


# I Don't Do Yes or No Answers! - I Do Explanations! - 6/10/15 Council Meeting

PERTH AMBOY - The late Dixon Rodriguez' cousin, Sandra Tobar came to the Council Meeting to speak about the release of the tape that showed the shooting that occurred on December 4, 2013. Behind her stood Dixon's mother. Tobar stated, "Two videos were online and one was very grainy. All we are looking for is closure. It's bittersweet. The video doesn't show what was done after he was shot. The audio portion (the 911 call) was released very quickly."

City Attorney Mark Blunda replied, "The video was retrieved from two businesses. I also wrote to the prosecutor that the City and family wanted to know the status of the investigations. This was done a couple of months after residents complained about the slowness of the videotape taking so long to be released."

Blunda read the letter that the



guez' shooting from day one. He told the Council, "People understand that we (residents) fight for a cause when we come up and speak. An outsider whose not even from Perth Amboy filed a lawsuit to get a copy of the Dixon Rodriguez shooting tape. I saw the video, but it wasn't clear. After 18 months this outsider had more interest in what was going on than you (the Council). Stop saying you are leaders when you are fake leaders. But I have to respect you as elected officials."

Resident Alan Silber said, "Within a few weeks of the shooting, one of the officers who fired their gun was back on duty while the investigation was going on. In 2008 it was promised that the administration would be transparent. That disappeared quickly. You seem to be hiding some things and someone in Woodbridge is tion to whether or not Silber had any evidence that someone delayed the release of the

tape.

Silber responded back, "I don't give yes or no answers. I give explanations. The Mayor and Vitale should have demanded a press conference a few months after the shooting demanding a release of the tape now. The person from the outside who finally got a copy of the tape had no agenda and he got the results (the release of the video). There is no plausible reason for this long delay. You lose credibility." Silber went on to give examples from other states where there were other police shooting's against civilians and how quickly videos of those incidents were released to the public.

Blunda briefly interrupted Silber by saying, "You can't go by what other states or municipalities practices are. You

City received from the Prosecutor's Office regarding the recent release of the video.

Blunda continued, "After we finally got release of the tape in early June 2015 we contacted the family's lawyer. We asked him if he wanted the video sent to the family, but he preferred that it be sent to him instead. The City was powerless."

salaries and salary ranges and increments for officers and employees of the City of Perth Amboy" (Ordinance No. 218-79 as amended adopted July 3, 1979) Re: Non Union - 2008-2014.

Former Councilman Ken Balut came up to speak about this. "Are you using a civil service title? Union workers should have a right to bid on these nonunion jobs. There should be a test administered to all applicants.

The title that Balut was referring to was Business Manager. B.A. Jillian Barrick said, "This for an existing employee who has a different title in the Parking Authority. This position was posted."

Resident David Caba questioned the title of Senior Housing Inspector and whether or not it will be given to an in-house person or a resident. "Will all of these positions mentioned in this ordinance be open to anyone who may qualify?"

Barrick stated that the Senior Housing Inspector's primary duty will be to enforce the codes already on the books.

An example would be to make sure household garbage is disposed of properly or to make sure it is put out after 5 p.m. (not too early).

Alan Silber questioned whether or not we are adding on additional people.

Barrick responded, "Some department will remain the same, while other will increase. The ordinance has a salary range for each position listed.

City Attorney Mark Blunda gave a more detailed explanation about the positions stated in the ordinance. "Towards the end of last summer, there were problems existing with the enforcement of codes. After having meetings with the Mayor and the Department Heads, we found a lot of obsolete practices that couldn't be handled with the existing system. Code Enforcement was severely understaffed and new equipment was needed. Titles were recommended by me to take care of a lot of these problems."

B.A. Barrick also stated, "Two existing employees are getting new titles."

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez noted that one title had a date of 1/1/15 on it. Barrick responded, "That one person would be paid retroactively."

When Fernando Gonzalez asked, "Are most of these positions were for people presently on our staff?"

Barrick answered, "Yes."

Resident Stanley Sierakowski had a question for Councilman Bill Petrick, "Can you respond to the rumor that you might be given the Senior Housing Inspector position of \$80,000 with health benefits?"

Petrick responded, "This is the first I've heard of it."

Former Councilman Ken Balut had a question about Communication No. 5. Ransom Environmental submitted an amendment to the original Response Action Outcome designation for AOC R-3 for the Rosengarten Property, 40 and 50 Washington St.,Perth Amboy. (6/1/15)

"This property has not been fenced in for over a year. People are using it to get to a fishing area. At one time homeless people were living there until there was fire. People are walking around freely and there's a school across the street."

