Perth Amboy Memorializes the 17th Anniversary of 9-11 with 9/11 Survivor Trees are Donated to the City of Perth Amboy Press Release 9/11/18

PERTH AMBOY – The service and the ceremonial tree planning honored the service of our first responders and remember the loss of two Perth Amboy community members, Isaias Rivera and Richard Rodriguez will be held with community members.

"This day will always be a time of contemplation, a time to gather and pay respect to those men and women who were affected by the 9/11 attacks. There were families in Perth Amboy that were tragically affected and suffered a great loss of their loved ones. This year we dedicate two 9-11 Survivor Trees donated by the 9/11 Memorial & Museum to our lost loved ones for a continuing remembrance," said Mayor Wilda Diaz.

ABOUT THE 9-11 SURVIVOR TREE: A Callery pear tree became known as the "Survivor Tree" after enduring the September 11, 2001 terror attacks at the World Trade Center. In October 2001, the tree was discovered at Ground Zero severely damaged, with snapped roots and burned and broken branches. The tree was removed from the rubble and placed in the care of the New York City Department of Parks and Recreation. After its recovery and rehabilitation, the tree was returned to the Memorial in 2010. New, smooth limbs extended from the gnarled stumps, creating a visible demarcation between the tree's past and present. Today, the tree stands as a living reminder of resilience, survival and rebirth.

The Survivor Tree embodies our nation's spirit of hope and healing, strength and resilience in the wake of the 9/11 attacks. Each year, the 9/11 Memorial gives seedlings from the Survivor Tree to three communities that have endured tragedy in recent years. The Survivor Tree seedling program was launched on September 11, 2013, in partnership with Bartlett Tree Experts, of Stamford, Conn., and John Bowne High School in the Flushing neighborhood of Queens. The following communities have committed to nurturing these trees to serve as landmarks symbolizing resiliency and hope.

There's a reason for an evacuation, and you are fortunate when you were told ahead of time. Can you imagine what those people felt like this past weekend in Boston when out of the blue their lives were turned around when in a split second they were told to run because their houses may explode at any second. Where do you run to when all of a sudden all around you is chaos, fire, and smoke?

As you can see by looking at the four pictures, the second one is where people were warned about the impending devastation of Hurricane Florence.

The first, third, and fourth photos show disasters where people had no idea what was to transpire in the next few seconds.

We get it where people are afraid to abandon their properties because of looters or vandals. I know they probably have in the back of their mind that perhaps the forecasters are alarmists or that the weather pattern will change suddenly.

Authorities can do just so much when protecting your properties. Remember, Emergency Responders also may live in those same danger zones.

Everyone should have an emergency envelope or small strongbox with any documentation such as your advanced directive, birth certificates, etc., or any document that is hard to replace. Important documents should be in a place of easy access to take in case of emergency.

You should have a plan in case everyone in your household is not home if you have to leave

Pay Stations, Road Paving, **Kushner Properties Discussed**

9/10/18 Caucus & 9/12/18 Council Meeting

PERTH AMBOY - At the for this program, "These two 9/10/18 Caucus Meeting, Interim B.A. Greg Fehrenbach gave a presentation regarding the Park by License Plate Program. He began by telling the Council, "Bids were received and reviewed. The person who was the low bidder for the pay stations agreed to extend the time to bid on contracts. The pay stations will be located on Smith Street by the corner of Madison Avenue and New Brunswick Avenue and another at State and Hobart Streets. Users of a credit card will incur a convenience fee. Coins will also be accepted. The pilot will be in use for two months. The coin, bill, and credit card machines will be associated with 21 to 25 spaces. The program is supposed to be from October 15th thru December 15th. You (the Council) will decide in January if you want them. It will be by license plates. Park by cell or mobile is currently being used in 700 cities in the U.S. There is no money in the meter or pay stations. You can download an APP and buy time using a credit card. There will be a cost no more than \$1000 to use the machines for the two months of the pilot. There will be material distributed that will be bilingual for a two-week period for people to get familiar with these machines. We have the lowest parking rate in the state."

