Pallone Applauds New Jersey 'Opt-In' To FirstNet

Press Release 7/26/17 WASHINGTON, DC- Congressman Frank Pallone, Jr. (NJ-06) responded to the announcement that New Jersey will be the sixth state to 'optin' to FirstNet, the nationwide broadband network for first responders that will be built by AT&T:

"I remember hearing from public safety officials during Superstorm Sandy how dan-

gerous it could be when their radios were not interoperable. That's why I want to congratulate everyone in the private and public sectors who came together to support our first responders. But we will all be better off when FirstNet is truly nationwide, so I encourage other states to follow New Jersey's lead and quickly opt in to the network."

Senate & Assembly Held Joint Hearing to Gauge Impact of Christie's Plan to Reorganize Delivery of Mental Health & Addiction Services

Press Release 7/25/17 (TRENTON) – Senator Joseph Vitale and Assemblywoman Valerie Vainieri Huttle will hold a joint hearing today of their respective committees to gauge the impact of Gov. Christie's proposed plan to shift mental health and addiction services functions, along with roughly 200 employees and nearly \$1 billion, from the Department of Human Services to the Department of Health.

In doing so, the Senate Health, Human Services and Senior

Citizens Committee and the Assembly Human Services Committee will hear testimony from invited guests on the Governor's Reorganization Plan No. 001-2017 - "A Plan for the Transfer of Mental Health and Addiction Functions from the Department of Human Services to the Department of Health."

The hearing took place on Tuesday, July 25, 2017, at 11 a.m. in committee room 4 on the first floor of the Statehouse Annex in Trenton.

UPDATE: FEMA not to Withdraw Sandy Claims after Pallone Letter

Press Release 7/28/17 WASHINGTON, D.C. - Today, on conference call with Congressional offices, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) reversed course and announced that homeowners participating in the Sandy Claims Review process would not be removed from claims review due to a lack of contact with FEMA. The agency said that files for these homeowners will be held with no further action taken if contact is not made by September 15.

Yesterday, Congressman Frank Pallone Jr. (NJ-06) led a bipartisan letter to Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Administrator William B. Long, objecting to FEMA's previous plan to remove claims that had not made contact with FEMA. The Congressman will be working to inform New Jersey residents that they should get in touch with FEMA if they have unresolved claims. Constituents can also get in touch with Con-

Congressman Pallone has been a leader in demanding transparency and reforms for those who have suffered from inefficiencies and fraud in the National Flood Insurance Program. Recently the Congressman introduced comprehensive flood insurance reform legislation in the House of Representatives. Last May, Pallone led a bipartisan letter from members of the New Jersey Congressional delegation to former Administrator Fugate of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) requesting that it immediately



State Bureaucracy Affects Patient Care; Hinders Practice of Nursing in New Jersey

Patients and nurses in New Jersey could be adversely affected by the resignation of Dorothy Carolina, PhD, RN from the position of executive director of the New Jersey Board of Nursing (NJBON).

Dr. Carolina resigned just 13 months after being named to the position. Why is this disturbing? People move on all the time.

The NJBON is the watchdog protecting patients by overseeing all the nurses of New Jersey. It issues all nursing licenses, deals with complaints and has disciplinary power, which is essential to protect patients and ensuring the best care. It is overseen by state's Division of Consumer Affairs.

NJBON oversees the practice of the state's 143,500 registered nurses, advanced practice nurses (APN) and licensed practical nurses; it oversees 80,000 certified home health aides. It also supervises all educational programs for the above professionals and paraprofessionals. In addition, each month the NJBON acts on approximately 250 disciplinary cases-situations that are investigated, analyzed by board staff and reviewed by the volunteer board members prior to action. That's an incredible workload.

I believe Dr. Carolina resigned her position for several reasons including the follow-

- Tensions with her non-nursing superiors in the State Division of Consumer Affairs with regards to setting NJBON work priorities, work flow and routine operational matters.
- Overtime denial from outside the NJBON.
- Frozen vacant NJBON staff positions, hampering the work output; the Position of Deputy Executive Director has remained unfilled for over 12 months.
- Limited or non-existent budgetary control by the NJBON **Executive Director**
- The volunteer Board of 13 appointees by the Governor's Office has only 7 positions filled and assuring a quorum at monthly meetings has been an ongoing concern, hampering important committee functions.

