





There were questions about safety with the possible reopening of a tunnel under railroad tracks. This connects Catherine Street and Dillman Lane near Perth Amboy High School.

William Kurzenberger, Program Coordinator, Office of Economic and Community Development came forward to shed more light on this resolution, "We want to remove some of the physical restraints and make improvements to the tunnel, shortening it from 200 to 100 feet. The proposed new entrances will have greater visibility, which will call for exterior and interior lighting. The design and engineering specifications we need requires more money. The \$70,000 cost was

recommended by our City Engineer."

Business Administrator Adam Cruz stated, "The police will look at safety concerns first."

Councilman Fernando Irizarry said, "Sometimes light and security cameras are not fixed."

Cruz assured the Council that they are looking at all of these issues first.

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez said, "I want to make sure that the community (where they want to reopen the tunnel)

participates more. Only a few people attend community meetings. "There's no problem to get money for planing. The community involvement in the past has only been token."

B.A. Cruz agreed with Gonzalez, "Let's have the meeting in the community that this will affect."

Councilman Bill Petrick looked at the diagram of the plans supplied by Kurzenberger and pointed out to a section

# Mayor Fred Henry Comments On 2016 Election

By: Joseph L. Kuchie SOUTH AMBOY - South Amboy Mayor Fred Henry commented on the recent 2016 U.S. Election at last Monday's council meeting.

People around the United States, including students and faculty at a number of colleges and universities in New Jersey, have taken to the streets to protest Trump's victory. Trump (290 electoral votes) defeated Hillary Clinton (232 electoral votes) on November 8th despite Clinton receiving over 1 million more total votes than Trump.

Henry, a Democrat, acknowledged that United States citizens have the right to protest, but hoped that they would stay as peaceful as possible. He also noted that our country was great for a reason and citizens must trust the process.

"There have been protests, we all know that, but we have a great country for a reason," Henry said. "We have a constitution that lays the ground work for how a person is elected. It has worked for over 240 years."

"We're never going to agree with the person that is elected but the person is our President, whoever that might be, and in this case it is Donald Trump," he continued. "We need to move forward and hope that he does what is best for all Americans. I'd like to think positively on things and I think that he will."

"We just need to make sure that these protests that are going on stay as peaceful as possible," he added. "We know people have the right to protest, but we need to move on as a nation, he will be our President, and we need to wish him well and surround him with

good people."

"Come January 20th we need to accept him. As President Obama said 'If he succeeds, we all succeed', and that's what it's all about."

Despite Clinton winning New Jersey's 14 electoral votes and taking Middlesex County with about 55,000 more votes than Trump, Trump actually won South Amboy by over 300 votes (1,870-1,506). Clinton had also lost South Amboy to Bernie Sanders during the Democratic Primary, and South Amboy was one of just three municipalities in Middlesex County that voted Sanders over Clinton (Milltown, Spotswood).

Mayor Henry also congratulated councilman Tom Reilly and councilwoman Zusette Dato on their re-election to the city council, and welcomed Democrat Brian McLaughlin, who will fill the seat left by Councilman Donald Applegate after defeating Independent Barbara Pasternack 681-161

Councilman Applegate was not in attendance for the meeting. The next and final city council meeting of 2016 will be held on December 21 at 7:00 p.m.

highlighted in orange and asked him if that was for a handicapped ramp.

Kurzenberger responded, "Yes."

Petrick showed concerned about this because the ramps appeared to be going away from the High School, "Maybe these should be relocated to the other side. We also have speeding issues on Dillman Lane which is a safety hazard."

Irizarry agreed with Petrick and wanted to know, "How can we do something about the speeding? Residents have been complaining. We even thought about having speed bumps but were told no because of insurance issues."

Cruz said, "I will discuss this with the Deputy Police Chief."

Council President Lisa Nanton wanted to know, "What caused the closing of the tunnel in the first place?"

Criminal activity that happened in the tunnel was cited as the reason for its closure.

Councilman Joel Pabon responded, "At one time there

was a person in that tunnel for security purposes. Like Councilman Gonzalez says, we've got to get the community involved."