Councilman Pabon asked, "Is there any data on how the current parking of a two-hour parking limit is working out?"

Fehrenbach had no information regarding this, but he did state that a person would get a 15-minute warning when time was running out on your parking space. "And you can punch in more time through your cell phone." He also said, "The limits on parking time were changed by ordinance when I wasn't here. This program will be based by zones. The only changes that will be made are the ones I will be mentioning," Fehrenbach stated.

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez had a few remarks, "I'm advocating for parking time limits that best serve each area of the City."

Fehrenbach responded, "We can reach out to the UEZ about time limit changes. In some towns, people who have handicapped placards pay for 2 hours of parking at metered spaces, and then they can park there the whole day. Those towns are thinking about making it for 8 hours maximum to park."

Fehrenbach responded to the question by Council President Bill Petrick as to why there are two different types of machines

machines are what were available at the time. They are due to arrive by October 15, 2018. The machines are cellular. We will remove the parking heads (from some of the present meters) and move them to needed places. The bid is for 30 machines."

Petrick then asked, "Will there be a warning to indicate if and when your time runs out and if and when you can continue to park at that same spot when your time runs out."

Councilman Helmin Caba then stated, "We have to make sure data is not sold to a third party for marketing reasons."

Councilman Fernando Irizarry drew a chuckle from the crowd when he stated, "If we do sell information, do we get a cut?"

Fehrenbach said he would get back to the Council about that.

There was a question regarding R-384-9/18 regarding NJ-DOT Road Rehab and Improvements Rebid (High and Fayette Streets, Intersection and Zambory Street) in an amount not to exceed \$236,272.39. Contract to Z Brothers.

Irizarry asked, "What's going on with Rector Street (Kushner Properties) from Fayette to Washington Street?

City Engineer Jeffery Rauch came up and answered, "There's finally an agreement for grant money to bid on this area of Rector Street. I would rather start in the Spring of 2019 after the bad weather has passed. We have contacted the Utility Companies of upcoming road work."

Fehrenbach spoke up and said, "There is a dispute going on regarding road paving."

During the public portion, Resident Ken Balut came up to speak about the Kushner Properties, "He (Kushner) bought two pieces of properties in other towns, but no one holds him accountable. Look at the bond money given back to him on uncompleted work. "Balut then mentioned, "Jersey City is standing up to Kushner.'

Resident David Caba came up with a couple questions regarding Kushner, "Where is their contract? Balut is correct. Jersey City is standing up to Kushner. We should stand up to Kushner even if he threatens to sue you. Put out a bid to contractors that will improve the Kushner properties. The Jersey City Mayor told Kushner to use all the attorneys you want." Caba then told the Council, "I'm going to look at (last 5 year) comparisons between properties that were sold at Jersey City's Waterfront compared to properties sold at the Rector Street Properties (Land-





Mayor Diaz Questions Council President's Ability to Serve Perth Amboy

Letter Notifies Residents of Prejudices and Misogynistic Views Displayed on Social Media

Press Release 9/13/18

PERTH AMBOY – Mayor Wilda Diaz releases a letter to the residents of Perth Amboy with regards to the improper conduct and views (demonstrated in the attachments) of Council President William Petrick.

OPEN LETTER TO PERTH AMBOY RESIDENTS

My administration has always been committed to fostering an environment that is safe, secure and free from ethnic, sexual and gender-based discrimination and harassment, sexual violence, and other related misconduct. It is why I write this letter, with great disappointment, to the residents in the City of Perth Amboy to make you all aware

of the alarming and deeply disrespectful views and behavior of the City Council President William Petrick.

Council President Petrick's Facebook page has shown his views, undermining the value of women, his non-democratic views and discriminatory views of the immigrant population. Those postings have since been removed from his Facebook page, but have been recorded and are still circulating on social media, damaging the reputation of our city, as a welcoming city to all of our residents.