As not only a faculty member in a leading nursing program at a university, but as an active APN with my own practice, I continually hear of delays and misinformation that is provided by an outsourced call center NJBON has contracted because they don't have the staff to answer all the calls they re-

To give you an idea of the workload of the NJBON, as of July 21, 2017, there are currently 4,116 nursing candidates backlogged awaiting board action on licensure or certification; 2,838 new graduates or graduate nurses from foreign countries and 1,278 licensees from other states seeking employment. Many of these applicants have been waiting for months, some with job offers pending a New Jersey nursing license.

The longer it takes these new nurses and nurses looking to practice in New Jersey to take the licensure exam, the higher the rate of failure due to lack of practice in the time span from graduation or last practice.

This backlog—because of lack of resources and cooperation—becomes an issue of access to care for patients and restriction of trade for nurses. Nursing is a profession vital in the delivery of health care. Nurses serve in hospitals, clinics, schools, universities, research facilities subacute and long-term care facilities and in agencies serving individuals with disabilities as well as in public health centers. Nurses care for individuals from prenatal through death. Nurses are caring for patients 24/7-365 days a year.

As the non-union professional association representing the nurses of New Jersey to protect the practice of nursing and patients, the New Jersey State Nurses Association (NJSNA) finds this level of bureaucratic interference appalling. It directly impacts the health care delivery to the state's nearly 9 million citizens.

Last year revenues from the NJBON were more than \$13 million from license fees and other fees. That is certainly enough to do the work of the NJBON. However, all this rev-

enue has been transferred to the state's general fund, leaving the NJBON underfunded and unable to properly func-

This is now at crisis level.

When bureaucrats can manipulate the staff operations and funnel the money away from the NJBON thereby driving an ethical Executive Director to resign, there is something wrong. This isn't about "special interest" pleading. It is the responsibility of the NJ-BON to protect the people of New Jersey. This is about ensuring a vital nursing workforce to safely serve the citizens of New Jersey.



Movie Review: Dunkirk - Two Views

Director Christopher Nolan gives us a new World War II masterpiece by weaving the stories of the story of Dunkirk into a magnificent tapestry covering the points of view from the land, sea, and air.

For those of you who are not familiar with this point in history, Dunkirk was the evacuation of the British and French armies as the Nazis began to close in. Time is not on their side. At the end, Axis Forces pushed the Allies to the Sea.

We start with a young British soldier who was just trying to find his way to a ship so that he can escape back to England. He finds another young man

and they grab a stretcher and put a wounded man on it to get onto a medical ship. The ship is bombed and it sinks. He swims back to Dunkirk Beach and attempts to leave again.

In "Dunkirk," we see the ships and how they're harassed by German U-boats and German bombers and how the pilots risk life and limb to save the evacuating troops.

In this movie, we get different points of view (air, land, and sea). A call went out to British civilians who owned boats to risk their lives to go to Dunkirk to pluck survivors from the sea. Each of these stories are woven together in a rich tapestry coming together in one focal point. Don't look for much dialogue here. It's just groups of men trying to survive in a hostile situation.

The ensemble cast is made up of two stars: Tom Hardy and Kenneth Branagh lead an ensemble cast. The cinematography is incredible. You get the vastness of the sea the endless Beach of Dunkirk along with the sky that seems to have no end. The costumes are authentic including the uniforms ships and planes. I also love the use of music and sound throughout the film. The eerie sound and ticking of a watch signaling time is running out gives you that sense of anxiety and tension. The very low music sounds like the crashing of the sea.

I rank these movies right up there with "Saving Private

Catholic Charities Resident Attendant Supervisor, Cynthia Bagner expressed appreciation for the important service James provided. James was enthusiastic to have provided the service and eager to start his barbering career, "I was very happy to have this opportunity brought to my attention by my mother's friend, Cynthia. It made me feel great about myself knowing I am able to provide my services to the people who need it the most. It was amazing to be able to do it", he said. Eight gentlemen received haircuts and were very pleased, one of whom waited 7 months to get a haircut before James' visit. Both James and the shelter are hoping to make this a monthly event for the residents.