# **Dixon Rodriguez Incident** *Middlesex Prosecutor's Office Releases Video*

Press Release 6/10/15 PERTH AMBOY, NJ- The City of Perth Amboy has been informed that the Middlesex Prosecutor's Office has released the surveillance camera video regarding the Dixon Rodriguez fatal incident on December 4, 2013. The City of Perth Amboy was not in possession of and was not responsible for the release of video or any footage captured that was directly collected by the Middlesex Prosecutor's Office for the investigation.

In a statement released June 3, 2015 to Clinton-based lawyer Walter Luers, James E. O'Neill of the Middlesex County Prosecutor's Office families, the officers, and the community. As such, I ask that you also continue to respect and offer your prayers, as the families continue in their recovery process. I want to assure our community that our Police Department has taken all necessary steps to ensure the safety and well-being of our residents," said Mayor Wilda Diaz.

#### Statement released today [June 10, 2015] from Deputy Chief Lawrence Cattano:

"It is a tragic situation anytime a life is lost. In this situation, officers were called to the residence by the mother of Mr. Rodriguez. On the 9-1-1 call she stated she needed Officers to respond as her son was violent. As the video shows, the Officers, consistent with their training, used the force necessary to respond to the violent and unprovoked attack by Mr. Rodriguez. Their response not only saved their lives, but also protected our citizens, including the school children that were on the street that day from the three neighborhood schools. A complete and thorough investigation of this case by the Middlesex Prosecutor's Office and the New Jersey Attorney General's Office concluded that the officers 'actions were warranted and legally justified," said Deputy Chief Lawrence Cattano.

The Middlesex Prosecutor Andrew C. Carey on the conclusion of the investigation on 4/24/14:

"This is to inform you that the Middlesex County Prosecutor's Office has concluded its investigation concerning the use of the deadly force on December 4, 2013, by two members of the Perth Amboy Police Department. Pursuant to the applicable Attorney General Law Enforcement Directives, we have provided the relevant documents and media to the Division of Criminal Justice for final review by the Office of the Attorney General. Along with the providing the materials, I have also stated our recommendation and conclusion regarding the investigation, which is, in sum and substance as follows:" "Upon the review of the entire investigation conducted by the Middlesex County Prosecutor's Office, the undisputed facts indicate that the use of deadly force by the two Perth Amboy Police Department patrol officers was justified under the law, and therefore, a grand jury investigation and/or review is not required.""



# It's Déjà vu All Over Again!

This past Saturday (6/13/15) I attended a forum put on by some of the Board of Education Members at the PAHS library. The sole topic was the status of the new high school. I came out of that meeting with very little new information learned, but perhaps a little different perspective on the situation.

According to the present Board Members, the beginning of a quest for the new high school began 13 years ago in 2002 when the need for a new high school was recognized. There were community meetings on various topics such as what type of high school should be built (academy, traditional, etc.). There was a contest on whom the architect should be and most importantly - where should this new high school be built.

So where are we now? It's 2015 and no new high school has been built nor is in the process of being built. I've been attending Board of Education Meetings for the past 2-3 years now and have heard a lot of talk about a new high school. It's fair to say that the previous Board (last 2-3 years) was preoccupied with the matters concerning the previous Superintendent and building a new high school was on the back burner.

During the forum, Board Member Israel Varela stated that he was instrumental in getting \$190 million from the SDA (Schools Development Authority) because he wanted 72 acres of land (the Celotex site).

It was stated at the meeting by Mayor Diaz who attended the forum, that over 2 years ago, the then Superintendent (Dr. Janine Waker-Caffrey) went with her and a staff member with a representative of the SDA and did an assessment of viable sites for a new high school.

This past September the then Board President Obi Gonzalez Amboy for a new high school is the Delaney Homes site. (FYI it's in the Master Plan (written in 2004) stating that Delaney Homes is the planned site for the new high school.) At the forum Board Member Milady Tejeda stated that the BOE has no formal written letter from the SDA indicating a deadline.

Originally, the plan was for 15.8 acres of land (Delaney Homes). Now the land available from the Housing Authority is 11.7 acres of Delaney Homes land. Recently the Board did an appraisal of the 11.7 acre property and the Housing Authority had an appraisal of the land as well. The Housing Authority's appraisal is \$4.1 million more than the BOE's appraisal. The Board of Education made an offer to the Housing Authority and offered the price based on their (the BOE's) appraisal. The Housing Authority refused the deal.

