Budget Questions, Road Repairs, and Keeping History Alive

6/10/19 Caucus

By: Carolyn Maxwell PERTH AMBOY – Business Administrator Frederick Carr informed the Council that there were two title changes in the Office of the Mayor and Deputy Prosecutor (in the Court System). He referred to Ordinance No. 5 – An Ordinance to amend an ordinance entitled Ordinance fixing and establishing a schedule of salaries and salary ranges and increments for officers and employees of the City of Perth Amboy. (nonunion and management)

After Carr spoke, Councilman Fernando Irizarry referenced R-255-6/19 – Certifying to the Middlesex County Board of Taxation a local tax levy in the amount of \$26,414,828 for the 2019-2020 Perth Amboy School Budget/General funds. Irizarry requested the tax levy for the school budget for the last 3-4 years.

Attorney Peter King spoke next explaining R-256-6/19 authorizing a contract with Jasinski, P.C., as investigator in the personnel matter in an amount not to exceed \$9,500. "This is because we need an investigator who will get facts regarding a lawsuit involving two City Employees."

Business Administrator Carr then talked about R-261-6/19 – Authorizing the use of contracts with approved Omnia Partners Government Purchasing Alliance National Co-op Vendors. "This is for a video camera and software supplies for the Police Department." Carr then talked about R-265-6/19 - The NJDOT Grant for local aid for 2020 road improvements for several streets off of Convery Boulevard. He explained that the DOT looks at the traffic volume when deciding on streets that need improvement.

Council President Bill Petrick stated, "There are other streets in much worse condition than Sayre Avenue."

Department of Public Works Director Frank Hoffman came up to give more details, "I have a list of over 20 streets that need work done."

Councilman Fernando Irizarry then spoke up and asked if the end of Fayette Street at the intersection of Center Street is on the list.

Hoffman answered, "Yes, but there are some streets that will cost much more to repair. High and Fayette Street will be worked on the day after school ends"

B.A. Carr then talked about R-268-6/19 - A release of performance guarantees, cash bonds in the amount of \$218,340.00 and planning/escrows in the amount of

\$2,369.30 to Buckeye partners for 380 Maurer Road.

Car explained that this is the refund from up-front money that was paid for the escrow and cash bonds.

DPW Director Frank Hoffman came up to explain Resolution R-268 thru R-273 which dealt with purchasing of equipment for Public Works. He explained that one of the purchases would be for a payloader which is over 20 years old. "There is a second payloader which is 7 years old and has a warranty that has expired. Then, there is a frontend loader on a garbage truck that

Residential Parking Discussed in South Amboy 6/5/19 Business Meeting

By: Joseph L. Kuchie SOUTH AMBOY - The city of South Amboy is working on an ordinance to help residents with parking near their homes.

The discussion began following public comments from resident Brian Murphy, who attended the business meeting to address his concerns about the four-hour parking signs near his home on Henry Street. His concerns about being ticketed grew after a police officer told him that he could technically be ticketed for parking in those spots if his car was there for over four hours, even if he was a registered resident.

"I think it needs to be worded better or residents should have a right to park there without having to move during the day," Murphy said. "I think there's got to be a better way so people can have people over, so residents aren't getting ticketed."

Business Administrator Glenn Skarzynski told Mr. Murphy that one of his neighbors on Henry Street visited him with a similar complaint, and that the city was working on a plan to fix the problem.

"We're working on a concept for resident parking permits and re-visiting the times for parking on various streets," Skarzynski said. "We're trying to be very careful because when we do this we have to do a pretty comprehensive parking ordinance because the balance we have to strike is making sure people in neighborhoods with no driveways have adequate street parking, and that those available spaces aren't being taking up by commuters."

"There's no secret that parking is at a premium in the city," he continued. "By being able to clearly identify residents and their guests, it will be easier for the police to do their job without catching a law abiding and tax paying citizen in a net and have them unnecessarily inconvenienced."

"The short answer is we're working on a plan, it's just a little complicated," he added. "I want to make sure we do it once, we do it right, and we address the problem to everyone's satisfaction."

Skarzynski told Murphy that he is aiming to have an ordinance for the council to review within six weeks.

All council members were in attendance for the business meeting. The next city council meeting will be held on June 19 at 7:00 p.m.

