# Big Difference: Snow Removal, Zoning, Free Inventory, & McKeon's Disappointment

1/8/17 Caucus

PERTH AMBOY – Councilman Joel Pabon questioned the bids for the replacement of the 6 million gallons per day High Lift Pump #1 at the Runyon Water Treatment Plant. "The low bid was \$46,000. The high bid was \$81,875. Why is there such a big difference?"

Luis Perez Jimenez - Director of Operations at the at the USA-PA (Utility Service Associates Perth Amboy) Middlesex Water Company) came up to speak, "Municipal maintenance was the low bidder have done a lot of work with us before. They will be doing hydraulic repairs. The pump they're working on is 30 years old and it is one of the biggest pumps that we have."

Another topic that drew a lot of attention was R-22-1/18 Memorializing the acceptance of military equipment previously received.

Deputy Police Chief Larry Cattano came forward to address this, "Around the year 2015, we were able to acquire military equipment. Besides vehicles, we were able to acquire recreational equipment such as volleyballs. We also get spot inspected by the State Police. There are some items that we no longer want and can be sold as surplus or destroyed. If we destroy any of this equipment we get from the military, we have to show photos how this was done. Some of the items are required to be returned to the source for disposal. We can ask other departments if they can use what we no longer want."

Councilman Irizarry said, "The Council just wants to know what we are getting before it is accepted by the departments. I'm not voting for something unknown."

Cattano emphasized that the surplus military equipment goes on a website with thousands of police departments, so they can see and request those items."

Cattano then responded to a question on why the police department received a military

boat. "These boats are more mobile and can get into tight spots. They can get under the railroad bridge whereas our existing boats have to wait for the bridge to open. We do the maintenance on the boats and they were used on our last two rescue responses. The military assigns values to all the equipment on their website and we get the surplus items for free. We can take back items no longer needed to Fort Dix or give them to other police departments who may need them. The jet-ski we have now has to be rewired."

Cattano then addressed the situation that occurred at 494 Neville St. "I will check with the court involving summonses at this address."

At this point Johan Delgado from Code Enforcement came up to speak, "There have been numerous complaints about this address which involved illegal housing and garbage. 9 out of 10 times when we went to check nothing was found. We issued one summons for rubbish and debris which was behind the house. It's a neighbor situation. I have pictures. We have informed owners of the house on what they can do."

Delgado also addressed the problem at 701 Gornik Dr. where there were complaints about a second story deck being built, and busses being parked. "The owner of the house came into the office and spoke with Code Enforcement Director Jamie Rios. I'll get back to you with more information."

During the public portion, Stephanie Márquez-Villafañe came up. She spoke about the difficulties she had (with her walker) with the recent snow when it came to the street corners where the snow was not cleared. She also commended the Department of Public Works for being out there during the bad weather conditions. Her other problem was that the fire alarms at King Plaza where she resides have been going on non-

stop. "One time at 4 a.m., they went off and the fire departments did not get there until 4:20 a.m. It took them another 10 minutes to shut off the alarms. When these alarms go off, there are disabled people and young people that don't know where to go. Since alarms go off constantly, some people ignore them." She then spoke about the difficulties she's been having when it comes to scheduling the Lung Cancer Awareness Walk. "I've started talking to Adam and the Police Department and have yet to receive a clearance on our application. I've gone to the Clerk's Office and the Recreation Office. I can't get give you a copy of insurance until I get an application approved for the walk."

Law Director King responded, "There are two applications: one is for if you want any City Officials or media present. This would come from the Mayor's Office. Special events applications can be acquired from the Mayor's Office and the Department of Recreation – not the City Clerk."

B.A. Adam Cruz then remarked, "Director of Recreation Kenny Ortiz approves the application and the Mayor only gets it if she is asked to attend."

After Márquez-Villafañe spoke, Council President Bill Petrick said, "I'm concerned about the fire alarms going off at King Plaza."

