Budget, Politics Big Stories in South Amboy

Tempers Flare as **Election Day Approaches**

By: Joseph L. Kuchie SOUTH AMBOY - The looming tax increase in the proposed budget and the upcoming primary election caused tension at last week's South Amboy council meeting.

The council's proposed 2014 budget would bring a tax increase of \$88 on the average home if adopted later this year. This news comes weeks before the primary election in South Amboy that will see incumbent Mayor Fred Henry take on party-backed candidate Jack O'Connell.

Council president Joseph Connors began the public portion of the meeting by requesting that all residents hold their budget questions for the June 5th budget hearing at City Hall. However, the meeting will come two days after the election in South Amboy and O'Connell believed it should be discussed if there was a resolution in the consent agenda dealing with the tax rate.

"On the consent agenda there is a resolution that is interval to the budget...it sets the tax rate," O'Connell said. "It allows tax bills to go out and that's based on the revenue you need to raise for the 2014 budget."

Business Administrator Camille Tooker disagreed, saying that this year's budget had no play in the estimated number in resolution #81-2014. The number in the budget, she said, is based on last year's numbers.

"The estimated tax bill is to collect taxes so we can continue to operate and stay within the statutory limits of sending out tax bills on the timeline," Tooker said. "That bill is not predicated on this budget, there's a percentage set by state that goes by last year's budget."

"You can send an estimated

tax bill out that is within a percentage higher or lower than what you billed last year," she added. "This year's budget has no play in that estimated number."

Arguments also ensued during the public portion when a local resident raised questions about Mayor Henry's involvement in helping local students to register to vote. Henry is currently the dean of students at South Amboy High School, but the resident said that some students felt uncomfortable that someone running for office was helping them in the registration process and believed it was a conflict of in-

Mayor Henry explained that he was asked by the schools to assist in the process after a guidance counselor went on leave, but he also said he made calls to the parents and explained to them the situation.

"The principal came to me and asked if I could help him because [the school] usually takes care of it," Henry said. "I said no problem but in the circumstances we are in I wanted to let him know I was in no way going to ask them to ask for me. When I called the kids

Flowers an Issue at Special BID Meeting 5/21/14

BID Member Virginia Lugo was not satisfied with the work that Rosario did and felt that the City was being overcharged for the flowers. She showed photos of one of the planters placed at the Five Corners by Carlixto's Landscaping Company on her electronic pad to all of the BID Members. The flowers were growing, but not yet in full bloom.

Lugo argued that the maxi-

mum cost for flowers should be \$12 a flat (high end) and er Carlixto Rosario's work in the maximum amount that the the planters on Smith Street City should be paying should and Convery Boulevard was be \$276 for 23 flats and \$1500 for labor. Lugo proceeded to argue that the flowers in New York City are in bloom and there was no water in the planters she saw at the Five Corners. She then stated that the print invoices had whiteout on them and were incon-

BID Member Reyes Ortega

asked Rosario, "How often do you water the plants?"

"Three times a week, depending if it rains or not," Rosario answered.

Troche stated, "Two proposals were given to the BID. Carlixto's Landscaping was chosen with a contract for \$1950. Eight flowers are planted in each planter altogether. Last year the flowers were already grown."

BID Member Annie Hindenlang stated, "Last year the flowers came in a lot fuller."


Roxana Troche stated, "Last year we did this it was later in the year. We wanted to have flowers for Memorial Day."

BID Chair Barry Rosengarten said, "I have a brown

thumb. We have a committee to look at the plants."

BID Member Virginia Lugo was still not satisfied with the cost."

Troche stated what the contract called for, "Four flowers in 63 planters. The contract did not call for a specific size. It called for Mr. Rosario to water the planters three times a week and \$735/month for maintenance."

Lugo then asked, "What was the official bid?"

Troche answered, "The cost of a project must exceed \$3,750 to have bids. For any-

thing less, you have proposals. We had two proposals – one for \$2,750, one for \$1,950. We accepted the one for \$1,950 when Mr. Rosaraio came in and asked to do the work."

Lugo then stated, "We have an invoice for April, May and June. This is what was sent to all the BID Members. I propose we table the bill and just pay him his monthly fee."

With that, BID Chair Barry Rosengarten stated, "Mr. Rosario has fulfilled his contract. It is my recommendation we should move forward with this bill so he can be paid."

