Wednesday, March 5, St. Peter's Episcopal Church, will be offering "Ashes to Go," a new approach to a centuries-old Christian tradition, from 6 am to 9 am at the Perth Amboy Train Station.

St. Peter's, a community that has been worshiping in Perth Amboy since 1685, is joining the nationwide movement that has clergy and lay people visiting transit stops, street corners, coffee shops, and college campuses to mark the foreheads of interested passers-by with ashes and invite them to repent of past wrongdoing and seek forgiveness and renewal.

In the Christian tradition, Ash Wednesday marks the start of the holy season of Lent, a time for reflection and repentance in preparation for the celebration of Easter. For centuries, Christians have received a cross of ashes on the face at the beginning of that season as a reminder of mortal failings and an invitation to receive God's forgiveness. Ashes to Go provides the opportunity

to participate in that tradition for people who have lost their connection to a church, or have never participated before.

"Ashes to Go is about bringing the important traditions of our faith out from behind church walls and into the places we need them every day," says the Rev. Emily Mellott, who maintains the website AshesToGo.org with resources and stories about this ministry. "As people get busier and busier, we need the church in new and non-traditional ways We especially need reminders of forgiveness in the tough places of our working lives. The people who accept ashes on the street are often people longing to make a connection between their faith and the forces of daily life, and Ashes to Go helps them feel that connection."

Are You At Risk? Find Out With A Free Test on American Diabetes Association Alert Day - March 25

The American Diabetes Association Alert Day® is a one-day "wake-up call" asking the American public to take the Diabetes Risk Test to find out if they are at risk for developing type 2 diabetes, a condition characterized by high blood glucose levels caused by either a lack of insulin or the body's inability to use insulin efficiently. Type 2 diabetes develops most often in middleaged and older adults but can appear in young people.

Held this year Tuesday, March 25, the Diabetes Risk Test asks users to answer simple questions about weight, age, family history and other potential risk factors for pre-diabetes or type 2 diabetes. The test can be taken by visiting www.diabetes. org/are-you-at-risk/diabetes-risk-test/.

Preventive tips are provided for everyone who takes the test, including encouraging those at high risk to talk with their health care provider. For every test taken, Boar's Head Brand® will donate \$5 to the American Diabetes Association starting March 25 through April 25, up to \$50,000.

Diabetes occurs because of the inability of the body to either make or properly use insulin, a hormone produced by the pancreas which helps in the absorption of glucose from the blood stream. Deficiency in the amount or action of insulin results in high blood sugar levels, a tell-tale sign of diabetes. According to the American Diabetes Association, in 2011 close to 20 million people in the U.S. were diagnosed with diabetes, and an estimated seven million still remain un-

Diabetes is the leading cause of kidney failure, non-traumatic leg amputations, new cases of blindness, and a major cause of heart disease and stroke. Asian Americans, African Americans, Latinos and Native Americans are highrisk ethnic groups for developing diabetes.

Symptoms of diabetes can include increased thirst and frequency of urination, feeling tired, weight loss, blurry vision, tingling/numbness in the hands or feet, and wounds or cuts that heal slower than usual.

Three Good Reasons To Share Dinner with Your Family Tonight

Many young people struggle
with excess weight. Almost 1
in 3 children ages 5 to 11 is
considered to be overweight or
obese. Weighing too much increases the chances that young
people will develop some
health problems — now and
later in life.

During March, National Nutrition Month and throughout the year consider eating dinners as a family. A study in the journal Pediatrics shows that sharing regular family meals improves children's nutrition, reduces the risk of childhood obesity, and encourages healthy eating habits

The results show children and adolescents who share at least three family meals per week are more likely to be a healthy weight and less likely to have disordered eating (an early sign of potential eating disorders) than those who shared mealtimes less frequently.

Overall, families that eat five or more meals together have children who are 25% less likely to encounter nutritional health issues than children who eat less than or equal to one meal with their families. Shared family meals seem to operate as a protective factor for overweight, unhealthy eating, and disordered eating, helping children build important habits for later life.

As a parent or other caregiver, you can do a lot to help your child reach and maintain a healthy weight. Healthy eating and physical activities are necessary for your child's wellbeing.

Sit down together for dinner tonight and take an important step to help your child – and your whole family – learn healthy habits that last a lifetime.



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
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