Nanton asked Kurzenberger, "Can the money can be applied for another project besides the reopening of the tunnel? And is this money just for the approval of these plans and then the implementation of the plans? Is there a deadline for the grant?"

Kurzenberger responded, "The deadline has passed. The resolution is needed for approval to get it going."

The Resolution was moved by Councilman Bill Petrick and seconded by Councilman Fernando Gonzalez. Everyone voted "Yes."

R-465 - Accepting the base bid and authorizing a contract with B&W Construction for emergency repairs to the Perth Amboy collection system in an amount not to exceed \$800,000.00

Councilman Joel Pabon was curious to see when these repairs would be started.

Luis Perez Jimenez - Director of Operations at the at the USA-PA (Utility Service Associates Perth Amboy) Middlesex Water Company) answered, "We're ready and we're just waiting to get a resolution passed."

This prompted Council President Lisa Nanton to ask, "For this Resolution, you are saying that you can get the repairs started and not go over the \$800,000 amount?"

Perez answered, "Yes."

Nanton then smiled and said emphatically, "Do it for less."

Acting Attorney Rainone said, "\$800,000 was the best price and it was based on a unit price bid."

After Resolutions were voted on, Councilman Fernando Gonzalez was the first one to speak. "There are a lot of roads in town in bad shape. When I'm driving on parts of Amboy Avenue, I thought I was in Vietnam. Is somebody keeping track of these conditions? And will something be done? Amboy Avenue was repaved about 3 years ago. After the utility companies finished digging up paved roads, they left them in worse condition than before."

B.A. Cruz responded, "Half of the roads were redone."

Gonzalez responded back, "Isn't there a requirement for what has to be done before the work starts? We allow them (utility companies) to do whatever they want. I talked to someone from the Board of Public Utilities about the gas meters that are placed in front of buildings. The gentleman I spoke to said, "That's not allowed." Gonzalez continued, "A new building on Madison Avenue has 5 gas meters in front. Please ask the engineer about this. We need to create some kind of policy. The town of Elizabeth went into a war about this."

Council President Nanton talked about her concerns, "We should talk to Elizabethtown Gas about this. Parts of Gordon, Water and some of the streets by the High School were patched - not paved."

Cruz responded, "Elizabethtown Gas went on site where Gas Meters are placed on the front of buildings and residences and our City Engineer went with them. Jeff Rauch (Perth

Amboy City Engineer) will be present at the next Caucus Meeting."

Nanton had other concerns: "I want Jamie Rios (Director of Code Enforcement/Administrative Officer to the Planning and Zoning Board) here about the overflowing garbage cans. They're attracting rats, raccoons, etc. I see a lot of them at night. Someone had the wires of their car chewed up by these pests. If we go to the expense of getting garbage cans with lids, people who violate these ordinances should be fined."

Councilman Bill Petrick had concerns about a sewer collapse near 778 Robbin Street. Petrick also mentioned Riverview Drive which is very bumpy when you access it through Herbert Street. At least PSE&G took some responsibility for that action." He offered congratulations to those who participated in the November 8th election and congratulated the winners.

Board Vice-President Israel Varela then added later in the Meeting in reference to the newly hired Supervisor of Educational Technology, "Since I met Ms. Pepe, I hope we do work on something. A lot of parents do not have Wi-Fi. We hope you use the technology (in the classrooms)."

# Conceptual Design for Greater Pedestrian Access:

Press Release from Office of the Mayor

PERTH AMBOY - The bicycle and pedestrian plan called for improved conditions that would allow for easier policing and return pedestrian access to the community. The new design would need to reduce the length of the tunnel and improve the sight lines into and throughout the tunnel. In its current state, the tunnel runs two hundred and eighty feet with entrances

that do not provide any visibility to the street on either side. This project reduces the overall length, which provides the opportunity to create and expand open space on the eastern side of the tracks. On the western side of the tracks, the tunnel would open up directly to the street in place of the current opening which is a long ramp that descends on a parcel across the street next to a private residence. Such improvements

would create clear sight lines into the tunnel from both streets and activate the area with daylighting techniques that will allow for nearby residents and safety patrols to observe the tunnel's traffic. The end result of these improvements will provide a much needed link in the City's pedestrian network that residents feel secure using. As a proposed designed, there are no funds or imminent plans for future construction.