Several Issues Remain Unsolved

6/12/19 Council Meeting

PERTH AMBOY – During the public portion on Agenda Items, Resident Stanley Sierakowski questioned Resolution R-262-6/19 thru R-264-6/19 which dealt with installment payments on certain properties (residential and commercial). He questioned whether the properties had to pay interest on installment agreements.

Council President William Petrick responded, "Yes."

Sierakowski then suggested, "You should treat these entities just like the rich. You fixed the Armory's bulkhead and they paid no interest on the over \$480,000 they owed. The people (from Resolution R-262-R-264) will be paying the

interest on the sewer work being done on their property."

Resident Ken Balut came up next. He asked if Councilman Fernando Irizarry received the information which he requested regarding the school tax levy (for the last 3 years). He then questioned Communication No. 17 where the Mayor notified the Council Members, Department Heads, and Directors that she is appointing Irving Lozada as Acting Director of the Department of Code Enforcement effective May 28, 2019.

Balut stated, "The Mayor can't keep extending this appointment. You (the Council) have to vote on it. Did Lozada file a report on the latest incidents? He (Lozada) was turned

down by Civil Services for other jobs he's not qualified for." Balut then questioned R-259-6/19 which dealt with authorizing an agreement with Hold Harmless with Harbortown to locate a summer lunch program during the period from July 1st through August 31st, 2019. The Harbortown Developer is not giving any money for Fun Day. There was also supposed to be a pool built (in the complex)."

Council President Petrick stated that there is a pool, but it's only for members who pay extra money.

Balut continued, "This doesn't make any sense." He then questioned again, "What's the levy on School Board Taxes? How much did it go up?"

Business Administrator Frederick Carr responded, "I sent the information to the Council."

Resident Alan Silber came up next and also referenced Communication No. 17. He told the Council, "You have a duty. I don't think the Mayor knows the City Codes. Irving was appointed Acting Code Enforcement Director. After 90 days, he can only be appointed by the Mayor with the Council's consent."

Petrick responded, "The Mayor has skirted the issue and we may have to take her to court."

Silber continued, "If there is no resolution, then you can't vote on it."

Law Director Peter King responded, "It was on the agenda






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Fireworks Spectacular over Raritan Bay Honors America's **Patriots and Celebrates Independence Day**

Recently, a redevelopment proposal was put before the City Council for the Eagleswood-Celotex Site. It did not include archaeology of this very rich historic land.

Many of the mid-19th Century progressive thinkers, visited, lived or worked at Eagleswood......including Henry David Thoreau, Ralph Waldo Emerson, the Grimke Sisters, Theodore Weld, Louis Comfort Tiffany, William Page, George Inness, Horace Greeley, Gerritt Smith, Elizabeth Peabody, Susan B. Anthony, William Cullen Bryant, Bronson & Louis May Alcott, Edward Kemeys, Frederick Law Olmsted, Alexander

Jackson Davis, Civil War Hero Admiral Farragut, Mrs. John Brown, Arnold Buffum, the Spring Family and numerous

Below the surface ground, the 1854 brownstone foundations of the Eagleswood Phalanx still exist. You can see part of these foundations in my film documentary entitled "George Inness: Peace & Plenty In Perth Amboy". We need to learn more about this important structure.

I ask the Perth Amboy City Council to please require the redeveloper of this historic land to perform archaeology before the site is built upon. That is, the redeveloper must contract with a professional archaeology firm. Our City Council has the ability to make this a conditional requirement. Right now, the City Council has a choice before it: The City Council can either document our rich history......or simply have it erased.

Holocaust: Days of Remembrance, City Hall, Perth Amboy 6/4/19

















Holocaust: Days of Remembrance Ceremony 6/4/19

By: Katherine Massopust PERTH AMBOY - The Holocaust Days of Remembrance Ceremony are celebrated nationally since 1979 and has been officially been observed in Perth Amboy for the last 8 years under the leadership of Mayor Wilda Diaz. The ceremony includes an Israeli Flag Raising and speakers who were Holocaust survivors. At one time, there was a large Jewish population in Perth Amboy. The purpose of the Days of Remembrance is to raise awareness and educate people by hearing first hand accounts from those who suffered the atrocities of the Ho-

locaust. Perth Amboy observed the Holocaust: Days of Remembrance this year on June 4th. The ceremony began with the raising of the Israeli flag in City Hall Circle and was followed by an observance ceremony in City Council Chambers which included speakers Holocaust Survivors Adela Froiman and Sabina Taubenfeld.

