

Some Topics for Discussion to be Carried Over **Until all Council Members Present**

10/10/17 Caucus

PERTH AMBOY – There were 5 topics of discussion on the agenda for the 10/10/17 Caucus Meeting. Because of the absence of Councilmen Fernando Irizarry and Helmin Caba, the topics involving the investigation of Peter Pelissier, discussion of Seagate Housing Complex, and the Rider for the Bridge PILOT would be held over until the Caucus Meeting scheduled for 10/23/17.

At a past meeting, Councilman Fernando Irizarry had asked for the Homeless Warming Center to be discussed. Since Jamie Rios, Director of Code Enforcement Jamie Rios was present at this Caucus Meeting, he was asked to come forward to answer questions about this center.

Councilman Joel Pabon wanted a clarification, "I was told by volunteers, but who will watch over the operation?"

Rios answered, "That is a question for the Y to answer." He then continued, "There was a transfer deed. The building in question has 20 units and there is also a community room and a business on the ground floor. Our Department did an inspection. Nothing came across my desk to change the usage for the building. The 20 units consisted of one bedroom boarding rooms. The building passed all inspections. I'll bring further information at the next meeting. The first level of the building is for commercial space only, as it was previously."

Law Director Peter King then spoke up, "The State had to approve the building because of the number of units."

There was a question regardthe warming center will be run ing R-399-10/17. A payment of the amount of \$298.68 (interest) be waived and credited towards future tax payments for a Conrail Billboard from the fourth quarter of 2016 to the present.

Business Administrator Adam Cruz explained, "This billboard is on Conrail Property and they would like the City to credit them in lieu of them making a payment to the City."

On R-400-10/17 dealing with the replacement of the City Phone System in the amount not to exceed \$135,000, Perth Amboy IT Tech John Alleman came forward to answer questions. He explained this contract with office solutions would not include the Police and Fire Departments. "With this contract, it would make it possible for the other departments who have plain old telephone systems not to lose power if there

are any outages. The system we have now is not adequate. There are no parts available if we lose power in other City Departments. Verizon will come in to review the POTS (Plain Old Telephone System) lines."

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez had a question, "Did we

have a contract with a company called Breaker that took care of the City's phone system?"

Alleman replied, "Breaker was a third party vendor and had end-of-the-line support. We could put the old equipment

Woodbridge is the strongest dog in this fight. If you have a strong case, then the law is on your side. Carteret and Perth Amboy are in a stronger position."

Law Director Peter King answered Sierakowski's question, "The reason for a mediator as opposed to an arbitrator is because if you have an arbitrator, you are locked in. You need 3 arbitrators: yours, the other side, and neutral. We don't want to be bound by certain arbitra-

Councilman Fernando Irizarry answered Balut, "The files are with the County. Someone in City Hall knew it was missing. Stop saying things that are not true!"

Balut continued, "I put an OPRA in and I didn't get it. I still didn't get any paperwork." Irizarry said, "Ask the County!"

Resident David Caba commented on R-395, R-396, and R-397. These Resolutions were

Press Release 10/13/17 PERTH AMBOY - Mayor Wilda Diaz announced the efforts that the City of Perth Amboy and community partners have made in the past three weeks to provide relief to Puerto Rico, including a collection drive, fundraising efforts for shipping

and Perth Amboy Police Officers awaiting deployment to Puerto Rico at a press conference today.

Trucks taking the first shipment completed the first leg of their journey for the Port of Jacksonville in Florida, where supplies will be loaded on ships

sailing to San Juan, Puerto Rico as early as tomorrow. Then, the supplies will be delivered to San Sebastián, a city located almost 80 miles west of San Juan, where few supplies or support for recovery have been received and people are in desperate

that we no longer have uses for up for auction."

The next person who came up to speak was Acting Police Chief Roman McKeon who fielded questions related to R-398-10/17 regarding the purchase of 44 Second Chance Summit Shooter Vests from Atlantic Tactical, the amount not to exceed \$38,940.00.

McKeon explained, "This takes care of everyone, plus there will be three extra sets. They're bulletproof vests which will be in use 24 hours."

R-401-10/17 accepting a FEMA Grant in the amount of \$232,500 for the 2017 Port Security Grant Program regarding maintenance and sustainment of Fireboat Marine V and Dive & Rescue and Recovery Equipment and Training.

