

Still Not Satisfied 6/26/17 Caucus

PERTH AMBOY - One of the topics for discussion at the 6/26/17 Caucus Meeting was the PILOT for Bridge. Business Administrator Adam Cruz was beside himself and showed his exasperation as he told the Council, "The Administration has brought in three experts such as the PARA Director and outside PILOT experts who talked about the benefits of having PILOTs. Everyone has been rejected and it's getting frustrating. The Council did not want to see a 30 year PILOT. We went down to 22 years and then it went down to 12 years with an option of a 5 year renewal."

Councilman Joel Pabon said, "I have no problem with 12 years, but I'm concerned how this would affect the City in the future, especially with 2 more perspective projects coming up who may ask for PILOTs. We are making decisions that are using taxpayer's money."

Councilman Jelmin Caba addressed his concerns, "I agree with Mr. Cruz. We all under-

stand that PILOTs are here. It can help our blighted areas. We have to be fair. Bridge negotiated with us to go down to 12 years. Bridge will be building more. For us to discourage Bridge, we'll make other developers not want to develop here."

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez added his remarks, "I'm not saying no to a PILOT for Bridge. If it was just for 5 years, we could see how that goes. I have met with you (Cruz) and others about PILOTs. We are looking at the year 2000 proposal. I just want more knowledge to see if we can get more professionals to come here. Most views on this project have been one-sided. With more professionals we can see how it will affect the City's future."

At this point Cruz, showing his frustration stated, "I can bring Jesus Christ here and you still will reject what he says regarding PILOTs!"

At that point, Council President Bill Petrick told Cruz he was out of order.

Councilman Fernando Irizarry questioned why some of the Council Members wanted an Independent Market Analysis now. "This has been going on for 6 months. We can't negotiate the contract. Only the Administration can and then we approve it. Surrounding towns are getting PILOTs and how can we be competitive when other cities are willing to do PI-LOTs (with developers). What other professionals do you want to get? Who? We had the top state professionals here at least 3 times. Who are we going to get, now?"

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez spoke again. Showing his frustrations he stated, "This is a plan from 1998 thru 2000 and it's not adequate. We are supposed to so a plan every 5 years. It hasn't been done since 1998. I know because I was on the Redevelopment Board. Just do an RFP for an expert for an appraisal."

He suggested they start their salary at \$33,000, then go up by \$10,000 after that, and then they should





Councilman Irizarry spoke again. "You are not looking at the whereas clauses. You are taking it out of context."

Council President Bill Petrick answered Irizarry, "You are looking at land that is no longer contaminated and Beneke (one of the PILOT Experts) just spoke about the Bridge PI-LOT."

B.A. Cruz then told the Council, "We have to put out an RFP that has to be posted for 20 days."

Petrick came back and stated, "There is activity that is constantly going in and out of the Bridge property.

After the conclusion of the Bridge PILOT discussion, the floor was open up to the public.

Former Councilwoman Lisa Nanton came up to speak about who can be members of the Arts Council. "There doesn't have to be an age limit or occupation restriction. We are just restructuring so that it does not have to include at least one teacher and one student on the Arts Council."

This upset Councilman Jelmin Caba who felt that there was a need to have at least two positions held by at least one teacher and one student. "We need to make sure we have in place that a person had to be involved in the arts. A lot of times students will join the Arts Council, but they feel that their voice is not being heard and they need an incentive to stay." Another resolution that was discussed was R-261-6/17 -Authorizing submission of an application to the 2017 PetSafe Bark for Your Park Program. CFO Jill Goldy came forward to shed some life on this resolution. She stated, "I am the one who wanted this on the agenda. I saw information about it at the League of Municipalities. This program is to support municipalities who will be building dog parks to help offset the cost.





I thought this would be good for the City."

Deputy Police Chief Larry Cattano came forward to answer a question pertaining to R-262-6/17 - A lease purchase agreement with Aspire for the purchase of body warn and vehicle mounted cameras for the PAPD in the amount of \$350,540.

Cattano stated, "This is a 6 year program. Under this agreement we can get new equipment in 3 years which will save the department money versus purchasing this equipment outright."