Herschel Chomsky offered a few words. He referenced recent violent attacks on Jews (in many places in the world) that still occur today. "We received a warning from the German government not to wear Yamakas in public. I say, "No." I wear my Yamaka every day. Of all places, to say it. This day is important. The Holocaust will be taught everywhere to people of any religion, any nationality. We'll overcome this. It hurts me to say we have to continually say this. It's unimaginable what they (the Holocaust victims) had to go through."

Fire and Police Chaplain Gregory Pabon gave the invoca-

tion. He thanked everyone who made the ceremony possible. He especially thanked High School Teacher Rachel Wittenberg who arranged for students to be here and film the ceremony to learn what this is all about.

Mayor Wilda Diaz welcomed everyone including members of the Lakewood Community who with the help of the local Jewish Community and the staff of Days of Remembrance across the country. "They host observance ceremonies for their community. I believe the most important part of the observance is to listen to the living testimony here. I want to hear directly from you. We cannot tolerate injustice. We have to be courageous to stand up for what's right."

Diaz then gave a proclamation to the two guest speakers: Adela Froiman and Sabina Taubenfeld, who are sisters who were born in Minsk Mazowieck, Poland.

There was a candle-lighting ceremony to honor the Holocaust victims led by Herschel Chomsky and Mayor Diaz. Some of the attendees participated in the ceremony.

Moti (Marc) Lieberman came up to speak. He explained how he works to keep the memory of the Holocaust alive and to tell the world the stories of the survivors. He then stated that Germany has released the documents of those who were occupied in concentration camps. He passed around a card which had his mother's father's (maternal grandfather) photo and exact details of his features that the Nazis had. "The document came in the mail. They have an account of every inmate." Lieberman continued, "My eyes are still red."

He then introduced the two guest speakers.

Sabina Taubenfeld spoke first. She explained how everyone in her family including her father, two older brothers, one sister, her grandfather, and greatgrandfather that only the two sisters survived the Holocaust. "I was 17 years old in 1939. We had a ghetto. All had to stay in the ghetto, wear the Star of David. We couldn't go to school. We had to take in all kinds of relatives."

Adele Froiman spoke next, "Our father had a bakery. We got along with the Jewish and non-Jewish residents. In 1942, they made us go to the ghetto. We took gold, cash, and money to take with us (what they could). My parents, two brothers and my sister – they (the Nazis) took everything. Everyone was taken to the ghetto. One Saturday morning we were going to work, and we were shipped to Treblinka (an extermination camp built and operated by Nazi Germany in occupied Poland)." Froiman stated, They killed all of them."

Lieberman then passed around a photo of 16 friends. Froiman then added, "Only two of the people in the photo survived. One girl is in Israel, now."

Taubenfeld stated, "For a period of time, I was separated from my sister."

Froiman stated, "Everyday, there was an inspection. I covered myself with a blanket. I kept washing myself. I washed my hair with coffee. I was always hungry. It was hard times. We used to work every day cutting wood and took it back to camp."

Taubenfeld stated, "I wanted to go to Germany to be a maid, but I was young. I said I was 17, but I wasn't. I was 14 years old. I had some money and signed up. The lady in charge said I was Jewish. I said "No." I was Polish. We were sent to a Warsaw ghetto. I saw people with diseases. Two or three weeks before they destroyed the Warsaw ghetto - they burned it down. I saw the smoke and got away - with a little bit of luck, too. On June 5th, they destroyed our place. It was a Saturday. They (the Nazis) came. We ran

and kept running."
Froiman stated, "Bullets were all over the place. One bullet – a piece of it hit me. I had a small infection. I didn't think much about it. A boy showed us - there was a round cage - a place to hide. It locked from the inside. When they (the Nazis) came, the little boy came by. The German asked the boy if he knows how to open it. He said, "No." Outside, one girl was screaming, "I am not Jewish!" The Nazi shot her. At night, we got up, we gave another girl jewelry and asked her if there is a place to hide. There was me and another little girl, too. She took us to the place. It was a basement underneath a porch."

