

Lessons <u>NOT</u> Learned! **Board Attorney's Instructions Still Ignored**

PERTH AMBOY - School Board Attorney Derlys Gutierrez was the first one to make remarks at the 5/7/14 Board of Education Meeting.

This time she had guidelines for those from the public who wish to make remarks. She stated that the speakers must give their name and address. If the speaker is representing an organization, they must state that organization's name. "You're limited to 5 minutes. You may be liable to any personal attacks that you make. And you could be asked to leave. I'm asking the audience and Board Members to please respect themselves."

The first person to speak from the public was the current Human Resources Manager for Perth Amboy Public Schools, Bernice Marshall.

Marshall spoke about AchieveNJ (From the State of NJ Dept. of Education website: AchieveNJ is New Jersey's educator evaluation and support system, designed in collaboration with New Jersey educators through a two-year pilot. This system provides district and school leaders with a critical tool for recognizing effective educators and identifying meaningful opportunities *for professional growth.)* 

"I was never asked any questions about this. Other administrators have not been asked to evaluate teachers as I have done. This is a personal attack on me (abolishing the HR Title). I was called to a meeting to discuss my job and Derek Jess was present. He is not my boss and should not have been at that meeting. No one told me about my job being eliminated." Addressing Acting Superintendent Rodriguez, Ms. Marshall wanted to know, "Why are you making drastic Human Resources changes when you've only been here 4 months? When my contract ends in June, you will be hard pressed to find someone with the same level of professionalism, dedication and work ethics that you found in me." Bernice Marshall's fiancée, Charles Simmons came to the podium to speak and said, "Bernice did not know that I was going to be here."

He proudly said, "Bernice has achieved great results in all aspects of her job. She has excelled and her department is the only one that got a perfect score in QSAC." (From the State of NJ Dept. of Education Website - The Quality Single Accountability Continuum (QSAC) is the Dept. of Education's monitoring and evaluation system for public school districts. The system focuses on monitoring and evaluating school districts in 5 key components that, based on research, have been identified to be key factors in effective school districts.) Towards the end of his speech, he said, "This is a personal vendetta against Bernice by the Acting Superintendent and certain Board Members." Another agenda item that has been a hot topic had to do

**Shop Local Boost to Small Towns**

By: Mariyah Wojcik SOUTH AMBOY- Shop Local, a property tax refund program designed to boost the economies of small towns, has resurfaced as a priority for the city council at the May 7 Business Meeting.

Carmine DeFalco, a representative from Fincredit, Inc. delivered a presentation regarding the details of the "Shop South Amboy" program. Talks between Business Administrator Camille Tooker and DeFalco have taken place over the past month, and the program was described in detail.

"Essentially, people get a refund on their property taxes on the third quarter bill just for shopping locally," said De-Falco. "Small business owners in the area can offer any percentage rate they choose as a tax credit, and these credits are accumulated by the customer using a property tax card." Shop Local programs have been instituted in Marlboro, Highland Park, Pequannock, Bayonne, West Orange, Voorhees, and Verner, and are set to launch in Manalapan and Brick Township this summer, according to DeFalco.

customer. If the customer rents their residence, they are mailed a check at the end of the accumulation cycle for the amount of money that they have collected while shopping locally.

This program is being considered because it has the potential to increase business in South Amboy's shopping district, according to Tooker. Businesses receive window decals to identify themselves as participants, and they may advertise their participation in other ways as well, such as through social media or in the local newspapers.

The property tax cards, which every customer must present if they wish to accumulate money towards a rebate, are intended to be purchased by South Amboy, at a cost of \$1 each. However, this cost may be subsidized by a local bank or credit union if the town can find a willing donor. DeFalco, having worked closely with other towns beginning this program, stated that approximately 10-15 small businesses would be required to get the program started. There is a \$10 per month participation fee for these businesses, but if the program is successful this will be regained in additional profit from increased sales.

At the last Board of Education Meeting, 4/10/14, Ms. Marshall read from a prepared statement (See Amboy Guardian 4/16/14 p.6.) In that statement, Ms. Marshall made it clear of her disappointment at not being notified in person that her title was on the agenda to be abolished at that meeting.

At the 5/7/14 BOE Meeting Marshall said, "I'm pissed off! I am not going to read from a paper this time. I want to look you (the Board) in the eye. A few meetings ago, Mr. Varela told me to never let anyone bully you. And I feel that I've been bullied."

Vice Principal Karen Moffatt has been at he helm of the Richardson School for the last 22 months. There has been a strong push by those who support her (Teachers and Parents) to make her the permanent Principal. The Board had previously turned down Moffatt's request to be Principal because of an unresolved incident that happened at the Richardson School.

At the 5/10/14 Board of Education Meeting, Moffatt spoke about her qualifications to be Principal. "I started in the school system 23 years ago. Nothing has ever distracted me from doing the best for my students. In the last 22 months I have acted as a Principal and Vice-Principal and have brought optimism to the school. My days start at 6 a.m. and end at 6 p.m. It's important that I make a connection with my students. Bermudez, I. Varela, O. Gonzalez; Voting "No," were D. Roman, W. Ortiz, M. Garcia. Motion passes to abolish job description.

When it came to the appointment of Edwin Nieves as Principal of the Richardson School, the votes were as follows: "Yes," M. Tejeda, D. Roman, S. Lebreault, A. Bermudez, O. Gonzalez; Voting "No," K. Puccio, W. Ortiz, M. Garcia; "Abstain," was I. Varela. Motion passes.

that South Amboy is small," said Tooker. This may pose a problem when the Council is attempting to attract businesses to participate in the program, because there is a limited number.

In addition, multiple cards can be registered under the same account, making this

plause from his supporters. When coming up to the mic to speak, he told his present and former students to come down with him.





#### Spring is Here! Don't Let Knee Pain Stop Your Running Routine

Running is a great form of exercise and an important part of many people's lives. However, the joys of running and all the mind and body benefits do sometimes bring some collateral damage. Runner's knee is one example. Runner's knee can mean different things to different runners, trainers and physicians. I will discuss three knee conditions often seen in runners with knee pain: IT Band syndrome, Hoffa's syndrome, and osteoarthritis.

My wife developed knee pain while training for her first half-marathon last summer. There was lateral sided knee pain (pain on the outside part) that started to bug her midway through her longer training runs, and became really painful by the end of the run. There was no swelling or stiffness. It was troublesome for her because there was no obvious injury, and she was concerned it would stop her from finishing the Philadelphia Rock and Roll Half Marathon. Her exam was typical for ITB syndrome seen in runners: strong thighs, good range of motion in terms of knee bending, and no swelling. But she had very tight IT bands, or iliiotibial bands, which are the long, soft tissue structures that go from the outside of our hips to just below the knee. They often become tight in runners, and can be painful and tender anywhere along their course. This condition can be seen in nonrunners as well. We treated my wife with a therapy regimen that focused on stretching and massaging her IT band, and she was able to not only compete in the half marathon, but finish at a very high level! In the front of the knee, behind the knee cap and patellar tendon is a structure referred to as Hoffa's fat pad. In runners it can become inflamed and painful, causing a very sharp and pinching pain. The treatment may include a steroid (cortisone) injection into the affected area, which often resolves the inflammation. Other times, a knee arthroscopy ("knee scope") may be required to get the runner back to their tiptop form. Hoffa's Syndrome may mimic chondromalacia patella, a cartilage condition that also causes pain behind the kneecap, or patella.