Acting Fire Chief Ed Mullen came up, "The cause of the alarms going off were the pipes freezing which caused multiple malfunctions. They're also broken sprinkler pipes. Every apartment in the building will hear alarms that go off in the hallways and lobbies. Alarms that go off in the apartment such as in a case of maybe someone burning their meal while cooking, it will cause an alarm because of the smoke. The alarm will only be going off in that particular unit."



# **South Amboy Reviews Garbage Ordinance**

By: Joseph L. Kuchie SOUTH AMBOY - The South Amboy council began discussions to amend the city's current garbage ordinance at last week's business meeting.

The current ordinance, which was passed in 2015, was developed to clean up the streets of South Amboy and prevent residents and businesses from leaving garbage on the curb for long periods of time. Currently the ordinance states that residents can not bring their garbage cans to the curb until 6:00 p.m., but Mayor Henry asked the council to consider changing it to an earlier time to reflect the sun going down earlier in the winter months.

After a brief discussion, the council agreed in principle to change the time from 6:00 p.m. to either 4 or 4:30 p.m. between November 1 and March 31. The time between April 1 and October 31 would remain 6:00 p.m.

The city also discussed the fines and court appearance tied to the ordinance. The ordinance states that residents and businesses will be fined for their first and second offense and would have a mandatory court appearance for a third offense and beyond, but the council believes that residents have been required to come to court on their first offense.

Mayor Henry promised to speak with code enforcement to ensure that residents were being ticketed properly for the first two offenses.

Council President Mickey Gross asked City Attorney John Lanza to begin developing an amendment for the current ordinance. Once drafted it would need to be voted upon by the council and the public would be able to speak about it at an upcoming council meeting.

Mayor Henry also gave an update on the Business Administrator role.

According to Henry, he and Council President Gross will be interviewing three candidates at City Hall on January 19th in hopes of hiring someone as soon as possible. Mayor Henry has been taking on the responsibilities of Business Administrator after Stacey Kennedy resigned earlier this month.

Councilman Tom Reilly announced that the city will be hosting another business breakfast at the Broadway Diner on February 24th from 9 – 11 a.m. There will also be a small business workshop at the South Amboy Library on January 22nd.

All council members were in attendance for the city business meeting. The next city council meeting will be held on January 31st at 7:00 p.m.

who shouts the loudest. Let us dream big and challenge ourselves. Our dreams lie above us. New Jersey was hit hardest by the new tax bill. It's devastating to the middle class. Can we agree as a Democrat or Republican to lead the way for every young woman to be treated as an equal? We will do what is right. The gender wage difference will be gone as a relic. We in New Jersey will stand up for things and focus on issues not chasing ratings and start learning facts. We need to stand to-

When I grew up, John F. Kennedy was President, and public service was a higher calling. I still believe all of that is very true. I'm saddened by how much people have lost faith in government. Too many people believe the system doesn't care about them. In the election of 1968 of Nixon vs. Humphrey, I asked my mother who she was going to vote for. She answered, "I chose my candidate because he cares about me." Each of us wants to make New Jersey a better place to live. The power given to us is the power to bring about change. New Jersey has gotten too expensive. Commuters rely on a mass transit system that can't get them to work on time. A quality public endeavor of equal pay for equal work and access to good education opportunities for the middle class is needed. A college education is not for everyone. We must focus on youth training and development. At its core, government must do the basics. Let's pledge ourselves to the Gateway tunnel

and fix New Jersey Transit. Too often there are government actions that have no purpose. In this wealthy state, too many people don't have access to a supermarket. There are too many foodbanks that don't have support. We can and will fix that. Government can help, and it takes all of us to make government work. All voices matter. Republican or Democrat, north or south will have a voice as an equal part of government. We will make sure we get policy right. We do a hard thing and do it right and do them together. New Jersev chose us to make the rules."

The ceremony concluded with God Bless America and the benediction by Imam Morshad Saami Hossian, Voorhees Islamic Center, Cherry Hill.

# Celebrating Dr. King One of the Champions of Civil, Employee, & Worker's Rights

One of the harshest realities in life is when you lose a job. One of the worst cases is when that job loss is totally unexpected. This happened recently when Walmart closed a large amount of their Sam's Club locations without their employees knowing in advance.