Taubenfeld said, "It was a very poor family. We stayed there 18 months in the cellar. It was full of rats. There were 4 of us. It was horrible. We never put on the heat. It was such a small place."

Froiman stated, "We laid underneath the porch. She (the owner) was very poor. It was bad as a cage. She had 2 daughters in Warsaw. We heard the

woman was pregnant from a man in another town. She had a little boy with him. They killed him. She couldn't go anyplace. She had a gentleman. Her husband was in Warsaw. Jewish women in the Polish Underground looked Polish - not Jewish. She came to visit us and brought us food, money, and tried to help us. She knew people needed help. We spent 18 months under the porch. After the war was over, we came out. I couldn't walk. I was like a baby. I had to learn how to walk. They asked me where do you want to go? We went to live in the town we were born in. It took 3 months to learn to walk again."

Froiman stated, "I went to visit her every day.'

Taubenfeld said. "I now have 2 daughters and 4 grandchil-

Froiman said, "I now have 3 daughters and 8 grandchildren."

Taubenfeld was sent from Germany to orphanage and she came to America. She came to the USA in 1947. "I had no family there. I lived in St. Paul Minnesota."

Froiman came to Montreal, Canada and stayed there for 4 years. "My sister did not want to come to Canada, so I came

Both sisters want people to learn about the Holocaust. "It can happen to anybody. Love each other. It is important."

The ceremony concluded with a hymn and a Benediction.

Marc Lieberman mentioned the book, "The Pit and the Trap: A Chronicle of Survival" by Leyb Rochman stating all should read that book.

da), but the Council President asked that it be taken off."

Petrick then spoke up, "There were resolutions (appointing Lozada) that were put on agendas twice, but it was not put on this agenda, so it's a no-vote."

Silber continued, "You (the Council) can't hide from this, and you should be outraged."

Law Director King then told the Council, "You will have to give an advise and consent and a reason on why you vote on a resolution."

Resident and Businesswoman Sharon Hubberman came up again and referenced R-280 -6/19 - Authorizing an application to the New Jersey Local Finance Board for the dissolution of the Perth Amboy Redevelopment Agency pursuant to State Statute. She stated, "The biggest issue (regarding PARA is the way it is outfitted and appointments without the Advise and Consent of the Council. The law says the Mayor can appoint one person to PARA. The Council appoints the other members. PARA needs a vision, a plan, and growth, that they need to accomplish. We have a fractured entity. To start PARA over again, you may have to meet financial qualifications: an asset to debt ratio also needs to be looked at."

After the Public Portion was closed, Business Administrator Frederick Carr referenced

R-281-6/19 which pertained to the retaining wall reconstruction project on Riverview Drive. He noted that the funding for an amount not to exceed \$2,800,000 was approved by the DCA. The amphitheater was approved with the changes that were recommended by the Council."

James Fearon spoke up and said, "The PILOT governed by the financial agreement approved by the Council. 5% was given to the County and some of the money was applied to debt service. The issuance of bonds is what is on R-282 – Amending the CY 2019 Budget. "Interest is 4% on bonds bought by investments."

When it came to vote on the resolutions, R-254/6-19 thru R-279-6/19 and R-283-6/19 was moved by Councilman Fernando Irizarry and seconded by Councilman Helmin Caba.

R-280-6/19 was asked to be pulled to vote on separately by Councilman Fernando Irizarry. Councilman Joel Pabon said, "We need to know where we stand before dissolving PARA. I'm voting "No" on this resolution. The terms have expired on some of the Members."

Councilman Helmin Caba said he was voting "Yes." "Everyone sitting on PARA is there illegally. The Mayor is still having meetings illegally."

Council President William Petrick then told Law Director King who had stated earlier he that he may have a conflict representing the Council. Petrick told King, "You are here with the Mayor's blessing and she can remove you just as she has done to others."

When it came to R-280, Councilman Fernando Irizarry and Joel Pabon voted, "No."

Helmin Caba also requested the minutes from all the PARA meetings this year. City Clerk Kupsch said that she would do so.

