PERTH AMBOY – Johanna Calle (Director of the New Jersey Alliance for Immigrant Justice) was Master of Ceremonies at a Roundtable Discussion hosted by Perth Amboy Mayor Wilda Diaz at the Brighton Avenue Community Center on Thursday, July 19, 2018. Besides Mayor Diaz, the panel included: Hopewell Borough, Mayor Paul Anzano, Morristown Township Mayor Timothy Dougherty, Dover Township Mayor James Dodd, Maplewood Township Mayor Victor DeLuca, Roselle Borough Mayor Christine Danseareau, Assemblywoman Yvonne Lopez 19th District, Assemblywoman Annette Quijano 20th District, New Jersey Alliance for Immigrant Justice.

All the above Mayors have Municipal ID Programs in their towns.

Mayor Wilda Diaz stated, "Immigration has been a topic for a long time. This (Undocumented Immigrants) is a very marginalized group." She thanked the 19th Legislative Team, especially Senator Joe Vitale for Assembly Bill 1738. "This law is important for every citizen in New Jersey."

Assembly Bill 1738. NJ Safe and Responsible Driver Act to give qualified drivers regardless of your immigration status a way to obtain a driver's license. Certain documentation is required, but they emphasize that

once you receive this license, it will indicate what it can and cannot be used for.

Assemblywoman Annette Quijano spoke next, "Two weeks ago, the sponsors and the Assembly came up to speed to discuss this bill. California already has this in place (giving driver licenses to undocumented residents). So far, they've had 1 million undocumented drivers sign up. Anyone eligible to drive should be able to. If this bill is signed, it will identify you as a resident of New Jersey. This way, you can be insured and registered. This will increase New Jersey's economics. People will have a license and be able to buy an automobile and of course the automobile will need repairs, tires. It will bring increase revenue for tolls and gas. We don't do press conferences. Senator

Vitale has been a great partner in the Senate. We're meeting with the sponsors of the bill. We're trying to make sure we're protecting people's identity."

Assemblywoman Yvonne Lopez spoke briefly. She praised Assemblywoman Annette Quijano for her leadership, vision, and foresight. "Perth Amboy has always been in the forefront for immigration rights."

Roselle Borough Mayor Christine Danseareau talked about how this bill will help the residents. There is an increasingly number of diverse people in my community. Many people are riding bikes to work in all types of weather. We started with the Municipal ID Program first. I agree with the legislators. This bill will be great for the econ-

Improvements Discussed & More to Come

SOUTH AMBOY – Some of the items discussed at the Business Meetings included for the disposal of surplus property. B.A. Glenn Skarzynski stated, "Vehicles have been advertised on the GOVDeals to satisfy the cost."

City Clerk Laura Kemble-Kalantsis answered the question regarding Item No. B. Resolution to provide for the insertion of a special item of revenue in the budget. "It's \$500,000 for a recycling grant."

Council President Mickey Gross stated, "I have to abstain from this item because it comes out of the department that I work for."

Item No. C. Resolution to return a performance bond and accept a maintenance bond for 2082 Route 35 South. City Engineer Mark Rasimowicz said, "It was signed off by Angelo Valtutto (Planning Board Consultant PE, PP)."

Rasimowicz also answered the question for Item No. D. Resolution awarding emergency sanitary sewer lines inspection and cleaning for \$12,280 invoiced for emergency repairs. "It was awarded to Oswald Enterprises."

For Item No. E. Resolution to renew a liquor license for 2018-2019 license term. Kemble-Kalantsis said, "The pocket license was paid through the State. This is so they can pay the City."

For Item No. F. A Resolution to amend Resolution 107-2018-Forclosure for Delinquent Taxes. City Attorney John Lanza said, "These locations are undesirable because of contaminants. A title search can be

done, and the City can proceed with the foreclosure if the owner doesn't pay the taxes."