Looking forward, James will attend a vocational school part time during his junior and senior years and will earn his cosmetology license in addition to his diploma. He will have a chair waiting for him at his local barber and will continue to advocate for the homeless and raise awareness about Autism.

The Ozanam Inn Men's Shelter provides temporary and emergency lodging, meals, physical and mental health assessments, crisis counseling, assistance with housing and employment, case management and referrals to homeless men. 14,212 nights of care and 28,424 meals were provided to 163 men in FY 2016. Diegnan-Vitale Bill to Combat Opioid Abuse Among Student Athletes & Cheerleaders Now Law

TRENTON – Legislation sponsored by Senator Patrick J. Diegnan Jr. and Senate Health Chairman Joseph F. Vitale to require the Department of Education to develop an educational fact sheet for distribution to parents of studentathletes and cheerleaders concerning the use and misuse of prescription opioids is now

The law, S-2402, requires the Commissioner of Education, in consultation with the Commissioner of Health, to develop an educational fact sheet that provides information concerning the use and misuse of opioid drugs in the event that a student-athlete or cheerleader is prescribed an opioid for a sports-related injury.

"More Americans die from drug overdoses than in traffic accidents, and more than three out of five of these deaths involve an opioid," said Senator Diegnan (D-Middlesex). "We have to make sure that our student athletes, cheerleaders and their parents are educated about the dangers of opioids and the potential for abuse. This law will help to ensure that happens and, in turn, will boost our prevention efforts."

Under the law, school districts and nonpublic schools that participate in interscholastic sports or cheerleading programs will be required to distribute the fact sheet annually to the parents or guardians of student-athletes and cheerleaders, and to obtain a signed acknowledgement of the receipt of the fact sheet by the students and their parents or guardians.

"The misuse of prescribed opioids, which can lead to addiction, is having devastating effects on our families and communities. Providing students and families with the tools to start the conversation about the risks of opioid abuse in the event of a sports injury

could prevent a problem from starting," said Senator Vitale (D-Middlesex). "The fact is that knowledge is power when it comes to fighting the opioid and heroin epidemic that is claiming the lives of our residents and youth, and education must continue to be a leading part of our efforts."

According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), 44 people die in the US each day from an overdose of painkillers prescribed by doctors. In 2014, 200 million recipes of opium derivatives were made in the US.

The bill was signed by the governor Friday.

Congressman Pallone Leads Efforts to Pass Safe Drinking Water Legislation Through House Committee

Package Includes Pallone's Lead Drinking Water Proposal

Press Release 7/27/17 WASHINGTON, D.C. - Today, the House Energy and Commerce Committee approved the Drinking Water System Improvement Act, which addresses many of the challenges facing communities nationwide who do not have confidence in the safety of their drinking water. Ranking Member Frank Pallone, Jr. (D-NJ) led House Democrats in bipartisan negotiations over the legislation, which would be the first major update to the Safe Drinking Water Act in over 20 years. During negotiations, Pallone successfully advocated to include several important provisions into the bill including his proposal to provide grant funding to public schools to replace lead drinking water fountains.

"This bill will offer real funding and real tools to make our drinking water safer and to rebuild our drinking water infrastructure," Pallone said. "I am also proud to say that the bill includes funding to replace lead drinking fountains in schools and will require EPA to assess, for the first time, the anticipated costs to replace our lead service lines nationwide. Safe drinking water should be a bipartisan issue that we can all agree on, and I am pleased that today we came together to improve our nation's drinking water infrastructure."

Pallone's lead drinking foun-

tain provision would authorize \$5 million for each of fiscal years 2018 through 2021 to help replace older fountains and to supplement the costs of monitoring and reporting lead levels in the drinking water of schools of a local educational agency receiving such funds.

The New Jersey congressman has been a longtime leader in calling for action to improve water infrastructure and to remove lead from our drinking water. Earlier this year, Pallone led House Democrats in introducing legislation to comprehensively update the Safe Drinking Water Act.