Now it's back to the same old business. To quote Yogi Berra, "It's Déjà vu all over again!" Time is being wasted. The whole situation is like a dog trying to catch its own tail going around in circles. While everybody's waiting for the best deal, somebody else catches the deal from under your nose.

I understand it's an important decision. This decision will affect the future of Perth Amboy's school system now and for years to come. This was stated at the forum by many of the Board Members and Interim Superintendent Dr. Vivian Rodriguez.

This indecision keeps us at status quo. In the meantime, everyone suffers (students, teachers, parents, etc. There comes a time when a decision has to be made or someone will make it for you, and it may not necessarily be the decision that you really wanted. We've talked, studied, assessed and pondered on a new high school. Enough, already. Make a decision. It might not please everybody, but it's the first step. Hopefully 5 years from now this conversation will be a thing of the past and a new high school will finally be built. If not, it will be an embarrassment. K.M.

"Contaminants are coming into that vacant property from properties across the street."

Councilman Bill Petrick said, "There was a letter stating that the property mentioned in Communication No. 5 was cleared according to specifications, but there are contaminants coming in from off-site locations."

Councilman Fernando Irizarry, "If people are homeless, they are not tracking contaminants home when they walk on this property."

Former Councilman Ken Balut was incredulous and couldn't believe Irizarry's statement. Balut responded by saying, "Are you kidding me? What about the Police and EMT Workers that may have to pick up the homeless that were exposed to these contaminants?"

Other speakers were concerned about parking in the City. One resident from Fayette Street, Iris Rodriguez came up again to complain about the parking situation on Fayette and Watson Avenue. Rodriguez told the Council, "You move quickly when it comes to solving parking problems in the nicer areas of town. We need residential parking permits from at least 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. We don't have driveways. We have a lot of out of State plates on High Street. If Mary Street Residents can get residential parking spots, then why can't we? Some bar owners have given political contributions to candidates. Come to my street." William Street Resident Maria Arcelay told the council, "My neighbors and I are very upset because when there was road repair work done on our street, there was a sewage backup in their basements. I personally

called Mayor Diaz' office, left my name, phone number and address for the Mayor to personally come to my house to see what I'm going through. She never came, but when someone did show up, they wanted to know who was the lady who complained. I didn't appreciate being addressed that way, since I left my full name. All this person did was bring me detergent and left me to clean up my own basement. I will come here over and over again. If I find no satisfaction with the City, I will go further to the Governor. If I get no satisfaction there, I will go to President Obama. I've been in Perth Amboy for over 30 years. I don't want to mention what I had in my basement because this problem. This town is overpopulated. I invited the Mayor to my house and nobody called me. I'm not blaming you (the Council)."

Council President Lisa Nanton and B.A. Jillian Barrick responded to Ms. Arcelay. Nanton said, "Let's see if we can find out what's causing the problem."

There was an amendment for allowing handicap parking permits in the mixed business/ residential areas. Councilman



Alpine Street Resident Anthony Bermudez also joined in about the lack of parking on his street. He emphasized one particular one family house on the street, "Which I suspect is illegal housing. It's located between Francis and Spring Streets. I've been here all my life and pay taxes. You see a bunch of cars and people coming in and out of houses. Tell me what I can do to help alleviate the problem. 10 rooms are being rented out in a one family house which is a fire hazard.

Former Council President Kenny Balut still had concerns about the property on Washington and High Street where homeless people had been living until there was a fire and they were displaced. "People are walking on that property to get to the fishing area. When they go home, they are probably tracking the contaminants to their homes." At the end of the meeting, B.A. Jillian Barrick again asked for the addresses of Ms. Arcelav and Mr. Bermudez so she could get the additional information from them.

Fernando Irizarry had misgivings about this amendment because he thought that the amendment for hardship cases would be given more privileges that apply for a regular handicapped spot. Attorney Mark Blunda made it clear that a hardship case would have the same criteria as a person who is given a handicap spot. "Every two years an applicant would be reviewed to see if they still meet the criteria for their handicap spot."







### Buckeye Facility Fire Safety and Emergency Response Simulation

Press Release 5/27/15 PERTH AMBOY - Mayor Wilda Diaz announced the collaboration of a full-scale fire and emergency response drill conducted by the Perth Amboy Fire Department and Buckeye Perth Amboy personnel which was held on Sunday, May 31st at the Buckeye Partners, L.P.'s Perth Amboy terminal.