For Resolution R-282-6/19, Councilman Irizarry asked that resolution to be voted on separately

Council President Petrick requested that Resolution R-282 be tabled because of a conversation he had with Perth Amboy Court Judge Rivas. "Judge Rivas told me that judges cannot be removed in the midterm of their contracts. We can act on prosecutors."

There was a motion to discuss R-282 in closed session. It was moved by Councilman Joel Pabon and seconded by Helmin Caba. R-282 was moved to table by Pabon and seconded by Caba. All voted "yes" to table.

Council President Petrick said, "They are going to be voting on R-281 – Authorizing the retaining wall project at Riverview Drive." R-281 was moved by Irizarry and seconded by Caba. The only "No" vote was Petrick. The motion passed, but a special meeting was called to discuss it further.

Because of this decision, Attorney Diane Stallback who

represents NCP Corp. & Duke Realty came up to speak. She told the Council that the potential tenant for their redevelopment project has a specific timeframe set (for the Council to approve). "The deadline (for the Council's decision) was this Friday (6/14/19) and I don't know if they (the potential tenant) will extend the timeline. The recirculation of how the trucks will be moved around the property has changed."

After Stallback finished talking, Mike Davis from Duke Realty came up to speak. He told the Council there were no changes to the public improvement (amenities) and we pulled items off the table that the City requested. We're looking at a potential of 300-500 jobs that this Fortune500 Company will bring. You can make changes even after you vote tonight. It was decided by the Council that a special meeting should be held. This was due because of the PARA Meeting regarding this development took place on Tuesday, June 11, 2019. The Council never received notification or minutes of this meeting.

After Davis spoke, the last public portion was opened up. Resident Stanley Sierakowski came up first and he talked about PARA. He stated, "The Council creates and dissolves PARA. If you dissolve it, you can appoint yourselves and hire your own professionals and experts. The DCA doesn't issue legal investigations. They go to the Attorney General's Office. You (the Council) can go individually or as a Council Member. You are weak on character."

After Sierakowski's last statement, Council President Bill Petrick told him, "You were good up until that last comment (weak on character)."

Sierakowski continued, "Assert yourselves. You are spending millions on personnel matters. None of you can fire the attorney."

The next speaker to come up was Marilyn Dudash Estacio who graduated from the PAHS Class of 1964. She made an emotional plea. She began by saying, "The Memorial Service (5/27/19) was moving, but the Veterans names from our class were not inscribed on the monument, even though we submitted their applications in a timely manner."

Councilman Joel Pabon spoke up and stated, "I've worked with the Class of 1964 about their Veteran's names not being on the wall."

Business Administrator Carr replied, "We have submitted the list. We are working with the man who carves the names on the wall."

Resident Ken Balut came up next. He told the Council. "You have no money for names on monuments or for the schools, but you can give millions for PILOTS. People (developers, lawyers, and others connected to the downtown redevelopment project) who came here tonight to speak said they met with PARA yesterday. Did you get any information about this meeting?"

Petrick responded, "No."

Balut then said, "The City is paying for the Y's pool and they get money from the schools." He then talked about a South River Water Inspector who recently got indicted for submitting false water testing reports. "There are health problems associated with bad water which is serious. Where is the transparency? You should have had the minutes of the PARA Meeting from Tuesday (6/11/19)."

Councilman Fernando Irizarry responded to Balut's question regarding the School Board tax levy from the last 3 years. "I got the information as we all did, but I need time to study it."

Resident and Businesswoman Sharon Hubberman came up next. She became emotional when she talked about a person from the public was told to sit down. "You showed more respect to the developers. I only saw Petrick stand up to the developers for us. Dark money exists. We face a lot of issues. Where is the special meeting to get our Veteran's names on the wall? Changes are constantly being made after contracts are signed. We need transparency in government and people need a voice. We live, invest, and have family here. Developers try to pressure us. Don't fall for it."

Petrick responded, "We asked them (developers and contractors) to come up here to explain themselves."

Resident Alan Silber came up next said, "Believe it or not, I went to see a doctor and they actually told me to get a second opinion. You (the Council) can get a second opinion from another lawyer. Sometimes people abstain without a reason. My problem is not with the person, but with a position they are put in."

