3/20/17 Caucus

PERTH AMBOY – R-137-3/17 – Approving a special permit for public entertainment for the Committee Patriotico Cultural Puertorriqueno of Perth Amboy. R-138-3/17 Approving a special permit for public entertainment for United Dominicans for Perth Amboy

Councilman Fernando Irizarry was frustrated when he stated, "I have asked for the applications and police reports on numerous occasions about these two festivals and have not seen them. We are supposed to see the applications first, but all we have received are summaries and not

the reports."

Attorney Judy Verrone said, "I can provide you with the applications."

Business Administrator Adam Cruz said, "I will try to get the police reports."

R-139-3/17 — Granting a storm water utility easement for the storm water connection at the existing inlet within the firehouse parking lot on City owned property (lot 1.01, block 172) with the Perth Amboy Board of Education for the new Seaman Street School.

Council President Bill Petrick wanted to know, "Is the additional line going to be enough for the additional run-

off?"

Business Administrator Cruz answered, "Yes, and I can get the reports from City Engineer Jeff Rauch."

R-141-3/17 — Granting a cross access easement on the City owned property (lot 1.01, block 172) with the Perth Amboy Board of Education for the new Seaman Street School.

Petrick wanted to know, "Who is absorbing the cost for this?"

Cruz answered, "We are."

Petrick was puzzled by this because they (the Board of Education) already have access to the property. We need more discussions with the

Battling it Out

3/22/17 Council Meeting

PERTH AMBOY - During the first public comments, Resident Stanley Sierakowski had a question about the City's budget, specifically questioning Seabra's Armory. "There is a little over \$22,800 listed for delinquent taxes. That is under a \$731,815 budget. The Armory Restaurant owes the City \$496,000 over a two year period. Where in the budget is the account's receivable in the Armory? Their interest would be over a million dollars. As far as the PILOT Projects, It's the developers that are saving millions of dollars."

Sierakowski then mentioned a letter sent from former Tax Assessor JoAnn Jimenez addressed to the Council President, Business Administrator and City Clerk. "In the letter, Jimenez said that they will look into that situation (developers wanting PILOT's on land that they do not own) later."

Stanley Sierakowski concluded, "Everything is a total lie, and you (the Council) should think for themselves."

Resident Kenneth Balut had questions on the Seaman Street Property where a future elementary school is planned to be built. "The cause for the easement and storm water connection is still taxpayers dollars regardless of whether the Board of Education or City pays for it."

Balut also had concerns about the school being built in front of the firehouse. "Look at all the traffic already on Seaman Street. Have you ever seen it how it looks when school is let out? We bought that property to get a developer out of trouble."

Balut then switched gears and talked about the money spent to purchase of 52 Holiday Wreaths for \$20,000. "Just because the bid for these wreaths were under the bidding limit, you okayed this resolution. During the League of Municipality Meetings, there were vendors there that had Christmas Decorations. You could have inquired about

their prices."

He then mentioned, "Even though JoAnn Jimenez left our town for a better job, she responded to a request from the Council because she still cares about the City. You are making all these bad deals."

Councilman Irizarry had questions about some of Balut's statements, especially about a \$5 million (expenses associated with the cleanup of the Seaman Street Property) figure that Balut mentioned. Irizarry stated, "An estimate is not an expense."

Balut then started to rattle off how he came up with the estimated figure of \$5 million. "The specs on the 3 bids to clean up the Seaman Street property - if you want to go with me, we could look up the records. I spent 3 hours researching the Seaman Street Property. The same appraiser that did the Seaman Street Property also appraised the property on Washington Street. We used to have a school bus stop on Seaman Street when

there was no one living there."

Resident and Business Own-

er Susan Batista came up to speak about R-137 and R-138. "Who did this and how much do they (the organizers of the upcoming festivals) have to refund to the City? It looks like the one festival (Puerto Rican Festival) used the City's Joint Insurance Fund. On Resolution R-138 pertaining to the Dominican Festival, it seemed like the numbers for the amount of people attending are askew. The Old Bridge Police came over to help cover the event. The attendance numbers for this year has to exceed the amount of people the have written down on the application. There a number of parks that can hold this venue. This is a Board of Education Property (Wilentz School) and you (the Council) may not have the jurisdiction to make this decision."

Councilman Joel Pabon said, "That is a valid point where a resident made a comment about the Puerto Rican Festival probably using the City's insurance instead of their own. Are they allowed to do that?"