pleted," said Pallone "All along the Bayshore, flooding has become an increasingly common phenomenon as severe storms have become more frequent and residential and commercial development has increased. "The award of the Port Monmouth Hurricane and Storm Damage Reduction Project Contract 2 is another critical step in the Corps' efforts to increase resiliency measures for this community," said COL David Caldwell, Commander, US-ACE, New York District. "Large storm events will always be a threat, so it's critical we continue to do all we can to help mitigate potential flood damage and increase resiliency to vulnerable communities like Port Monmouth. That's why we now have a second announcement of a contract award for the next elements just 30 days after breaking ground on Phase 2 of the Port Monmouth Hurricane and Storm Damage Reduction Project. I am pleased to say we're moving to con-

struction as aggressively as

possible thanks to the support of the community, leaders, and elected officials. Port Monmouth is on its way to becoming much more resilient."

The first phase of the project was successfully completed in June of 2015 and included dune restoration, beach replenishment, groin work, extension of the fishing pier, and construction of protective dunes. # **Pallone Celebrates Removal of Atlantic from Final Offshore Drilling Plan**

Press Release 11/18/16 WASHINGTON, DC – Today, the Department of the Interior unveiled its final 2017-2022 Outer Continental Shelf Oil and Gas Leasing Program. The final plan does not include a dangerous provision from the Draft Proposed Plan that would have authorized new offshore oil and gas leasing along the southern Atlantic coast. Pallone worked relentlessly to remove the Atlantic from the proposal, sending two letters to the Department of the Interior raising concerns about the risks posed by offshore drilling to New Jersey and communities throughout the Atlantic coast. He – along with Senators Menendez and Booker - joined concerned residents of New Jersey fighting to #KilltheDrill, and Pallone spoke directly with senior Administration officials to reiterate the need to prevent At-

lantic drilling.

Earlier this year, Congressman Frank Pallone, Jr. (NJ-06), led 73 of his colleagues in sending a letter asking President Obama to permanently protect both the Atlantic and Arctic Oceans from any future offshore oil and gas leasing. This week, he asked President Obama to put the ban into place before President-elect Trump is sworn into office.

"I am pleased and relieved that the Department of Interior's final plan abandons its earlier proposal to allow drilling in the Atlantic from Georgia to Virginia," said Pallone. "That proposal was incredibly shortsighted, and would have threatened the ecology and economy, and public health all along the Atlantic coast, including our New Jersey coastline."

Rep. Pallone has been a longtime leader in the fight to protect the Atlantic coast, sponsoring legislation since

2010 to prevent expansions of offshore drilling. The current version of his legislation, the COAST Anti-Drilling Act (H.R. 1977), has 30 House cosponsors and companion legislation was introduced by Senator Menendez. Pallone wrote to the Secretary of the Interior in 2010 voicing strong opposition to a plan to enable drilling in the Atlantic. He did this even before the Deepwater Horizon disaster brought offshore drilling to the forefront of the news.

"As I have said before, drilling in the Atlantic Ocean is a risk-reward proposition: coastal communities face all of the risk so that Big Oil can reap all of the reward," said Pallone. "We need to continue to reject efforts to drill along our coastline, and to transition to cleaner and more efficient energy sources along our cost."

# This Week in World War II 75 Years Ago

On the Eastern Front, Rostov-on-Don, in Russia — an important hub on the southern front — is taken by the Germans on November 21, 1941. In Libya, the British 70th Infantry Division attempts a breakout from Tobruk, which it accomplishes after a day of heavy fighting.