The objective of the exercise is to test the response of the local emergency personnel and water flow and pressure in the event of an actual fire emergency at the site. Buckeye's terminal is located at 1200 State Street, north of the Outerbridge Crossing and comprised of rail yards, tank farms, and loading and unloading facilities, designed for the handling of petroleum products. The simulated scenario for the exercise was as follows:

The scenario for the drill will be a fire involving a petroleum crude oil train located on Buckeye property. Several tank cars were on fire with many exposed to the fire, along with employees that need to be rescued by the initial responding units. The goal of the drill will was to flow water in excess of 5,000 GPM, while assembling 15,000 gallons of foam concentrate.

The coordinating parties included: The Perth Amboy Fire Department and mutual aid fire departments, Buckeye Perth Amboy terminal operations team, the Perth Amboy Police Department, the Office of Emergency Management, Raritan Bay Medical Center's Emergency Medical Services, Large Diameter Hose (LDH) Strike Teams, Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI) foam resources, the Middlesex County Fire Coordinators and the Middlesex County Tanker/Tender Task Force. Additionally, Middlesex County, Somerset, Monmouth, and Mercer county Tanker/Tender resources will be in use.

Buckeye followed procedure for drills as required by the State of New Jersey for the safety of the public. This was STRICTLY a simulated drill, in which no one's life will be threatened and all safety procedures were followed.

The drill took place at Buckeye Partners Terminal Property (Parking Lot), 1200 State Street, Perth Amboy, NJ 08861

# **DEP Announces Approval of \$102.3 Million for Green Acres Open Space** and Recreation Projects

### Garden State Preservation Trust Approves \$102.3 Million for Park Development and Open Space Acquisitions

#### Press Release 6/10/15

(15/P56) TRENTON - The Garden State Preservation Trust today approved the Christie Administration's recommended list of \$102.3 million in Green Acres open space acquisition and recreational development projects, Department of Environmental Protection Commissioner Bob Martin announced.

The Garden State Preservation Trust approved \$93.3 million in funding for local government and nonprofit group projects in every New Jersey county. In addition to funding approved by the Trust, the Department has identified an additional \$9 million to be used for State acquisitions.

"The Christie Administration is committed to protecting New Jersey's beautiful natural resources by enhancing quality of life throughout the Garden State," Commissioner Martin said. "The Green Acres program is vital to that mission. This funding targets park improvements, protects greenways and watersheds, and adds to lands that provide a wealth of outdoor recreation activities for everyone."

A funding request for the list of Green Acres projects approved by the Garden State Preservation Trust will go to the Legislature for consent and then to Gov. Chris Christie for approval.

Green Acres funding is used to leverage many millions of additional preservation dollars through matching federal, state, county, local and nonprofit funds. The projects approved by the Garden State Preservation Trust include \$52 million for county and munici-

pal land acquisitions and \$36.1 million for development of local parks and recreation facilities.

The state is also awarding \$3.7 million to 16 nonprofit groups for land acquisitions and a total of \$1 million to six nonprofit organizations for recreation development, as part of the DEP's mission to expand and protect public lands.

Local funding projects include:

•\$1.6 million toward improvements at Newark's Branch Brook and Weequahic parks to include upgrades for playgrounds, ball fields, building renovations, landscaping, fencing and lighting.

•\$1.6 million to continue restoring Hudson County's Lincoln Park West with a storm water management and landscape irrigation system and completion of the riverfront promenade.

•\$1.3 million for continuing improvements to the 84-acre Joseph Medwick Park in Carteret and Woodbridge, such as observation decks overlooking the Rahway River, resurfaced tennis courts, a playground area and extended paved walking/biking paths.

•\$1.3 million for restroom renovations, new pavilions, picnic tables, road repaving and a new dock at Garret Mountain in Paterson and Woodland Park.

•\$1.1 million for Asbury Park to purchase the development rights to a half-acre North Beach property on which the current redeveloper wants to build townhomes. The city proposes developing a waterfront park there to preserve

beach access.

•\$825,000 to renovate Belmar's Maclearie Park, which suffered extensive damage in Superstorm Sandy, for tennis and basketball courts, a tot lot, sailboat storage area, picnic pavilion and seasonal band stage.

• \$500,000 to help Long Hill acquire 14 flood-prone properties along the Passaic River that will be demolished and deed-restricted as open space. •\$300,000 for major improvements to Whitman Park in Camden, including upgrades to basketball courts, baseball and football fields, and a new field irrigation system.