City Engineer Mark Rasimowicz answered, "The Resolution regarding road improvements on Stevens Avenue to Jads Construction Company. They will be providing a handicapped ramp and paving."

Item No. I. A discussion to prohibit the growth and sale of marijuana and refer it to the Zoning Board. City Attorney John Lanza answered this, "This has to be also approved by the Planning Board."

Item No. J. An Easement at 310 South Feltus. City Clerk Laura Kemble-Kalantsis stated, "I received a check for retainer from the owner of the property."

Mark Rasimowicz added, "I will review the map and they are just replacing the front steps."

There was an Ordinance regarding a bond for various capital improvements for the City of South Amboy. This was appropriating \$3,110,000 and authorizing the issuance of \$2,979,500 bonds and notes of the City to finance part of the cost."

Laura Kemble-Kalantsis said, "There was \$750,000 that came in from the State to add to the City Coffers for the Ferry Terminal."

Councilman Brian MacLaughlin had a question in regard to parking for the firemen who work at the Independence Firehouse. "We, Glenn (Skarzynski) are working on it."

Skarzynski then stated, "Stu-

omy and quality of life. Right now, the residents are limited to where they can go to work and the work that is local is limited.”

Dover Township Mayor James Dodd said, “Because we are a small town, transportation is lacking. We never had busing for our children and parents are forced to send their kids to school by taxi. This bill is a great idea.”

Morristown Township Mayor Timothy Dougherty stated, “This bill is bipartisan and will be an economic driver. 34% of the residents are Latino. This will take the burden off of drivers using fake ID’s.”

Maplewood Township Mayor Victor DeLuca said, “Everybody should be treated fairly. We look at this as a zip code. They deserve respect and a high quality of life. This is about social economic, and justice. Without a driver’s license, you can’t maximize your earning potential. I’ve been working with other mayors and legislatures.”

Mayor Diaz spoke again and said, “Since the Municipal ID Cards have been implemented in Perth Amboy, over 5000 Municipal ID Cards have been issued our residents. The population of Perth Amboy is a little over 50,000 with 85% of the residents being Latino. This will help build up our community and will be an economic engine

for our City. They will shop and dine in our community and not be underground.”

Roselle Borough Mayor Christine Danseareau said, “In my community, the largest group have been Latinos, but there are many also from Haiti and Guyana. With they were issued ID’s, out came pure ecstatic joy. We were now embracing them. We opened up an office of Hispanic Affairs. These residents are now becoming more civically involved.”

Maplewood Township Mayor Victor DeLuca said, “Since issuing the Municipal ID’s, the kids in town were able to sign up for a lot of recreational programs. This form of documentation (drivers licenses) will be a stepping stone for our country. Inclusiveness makes us whole.”

Mayor Diaz then spoke, “We reached out to churches, businesses, and civic organizations. We also provide citizenship classes. A lot of our small business owners are immigrants. Latinos helped to build up the City. We have a dreamer who works for the City. We need to help New Jersey prosper.”

Johanna Calle said, “The licenses will help everyone in New Jersey.”

Some of the comments made by the mayors were, “The people who have driver’s licenses will help stop predatory employers from exploiting them. Our insurance rates are high because of drivers without insur-

ance.”

Assemblywoman Annette Quijano said, “It’s important to hear how this impacts your particular communities. I’m meeting with different consulates to discuss this issue. I have full faith in our Governor. Once we get this bill passed, they’ll probably have an increase in DMV workers in order to handle the applications. We should also be accepting of the LGBTIQ community. On the license, they can identify themselves to the gender they identify with.”

One of the questions asked by the press was, “What kind of provisions are there in the law that protect the immigrants?”

Quijano responded, “We’ll look at California and their law. There’s a manual and handbook that sets guidelines on what they can or cannot do. This license cannot be used for identification purposes to get federal benefits.”

Another questions pertained as to whether their driver’s licenses will look like regular driver’s licenses.