Resident Alan Silber, who was in the audience offered

his advice, "There is a difference between contractor grade plants, which are always in bloom and regular plants." He cited the landscaping done at the Hess Gas station (on Rte. 9). "They are a different grade of flowers and are much more expensive."

Rosengarten then stated, "He did a job and there is no issue"

Troche stated, "I was satisfied with his work. It's only May. Give the flowers time to grow."

Mayor Wilda Diaz then added, "Come June, we should take this all under consideration."

BID Member Annie Hindenlang added, "We need to develop more specific criteria for our contracts."

Finally, a motion was made by Sergio Diaz to pay Rosario for his work." Voting "Yes," were: Sergio Diaz, Wilda Diaz, Barry Rosengarten, Yvonne Lopez and Reyes Ortega. Voting "No," were: Virginia Lugo, Jeanette Ruiz and Annie Hindenlang. BID Member Israel Varela was late to the meeting and the vote occurred before he came. The motion passed, and Rosario was paid for his work.

Sometimes You Just Have to Go With Your Gut

The City of South Amboy is embarking on either electing a new mayor or reelecting the existing one. June 3, 2014 is the primary. The two opponents have been placing ads, sometimes attacking each other or the previous administration. As with most elections there will be letters either supporting or attacking candidates that are sent to the paper. We reserve the right to edit or not publish letters. (see box lower right) Reasons why letters are edited include: length (some letters are just too long) or strong accusations against a specific person with no evidence to back it up. In recent letters, some of the statements made by the letter writer are ambiguous. The letter actually made the candidate that the letter writer was supporting be put in a questionable position.

My advice to anyone who writes a letter to the editor to support a candidate should look it over at least 3 times before you submit it for publication.

When the late Bill George was writing about the Vas administration, he would receive concrete evidence mailed to him from those who knew what is going on. Many times they asked to have their names withheld. A lot of this evidence was sent to Bill George, even after Vas was out of of-

So please, when strong accusations are made in your letters, either produce paperwork or photos for backup.

Although what you say may be true, and you are very passionate about a candidate, a produced true documentation is your best friend. Even with those facts presented before the voters, your candidate may still not get elected. There are many factors involved in winning an election: the good, the bad and the very bad.

I think in the long run, the voters want to see positive progress made. If it isn't pro-

duced, your promises were just empty words.

As in aside, here are some things done by some of the regular attendees at the Perth Amboy Council Meetings.

They may accuse some members of the administration of discrepancies in statements they made during the Meetings. When those residents come before the Council, they will actually produce an ordinance, resolution, photos or communication and even OPRA requests to back up their statements. Those residents may not always get the response they were looking for, but they always come with something in hand.

In the past, I have gone to South Amboy Council Meetings and I can tell you which residents always spoke with paper in hand and had their facts presented in a clear and precise manner.

Remember four years ago how brutal the election in South Amboy became. The election for Mayor was won by ONE VOTE. This was after several challenges by the candidate who came in second. Also voters, you need to look back at that election and the ads to see what platform each candidate ran on. What did each candidate say about the previous administration? Some Thoughts On Our Perth Amboy

Chaplain Corps PERTH AMBOY - I'll never

forget the moment last year I first walked into Chief of Police Benjamin Ruiz's office to introduce myself to him after being named the new rabbi of Congregation Beth Mordecai in Perth Amboy. I didn't know what to expect, given that this was one of my first experiences as a rabbi after graduating seminary and given that it was one of my first interactions with the police other than a run-of-the-mill traffic stop. While it was one of my goals to become an invested and enthusiastic civic participant in Perth Amboy, I could not have expected the warm welcome given to me by Chief Ruiz into the community of faith leaders who make up the Chaplain Corps of the Police Department. It didn't seem to matter to Chief Ruiz what final grades I received in Seminary, or how well I could translate Hebrew. All that seemed to matter to him was that I had a "rabbinate" (the Jewish term for "ministry") in Perth Amboy, that it was in the best interest of the Police Department to convene as many ministers and rabbis as possible who serve the needs of the greater Perth Amboy community, and as such he wanted me to become a part of the corps. I wonder though if he realizes that through this invitation he made me feel, as a new rabbi and as a new resident, that Perth Amboy could

be my home.

strengthened and so approximately a year and a half since that first meeting (and after a thorough screening process to follow up on the Chief's invitation) I find myself as a deputy commander, tasked to help identify the purpose and mission of our corps. What I've come to realize is that the invitation extended to me, as well as to many other faith leaders in town, by Chief Ruiz helped establish an amazingly unique Chaplain Corps. No other police department has a corps as broad as ours or as representative as ours is of the diverse faith traditions in our local area. Over the past couple of months, leaders of the corps, as well as rank-and-file members, have come together in one-on-one and group conversations to discuss our mission and how to take advantage of our unique, broad collection of faith leaders. While we are still in this process of discernment, two parallel and equally important missions seem to be developing.