Acting Fire Chief Mullen came forward, "This is part of the Capital Improvement Project. The total cost will amount to \$310,000. There will be an allotment of \$40,000 a year until the year 2020. 18 people will have personal dive suits plus additional hardware. We're looking at GSA pricing. We also looked at what the top dive teams use. The certification process should be complete by the spring of 2018. There is little or no money left from the County for funding."

On Resolution R-406-10/17 re: Authorizing the City of Perth Amboy to make Application to the Local Finance Board, B.A. Adam Cruz gave an explanation about his resolution. "This is regarding the Water/Utility Loans. This would be a request by the Council for a resolution so we (the City) can be put on the schedule to meet with the Local Finance Board. There's a need to replace the pipe and sewer lines."

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez spoke up, "It's Capital improvement for the water & sewer system. I will like the people from the Water Department here to explain what the \$11,000,000 will be spent on regarding the water and sewer system. Next year, the agreement with Middlesex will be up." ceived summonses and they were very nice people, but they have found an apartment in Hillside. During the Public Portion Resident Stanley Sierakowski asked the Council to table R-405-10/17 re: a person to person transfer of a Plenary Retail Consumption License from Bruce and Donna Mohr t/a the Flat Iron Tavern to Tawfik Enterprises t/a The Flat Iron Tavern.

Sierakowski was concerned because the person that the license was being transferred to had drug convictions in the past. He wanted to have the Council do a more thorough investigation. Sierakowski even gave the council a ruling referencing Tawfik.

Petrick read the paperwork that Sierakowski handed to the Council.

After reading it, Petrick replied, "The F.B.I., New Jersey State Police, and the Perth Amboy Police Department all cleared the petitioner."

Sierakowski continued, "This will affect the residents of Perth Amboy. You (the Council) just got this information today."

Later in the evening Tawfik came forward, "There was an order from the Attorney General's Office. The Council can look it over very carefully and I ask that you just work with me."

Sierakowski then talked about R-403-10/17 re: A Professional Service Contract with Eugene J. Codey to service as a mediator in the matter of Woodbridge vs. the Borough of Carteret and City of Perth Amboy in amount not to exceed \$50,000. "With Codey's Firm, most of their cases deal with arbitration and remediation. Go to a binding arbitration and the cost should be shared."

Council President Bill Petrick responded, "We don't have a choice since there are other towns involved."

Resident Ken Balut came up next, "I want an investigation tiation resolutions because of conflict of interest when I was on the Council. New Officers cannot live in this town on this salary."

Law Director Peter King addressed the missing documents in the Code Enforcement Department. "That Department has a running list of file numbers. There is an intern going through all the files to see if some items may have been misplaced. There is a master list."

Balut continued, "How can a C/O be issued with illegal items in it? I was told certain houses were issued C/O's without being inspected."

King replied, "One of the missing files that you requested was found and it had the last selling of the house (on your OPRA request). I will go with you to Code Enforcement."

Resident Alan Silber came up to speak next, "A newspaper said that a City Official said, "The house (on Brighton Avenue where the two boys fell from the second level balcony) was over 100 years old and had normal wear and tear."

Council President Bill Petrick then spoke up stating, "The State of New Jersey does multiunit inspections and they found no outstanding violations."

Silber then asked, "Does City Hall have a water meter?"

Petrick answered, "The Middlesex Water Company put meters on all units, including churches."

Silber explained, "The plants on Smith Street were being watered using City water. The BID Members should take water from their own homes to water these plants. The BID should be water for the plants put in their budget.

Resident and Businessman David Caba came up to speak. He complained about the muggings and other violent crimes being committed in Perth Amboy. "Meetings are still not shown on the internet right away. I like the Jeep Shows that are shown. It's also important that Council Members be here (in reference to two missing Council Members). I like this Council because you care for the City. You run for office to look out for the taxpayers. People come up and talk because they are concerned. Kushner is not paying for the Rector Street repairs. It was grant money." Councilman Fernando Gonzalez requested that Law Director King ask Code Enforcement to provide the Council with any complaints or actions in regards to the Brighton Avenue house.

Council President Bill Petrick corrected the amount, "It's actually \$12,600,000."

B.A. Cruz concluded the discussion by telling the Council, "The application is due 10/18/2017."

Council President Bill Petrick said, "Residents complained about two buses parked on Dorsey Street near the American Legion that are being used as mobile homes."