As Mayor, I am deeply disappointed that an elected official who represents a diverse urban municipality, expresses such

blatant prejudices and misogynist views against women, on social media. Such behavior is unbecoming of any public official. It is disrespectful to the residents he is supposed to serve

Over the years I have experienced, and unfortunately, have grown accustomed to the heightened level of misogyny demonstrated against me from other male elected officials. Moriarty, Schaer & Quijano Bill Banning Ghost Guns, 3-D Plastic Firearms in NJ Advances in Assembly

If Enacted, New Jersey Would Have the Strongest Law in the Nation

TRENTON – No Ghost Guns.
No 3-D Firearms. And no purchasing any component used in making either of these weapons.
Legislation banning the manufacturing of any untraceable or covert firearm was approved by the Assembly Judiciary Committee Monday.

The bill (A-3129)- sponsored by Assembly Democrats Paul Moriarty, Gary Schaer and Annette Quijano - would make it illegal to purchase firearm parts for the purpose of unlawfully manufacturing firearms without a serial number and to manufacture or possess covert or undetectable firearms and 3-D printed firearms.

"Instead of making it harder

for criminals to obtain weapons, new technology and mail-order kits are only making it easier for criminals to manufacture firearms at home," said Moriarty (D- Camden and Gloucester). "Our only recourse is to arm our court system with additional penalties for those who choose to skirt the law, avoid licensure and manufacture these types of firearms to keep or even to sell. We're saying no to ghost guns, and no to 3-D firearms. Not in New Jersey."

The bill makes it a 3rd degree crime to: (1) manufacture, cause to be manufactured, transport, ship, sell, or dispose of any covert or undetectable firearm; (2) possess any covert or undetectable firearm; or (3) possess a

firearm enclosed in a container or covering that is designed or modified to allow the firearm to be fired while so enclosed and that disguises or obscures the shape of the firearm such that it does not resemble a handgun, rifle, shotgun or machine gun.

"An untraceable and undetectable weapon is a nightmare for our police community," said Schaer (D-Bergen and Passaic). "We may not be able to end this trend of covert weapons as quickly as we'd like, but we must increase penalties and ensure our law enforcement have the ability to prosecute criminals who evade existing gun laws."

A covert firearm is a gun that

resembles, but not limited to, a key-chain, pen, cigarette package, cellphone, smart phone, wallet, or cane. An undetectable firearm is constructed entirely of non-metal substances, or one that does not include one major component.

"New technology and the make-it-at-home kits are making it way too easy for guns to get into the wrong hands," said Quijano (D-Union). "This bill sends the appropriate message: New Jersey will not stand for it. If a person manufactures or possesses a ghost gun, or 3-D printed weapon or even buys the parts to make them, there will be additional penalties if

A violation of this bill's provisions is not to merge with any other criminal conviction. The court is to impose separate sentences for each criminal offense.

A crime of the third degree is punishable by a term of incarceration of three years to five years, a fine up to \$15,000.

The bill will now be considered for a floor vote by the Assembly Speaker.

ings). Do you think you want to have a potential buyer in the City to look at Rector Street by the Kushner properties? That part of Rector Street hasn't been touched in 12 years. Rebid this property to make it more attractive."

Fehrenbach responded to some of these comments, "In 2013, the Council made a decision to say no to the Kushner modifications to Landings. There was a \$100 million lawsuit that we defended. Rauch (City Engineer) worked with Gershwin (One of the Representatives from Kushner Properties) to complete Phase 1 improvements. The work was stopped because of agreement terms and NJDOT funding. Kushner should pay for the properties, but in 2013 negotiations broke down."

Resident Alan Silber spoke next, "I remember when the directors used to come to the meetings. The Wilentz School has over 1000 students and we want high density? Maybe we can get 1800 students in there. Smaller classrooms are better for kids. We are Number 6 in high density."

Fehrenbach replied to the statement regarding some directors not being here, "I told Walensky (Parking Utility Manager) he didn't have to be here for the Pay Station pilot program because I had all the information needed to answer any questions the Council may have."

Resident Jeremy Baratta came up to speak and questioned, "What firm handled the Kushner lawsuit? What was the amount? And why weren't the issues resolved?"