Quijano answered “If presented to someone in law enforcement, it will be coded and will identify the individual as not having a regular driver’s license.”

Mayor Diaz then added, “For Municipal ID’s, we don’t make any copies of the identification material presented to us from the applicants. It just says where you reside.”

Middlesex Water Company Subsidiary Awarded City of Perth Amboy Operation and Management Services Contract

ISELIN - Utility Service Affiliates (Perth Amboy), Inc. (USA-PA), a subsidiary of Middlesex Water Company (NASDAQ:MSEX), has been awarded a contract to operate the City of Perth Amboy’s water and sewer utilities commencing January 1, 2019 and extending through December 31, 2028. The effective date of the agreement coincides with the expiration of USA-PA’s current operating agreement with the City that has been in place for the past 20 years. Under this agreement, USA-PA will help the City realize increased operating efficiencies as USA-PA continues to provide quality service to the residents of Perth Amboy. The contract has been awarded by the City Council and is pending final execution.

“We are pleased to have been again selected to operate Perth Amboy’s water and wastewater utility systems,” said Dennis W. Doll, President of Middlesex Water Company. “We have an excellent team in place that is highly skilled in managing the water treatment and distribution system and the wastewater collection system. They are experienced with meeting challenges associated with the City’s infrastructure and are prepared to continue to help the City

navigate through an increasingly challenging and complex regulatory environment,” added Doll.

USA-PA first began operating the City’s water and wastewater utilities in January 1999 under a 20-year agreement. As the current contract was nearing expiration, the City of Perth Amboy issued requests for competitive proposals to operate the systems under a new 10-year agreement. These proposals were evaluated by an independent review committee consisting of City officials and third-party consultants. After a thorough evaluation process, USA-PA was selected as the “most complete, dependable and responsive organization” to be the City’s partner. Under the terms of this operation and management services agreement, Perth Amboy will retain ownership of its source of water supply, as well as its water treatment plant, storage, collection and distribution systems and related pumping stations. USA-PA will operate and manage the water, sewer and storm water facilities and will be paid \$67 million over the course of the ten-year contract. In addition to daily operation, these fees will cover maintenance, minor system repair costs and management of

the City’s ongoing capital improvement program. The City of Perth Amboy will manage all billing and customer service work.

Middlesex Water Company, organized in 1897, is an investor-owned water utility and is engaged in the business of collecting, treating and distributing water for domestic, commercial, industrial and fire protection purposes. The Company is skilled in all facets of water supply and distribution including water and wastewater treatment and the development and management of watershed properties. Headquartered in Iselin, NJ, Middlesex Water supplies water on a retail basis to residents in Carteret, Edison, Metuchen, South Plainfield, South Amboy, Woodbridge and portions of Clark, New Jersey. Middlesex Water sells water under wholesale contracts to the City of Rahway, the Townships of Edison and Marlboro, the Township of East Brunswick, the Borough of Highland Park and the Old Bridge Municipal Utilities Authority.

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Bus Company Woes and Abandoned Property Renewal 7/12/18 Zoning Board Meeting

PERTH AMBOY – There were two topics of discussion at the 7/12/18 Zoning Board Meeting. The first topic dealt with the vacant parking lot on Sayre Avenue where a bus company was parking their small school buses. That bus company had been brought to court several times, but their attorney was able to get their client to have their time extended to park their vehicles.

The bus company's lawyer stated that the City did not have zoning ordinances in place when that lot was placed there. He showed pictures of vehicles from the 1947 to present that have parked on that lot whose length ranged from 18.75 ft. long all the way to 19.8 ft. long. The school buses presently parked there are 19.3 ft long.

Residents in that area came up to speak who were against the parking because it encouraged homeless people to sleep in between them at night and that it

also brought down their property values.

When it came time for voting, it was decided that this matter had to be carried over to the next meeting to be held in August because the voting was 3 for and 3 against. One member of the Board had to recuse himself. The lawyer for the bus company had stated that they needed to have the full Board voting on this matter.