DeCotiis Attorney Judy Verrone said, "All this Ordinance says is that the applicant must provide insurance for the festival. The Resident was talking about last year's application."

Council President William Petrick wondered, "Is it proper for the event to use insurance from the City's Joint Insurance Fund?"

Pabon inquired if the City used their insurance to cover this event. "Was that correct?"

Petrick inquired, "Is it typical that a private organization can be covered by the City's joint insurance fund for their private events?"

B.A. responded, "The City can choose to cosponsor an event." Cruz then asked Verrone if she had any backup information on last year's event."

Verrone responded, "Yes." Petrick responded, "We (the

Ortiz said, "This is a tricky situation because there is such a thing as freedom of speech and what one person might find vulgar that another might not. Maybe we can add a language clause to the ordinance."

At this point, DeCotiis Attorney Judy Verrone said, "Ortiz is correct. There is such a thing such as freedom of speech. Basically, this ordinance is to regulate a place and time where a performance can take place."

A question was acted if these performers will be using streets. Ortiz replied, "We can isolate places with ample space for these performances."





Department of Law, effective April 1, 2017 and waiving the residency requirement."

Council President Bill Petrick said, "We need to talk to this person prior to appointing her."

Attorney Judy Verrone responded, "This is the Mayor's appointment and this resolution is for the Council to advise and consent. The Council can say yes or no."

Councilman Fernando Irizarry said, "How can I advise and consent without speaking to her?"

Verrone continued and said, "I know you probably are tired of me saying this, but this is the Mayor's nomination."

Irizarry then spoke about a correspondence from the Mayor, telling the Council that they cannot change the position of a Law Director from part time to full time. Irizarry wondered, "Why is this position being filled if we don't have the authority to change it?"

Verrone answered, "The Council doesn't have authority to change the Law Director's hours."

Council President Petrick asked, "Why does this resolution have waiving of a residency requirement when this lawyer has a Perth Amboy Address?"

B.A. Cruz said, "That's what she (Emillia Perez) uses as her mailing address." Petrick responded, "We need to meet her (Perez) in public or in a private session."

Verrone responded, "There is nothing inconsistent in this ordinance. It's the Mayor's appointment."

During the public portion, Resident Ken Balut questioned the Seaman Street Resolutions, "It's so polluted that the SDA would not approve." Balut stated in a letter that he had in his possession from 2004. "This is all taxpayers money whether it's being paid for by the City or the Board of Education. The proposed County Park on Washington Street is still polluted."

Balut then mentioned the Youth Alliance Group that spoke earlier in the Meeting. "This is a very good group. As one person from that group said, this program deters our youth from getting involved in drugs, tobacco and alcohol, of which there's easy access to. There were about 20-25 kids from this group here and that is about the amount of people in the City and surrounding towns that have overdosed on drugs." Balut then continued to speak about the new bail reform law that was recently passed. "It's not working. There was a case where a person who had committed robberies, was arrested and released without bail based on this new bail bonds program. Shortly after he was let go, he immediately committed two more burglaries." Balut then questioned why the Mayor, Police, Fire Department or the Board of Education were not here to talk about the pipeline."

Resident Stanley Sierakowski had a question about Resolution R-129-3/17 – Introduction of CY2017 Budget. "With the delinquent taxes, I didn't see accounts receivable or the status of the Armory Account (taxes and money owed to the City)."

He then mentioned Communication No. 1. JoAnn Jimenez, Former Tax Assessor, submitted a timeline and recommendations regarding the Bridge PILOT Proposal. "E-port doesn't own the property. You need to own the property to get a PILOT. This is a shift of City money. The municipality will get the money the last 15 years of the contract. The Jimenez Communication said the true assessment is not known. The Board of Education and the Library are the big losers in the E-Port PILOT Program. Money won't be available under the new administrations (State and National)."

Resident Jeremy Barrata came up to speak next, "Be advised of referencing R-145. The advise and consent (Appointment of a Law Director) is not a rubber stamp. The new Law Director should come before the Council."

PERTH AMBOY - March 31st will be the 147th anniversary of Thomas Mundy Peterson becoming the first African-American to cast a vote under the 1870 Fifteenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution:

The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

Perth Amboy has long taken pride in Peterson and his place in Civil Rights history. After casting his vote, he could have disappeared into history. Yet instead, he fully embraced civic life as a citizen. How Peterson took advantage of this new opportunity is an aspect of the story that few know about.