Silber continued, "Lozada (Acting Director of Code Enforcement) is not a City Employee. He's in that job illegally"

Resident and former Councilman Fernando Gonzalez came up. He stated, "I'm a big proponent of term limits. We have the ability and it's on November's ballot that the Mayor has to win by 50%+1 of votes cast. Pass that resolution. Once people get the recognition, they don't want to let it go. Now, you're having trouble with PARA which was created by the Council. There is dark money. You should not be afraid of work. You should be the one whose making decisions (regarding redevelopment).

There will be a special Council Meeting on Tuesday, June 18, 2019 at 5 p.m. at the City Council Chambers.

I have the following concerns during the Public Comment process including May 8th (with 22nd)regarding cleanup of pollution of the Perth Amboy water supply at Runyon Watershed in Old Bridge, New Jersey.

*The Risk Assessment Reports(Project #3651120035) of April 13,2015 show serious impacts and concerns as a resident drinking Perth Amboy water as cummulative receptor cancer risk and receptor hazard values are above USAEPA limits--not withstanding treatment efforts by Middlesex Water Company. Two public notices in 2018 and 2019 detail this concern(Dioxane and Trihalomethanes violations, PWSSIDNJ1216001.)

Please acknowledge new water-well opportunities as New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection is approached by our Water supplier--Middlesex Water Company. A representative proposed opening up a new well #8 providing better water(in quality and quantity) for the community, at the May 8th public meeting. New technology offers us hope.

*As a concerned resident and consumer, I respectfully asked that the proposed plan for the CPS/Madison Superfund Site, Old Bridge, New Jersey, implement Alternative 4-Excavation, Offsite Disposal and In-Situ Chemical Oxidation. Your press release states 900 cubic yards are involved. This plan would clean the area between the remediation area and the Perth Amboy water supply. Decades of pollution and neglect from the responsible parties have left this area as a sort of" Dead Zone." A new beginning(filling the Runyon Watershed with clean soils and plants) finally can start moving the process toward a real watershed not an Industrial zone.

Sandy Hook / Highlands History: Sandy Hook /Highlands History: Originally discovered by the famous Sea Captain Henry Hudson in the early 1600's, Sandy Hook was a beautiful, 1,665 - acre barrier peninsula within view of the Manhattan skyline.

Now, this picturesque 2,044 acre barrier beach peninsula located on the northern tip of the New Jersey shore offers a variety of environmental, historical, and recreational resources. Featuring 7 miles of ocean beaches and sand dunes, salt and freshwater marshes, hiking and biking trails and 264 acres of maritime forest, Sandy Hook is rich in ecological diversity. Historic sites include the Sandy Hook Lighthouse, the oldest surviving lighthouse in the United States. Birding, hiking, wind surfing, fishing and exploring the park's natural and cultural resources are available year round.

History: Gateway's calendar includes nature walks and history tours and programs for Sandy Hook. Take a stroll around Fort Hancock Historic Post. The Sandy Hook Lighthouse. Keepers' Quarters and Barn are open seven days a week to tell the story of lighthouses and the men and women who maintained these life-saving sentinels. Lighthouse tours are available on a first-come, firstserve basis. Want to reserve a group tour for the Sandy Hook Lighthouse? Please be advised: reservations must be made prior to your group's visit; reservations must be made three weeks in advance of the requested tour date; maximum group size is 35 participants.

April 1 - October 31: The park is open from 5 a.m.- 10 p.m. daily, except by permit or as noted below. Through the summer of 2018, there is a \$15 charge per day for beach parking from Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day. Parking at Fort Hancock is always free.

November 1 - March 31: The park is open from 5 a.m. - 8 p.m. daily, except by permit. All navigable marine waters within the park boundary are open 24 hours.

Visitor centers and contact stations - open every day EX-CEPT Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day (Dec. 25) and New Year's Day (Jan. 1). Visitor Center number: (732) 872-5900 Lighthouse Tours: Offered first come, first served, from 1 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. Children must be at least 48 inches tall to climb the tower. A video in the adjacent barn is always open.

Lighthouse Keepers Quarters/ Visitor Center: Open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily. Rangers are available to answer questions, discuss the natural and cultural resources of the park and sell Senior/Access passes. Interpretive exhibits and a gift shop are available. The visitor center phone number is 732-872-5970.