The following words were spoken by the late Dr. Martin Luther King. This was in an article written by Peter Dreier in *Common Dreams* at www.commondreams.org

One of Dr. King's last marches was the Campaign for Worker's rights. This was to support African-American Garbage workers who were on strike to protest unsafe conditions and at the same time abusive supervisors, low wages, and to gain recognition for the union. Their sign said: "I am a man."

The Civil Rights Union and the Labor Movements were very much connected. Here are some exerts that Dr. Martin Luther King said in his address to the AFL-CIO at the 1961 Convention: "Our needs are identical with labors' needs. Decent wages, fair working conditions, livable housing, old age security,

health and welfare measures, conditions in which families can grow, have education for their children, and respect in the community."

Other words that he spoke: "What does it profit a man to be able to eat at an integrated lunch counter if he doesn't earn enough money to buy a hamburger and a cup of coffee?"

At the time, King observed: "Negros are not the only poor in the nation. There is nearly twice as many white poor as Negro, and therefore the struggle against poverty is not involved solely with color or racial discrimination, but with elementary economic justice."

If Dr. King were alive today, what would he think about the situation where union workers were totally taken off guard and not given ample notice about a job loss? You would think in the year heading into 2018, this would not be an issue. Unfortunately, it is. We salute the message that Dr. King spoke so many years ago. In this day and age, workers should at least be given the respect of proper notification of termination. This should not be happening. *C.M.*

## A Tragedy is No Time for Politics

At the conclusion of Monday's [1/08/2018] City Council Caucus meeting, Acting Police Chief Roman McKeon was the final speaker during the Public Portion [5 minutes Maximum per Speaker]. McKeon's presentation, made in uniform, and his interaction with the Council lasted 20 minutes. My observations, interpretations and conclusions were made after watching the meeting online on PATV. At no time did McKeon indicate that he was speaking as a member of the public therefore he was speaking as the Chief of

During the Caucus meeting there was no mention of the incident involving a carbon monoxide fatality so I believed that was the topic on which Chief McKeon would inform the public. But that is not what happened. It began with McKeon informing everyone that what he was going to say was not politically motivated. That's a sure sign that the opposite is about to happen. Chief McKeon stated that the Police personnel and their families wanted to know why the Council members did not show up at the scene and at the hospital to show their support. He stated how disappointed he was by this lack of support and mentioned several times how many hours Mayor Diaz and BA Adam Cruz stayed at the scene and at the hospital but Council members were absent.

course, since this was not political. Chief McKeon then went after the few Perth Amboy residents who attend the meetings but do not support the Police. He commented that they talk about stop signs, parking and the Chief's version of how safe Perth Amboy is but "when the doo-doo hits the fan" they were nowhere to be seen, not at the hospital and not at the apartment building.


A clearly frustrated Councilman Helmin Caba was the first to respond stating emphatically that at no time had anyone from the Administration or police contacted him about the incident. He commented that it has been embarrassing that as an elected official he often has to get information from residents rather than the Administration. Joel Pabon stated that he was at work, was never called and had no clue of the tragedy until he saw it on Facebook. Councilman Gonzalez backed their version saying he was not notified and also commented that this was an ongoing pattern. Council President Petrick, in response to McKeon, affirmed that he had been contacted by Adam Cruz but was instructed not to tell anyone.

At Wednesday's regular meeting the Chief, the Deputy Chief, a Captain, two representatives from the PBA [I believe] and a Special who provides security and six members from the public were present. Was this unusual turnout by the Police a show of support for McKeon's political attacks on the Council

and residents who attend meetings? Was it meant to have a chilling effect on the public and Council to question the Administration? Could this be an attempt by our thin-skinned Diaz Administration to stifle dissent? Dialogue is always useful and welcomed between the police and the public —but the perception of intimidation, especially if it is orchestrated by the Administration, is not acceptable.