The second topic involved Antonio Abreu, who wanted to purchase property on Hanson Avenue, which had been abandoned and is an eyesore. He plans to build two houses on that property. People from the neighborhood came up to speak and were all for it. The existing structures have been boarded up for years which brought down their property values.

The Zoning Board voted unanimously for the project to go forward.

38.5 years, 3 Mayors (George Otlowski Sr., Joe Vas, Wilda Diaz), I'm sure Perth Amboy City Clerk Elaine Jasko could write a book on all of her experiences under 3 administrations.

Oh, how the City has changed. I don't know when they started to film City Council Meetings, but someone told me that at the Board of Education Meetings, hardly anyone showed up until they started filming them.

Jasko probably has many memories: some good and some bad, of the many people who came to the meetings to speak. You could never tell what she thought of them, because she always showed each of them respect, even though in some cases it was not reciprocated. Some of the residents she probably did enjoy were the late Richard Piatkowski and Peter Book. With Peter Book, you never knew what he was going to say, but you knew that he was going to leave everyone smiling.

Outside of City Hall, as you can see in her letter, she was a champion for Breast Cancer Awareness, especially after she survived a bout herself. I remember the first time Perth Amboy had the Breast Cancer Awareness Walk, which was partnered with Susan G. Komen for the Cure in 2009. It was so exciting to see all the people who participated. The City Clerk's Office was filled with Pink T-shirts, goodie bags, caps, etc. For this being the first time for this event, I think they were shocked at the amount of participants and sponsors. Besides local residents, there were out-of-towners, out-of-staters, and people from other countries. Many runners and walkers were there sporting T-shirts in memory of those that they lost to cancer or of cancer survivors. A good number of the participants were cancer survivors themselves. Not only were the people from City Hall involved, but, they brought many of their relatives to the event.

One year, Jasko was featured on a billboard from the neck down in a pink T-shirt as a breast cancer survivor.

I remember that former B.A. Greg Fehrenbach and former Law Director Mark Blunda ran in the race, along with their spouses and remember they live out of town. There were running teams that also participated.

I know Elaine was a big part of

making this first time City event a huge success.

After Superstorm Sandy hit, the Waterfront was damaged certain guidelines made future runs difficult to take place.

In 2013, there was the Shades of Pink Benefit at Seabra's Armory chaired by Junel Hutchinson and Diane Rappoport who at the time both worked at Alameda. This was to benefit Mary's Place by the Sea.

Hutchinson was a breast cancer survivor herself. In 2015, Elaine Jasko decided that she also wanted to help that organization because of the great work they do in helping women and their families who were going through the struggle of cancer. Elaine Jasko and Raquel Roche, her co-chair decided to have the first ever evening Pink Ribbon Gala in 2015. Elaine successfully recruited me to be a part of that committee and she wisely had on board Junel and Diane. No one could have imagined how successful the first year of that gala would be.

Last year was a little bit tough because there was an election and many people running for office. It took a lot out of everyone, but Elaine was determined that the 2017 gala would take place.

One thing about Elaine is when she wants something done and she needs your participation, it's hard to say no. When it's necessary for her to be a tough cookie, she will be. If it's in her power at all to help any organization or individual to be of support when their fighting cancer, she will do it.

I think it's because of the support system she had that makes her so willing to help others.

If you ever had the pleasure of going into Elaine's office at City Hall, you would smile from ear to ear, being surrounded by pink everywhere. She had many gifts of love that were pink given to her. I have no idea where she's going to put it all when she leaves, but I know she'll find a place for everything.

dents were glad about working through the co-op system through City Hall. We're also looking at military surplus for lighting."

City Engineer Mark Rasimowicz stated, "We're looking at the hole-in-the-wall. Glenn and I will be meeting with Conrail."