"Perth Amboy is one of the few municipalities in the State of New Jersey that still holds such remarkable national history. We are deemed the "City of Firsts" for one because of Thomas Mundy Peterson's movement, which remains a significant detail in history taught in our public schools locally and one that should be known by every student in America," said Mayor Wilda Diaz.

New Jersey historian, author, and lecturer, Gordon Bond, will be exploring this aspect in his presentation, "Citizen Peterson: How Thomas Mundy Peterson Made the Most of His Historic Vote." He will be talking specifically about how his original research revealed some of Peterson's forgotten participation in Perth Amboy, Middlesex County, and State politics.

Bond will also provide an update on the release of a pamphlet about Peterson he is writing for the Middlesex County Cultural and Heritage Commission that will be made available free of charge later this year.

Additionally, the 1683 Society Inc., a nonprofit organization will honor Thomas Mundy Peterson & Marcus Curless, respectively the 1st & 2nd African American voters under the 15th Amendment in the United States of America. Their votes took place in our Historic Perth Amboy City Hall on March 31, 1870. A tree with a cast bronze marker will be planted to commemorate the 147th Anniversary of their votes at City Hall Circle located at 260 High Street at 1:00 p.m. on Friday, March 31st.

This Week in World War II 75 Years Ago

On March 27, 1942, the government of Australia declares a state of emergency in the northern portion of the continent. Heavyweight boxing champ Joe Louis (now a private in the Army) knocks out Abe Simon in the sixth round of their military-charity exhibition fight at New York's Madison Square Garden. The match nets \$36,150 for the Army Relief Society.

The German-occupied French port of St.-Nazaire is wrecked on March 28 in a raid by 611 British commandos and Royal Navy sailors. 169 of the attackers are killed and 215 are taken prisoner. The damage caused by the raiders, however, is so extensive that the port cannot be re-opened until 1947. The RAF bombs Lübeck, Germany, a cultural center, dropping mainly incendiaries. The resulting firestorm damages or destroys some 12,800 buildings, including three main churches, representing over 60% of the buildings in the Medieval town. Some 300 people are killed and over 780 are injured. 15,000 residents are left homeless. Hitler is outraged over the destruction. In France, the first deportation train departs for the extermination camps at Auschwitz, in Occupied Poland.

In Burma, the Battle of Toungoo ends in a Japanese victory on March 29. The city controls the road north to Mandalay. Its capture threatens the flank of the Allied defensive line in Burma and opens the way for a Japanese move into the central part of the country.

In Washington, D.C., on March 30, the U.S. Joint Chiefs of Staff divide the Pacific Theater into three commands: Pacific Ocean Areas, headed by Adm. Chester Nimitz; South West Pacific Areas, commanded by Gen. Douglas MacArthur; and South East Pacific Areas (based at Balboa, Panama, to protect American shipping from attacks by submarines), led by Rear Adm. Abel Bidwell.

On March 31, the Imperial Japanese Navy initiates "Operation C," a sortie by a fast-carrier strike force against Allied ships and bases in the Indian Ocean. At the same time, the Japanese launch an 850-man invasion of Christmas Island, ideally located as a control point in the eastern Indian Ocean. It is also a source of phosphates needed by Japanese industry. Defending the island is a 6-inch gun manned by a British artillery detachment, comprising one British officer, one Indian officer, four British non-commissioned officers and 27 Indian gunners. Apparently believing Japanese propaganda that India has been liberated from British rule, eight of the gunners mutiny and kill the British commander and non-coms, allowing the Japanese to occupy the island unopposed.

On April 1, 1942, Japanese troops in force attack Prome, Burma, on the Irrawaddy River about 160 miles northwest of Rangoon. As part of "Operation C," Japanese warships, centered on the carrier Ryujo, enter the Bay of Bengal to prey on Allied merchant vessels in the Indian Ocean. Off Cape Henry, near Virginia Beach, Virginia, the American tanker SS Tiger carrying 64,300 barrels of fuel oil belonging to the U.S. Navy — is torpedoed and sunk by German sub U-754.

The Japanese make landings on New Guinea on April 2, most importantly at Hollandia, a regional capital in the Dutch portion of the island. British troops begin retreating from Prome, Burma. The American coastal steamer SS David H. Atwater, fully loaded with 4,000 tons of coal, is attacked and sunk by gunfire from surfaced German sub U-552 off the Delmarva Peninsula. Only three of Atwater's 27-man crew survive. The survivors' testimony and evidence found on the scene by Coast Guard rescue vessels indicate that the German submarine deliberately machine-gunned surviving sailors in the water and in lifeboats and life rafts.