Acting Police Chief McKeon came up to address this, "There is actually a man and a woman in their 20's living in these buses. At night, they park on private property. They had reon Code Enforcement. The C/O's I asked for were lost." Petrick replied, "The house in question was cleared and Code Enforcement had no outstanding violations on it."

Balut in his frustration said, "No one seems to care about Code Enforcement losing files." He then complained about the starting salaries of Police Officers and the fact that they are getting paid less now than they were a few years ago.

This prompted Council President Bill Petrick to ask Balut, "Why all of a sudden are you concerned about the Police Officers' salaries and you never questioned it when you were a Councilman for four years?"

Balut explained, "I was not allowed to sit on contract negoCouncil President Bill Petrick added, "I would like a report from the State, too."

Councilman Joel Pabon said residents called him from the neighborhood close to 708 Car-

Flashback to the 2012 Perth Amboy Mayoral Debate. An area that was always discussed for redevelopment was the corner of Convery Boulevard and Smith Street in Perth Amboy which was the old Celotex Property. At the time, it was tug of war between the Board of Education and the Redevelopment Agency as to whether there should be a new high school there or a mixed-use housing building to bring in more ratables. The area of Perth Amboy that laid very heavily on my mind was outer State Street which was heavily blighted with decrepit buildings. It was embarrassing when a person would cross over the bridge linking Sewaren and Perth Amboy see that area in such despair.

One of the questions asked to the candidates at that 2012 debate was: "What would you do to improve that area (Outer State Street)? I really can't remember anyone addressing that question thoroughly; many of the candidates pivoted right over to the Celotex Property.

Today, this has changed and it is outer State Street that has gotten a revival along with outer High Street.

This brings me to this point. On October 13, 2017, we attended a press conference held at the new Target Facility on High Street. Target, along with BridgePort, have partnered up with the City of Perth Amboy in the relief effort to help the people in Puerto Rico. It's ironic that this year with all the destructive natural disasters that have occurred. These two corporations completed their facilities when it was most needed. It was as if it was

fate.

At several Council Meetings, Residents and others have come forward to complain rightfully how some developers have harmed the City. In my opinion, the Residents can rest assured that Target and BridgePort are here to have a positive impact in the community. This is demonstrated when they didn't hesitate to help in whatever capacity they could: to store and ship the supplies collected by the community of Perth Amboy.

So many organizations, community groups including some from neighboring towns came together to make this drive a success. There are too many to mention. The Perth Amboy Police will have a contingent of 5 Officers to go over to Puerto Rico this week and the following week 6 more will go. Unfortunately several Firefighters requested to go, but because of the natural disasters going on in other parts of the country, they could not be spared. 

Historic Surveyor General's Office

PERTH AMBOY - The Historic Surveyor General's Office, which is adjacent to Perth Amboy City Hall, is now open for tours. At one time, this structure was the meeting place of the East Jersey Board of Proprietors & housed their records. Presently the Surveyor General's Office is displaying artifacts from the John Watson (1685 - 1768)archaeological site along with other items from Perth Amboy's rich history. Perth Amboy history DVDs are also available.



regarding litigation with the City and other parties. "Everything there is a settlement," Caba said.

Council President Bill Petrick answered, David Caba, "These are workplace injuries. The law of the State of New Jersey states if you are hurt on the job, you are entitled to compensation."

During the Meeting, Councilman Fernando Irizarry asked to pull R-394, R-398, and R-401 for discussion. R-384-R-397, R-399, R-400, R-402–R-405 were voted upon and unanimously accepted.

Resolution R-398 was discussed first. Irizarry asked if Second Chance meant secondhand vests.

Council President Petrick answered, "No, it's the brand name." R-398 was voted on and unanimously accepted.

R-401 was then discussed. Irizarry asked, "How many (are needed) dive and rescue team? What does the Police and Fire Department have to do with a rescue team?"

Cruz answered, "The Fire Department has 4 shifts and the Police Department has 3 shifts. We need to coordinate to have

enough of a response time." Irizarry insisted, "That doesn't justify this."

Cruz then added, "That doesn't mean the City getting a grant?" Irizarry then argued, "To work

ck out who can cover which jurisse diction?"

Cruz then stated, "The Fire and Police Departments work together here every day."

Irizarry then stated, "I've heard that before. Eventually the grant money runs out and we (the City) have to pay."