I do believe Chief McKeon is a decent man who had a bad day on Monday. The City is not served by a Police Chief carrying water for the Diaz Administration which has an established history of one-way loyalty. The Council members did not deserve his uninformed diatribe on Monday. As for the persistent presence of a small group of residents who attend meetings, I will continue to do so. I know who was there to question, criticize and expose a previous administration and we know that a great many supported that administration without question. That's a mistake that should not be repeated.

B.A. Cruz responded to Stephanie's concerns, "The property owner is responsible to make sure the corners that they are on are clear."

Councilman Pabon said, "I thought so, but I don't think these businesses are aware of it"

Cruz then stated, "There are about 22 summonses issued to-day (1/8/18)."

Code Enforcement Employee Johan Delgado came up to speak, "There were 22 summonses issued today. I even deputized a mailman. I gave him my cell phone number, so he can tell us about all the trouble spots that he encounters on his route."

Pabon then remarked that the BID should be using money for this enforcement. "This is just a suggestion."

Balut then turned his attention to the situation of commercial vehicles parked under the Outerbridge.

Petrick responded, "This is a Port Authority issue."

Balut then asked about the company that got a tax break then left. "Did anybody talk about the schools about the density? What are you going to do with these students?"

Mayor Diaz came up to speak. She wanted to let the Council and residents know how the City's Safety Personnel saved lives by evacuating the building (185 Fayette St.) how they responded. "Our Police, Fire, and Code Enforcement came out on such treacherous conditions. Our hospital responded so well to this crisis. To see that many Police Officers with IV's in their arms and oxygen masks on because they were overcome – I was so proud of all of them. I recently had a meeting with our Freeholders and let them know that other cities have to be responsible for their residents. We listen to the Council, especially when it comes to parking. A parking deck will help all our businesses. Some businesses already have parking behind their buildings. It will also help if we have a deck when we have a Waterfront event. It was in the plan, but wasn't spelled out. There are people who want to invest which creates ratables. It's exciting. We're holding developers responsible to make sure they invest in the infrastructure." Diaz concluded again praising the doctors and nurses and other professionals in the hospital who did their best under the worst conditions. "Two people who were overcome by carbon monoxide had to be transferred to another hospital."

Acting Police Chief McKeon came up to speak next. He became emotional and talked about how amazing it was how

the City worked together to respond to this crisis. "The Auxiliary Police did a great job and the Police Chaplains helped a lot when it came to confront those affected. I want to give a special thanks to Mayor Diaz and Adam Cruz. It was a testament to all of our City employees. Adam and the Mayor were there (in the hospital) for three hours for the families that are affected and our emergency personnel. People come here to the meetings with legitimate complaints, but don't ever come out to support the police. We appreciate the Mayor and Adam's support. The only person who called to see how we were doing was the Middlesex County Prosecutor Carey."

Councilman Helmin Caba spoke, "I was never contacted about the incident. The average person knows what's going on, but we don't. As an elected official, it's embarrassing."

McKeon went on to explain, "It was a case of bad communication, and the families were upset."

Councilman Joel Pabon then stated, "I didn't know what was going on until I found out about it on Facebook. It's far from the truth that we don't support the police. I have 110 employees that are my responsibility when I'm at work. I hope we can learn from this. There is no time that I do not support the police."

McKeon understood, "It's important that we have an open discussion about this, so we can go forward positively."

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez the asked B.A. Adam Cruz, "Will you please inform us of these situations? We have no idea what's going on."

McKeon then went on to explain, "A simple text from the Council President will mean a lot. I can't stress enough how we all pulled together (Fire Department, Police (Regular and Auxiliary) EMS, Hospital, and Olive Street).

Cruz then commented, "I rely on the Chief and Prosecutor's Office on what information can be released. It was chaos from moment the call came in. I left town at 11 p.m. I had to get people housing. It was one big event. If anyone had called me, I could have relayed the message as to what had happened. The Mayor has never censored me. I tell her what I sent you guys after it's done."

Councilman Caba then said, "We can be contacted by anyone, including the media."