•\$200,000 for Westwood to acquire flood-damaged and flood-prone properties, demolish the buildings and restore the lands.

• \$1.1 million to Perth Amboy to develop a waterfront park at the base of the Victory Bridge that would include a dog park, motorized boat launch, fishing esplanade and cleaning stations.

"The proposed Raritan Riverfront Park will include a play area for both small and large dogs, an ecological walking trail, a motorized boat launch, parking and a picnic and grilling area for families," Perth Amboy Mayor Wilda Diaz said of her city's project. "These recreational goals will meet the redevelopment initiatives in the master plan and create greater opportunities for waterway access and usage. I want to thank NJDEP for the Green Acres funding that allows us to expand our recreational facilities to all."

Nonprofit matching grant funding includes:

• \$350,000 to the Trust for Public Land toward land acquisition initiatives in 18 project areas from Bergen to Sussex to Cape May counties.

•\$175,000 to the Camden Special Services District, which proposes stabilizing the walls and adding a pavilion roof to the historic Joseph Cooper House. The circa-1695 house is the oldest standing structure in the city.

• \$175,000 to the Passaic River Rowing Association to develop and expand an existing boathouse in Riverside County Park South in Lyndhurst.

• \$150,000 to the Washington Park Association for landscape improvements at Washington Park, on the border of Union City and Jersey City, and Lincoln Park West, along the Hackensack River.

Approximately \$9 million will fund land acquisitions for inclusion in state parks, forests, natural areas and wildlife management areas. These projects include:

•Preserving open lands within the Barnegat Bay Watershed, the state's most widely used recreational resource.

•Protecting the green belt in the Highlands Greenway, a critical water source area for one third of New Jersey's citizens and a region potentially vulnerable to development.

•Expanding natural areas throughout the state to protect threatened or endangered plant and animal species.

• Protecting open spaces in the 1-million-acre Pinelands reserve to ensure water quality, ecosystem integrity and sustainable agriculture production.

· Increasing public access and

#### land holdings in the Delaware River Watershed Greenway.

•Purchasing additional lands in the Ridge and Valley Greenway region bounded by the Highlands to the east and the uppermost areas of the Delaware River to the west to link between publicly owned lands. •Partnering with various agencies to preserve additional New Jersey lands in the 14-county Crossroads of the American **Revolution National Heritage** Area, through which General George Washington's Army passed.

The Green Acres program was created in 1961 as the result of an innovative bond referendum. Working with public and private partners, Green Acres has directly protected more than 680,000 acres of open space and provided hundreds of recreational opportunities for numerous activities, including city parks, natural areas, playgrounds, athletic fields, boat ramps, docks, fishing piers and environmental education. Total protected open space across the state now exceeds 1.4 million acres.

In addition to providing recreation opportunities, Green Acres projects help protect water quality and stimulate economic development by creating jobs, and making cities and towns more attractive places to live and work.

cer/Hunterdon). "By discouraging drivers from unlawfully using placards that belong to a friend or relative, this bill will help ensure that the designated spaces are used only by authorized parties."

The new penalty would be imposed in addition to the penalty for illegally parking in a parking space designated for individuals with disabilities. Current law sets the fine for parking in a restricted parking space without a placard at \$250 for a first offense. Second and subsequent offenses carry a penalty of a minimum fine of \$250 and up to 90 days of community service. The Motor Vehicle Commission may also revoke the placard or plates of a person who loans

"Abuse of parking privileg-

es intended to make facilities more accessible is a serious violation of the rights of New Jersey residents with disabilities, and it ought to be treated as such," said Wisniewski (D-Middlesex). "This legislation will discourage such offenses and advance disability rights in our state."

"Restricted parking spaces facilitate self-sufficiency for New Jersey residents with disabilities and are representative of our state's belief that all people should have the opportunity to live, work and fully participate in society," said Benson (D-Mercer/Middlesex). "Safeguarding the rights of individuals with disabiliways be a priority."

Under the bill, "unlawful use" shall include display of a placard by:

•a person other than a driver or passenger who was lawfully issued a temporary or permanent placard;

•a person who continues to use a lawfully-issued temporary placard past its date of expiration; or

•a person who was issued a permanent placard and subsequently had his or her disability identification card revoked or deemed invalid.

The measure was advanced on Thursday by the Assembly Transportation and Independent Authorities Committee, of which Wisniewski is chair.