The first is the creation of a robust staff chaplaincy program that would serve the spiritual and pastoral needs of the officers within the Police Department. Whether it's helping distraught family members at scenes of fatal accidents, or providing moral support to officers and their families through the ups-and-downs of careers in law enforcement, what gives us legitimacy as a Police Chaplain Corps is by serving the needs of the Police Department. As the International Conference of Police Chaplains (ICPC) states as its first core value, "we respect and honor the badge and the men and women who have earned the right to wear it" (www.icpc4cops.org/aboutus). Thanks to the efforts of a few of our leaders, we are on our way to fulfilling this mission on behalf of the men and women in blue.

Not all chaplains in the corps though are called to serve the specific ministry of attending to the needs of our officers in the Police Department. In fact, given Chief Ruiz's openness to welcoming all faith leaders into the corps from the outset, it seems clear that one of the goals of the corps is to move beyond the walls of Police Headquarters in order to convene the larger faith community together. As such, our second mission is to be a conduit for serving the needs of the community. As we discussed in one of our larger meetings, some of our collective concerns include reaching out to the spiritual needs of the larger Perth Amboy community beyond the walls of our respective houses of worship, working on programs that will help strengthen the bonds that will unify our city, identifying key areas of need to mobilize our efforts within the community, and building a healthier relationship between the residents of our city and the Police Department.

It is this last point, that we as a corps - through our programs, our outreach efforts, and our communication - can help the Police Department and the larger community be more in tune with one another, that links together our dual missions, to serve the Police Department and to serve the community. What's more, this link seems to lie at the heart of the "community minded" policing methodology for which Chief Ruiz has advocated (see



Christie Administration Announces More Than \$17 Million In Clean Communities Grants For Municipalities And Counties Program Funds Litter Cleanups That Build Civic Pride

TRENTON – The Christie Administration today announced the award of more than \$17 million in Clean Communities grants to help municipalities and counties conduct litter cleanup efforts that help beautify New Jersey's communities and roadsides.

"This money is used for cleanup efforts that show the Christie Administration's commitment to protecting our natural resources, enhancing our quality of life and building pride in our cities and towns across the state," said Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) Commissioner Bob Martin.

The DEP is awarding a total of \$17.1 million, including \$15.2 million to 559 eligible municipalities. Seven municipalities are not eligible because they have fewer than 200 housing units. An additional \$1.9 million is being awarded to all 21 counties.

"Many of the largest grants are going to urban cities," said Jane Kozinski, Assistant Commissioner for Environmental Management. "These grants build civic pride and enable our cities, towns and counties to move ahead with programs that remove litter from our neighborhoods and along our roads and highways, making our state a better place to live and work."

As established by law, the nonprofit New Jersey Clean Communities oversees the reporting requirements for the program. The grants are funded by a legislated user-fee on manufacturers, wholesalers and distributors that produce litter-generating products. Disbursements to municipalities are based on the number of housing units and miles of municipally owned roadways within each municipality.

"New Jersey Clean Communities is a grassroots, community-driven litter abatement program that depends on funding disbursed to towns and counties every year," said Sandy Huber, the group's executive director. "Money used for cleanup, enforcement and education related to litter abatement helps relieve strained municipal budgets, creates employment and promotes volunteerism. We are grateful for the funding and proud of three decades of success in sustaining a reduction in litter statewide."

Litter comes from pedes-

trians, motorists, overflowing household garbage, construction sites and uncovered trucks, and is often blown by the wind until it is trapped somewhere, as along a fence or in a ditch or gully. People tend to litter when an area is already littered, and when they do not feel a sense of ownership or community pride. In addition to being unsightly, litter unhealthy may create a negative public image.

Activities funded by the grants include cleanups of stormwater systems that can disperse trash into streams, rivers and bays; volunteer cleanups of public properties; adoption and enforcement of local anti-littering ordinances; beach cleanups; public information and education programs; and purchases of litter collection equipment, litter receptacles, recycling bins, anti-litter signs and supplies to remove graffiti.