Fehrenbach answered, "It was McManimon, Scotland & Baumann. The lead attorney for the City was at the time William Northgate. (Northgate left when DeCotiis came in.) I don't know who the Kushner's law firm was for the suit. It took more than a year, and it was \$20,000+ for the cost. As of today, I am unaware of any resolution. The former B.A. Peter Pelissier said that they were in negotiations when he arrived."

Baratta then stated, "All a person has to do is look up a docket number."

Fehrenbach said, "I can do that"

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez then spoke up, "DeCotiis settled because Kushner was supposed to get what he requested (The deal he made with some of the Landings Residents)

Council President Bill Petrick concluded the discussion. "Kushner is in negotiations with redevelopment about new buildings."

During the 9/12/18 Council Meeting, the discussion on the Kushner properties on Rector Streets specifically continued.

Resident and Businessman David Caba asked, "Where is the Rector Street bids for street repairs?"

Councilman Fernando Irizarry responded, "Rector Street will not be done until the spring of 2019."

Caba then continued, "Something was said last year about making repairs to Rector Street. How many explanations do we need as to why repairs are being delayed?"

Irizarry indicated, "I don't like it any more than you about the continued delays on repairing Rector Street." Caba continued and talked about having to get state grants to repair Rector Street, "It's been 12 years, and Kushner has the money. He should fix the street."

Council President Bill Petrick then remarked, "The reason Kushner is rich is because he doesn't want to spend his own money."

Resident Alan Silber came up, "It's been one year since you passed a resolution regarding repairing Rector Street. We put liens against all kinds of properties but nothing on Kushner's. Who plows Rector Street (Kushner's portion)?"

Fehrenbach answered, "I assume the City."

Silber then pleaded to the Council, "Just tell the truth."

Petrick responded, "We can only react on what the administration tells us."

Silber then continued, "The only money that didn't come through for road repairs is Rector Street."

Fehrenbach responded, "I'm only telling you what I know is true. The funding source came through from the State of New Jersey. We had to wait for outside funding to come through for the water meters. Funding was authorized by the Council. There was insufficient time to add Rector Street for this year."

Silber repeated himself, "The only money that didn't come through was for Rector Street."

David Caba came up to speak during the last public portion with information comparing properties that were sold near the Jersey City Waterfront versus the Perth Amboy Waterfront. One of the comparisons was the Landings property whose original selling price was listed for \$440,000. In subse-

quent years, it dropped down to \$154,000. The last sale price was \$140,000. In comparison a property on the Jersey City Waterfront which was listed for \$750,000 and sold for \$805,000."

Council President Bill Petrick responded, "Jersey City Properties have a water view of Manhattan."

Caba responded, "Rector Street should sell for at least close to what they were bought for. Why is our beautiful Waterfront not thriving? Other houses in town are selling at higher rates. We need a new Mayor or administration."

Councilman Joel Pabon questioned, "Why is Kushner still in this town, period? Why is the Mayor permitting this? She needs to stop holding his hands."

Fehrenbach responded, "Kushner owns the property. As long as they continue to pay their taxes, we cannot throw them out."

Council President Bill Petrick responded that the City has been laxed in enforcing infractions on Kushner.

Jeremy Baratta came up to



speak and asked if anyone ever heard about eminent domain. "Can't PARA issue a redevelopment ordinance? The Administration has to be motivated to do so. If I pulled a lawbook, I could find a way to address this problem. An expert on municipal law could find a way to remove Kushner. I don't believe nothing could be done to solve that neglected property."

Silber came up to speak about the Kushner properties. He stated that one of the small townhouses on Front Street by Bayside Creamery sold for \$330,000. We can't get that street paved (Rector Street by Landings portion)? The Landing are selling for half that price. In 2012, the Mayor had all these women politicians support her in a rally held at City Hall Circle because someone offended her. When it was time to get reelected, she knew what to do. Can you imagine buying at the Landings for \$400,000.

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez was absent at the 9/12/18 Council Meeting.

your business' accounting system. Here's how:

The basic difference lies in when you can book revenue and expense. One method (cash) is based upon when you actually receive or make payment. While the accrual method allows capturing this same information when there is an established obligation.