Chief McKeon concluded with the following statement: "I didn't come here to point fingers. I know each of you supports us 100%. I just had to tell you how members of the Department felt. It would be hard pressed to find another city who could respond to this situation as well as we did."

# **Special Meeting on Zoning Set Up for Jan. 29th**& Answering Questions from 1/8/18 Meeting

PERTH AMBOY – During the public portion (for agenda items only), Resident Ken Balut came up to speak first. He wondered why, "Of the proclamations given out, why is there not a proclamation for National Police Week? Shouldn't someone from the Mayor's Office or the Police Department get recognized that week?"

City Clerk Elaine Jasko remarked, "This is not on the agenda."

Council President Bill Petrick told Balut, "This can be discussed later on during the meeting and questioned. Why didn't you mention this at the Caucus Meeting which would have given us enough time to put it on tonight's meeting?" Petrick also mentioned that there will be a special meeting on the ordinance that was pulled regarding zoning and land development. This meeting will take place on January 29, 2018 and he asked that it be moved to a later hour so more people could attend.

Resident Renee Skelton spoke next, "Zoning determines property value and the quality of life. I think the special meeting of January 29th should be at 7 p.m. That's just my personal opinion. I want to address a zoning problem that has been going on for 3½ months in my neighborhood. There is a lot on Sayre Avenue that used to be the site of an old coat factory. This is a R-25 Zone. Power washing is taking place there, including buses. This is a low-density neighborhood and we've had dozens of violations. There are at least 15 to 20 buses on that lot, now. I was told Code Enforcement issued violations to the bus company whose owner is located in Paterson. Now, it's November and December and buses are still in violation. They were supposed to have a court date. I went to municipal court three times to see if the case was being heard. It has not been on the docket. You are allowing a nonconforming use to be violated which will then become a conformed use. If you let people get away with this, they will continue to violate the laws."

Law Director Peter King responded, "Every day that this bus company is in violation, the fees go up."

Council President Bill Petrick then asked, "How long can they continue this cycle with their lawyers postponing the dates?"

Skelton provided photos to the Council.

King then continued, asking Skelton to bring the pictures to the court for evidence. "If the company in violation and is not paying their fines, then a bench warrant is served, and their registration will be suspended."

Skelton spoke up and said, "Last week, the judge said the case was not on the docket."

Councilman Joel Pabon added, "There are engines that are being power washed on this lot."

Skelton then noted, "I'm getting sick from the solvent these buses are using and they are not our school buses."

Council President Bill Petrick questioned if the police can come at night and shut them down.

Law Director King said, "The police can be called and also environmental services. We will talk to zoning and we may call you (Skelton) and ask you to testify."

Skelton responded, "I'll be happy to."

Resident Jeremy Baratta spoke next, "To get an immediate response, call 1-800-WARN-DEP which is open 24 hours. They will send state troopers and anyone else that needs to be notified.

King replied to Baratta, "The prosecutor does that."

Baratta again gave out the number and said, "That number is the reporting number for environmental issues."

Resident Ken Balut came up again frustrated there is no proclamation for National Police Week. He then asked the Council if they knew what the schools and City were going to get for the last PILOT they awarded.

Councilman Helmin Caba stated, "The City gets a larger payment through the PILOT and the schools get 0%."

Balut then questioned, "What is the taxpayer getting?" He started naming some of the employee salaries. He questioned, "How are we going to pay for additional students? Will contractors pay for the sewer system? All of these developments promise much, but they don't deliver. Did anyone talk to the School Board? The Mayor is trying to control the schools. Did you guys get a phone call about the ShopRite stabbing and shots fired on Penn Street? There is a problem on Ridgely Street where some residents and buildings are being tagged."

Katherine Massopust came up to speak to question what's going on with the rezoning and proposed transit village.

Council President Bill Petrick said the main areas affected will include: New Brunswick Avenue, Elm Street, Fayette Street and Rector Street (and other streets in the area)."