British heavy cruiser *HMS Devonshire* on November 22 sinks commerce-raiding German auxiliary cruiser *Atlantis* off Ascension Island in the South Atlantic, ending the longest warship cruise of the war. (*Atlantis* has been at sea for 622 days without in-port replenishment or repair). During her cruise, *Atlantis* has sunk 22 Allied merchant ships. The United Kingdom issues an ultimatum to Finland: End its war with the Soviet Union or it will face war with the Allies. The 2nd New Zealand Regiment captures Ft. Capuzzo, Libya, near the Egyptian border. To the west, Rommel begins a counteroffensive, re-taking Sidi Rezegh, south of Tobruk; British tank losses are heavy. In Russia, sixty trucks carry food and other supplies across Lake Ladoga on an ice road to the defenders of Leningrad. It is the first of hundreds of such truck convoys.

On November 23 the U.S. forges an agreement with the Dutch government-in-exile whereby the U.S. will occupy Surinam (Dutch Guiana) on the northeast coast of South America to protect bauxite mines there. A bomb explodes at the U.S. consulate in Saigon, Indochina. Much damage is done, but there are no injuries. German progress is being made on a 50-mile front northwest of Moscow, with some units less than 35 miles from the city. Fierce fighting occurs south of Sidi Rezegh, Libya, with the Germans and Italians suffering heavy losses; they now have fewer than 100 tanks. To the northeast, at Gambut, Libya, New Zealand infantry captures German Afrika Korps headquarters and much German communications equipment.

On November 24, the U.S. grants Lend-Lease benefits to the Free French. In the North Atlantic, German sub *U-124* sinks the British light cruiser HMS Dunedin. Of a complement of 486, only four officers and 63 enlisted men survive. The Germans begin a siege of Sevastopol in Ukraine's Crimean peninsula. In Russia, German Field Marshal Gerd von Rundstedt, concerned that his force is in an untenable situation, disobeys Hitler's direct order to hold Rostov-on-Don and withdraws from the city. In addition to being attacked in their rear by the Red Army, von Rundstedt's troops are short of food, fuel, ammunition, vehicles and winter clothing.

In the Mediterranean, German sub *U-331* on November 25 hits the battleship *HMS Barham* with three torpedoes. The British vessel's magazines explode and she rolls over and sinks quickly with only 343 surviving from her crew of 1,184 officers and men. In East Africa, Allied forces take Tadda Ridge, 7 miles from the Italian stronghold at Gondar, in northwestern Ethiopia. From Berlin, German foreign minister Joachim von Ribbentrop denounces Franklin Roosevelt as "the chief culprit of this war." In Libya, the 7th Indian Brigade repels an attack by the German 5th Panzer Regiment at Sidi Omar, while Australian and New Zealand troops link up near Ed Duda, southeast of Tobruk.

In Washington on November 26, U.S. Secretary of State Cordell Hull delivers a note — "Outline of Proposed Basis for Agreement Between the United States and Japan," known as "the Hull Note" — to the Japanese ambassador. The note demands, among other things, that Japan withdraw its troops from French Indochina and China and stop all other Southeast Asian incursions. The Japanese request two weeks to formulate a reponse. In Japan, a fleet of 33 warships and auxiliaries, including six aircraft carriers, commanded by Japanese Vice Admiral Chūichi Nagumo leaves Hitokapu Bay for Pearl Harbor under strict radio silence. In North Africa, the Germans withdraw from Sidi Rezegh, Libya, allowing the British 7th Armoured Division to retake the town. Lt. Gen. Alan Cunningham is relieved as commander of the British Eighth Army, replaced by Maj. Gen. Neil Ritchie. In the Middle East, the commandant of Free French forces in the Levant proclaims Lebanon to be "independent," even though the country is still governed by the Free French and Allied occupation troops remain in place.

On November 27, German panzer units reach the outskirts of Moscow. The Red Army retakes Rostov-on-Don in southern Russia. The last Italian armed forces in East Africa surrender to Allied troops at Gondar, Ethiopia. In Tokyo, the official government news agency Domei Tsushinsha reports: "There is little hope of bridging the gap between the opinions of Japan and the United States." The U.S. government issues a war warning to its overseas military commanders, advising that negotiations with Japan have reached a stalemate and that Japan might take hostile action at any moment. The Philippines, the Malay Peninsula and Borneo are listed among potential targets of a Japanese attack, but the Territory of Hawaii is not.