Resident Ken Balut came up to speak and inquired about the vital statistics pertaining to the Police Department. He asked Acting Law Director Peter King why his OPRA's have not been answered. "It seems that they have been lost. It's amazing." Balut also suggested that the Council check with Jersey City regarding R-262. "Everybody drives out of town to go home (Administration and Appointees). Councilmen Caba and Irizarry don't know where their campaign money is coming from. Now that Caba is Perth Amboy Democratic Chair, you have to be careful when voting on contracts that bidders might have given money to your campaign. Talking about Bridge PI-LOTs, you have to talk numbers to the public so the people can understand. By the time the school is built, it will be too small. Jobs coming in have very little employment for Perth Amboy residents." Resident Stanley Sierakowski came up to speak. Addressing the Council he stated, "The lawyer is now the Assistant Law Director. Is that legal? The Bridge PILOT is 30 years. Read the Whereas Clauses - not 12 years. Look at Exhibit B. Money is being taken from the school and library."

swered Sierakowski, "We are an Abbot District."

Stanley Sierakowski countered, "The first and second year of the Bridge PILOT are zero monies coming in."

Councilman Irizarry answered back, "Is that normal?"

Sierakowski countered, "I propose you don't take from the Board of Education budget. Take from the Mayor's budget."

Irizarry answered, "The Board of Education will not lose a dime."

Sierakowski then asked, "What is the duration of the financial agreement?"

King answered, "I have not reviewed the contract, yet. I am still the Acting Law Director."

Business Administrator Cruz had a comment to make, "You (the Council) have a letter stating that King is the Acting Law Director – not the Assistant Law Director."

Resident and Business Owner David Caba came up to speak. He wanted to know who was responsible for the part of Rector Street where the Landings is. "I eat, sleep and dine here."

Business Administrator Cruz responded, "I was here (in Perth Amboy) Saturday and Sunday

David Caba responded, "We want to move the City forward in a different direction. Someone tied to Trump has abandoned the City. They did not maintain their property. cilman divulging personal information to the media about the death of Fire Chief Abraham Pitre.

Caba stated, "This individual was very human and whatever were the circumstances, you're not here to judge. After one of the Council Meetings, I had talked to Fire Chief Pitre and asked him where he lived. He responded, "I still live in the City." The Chief lived in the City and gave of his time. I knew I could count on him. The Fire Chief of the City of Perth Amboy lived on Charles Street - not on High and Rector Streets. I would like to get an extra minute to give a tribute to the Chief."

Before continuing, he addressed Councilman Fernando Gonzalez and said, "Did you say anything? I wasn't there. One thing, Mr. Gonzalez, I do respect that you always gave me extra time (when I request it) to speak at meetings. There should be more tributes to Pitre."

Resident Jeremy Baratta came up to speak next. He had a question about Fairview Insurance, "Where will they be saving us millions of dollars?"

B.A. Cruz responded, "The

rates will be cheaper. We will be getting 6 months of savings this year and next year. The Council will see it on the financial report. The surplus money will go into the general fund. Money is not budgeted, but kept in the surplus."

Deputy Police Chief Larry Cattano came up to give more information about the bodyworn cameras. "The technology being used is called "Cloud" which is used to transmit data. The cameras will sit in a pouch on the Officer's uniform. There could be a transmission of data, but certain data cannot be showed under certain circumstances especially when it involves minors. Cell phones and data is restricted to certain individuals. There are 11 hours of continuous showing. It will also indicate how much battery time is left."

When it came time to vote on the agenda, R-247 and R-249 thru R-263 was moved by Councilman Fernando Irizarry and seconded by Councilman Jelmin Caba. The vote was unanimous "Yes."

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez requested that R-248 be pulled for discussion before being voted on. He stated, "There seems to be one major reason for denial for handicapped spaces. There may be two handicapped spaces already assigned per alternate sides of the street."

Deputy Chief Cattano came forward to answer. "There's a clause in the ordinance which limits handicapped spots, especially curb to curb. The space must be in front of the applicant's house. There is a mechanism in place in the ordinance if an applicant wishes to make an appeal."

Councilman Fernando Irizarry, who is also a member of the Handicapped Parking Committee said, "Decisions are based on the clause limiting the amount of handicapped spaces on one block."

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez said, "I just want to make sure that these are not just blanketed denials."

The motion was moved by Councilman Gonzalez and seconded by Councilman Irizarry

After the voting session was complete, the public came forward to speak.