Massopust questioned, "Do you think it's wise to bring in any more people to Perth Amboy?" in reference to the rezoning. Massopust said, "I would like to see it (the documents)."

Petrick asked City Clerk Elaine Jasko if the document is available online?

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez said, "We can forward it to you."

Resident Alan Silber had a question on R-22 – Accepting a donation of equipment from the Law Enforcement Support Office. "If you don't like the ordinance, then change it. Don't ignore it. Also, the lot that was

fenced in should also be maintained. At a previous meeting, there was a woman from PARA who said the PILOT would create 2000 jobs. Don't you think new developers will ask for a PILOT? If the Mayor keeps saying how much money we are getting, then the State will say: pay for your own schools."

Council President Petrick said, "CFO Goldy and Chief McKeon should be giving us a list of all this equipment before we vote on it."

Councilman Pabon was glad, "We got a lot of good stuff, but we don't know about it beforehand."

Deputy Police Chief Cattano came forward to address this, "We are not trying to conceal the merchandise, but we have to memorialize it and put (document) the receipt of it by resolution"

Petrick cautioned, "If it will cost us, especially we should know about it."

Cattano responded, "The merchandise we are getting are at zero cost."

Pabon then remarked, "I was talking to a DPW Employee who was so happy about the nocost plow that the department received. We just don't want to be taken by surprise."

Councilman Fernando Irizarry stated, "I don't intend this as criticism. I think what you are doing is great. You're saving us money. I'd appreciate you telling us when you get the stuff."

Cattano responded, "I'll have that sent to you."

Irizarry added, "We want to know sooner."

Petrick then said, "Congratulations to you on your certification. It's nice to know what degrees and certifications the Police and Fire (Departments) have."

Cattano proudly stated, "Almost everyone has some sort of degree. It makes us more well-rounded."

Petrick continued, "It's a benefit to the community to have additional training. What is nice to see is the professionalism."

During the Council Comments, Helmin Caba stated, "Ken Balut brought up good points to have discussions with the Board of Education."

Petrick responded, "Can City Clerk Jasko provide the Board of Education with the (proposed) zoning changes so they are informed and have questions?"

Caba said, "I voted for the PILOT. It was the right thing to do for this situation. I don't approve for multiuse. We don't get a dime directly. We have to make sure we don't raise the taxes. I recommend what Senator Sweeney recommended for school – 5% or some small percentage to go to the school system. My condolences to the family of the young girl who passed away last





week (1/4/18) Let's continue to pray for the sick. I was not aware that 27 police officers were admitted to the hospital. That information was not relayed to me. We were not contacted or informed. My recommendation is to have better communication. We should be informed as elected officials - good or bad. We owe it to our constituents to be fully informed."

Fernando Gonzalez said, "We need better communication. We should not be apologetic because we are not informed."

Pabon said, "Let's take a look at this. The area of Gerdau Ameristeel is being built and Perth Amboy is being cleaned. There has been a lot of land that's contaminated and we're receiving a lot of grants. I remember the building on the 5 Corners (Smith/State/New Brunswick Ave.) and it needed someone to redo it. That developer has done a beautiful job. There are a lot of buses, and that's how the system operates. We all went to school here. A lot has changed. There are State mandates on buses. Everyone seems to get bused now. Do we have the right equipment for the police and do we have to invest in more? We learn by this and we have to do what we need to improve these apartments and stop pointing fingers."

Pabon addressed the problem with the smoke/carbon monoxide detectors, "People need to know they are not to be played with. We learn from these things and hope they don't happen again."

Irizarry had no comments.

B.A. Adam Cruz relayed a story about a Code Inspection that was done as a follow-up

visit at a residence. "On that visit, when the air was tested Carbon Monoxide particles were present. The detector went off. The Chief and Deputy Chief are getting Carbon Monoxide Detector devices. The lady was placed in a hotel. On the day of the incident (on Fayette Street) I called the Council President at 6:30 p.m. At 11:31 a.m. the next day (Friday, Jan. 5, 2018) emails were sent to all by the Mayor's Office. We had an emergency situation. My hats off to the men and women who almost gave their lives. We do have heroes here – each and every day."