Councilman Joel Pabon then said, "I've been part of some of the search and rescue that goes on in the Waterfront. There are some personnel from other towns who come here (when needed). Our Waterfront is becoming more active. When response time comes, people react. You get to see all of this. People that are not on the payroll are involved. Search and Rescue Dogs and other things you don't think off. I'm glad about bringing all this equipment here. I know the expenses. When the Chief came in, he was glad to have equipment. If we continue to use the Waterfront, we have to keep our City safe."

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez added, "Not everyone is a swimmer or a diver. The fact is we're purchasing \$230,000 in equipment we wish we had before. It is something that is needed. Three years down the road, the Fire and Police Department will be well trained." Councilman Helmin Caba said, "I agree with Councilmen Joel Pabon and Fernando Gonzalez. If we open up the beach and something does happen, this will be needed."

Councilman Irizarry said, "Every time we say it's for safety, 3 years later we won't have the money. Somewhere we have to draw the line. Sooner or later, we have to say no. In a few years the citizens will have to pay for this."

R-401 passed unanimously.

Statement by Mayor Wilda Diaz Press Conference

Puerto Rico Relief Efforts Friday, October 13, 2017

PERTH AMBOY - I want to start off by welcoming all who are present today- this would have been impossible without the help of everyone in this room.

I cannot express to you how proud I am of our entire community. I mean, we have had such an overwhelming response that some of our staff have solely focused on this humanitarian effort to fulfill a great need on the Island of Puerto Rico.

Perth Amboy is nearly 80% Latino, so I know this is near and dear to many of those in this room. Whether you have immediate family, extended loved ones, friends or maybe just very fond memories of the island, it leaves many of us grieving over its devastation.

As a Puerto-Rican American, my parents live on the island. When Maria hit landfall, my mother and sister were there. Not hearing from them for days was really difficult on all of us. We all experienced a lot of anxiety and worry for their well-being. Thank God my mom is now here at home with us. My heart goes out to those still trying to communicate with their loved ones.

Five years ago we experienced the devastation of Super Storm Sandy and here in our hometown, the damage does not nearly compare to the destruction faced by the victims of Harvey, Irma and Maria, which all happened within just a matter of weeks from one another. While Texas and Florida are on their way to recovery, Puerto Rico and the Caribbean Islands still fall short of just the basic essentials-food, water, shelter, gasoline, communication and power.

It was just a matter of hours into the storm on September 20th that we all realized what they were really facing.

It's been 21 days! Since day 1, we brainstormed; Day 2 we mobilized; Day 3, we rallied our resources and every day since we've been on a single mission to get these resources to the people of Puerto Rico, specifically those in the most rural areas of the island, the North West Region. Just last week, I was pleased to join New Jersey for Puerto Rico, an organization spearheaded by the Puerto Rican Congress of New Jersey and state-wide leaders, as we presented their first \$10,000 check to the American Red Cross. Thank you Sam Delgado and Yvonne Lopez for making this possible. Here in Perth Amboy, my administration led a city-wide collection drive. Many city employees and our city departments--Human Services, Police, Fire, Public Works and my immediate office staff, rolled up their sleeves and expressed

their compassion through action and it encouraged others. From boxing goods to donating and packing products, to palletizing—it has been all hands on deck.

Since then we have collected more than 200 pallets of goods that's over 400 thousand pounds of essential supplies, including, first-aid kits, batteries, flash lights, hygiene products and most importantly, canned goods and water.

Dr. Roman, Vivian Rodriguez and Board President Puccio, thank you for joining us today and thank you for the generous donations of the staff and students of the Perth Amboy Public School System.

Surrounding communities like Edison, Linden, Rahway and Woodbridge lent a helping hand. Councilwoman Lizbeth DeJesus of Woodbridge Township, I want to also thank you for your generosity.

If it were not for the kindness of Home Depot, Englert, US Food Service, Sun life Rentals, Riverdale, Renovation House, The Puerto Rican Association for Human Development, the Perth Amboy Jeep Club, All Stars Academy and UPS, among many others, these goods would not be here today.

If it were not for the kindness of the cultural exchange students visiting from the Dominican Republic, these goods would not be boxed today.

We are gathered here in the Target Warehouse, the first distribution facility in the State of New Jersey that opened its doors just a few short months ago. If it weren't for them we wouldn't be here today!!!