Resident Jermy Baratta was not happy with Business Administrator's Adam Cruz's comments. Baratta stated, "I have been going to many meetings in other towns and I have never seen conduct such as what is exhibited by the Business Administrator. He is angry and combative. He is disrespectful and it's disgusting to the Council and to the citizens. I am in awe of your (the Council) restraint. I have never ever seen anything like this. If he (B.A. Cruz) doesn't have an answer to a question, he should apologize. His job is to represent the administration. His attitude is representative of the administration. If he can't handle the job, he should go elsewhere."

Business Administrator Cruz waited before responding to these acousticians. Cruz said, "This is the portion for the public to speak."

Council President Bill Petrick told Cruz, "In the past, we have interacted with the audience when they ask questions."

Cruz then remarked, "Some people (when they come up to speak) mock and show disrespect to the Administration, Directors and experts who make presentations."

Council President Bill Petrick responded, "The audience can say what they want, as long as it's not profanity."

Resident Stanley Sierakowski talked about Resolution R-262 (Lease/Purchase Agreement with ASPIRE) for the purchase of Body Worn and Vehicle Mounted Cameras. Sierakowski thought that the lease agreement was too long. "At the end of Year One, the Police Department should ask what equipment can be replaced."

Sierakowski then turned his attention to the request by speakers for extra time during the public portion/comments. "It should be by majority rule not that if one Council Member says "No" the extra time is not given."

He also wanted to know if the current attorney (Peter King) asked for information from the past administrator about the Armory contract.

Resident Ken Balut came up to speak next. He asked, "The Police are calling me about problems (they are having). If the Council wants to make comments on what I say, please do so when I'm here. There's a file missing in Code Enforcement."

Acting Law Director Peter King responded, "Some departments lose files. For instance, if they change buildings."

Balut responded to Mr. King stating, "I want a answer about that lost file."

Balut continued, commenting about the \$1.7 million no-bid





contract. "I put in an OPRA Request. There's no paperwork."

Council President Bill Petrick responded, "That's the Goldberg Property."

Balut then continued to talk, "You've had the OPRA Request for three months. People are afraid to talk, because they are afraid of harassment by Code Enforcement."

Council President Petrick then requested that Acting Attorney King get information on the missing files and where they might be and what happened to them."

King responded, "It's with the Economic Development Office in the County."

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez spoke up, "The people who were involved with this property are still employed by the City."

Balut continued, "I've got two C/O's. One has two signatures and a stamp; the other one has one signature, but no stamp. I was a Police Officer in the City for 25 years and I still live here. Your campaign (Irizarry and Caba) hired someone who had a huge campaign violation."

Councilman Irizarry responded and asked if the Engineer can come back.

King responded, "The County has to be ORPRA'd for what he (Balut) was asking for."

Resident Sharon Hubberman spoke next, "There's a horrible stench of sewage throughout the City. What's going on with the sewage and water system? I did an OPRA request. We need to get our Administration paperwork in order. I've been going to other Faulkner Towns to see how they run their meetings. They show detailed item lists on their budgets and ask if there were any public comments. This shows transparency. We don't have any numbers that shows savings. You (the Council) have the voice to hold the Administration accountable."

Council President Petrick answered, "We can request that the Redevelopment Attorney be here at our next Meeting."

Caba continued, "I've been coming here for the last 7 meetings and I still haven't gotten an answer as to who owns that part of Rector Street. The Mayor went to New York to a wedding to get businesses to come here. Did we get any? Do we have any Chaplains who are from Lakewood? I hope what happened in Lakewood doesn't trickle down to here. Trump should build a wall around Lakewood."

After Caba sat down, Resident Herschel Chomsky came up to speak. He was very upset when he said he hadn't intended to speak at the Meeting, but he found it very insulting about the comments made by the last person who just spoke, "Especially when he said they should build a wall around Lakewood. All those that were accused are innocent until found otherwise. If they are guilty, then I agree they should be punished. My late father was a Rabbi and was very well respected in this town. Everybody should not be judged by a few."

Vitale Offers Bill to Expand Transparency, Accountability at Horizon Blue Cross Blue Shield

Compromise agreement would maintain goals of required financial reporting, additional public board members and responsible use of excess reserves

TRENTON - Senator Joseph F. Vitale today offered legislation that would expand transparency and accountability by Horizon Blue Cross Blue Shield of New Jersey, the state's only nonprofit health services corporation, by requiring enhanced financial reporting, adding two public members to the company board, and setting a cap on the insurance company's reserves. "I am pleased that we have reached agreement on legislation that will ensure greater transparency and accountability by Horizon to its policyholders and the public," said Senator Vitale (D-Middlesex). "I said from the very beginning that I wanted to bring Horizon to the table for open discussions. I am happy that we can now implement this vital reform legislation, pass a budget that funds our social service and education priorities, and ends the government shutdown."