• Separate your books. If starting a business from scratch, remember to set up separate bank accounts and recordkeeping. IRS auditors are quick to disallow expenses when your business expenses are mingled together with personal expenses. The same is true with credit cards. Use a separate credit card for your business transactions.

• Use sub-ledgers. Well-run businesses understand the need to organize elements of their business into accounting categories. These categories often use their own reporting system called sub-ledgers. Common areas are sales, accounts receivable, accounts payable, fixed assets, and inventory.

• Honor cash flow. Often success or failure of your business is predicated on whether you have enough cash to pay your bills. Determining your cash needs means understanding the cash situation of your business. To do this requires a good set of records. This includes recording your current situation on a timely basis and establishing a forecast of cash needs throughout the year.

• Create a fortress balance sheet. Banks love a strong balance sheet. If you think your business may need money for expansion, you will want to focus on developing a strong balance sheet that is low in debt and high in liquid assets like cash and accounts receivable. The irony here is that it's easy to borrow money when your records show you don't need it and it's hard to borrow money when you do need the funds.

• Identify financial pressure points. Every business has a few financial items that drive profitability. Do you know yours? It might be payroll in a labor-intensive business. It might be rent in a retail establishment. Perhaps your margins are low because of heavy promotional costs. A strong accounting system will help you stay focused on the more important financial elements of your business.

• **Understand seasonality.** By setting up a good accounting system AND forecasting performance over a twelve-month period, you will understand the true needs of your business. This is especially important if your business is seasonal in nature.

Remember, by spending time setting up the accounting system that is right for you, you are increasing your business' chance for success.

This Week in World War II 75 Years Ago

The Germans on September 17, 1943, begin withdrawing from Salerno, Italy, as elements of the British Eighth Army join forces with British and U.S. troops in the Salerno beachhead. On the Eastern Front, Soviet forces capture Bryansk, Russia, and Berdyansk, Ukraine, both on the Sea of Azov.

The Germans on September 18 transfer 25,800 men from Sardinia to Italy via the French island of Corsica, abandoning strategic airfields to the British and the Americans. In Paris, the mass deportation of French Jews begins, with 1,150 shipped by railroad to the Buchenwald concentration camp near Weimar,

Now equipped with electronic monitoring devices, improved anti-aircraft guns and acoustic torpedoes, German U-boat packs on September 19 resume operations against Allied convoys in the North Atlantic. In London, the British Air Ministry says that Hamburg, Germany, the target of concentrated air raids over eight days and seven nights in July and August, now lies in absolute ruins and represents "probably the most complete blotting out of a city that ever happened." In the raids, 42,600 people were killed, 37,000 were injured and over 215,000 houses and homes were destroyed, as well as 183 large factories and 4,118 smaller workplaces.

Allied forces approach Naples, Italy, on September 20. On Papua-New Guinea, the Battle of Kaiapit ends in an Allied victory, preventing the Japanese from threatening Lae or the expanding Allied airbase at Nadzab.

On the evening of September 21, Australian commandos, entering Singapore harbor by canoe, sink two Japanese troop transports. On the Eastern Front, the Soviet 43rd Army captures Demidov, in western Russia.

In northern Norway on September 22, six British X-class midget submarines attack and damage the German battleship Tirpitz at Kåfjorden, northern Norway. The damage puts the battleship out of action for six months. Wilhelm Kube, the Nazi governor of German-occupied Belorussia is assassinated in his office in Minsk by a time-bomb placed by his maid, a secret member of the Russian anti-Nazi Partisans. In retaliation, the SS executes over 1,000 male residents of Minsk. The Huon Peninsula Campaign — a series of battles fought in northeastern Papua-New Guinea — begins.

In Italy on September 23, the British Eighth Army's 78th Division advances from Bari towards Foggia, 82 miles to the northwest, and the important airfield there. Liquidation of the Jewish ghetto of Lithuania's capital, Vilnius, begins with the removal of 5,000 people who are shipped to the Majdanek concentration camp, outside of Lublin in Occupied Poland.