Group Tours of the Sandy Hook Lighthouse: Reservations must be made prior to the group's visit to the lighthouse. Reservations must be made three weeks in advance of the

Sandy Hook Observation Deck Open: The Sandy Hook Observation Deck is now open. Nine Gun Battery Tours: When construction began 1897, the battery was originally intended to mount three 10-inch caliber disappearing guns, but when construction was complted in 1902, an additional six guns were emplaced creating a nine gun battery that operated until 1944. Open on Weekends 1:30 PM to 4:30 PM. FREE

Nike Missile Radar Site: Horseshoe Cove, Parking Lot L; Tours are conducted on select weekends from April to November. Guided tours of the Integrated Fire Control (IFC) will allow you to see the inner workings of the facility where the supersonic nuclear armed Nike Hercules missiles were controlled and guided using Cold War era computers and radars. While taking a guided tour of this one-time TOP SECRET missile site, you will have the opportunity to meet and talk with some of the veterans who actually worked on the Cold War Era Nike Air Defense System. FREE.

Battery Potter: Open Saturdays and Sundays in the summer; 1 p.m. - 4:30 p.m. Explore and tour Sandy Hook's oldest disappearing gun battery, and the first concrete disappearing gun battery ever built in America, completed in 1895. Call 732-872-5970.

Mortar Battery: Saturdays and Sundays, in the summer; 1:30 p.m. - 4:30 p.m. The 1894 Sandy Hook Mortar Battery was Among the first Endicott era (1890 - 1910) concrete gun batteries built on Sandy Hook, as part of New York Harbor defense against enemy attack from the sea.

Can I bring my pet to Sandy Hook? - Pets and their owners may visit bayside beaches throughout the year. Pets are only allowed on oceanside beaches from September 15 -March 15. Pets are not permitted on oceanside beaches during the spring and summer because that is when the threatened piping plover builds nests in those locations. Pets must always be on a leash no longer than 6 feet. Your pet can visit SOME areas of Gateway! Some areas of Gateway have great trails for you and your pet to exercise and enjoy nature. Pets are NOT allowed in areas of the park which are delicate natural habitats.

Where pets are permitted, they must always be on a leash. You must also clean up after your pet when visiting the park. Pets running at large may be impounded at the owner's expense. Unleashed pets are at danger themselves. They may also be seen as a danger to other visitors and, most of all, may threaten wildlife and habitats that the park is legally bound to protect.

Where you CANNOT bring your pet, even on a leash:

All campgrounds: Floyd Bennett Field, Camp Hudson at

Fort Wadsworth and Sandy Hook. Ocean-side beaches at Sandy Hook Unit from March 15 through September 15 (piping plover season). Pets ARE permitted on bay-side beaches at Plum Island and Horseshoe Cove throughout the year, but must always be on a leash. Swimming beaches at Staten Island Unit's Great Kills Park from Memorial Day through Labor Day. At Jacob Riis Park, Fort Tilden and Breezy Point Tip (all within Jamaica Bay Unit) between March 15 and September 15 (piping plover season). ANY part of Jamaica Bay Wildlife Refuge at ANY time of year.

Exceptions: Service animals (guide dogs, signal dogs or other animals trained to perform tasks for persons with disabilities) are excepted. Dogs used by law enforcement officers in the performance of official duties are also excepted. Emotional support animals, comfort animals and therapy dogs are not considered service animals under Title II and Title III of the ADA.

Abandoning animals at a national park: DON'T DO IT. Domesticated animals have not learned the skills needed to live in the wild. They usually die before figuring it out. Abandoned animals have shorter lives due to attacks by predators, disease and living in extreme conditions. Besides, this is against the law. Violators will be prosecuted.

Some abandoned animals, particularly cats, kill wildlife that the park is here to protect. Outdoor cats are believed to kill hundreds of millions of birds and small animals each year in North America. Whether a cat is domesticated or feral, well-fed or hungry, cats act as predators by nature. People who love cats can give them longer, healthier lives and keep bird and wildlife populations more robust by keeping cats indoors 24 hours a day.