Agreement on the compromise legislation was reached after Senate President Steve Sweeney (D-Gloucester) invited Assembly Speaker Vincent Prieto (D-Hudson) and Horizon CEO Bob Marino to meet with him and Senator Vitale to work out an agreement on Horizon reform legislation to end the budget impasse.

"I would like to thank Senate President Sweeney for his leadership, and Speaker Prieto and CEO Marino for their willingness to work with us to achieve a compromise," Senator Vitale said.

Senator Vitale, the chairman of the Senate Health, Human Services and Senior Services Committee, said the reform legislation, S-2, is patterned range of reserves for Horizon requiring a minimum of 550% of Risk-Based Capital reserves and a "hard cap" maximum of 725%, sufficient to cover claims for all of its policyholders in the event of a catastrophic medical emergency such as superstorm Sandy when regular premium payments from policyholders were delayed.

Require the state Department of Banking and Insurance to commission independent annual audits to determine Horizon's reserve level, which would be paid for by Horizon.
Set up a process for Horizon to submit a plan to the Department of Banking and Insurance to determine how excess reserves above the 725% level should be used to reduce future policyholder premiums or otherwise benefit policyholders.

• Require the appointment of two additional public members with a background in healthcare, finance or insurance to the Horizon board – one each by the Senate President and the Assembly Speaker -- bringing the total board membership to 17, including 11 currently appointed by Horizon and four by the Governor.

• Require the Department of Banking and Insurance to establish requirements for health services corporations to provide detailed financial reporting information, including executive compensation, to be posted on the department website.

"This legislation establishes appropriate limits for Horizon's reserve, which comes out of the pocket of policyholders, and a process to allocate any excess reserve funds to the benefit of policyholders," said Senator Vitale. "It provides greater transparency so that consumers know exactly how much their insurer spends and for what purpose. In addition, it creates greater public oversight by adding two more public members to the Horizon board.

"Equally important is what this bill does not do," he said. "It will not raise premiums for Horizon customers. It will not take away anyone's health insurance. And it will not give any governor the power to take millions of dollars in Horizon Blue Cross Blue Shield reserves to pay for state programs. The bill specifically states that no determination on Horizon's reserves would be made until April 1, 2018 - after a new governor takes office."

Senator Vitale said S-2 - like his previous bill - was modeled after Pennsylvania regulations that established a range of reserves for the four Blue Cross Blue Shield companies operating in that state, and noted that Massachusetts and other states have adopted similar percentage caps on Blue Cross Blue Shield reserves to protect policyholders against companies building up unnecessarily large reserves out of the pockets of policyholders. In 2016, according to Horizon, the company carried a 620% reserve, sufficient to pay 75 days of policyholder claims.


Senate President Sweeney thanked Senator Vitale for his leadership role in developing the Horizon reform legislation.

"I asked Joe Vitale to take the lead role in developing the Horizon legislation because of his integrity, expertise and commitment to developing healthcare policies that are in the best interest of the people of New Jersey. Once again, he has performed commendably in balancing complex and competing policy interests for the betterment of our state," Senator Sweeney said.

Movie Review: Spiderman: Homecoming

Spider-Man takes on his arch enemy the vulture and another crew of bad guys. "Spider-Man: Homecoming" takes place after the events of Captain America Civil War.

Spider-Man returns home with the costume that Tony Stark made him and Iron Man tells him that he is not an Avenger yet, but he should stick close to the ground and be a friendly neighborhood Spider-Man. Peter must deal with regular life as well as balancing being a superhero. When his best friend, Ned finds out that Peter is Spider-Man, they team up to work on things together. Peter finds out that a group of bad guys are using high-tech weapons that have been pillaged from Avengers battles, but no one seems to believe him. Peter sacrifices attending regular social engagements in high

school to track down the leader of this group.

Adrian Toomes a.k.a. the Vulture is using all this hightech weaponry to steal so that his family can have everything they want. The Vulture believes that the rich and powerful do not care about the little guy. Spider-Man takes on the Vulture and gets beaten up. Spiderman must rescue people, but eventually with the help of Iron Man, he was able to fight the forces of evil without his high-tech suit. Tony Stark eventually takes the suit away from Spiderman who must learn to be a hero without it.