Council President Mickey Gross commented about this as well, "Mark and I met with the County and Freeholders. The County is very concerned about this. I was impressed (with what was said), and we're moving in the right direction."

Mark Rasimowicz spoke up and said, "Ridgeway Road also needs to be done."

Mickey Gross then talked about the July 3rd Fireworks which went well. "But the Boat Parade needs work. The depth of the water was too shallow." He then thanked everyone who participated.

Rasimowicz then gave a wrap up of the improvements being made throughout the City: work that was done and to be done. "The road paving was put out to bid. Utility companies will be doing part of the paving. The pedestrian bridge by the Waterfront was painted, and the company that did this was top-notch. On Bordentown Avenue, we're waiting for the utility companies to start their work. They wanted to do it in two years. The gas company put their main lines in, but still have to do some cutting. This will not happen before school starts."

B.A. Glenn Skarzynski said, "I met with some planners who would like to have a meeting with two Council Members regarding redevelopment and zoning. I also met with a grant writer

for a about an hour. We discussed potential revenue that we don't even know about in the City. It would basically deal with clean communities and civic work."

Gross then gave an update about a person who has a pigeon coup on their property. "That case will be in court soon."

B.A. Glenn Skarzynski then added, "A bench warrant was issued because the defendant didn't show up for the court date."

Skarzynski then stated, "I'm looking to replace the lights on the boardwalk with maybe LED's."

For the Business portion of the Meeting, Councilwoman Zusette Dato and Councilman Thomas Reilly were absent. During the Regular Meeting, which was held at 7 p.m., Councilwoman Dato was called by phone to participate. Reilly was absent.

During the portion of the Meeting when the Council and any other Administrators wanted to talk, Christine Noble spoke first. She complimented everyone for the great job they did who worked on the fireworks. Gross also thanked those involved in the fireworks. "It was a lot of hard work." He reiterated, "The boat parade needs work."

B.A. Glenn Skarzynski said, "Per the State, we will be replacing our video conferencing equipment and will be able to post videos and our Meetings online."

Council President Gross spoke up, "We should discuss this first."

Mayor Fred Henry then commented, "When we have this in place, (the video conferencing equipment, etc.), this will allow developers to make presentations, so the public can see this for transparency purposes."

City Engineer Mark Rasimo-

wicz then spoke about Stevens Avenue road improvements, "It was 50% funded by NJDOT with a \$500,000 grant. "This is part of the annual city-wide road paving."


During the public portion, OEM Coordinator Mark Herdman talked about an emergency drill held in the City. "We were a pilot for the County. We learned a lot and the training was done by the County. I want to thank the Fire Department, the Police Department and the Department of Public Works. We fulfilled the County's wishes."

Mayor Henry then told Mark Herdman that he also appreciated the volunteerism.

Gross also congratulated Herdman. "I went to a meeting in New Orleans, and your exercises were discussed there. You went above and beyond what was asked. Don't be surprised if you get called by other cities to talk about what was done."

Herdman then gave credit to all the volunteers who made this drill a success. "I'm only as good as them. The whole drill was done in 3 hours and 1 minute."

After the Meeting, Herdman explained, "This is a pilot program and it was based on a population of not more than 10,000. It was a drill in which South Amboy was the pilot city regarding how emergency services would respond to a bioterrorism attack. Residents will be notified by all forms of social media outlets. The antidote would first be issued to all the emergency personnel and their families first. The OEM's would then go door to door to each resident to deliver medicine. The County had a certain time frame set up from the time the attack took place until the medicine was distributed to all the residents."

This Week in World War II 75 Years Ago

In Russia, Soviet forces on July 23, 1943, continue their advance into the Orel salient. The German armies have now withdrawn to the lines held near Kursk at the start of "Operation Citadel." In Sicily, American troops take Marsala, on the island's western tip.