Petrick thanked those for their

Acting Police Chief McKeon came up to speak, "I was very emotional at the Caucus Meeting. I am a father figure to a lot of the officers. I understand there was some communication problems. I got very emotional, but it was not personal or political. I respect each and every one of you. I saw some family members in tears watching their loved ones being treated at the hospital. I love and support you guys (the Council) and hope you feel the same."

Petrick responded, "As a member, I understand. The Fire Department had a program where they gave and installed detectors for free. Call the non-emergency number to see if the program is still in effect. There are different signs that you may be suffering the effects of carbon monoxide poisoning. When levels are high, they can be fatal."

For the consent agenda (R-2-1/18 through R-23-1/18), it was moved by Councilman Fernando Irizarry and Seconded by Councilman Helmin Caba.

# This Week in World War II 75 Years Ago

The British Eighth Army begins a new push in Libya on January 15. In Yugoslavia, German, Italian and Croat forces under Gen. Alexander Löhr launch "Operation White," the biggest campaign to date against anti-Axis Yugoslav Partisans led by Josip Broz, known as Tito. Most Partisans captured, including the wounded, are executed on the spot. In Washington, D.C., construction of the Pentagon is completed after only 16 months. Covering 29 acres, it's the world's largest office building.

On January 16, the British Eighth Army destroys Rommel's rearguard at Buerat, Libya, and is now just 300 miles from the Tunisian frontier. Iraq enters the war against all three Axis powers. RAF Bomber Command renews its attacks on Berlin after a 14-month lull.

At the Casablanca Conference on January 17, the British want to keep fighting in the Mediterranean before any main attack is made on Europe via the English Channel. They propose invasions of Sicily and Italy, which they feel will precipitate the fall of Mussolini, as well as drawing German reserves away from France and the Low Countries. The British also want to establish air bases in Italy, from which German armaments factories and Romanian oil-producing facilities can be bombed. The Americans, on the other hand, believe that the proposed British plan will only dissipate resources for a cross-Channel invasion, and tie up forces in what they feel will be a sideshow. The Americans believe the quickest way to defeat Hitler is by an invasion of northern France. Both sides agree, however, that a cross-Channel invasion will not be possible in 1943, and the Americans grudgingly accept the British proposal for an invasion of Sicily.

On January 18, Jews in Warsaw, Poland, revolt against the Nazis by firing on the Germans with small arms in what is the beginning of the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising. The Jewish resistance is triggered by the resumption of deportations to the Treblinka extermination camp, which had been suspended since October 1942. In northern Russia, the Red Army breaks through the 515-day German siege of Leningrad from the east and opens a 6- to 7-mile-wide land corridor by which to relieve the city and start bringing in supplies. In the U.S., bread and certain metals are rationed. The sale of pre-sliced bread is banned, to reduce the need by bakeries for metal parts for bread-slicing machines.

The Soviets on January 19 claim victories during a 75-mile advance towards Kharkiv, Ukraine, stating that some 52,000 Axis prisoners have been captured on this front alone.

In North Africa, the British Eighth Army on January 20 solidifies its position in Homs, Libya, while Rommel's *Panzerarmee Afrika* continues its retreat toward Tunisia. In South America, Chile breaks off diplomatic relations with the Axis countries. A daytime raid by the Luftwaffe on a London suburb hits a school in session, killing 41 children and 6 teachers. A sweep by combined German, Italian, Chetnik, and *Ustaše* forces is begun against Yugoslav Partisans; the Tito-led Partisans are forced into southern Bosnia.

American and Australian troops attack near Buna, Papua-New Guinea, on January 21. The Japanese make a stand, but are defeated. The Australians and the Americans pour onto the northern coast of Papua-New Guinea and move northward towards Japanese positions at Lae and Salamaua. Hundreds of Jews are killed in the Warsaw Ghetto as German soldiers, responding to the revolt, begin throwing grenades into buildings where people are living.