They have stored our goods in this facility and assisted us with shipping. What you see here before you is less than half of the amount of goods we collected. Sousan and Jennifer, thank you so much for your hospitality.

Our first shipment went out on Monday, arrived to Florida and will be on its way to Puerto Rico tomorrow! And I want to give a special thanks to Jeff Milaniak, Principal of Bridge Development, who partnered with Unishippers of Edison to transport these goods to Jacksonville, Florida. This is over a \$20,000 dollars donation and I can't thank him enough for his generosity. Thank you! Thank you! Thank you! Additionally, because of the giving of numerous donors to the Celebrate Perth Amboy- San Sebastian Relief Fund, we have raised over 45 thousand dollars and arranged the shipment of 8 full containers through Sea Freight Logistics. 





This Week in World War II 75 Years Ago

Naval convoys on October 16, 1942, converge for "Operation Torch," the Anglo-American landings on French North Africa. Allied leaders agree on a plan to obtain the cooperation of Vichy French military officers there. In Warsaw, German authorities hang 50 Polish communists and display their bodies as a warning. The Aaron Copland-Agnes DeMille ballet "Rodeo" premieres in New York City. The U.S. National Boxing Association freezes the titles of all its champions serving in the armed forces. The character "Mighty Mouse" debuts in the 20th Century-Fox Terrytoons cartoon, "The Mouse of Tomorrow."

U.S. forces on Guadalcanal receive 32 additional aircraft on October 17. In Stalingrad, the Germans finally take control of the bitterly contested tractor factory. On Papua-New Guinea, an Australian advance northward from Port Moresby runs into fierce Japanese resistance. In the Aleutians, the Japanese destroyer *Oboro* is attacked and sunk by American planes off Kiska Island.

American and Australian troops invade the southern tip of Papua-New Guinea on October 18 and begin fighting their way up the island. In Europe, Hitler orders German troops to summarily shoot all captured Allied commandos "to the last man," even if they are in uniform and have surrendered. In the Crimea, the advance by German Army Group A toward the Black Sea port of Tuapse is halted due to difficult terrain and stubborn Soviet resistance. An advance party of four Norwegian Special Operations Executive (SOE) commandos are dropped by parachute to reconnoiter the area around the German "heavy water" plant at Telemark, Norway. The facility is important to the Nazi atomic-weapon development program. (The SOE is a British organization whose purpose is to conduct espionage, reconnaissance and sabotage.)

On October 19, Vice Adm. William "Bull" Halsey, USN, replaces Vice Adm. Robert Ghormley, USN, as Area Commander, South Pacific. In Washington, the War Department agrees to provide equipment for another 30 divisions of the Chinese Army. Soviet forces along the Don River launch an offensive.

The U.S. government, under authority of the "Trading with the Enemy Act," on October 20 orders the closure of the banking operations of the Union Banking Corp., in New York City, and seizes its stock shares. The bank is alleged to operate as a clearing house for the assets and enterprises of German steel magnate Fritz Thyssen, and is suspected of hiding gold for Nazi leaders. In the Solomon Islands, the heavy cruiser USS Chester is torpedoed by Japanese submarine I-167, killing 11 sailors and injuring 12. The vessel limps into Espiritu Santo, in the New Hebrides, for emergency repairs.

The U.S. Congress on October 21 passes the Revenue Act of 1942, a measure that calls for nearly \$7 billion in new individual income taxes (a near doubling of federal taxes) and lowers the personal exemption drastically enough to bring some 13 million new taxpayers into the system. By the end of the war, taxes paid by individuals will total more than the amount paid by corporations — the beginning of a new trend in American tax history. Off Lindesnes, Norway, the German transport vessel MS Palatia is sunk by an RAF Handley Page Hampden torpedo bomber. Palatia is carrying 999 Soviet prisoners of war to work as slave laborers in Norway, 916 of whom perish in the attack. In London, a royal proclamation is signed on October 22 that reduces to 18 the British call-up age for military service. Over Italy, the British Royal Air Force launches the first of a series of raids on the industrial areas around Turin, Milan and Genoa. In Russia, the first snow falls at Stalingrad. In the Pacific, Australian troops invade Goodenough Island, 15 miles northeast of Papua-New Guinea, attacking the Japanese Special Naval Landing Force located there. The strategy is to deny the Japanese use of the island during the Buna-Gona Campaign on Papua-New Guinea.