The Drinking Water System Improvement Act also includes a number of important provisions such as:

- An \$8 billion increase in infrastructure funding over five
- Funding for states to oversee drinking water systems;
- A minimum level of assistance for disadvantaged communities;
- A requirement that EPA make consumer confidence reports more accurate, more understandable, and more frequent;
- A buy American requirement for iron and steel products and Davis-Bacon prevailing wage requirements.

The Drinking Water System Improvement Act is now eligible to come to the House Floor for a vote by the full chamber.

This Week in World War II 75 Years Ago

On July 31, 1942, the Germans lose three submarines — *U-213, U-588* and *U-754* — to enemy action in the Atlantic Ocean. A flight of 630 British bombers raid Düsseldorf, Germany, destroying 453 buildings and killing 276 civilians. 29 bombers are lost. In Great Britain, the government bans driving for pleasure.

On August 1, the Germans — unable to gain much ground in western Egypt — launch a heavy air raid on Cairo. An interlocking convoy system for shipping — first introduced along the eastern seaboard of the U.S., which resulted in a pullback of German submarines there — is implemented, as well, in the Gulf of Mexico and in the Caribbean. In Asia, the Japanese establish a puppet government in Burma. British Prime Minister Winston Churchill and Gen. Alan Brooke, Chief of the (British) Imperial General Staff, arrive in Cairo, Egypt. The poor performance of the British Eighth Army in North Africa is of concern, and replacement commanders are being considered.

The British convoy "Pedestal" leaves the U.K. for Malta on August 2. It is carrying desperately needed supplies for the island bastion — located midway between Sicily and North Africa — that is under siege by the Germans and the Italians. U.S. troops begin shipping out to the U.K. aboard the passenger liners SS Queen Elizabeth, SS Queen Mary, and SS Nieuw Amsterdam. These vessels — now converted to troopships — are too fast for standard escorts, so they sail alone. Their routes across the Atlantic are based on British Admiralty intelligence on Axis U-boat concentrations.

In the South Pacific, the destroyer USS Tucker on August 3 is escorting the ammunition ship *SS Nira Luckenbach* from Fiji to Espiritu Santo, New Hebrides. Tucker, approaching Espiritu Santo, hits a mine in an American minefield laid just the day before. Six crewmen are killed; 152 survivors, including 21 wounded, are rescued by *Nira Luckenbach*. Tucker sinks the following morning, despite attempts to tow her into port. In the U.S., the FBI arrests 89 "dangerous aliens."

On August 4, advance units of the German 4th Panzer Army cross the Aksay River, in Russia, on their drive toward Stalingrad. The British government, citing documents seized in a raid in India, accuses Mohandas Gandhi and others in his party of working toward the "appeasement" of Japan. To prevent illicit communications in the Occupied Netherlands, the Germans order all Dutch homing pigeons to be killed. In New York, Paramount Pictures premieres the musical film "Holiday Inn," starring Bing Crosby and Fred Astaire. The movie will win an Oscar for Best Original Song: Irving Berlin's "White Christmas." The U.S. War Production Board bans the manufacture of typewriters for private use.

Allied convoy SC-94 (35 merchant ships traveling from Sydney, Nova Scotia, to Liverpool, England) is sighted by a German U-boat in the Atlantic on August 5 when a group of six ships and two escorts gets separated from the convoy due to fog. One ship is sunk, but two U-boats are driven off. On the Eastern Front, German Army Group A continues its offensive, with advances towards the oilfields of Maykop in the Caucasus.

The U.S. Army's Lt. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower on August 6 is appointed as commander-in-chief of Allied forces preparing to invade North Africa. In the Soviet Union, the Germans cross the Kuban River near Armavir, in southern Russia. In Detroit, Max Stephan — a German-born restaurant owner who had been convicted of treason in July for aiding an escaped German prisoner of war — becomes the first American citizen to be sentenced to death for treason since the Whiskey Rebellion in 1794. (President Roosevelt will commute Stephan's sentence to life imprisonment eight hours before his scheduled execution by hanging.)