I would have to take apart this movie into several pieces. If you are a big Spider-Man fan like I am, you'll pull it apart and nitpick through it. If you're just the average moviegoer, you will enjoy the action adventure part, but you might feel like you're in the middle of the kid's movie. Disney and Sony have made this movie geared up for younger viewers.

The acting is superb and the new Spider-Man (Tom Hol-

land) is great. He captures the younger Spider-Man's problems including going out with girls that are out of his league. When Peter Parker should really be concentrating on his studies, he chooses to work on his superhero skills. Michael Keaton is terrific as Adrian Toomes (the Vulture) who gives more depth to the Vulture than the comics. In the comics, the Vulture is an old man obsessed with youth and stealing from the young. Keaton's portrayal is more interested in trying to provide for his family and make him more of a down-to-earth villain so the audience can sympathize with the Vulture. We also get appearances by the Shocker and the Tinkerer, one of the Vultures minions.

The special effects are great. Spider-Man leaps from tall buildings including the Washington Monument. We see what Spiderman does when there are no tall buildings around such as in the suburbs. This movie has a lot of good stuff and some stuff that Spi-



der-Man fans may not like. The filmmakers are more inspired by the Ultimate Spider-Man Series which concentrated on a young Spiderman.

The movie moves fast and there are plenty of swift moving action. Take the kids and enjoy the Robert Downey Jr. as Iron Man. It's one of the better Spider-Man movies, but it's a good introduction to this new Marvel Universe, a new Spiderman for a new generation.

This Week in World War II 75 Years Ago

German forces capture the town of Rossosh, in Russia, on July 10, 1942, cutting the Moscow-Rostov rail line and establishing a bridgehead on the east bank of the River Don.

Rommel's forces are stalemated before El Alamein on July 11, largely because of ammunition shortages. Allied convoy PQ-17 finally reaches Russia after losing 24 of its original 35 ships, the worst convoy loss of the war. Stalin voices his suspicion that the British have fabricated the losses to avoid delivering promised supplies to the U.S.S.R. RAF Lancaster bombers fly 1,750 miles — their farthest sortie of the war so far — to bomb German shipyards at Danzig.

Stalin begins moving massive numbers of troops into the Stalingrad area on July 12. Marshal of the Soviet Union Semyon Timoshenko is placed in overall command of the new Stalingrad Front. Soviet general Andrey Vlasov, who has been hiding in German-held territory since his force was defeated defending Leningrad on July 2, is betrayed by a local farmer and captured by the Germans. During captivity, he will switch sides and collaborate with the Nazis, proclaiming that Joseph Stalin is the greatest enemy of the Russian people.

On July 13, Hitler, judging the movement on Stalingrad as being too slow, relieves Field Marshal Fedor von Bock as commander of Army Group B, to be replaced by Gen. Maximilian von Weichs. Hitler assigns Colonel-General Friedrich von Paulus's Sixth Army the operational objective of capturing Stalingrad.

The Vichy government on July 14 refuses a U.S. offer to move nine warships of the French fleet to an American, neutral or Martinique port to prevent their seizure by the Axis. A large crowd gathers illegally in Marseille, Vichy France, to celebrate the national holiday Bastille Day. Two women are shot by police trying to disperse the assemblage. A working committee of the Indian National Congress adopts a resolution demanding British withdrawal from India but denies any intention of embarrassing the Allied war effort.

On July 15, there is light skirmishing around El Alamein, Egypt. On Akutan, in the Aleutian Islands, a U.S. salvage crew recovers intact a Japanese Mitsubishi Zero fighter plane that had crash-landed there. Extensive study of the still-airworthy plane allows aeronautical designers and strategists to devise ways to defeat the speedy, agile Zero, the primary and formidable - fighter of the Imperial Japanese Navy. In Europe, the first 2,000 Jews are deported from the Netherlands to Auschwitz, in Poland, by German authorities.

On orders from the Vichy government, French police on July 16 and 17 arrest 13,152 Jews, including over 4,000 children. They are incarcerated under conditions of severe deprivation in an indoor bicycle velodrome stadium near the Eiffel Tower for several days, then shipped off to Auschwitz for extermination. In North Africa, the British XXX Corps captures a key ridge west of El Alamein, Egypt. In Washington, the government severs diplomatic relations with Finland.