"Operation Gomorrah," an Allied bombing campaign over Germany, begins on July 24. In the first air raid, 746 RAF bombers drop 2,300 tons of bombs on Hamburg in 48 minutes. This tonnage is as much as the Germans dropped in the five heaviest raids on London. Fires from the raid are visible for 200 miles and burn for three days. This is the first operational use of "Window" (radar-jamming foil strips — also known as "chaff" — dropped by aircraft). In Italy, a ten-hour meeting of the Fascist Grand Council passes a motion, 19 votes to 7, asking that King Victor Emmanuel III take command of all Italian armed forces, replacing Benito Mussolini in that role. In Scandinavia, a battle-damaged USAAF B-17 Flying Fortress crash-lands in Sweden. Its 10-man crew becomes the first of nearly 1,000 American and other Allied airmen to be granted refuge in neutral Sweden during World War II.

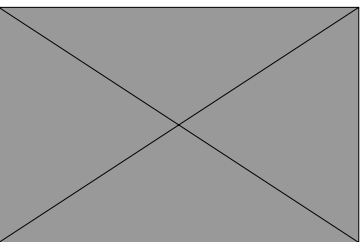
On July 25, Benito Mussolini is arrested by order of Italian King Victor Emmanuel III; Marshal Pietro Badoglio, a hero of "The Great War," becomes prime minister. Badoglio introduces martial law and incorporates the Fascist militia into Italy's regular armed forces. Caught by surprise by the Italian moves (having just met with *il Duce* six days earlier and gotten no hint of Mussolini's weakening position), Hitler orders German divisions rushed south into Italy to disarm their former allies. In Sicily, Allied forces face stiff resistance as they approach Messina, on the island's northeast corner.

Newly appointed Italian Prime Minister Pietro Badoglio excludes all Fascists from his cabinet and on July 26 dissolves the Fascist Party. In Berlin, the German High Command orders a number of *Waffen-SS* (Armed-SS) divisions to be transferred from Russia to Italy, but only the 1st SS Panzer Division is actually redeployed. In Washington, D.C., a federal grand jury indicts eight expatriate Americans, including the poet Ezra Pound, on charges of treason for making pro-Fascist broadcasts from Axis countries.

On July 27, the Badoglio government transfers Mussolini — now a prisoner — from Rome to the Island of Ponza, one of the Pontine Islands in the Tyrrhenian Sea, about 20 miles offshore and roughly midway between Rome and Naples. The German High Command quickly develops a three-pronged strategy regarding Italy. The Germans will: liberate Mussolini; occupy Rome and the rest of Italy; and capture the Italian fleet. In Sicily, heavy fighting continues. German Gen. Albert Kesselring — Commander-in-Chief, South — orders preparations for the evacuation of the island.

A second air raid on Hamburg, Germany, by 722 RAF bombers on July 28 results in nine square miles of the city being set ablaze. The resulting firestorm generates winds of 150 miles per hour at temperatures to 800°F and kills 44,600 civilians. President Roosevelt announces the end of coffee rationing in the U.S. The limitation was in effect for about eight months, primarily due to the torpedoing by German submarines of vessels carrying coffee from Brazil.

As a result of the recent Allied bombings, the German government on July 29 orders the mass evacuation of civilians from Hamburg. Over one million people begin leaving the city. In the United Kingdom, the government announces that all women under 50 years of age must register for war work.



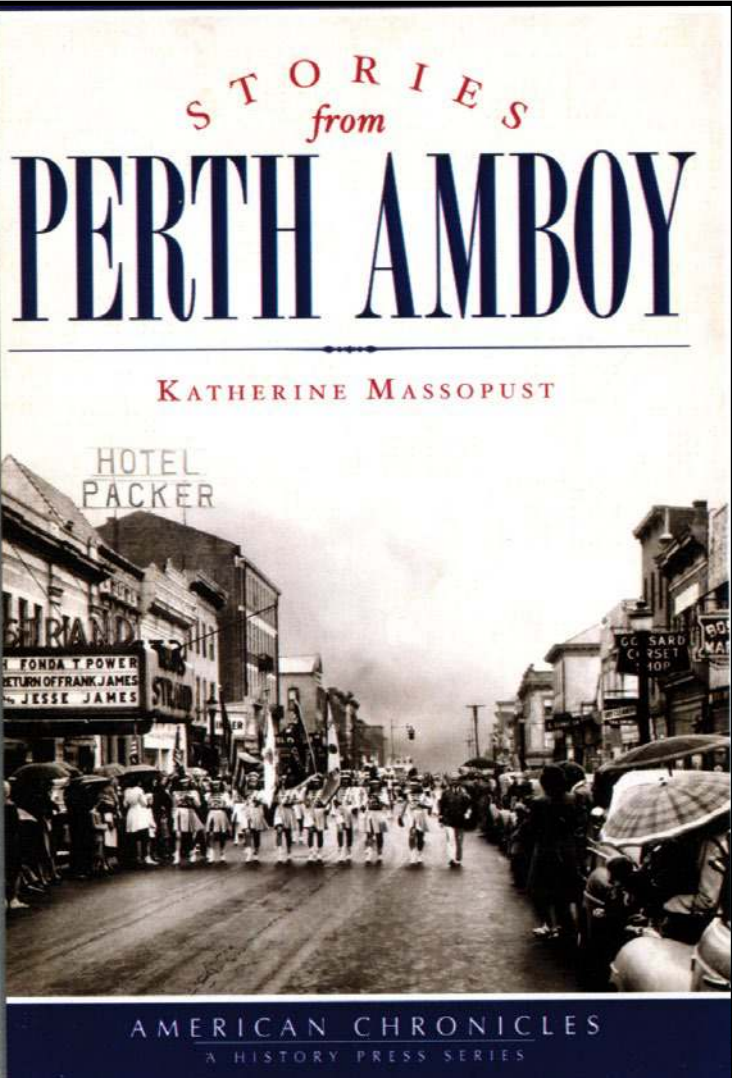

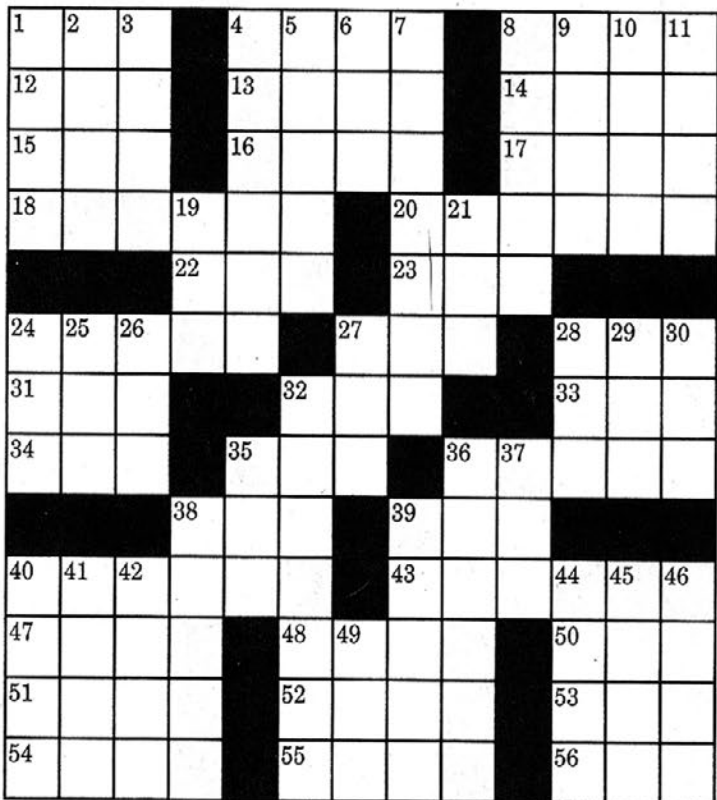