Beach Info:

Fees & Passes: There are no entrance fees for Gateway National Recreation Area. However, there is a charge for beach parking from Memorial Dav weekend to Labor Day at Sandy Hook, N.J. For most vehicles, beach parking is \$15 per day or \$75 per season. For oversized vehicles (more than 20 feet), charge is \$30 per day or \$150 per season. Hours of collection are 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. InterAgency (IA) Military Pass holders along with their families and IA Every Kid In A Park Fourth Grade Pass holders along with their famlies will receive free beach parking.

Are there Beach Parking discounts? - Yes. InterAgency (IA) Access Pass and IA Senior Passes holders receive a 50% discount. Please note that the IA Annual pass holders do NOT receive a discount on expanded amenities fees such as beach parking. Active Military Members who own an IA Annual Pass will receive free beach parking at Gateway where parking fees are charged, including Jacob Riis Park and Sandy Hook. Active duty military photo identification will be required at all times to verify ownership of the Annual Pass. Vehicle Hang Tag is to be displayed at all times. (Hang tag is issued with annual pass.)

ALCOHOL IS NOT AL-LOWED ON SANDY HOOK BEACH

Camping Rates and Details: \$30 a night; \$210 a week;

\$15 a night with the Senior or Access Pass; \$105 a week with the Senior or Access Pass; Length of Stay: No day use, you must camp overnight. 14 nights is the maximum number of nights permitted.

Size limits: Up to six people may camp at a single site. Larger families and groups will need to reserve multiple camp sites. Sites are large enough for one large tent or two small tents.

What to bring: Your own tents and sleeping bags. A pad underneath your sleeping bag may cushion you better for a better night's sleep. Bring sunscreen and insect repellent as well.

What NOT to bring: Alcohol, pets, and charcoal grills are NOT allowed at tent camping sites. Glass containers are not allowed anywhere in the park. Recreational Vehicles (RVs)

at Floyd Bennett Field only:
There are presently nine RV
camp sites with another 11
planned for the near future. Water, sewer and electrical hookups are NOT available. Tents are not permitted in RV sites.

Neither Fort Wadsworth nor
Sandy Hook can accommodate RVs.

Showers: Showers are not available at Sandy Hook. At Fort Wadsworth, a cold-water shower is available to campers during the camping season. At Floyd Bennett Field, hot and cold-water showers, located across from the camp grounds, are open daily May through October, 9 a.m. - 2 p.m.

Where to obtain passes at Gateway - Visitors may obtain Access or Senior Passes at the following sites throughout the year. Unless otherwise mentioned, sites are open during normal business hours seven days a week. Senior passes are \$80. Please note: the America the Beautiful annual interagency pass is sold only at parks with entrance fees; Gateway does not charge an entrance fee, so this pass is NOT sold at any unit of Gateway. You must instead visit one of national parks charging entrance fees or visit the <u>USGS</u> store online.

Golden Access Passes were replaced with a new series of interagency passes called the America the Beautiful - National Parks and Federal Recreational Lands Pass. All Golden Access and Golden Age Passports will continue to be honored according to the provisions of the pass. Only paper Golden Age and Access Passports may be exchanged free of charge for new plastic passes. The America the Beautiful Pass Series includes the Annual Pass, Senior Pass, Access Pass and Volunteer Pass and the free annual pass for active military and their dependent families. Please visit the <u>USGS</u> Store website for more information or to purchase online.

Internet & Cellular Access: Public wi-fi is not available in any section of Gateway National Recreation Area. Cell service is generally available throughout the park, although some dead zones exist.

Information - Breezy Point Tip: Please note that Breezy Point Tip is closed to vehicles from March 15 to September 15, due to piping plover activity, even to those with 4 x 4 permits. You can drive to the lot at the end of the road, and then walk to the tip.

All off-road Fishing Permits Sold Out for 2019 - All off-road fishing permits for the Breezy Point Tip are sold out for 2019 **Swimming** - Lifeguards are on duty from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. from Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day at ocean side beaches. Please swim only on guarded beaches and only when lifeguards are on duty. When wading, be aware of sudden drop-offs. If you can't swim, don't go in. Rip currents are powerful currents flowing away from the shore. Before you go to the beach, learn what you need to do to Break the Grip of the Rip. Biking: For a great way to see Sandy Hook, the seven-mile long multi-use pathway (MUP) starts at the park entrance and loops around Fort Hancock. It is shared by walkers, bicyclists and in-line skaters. Bring your own bicycle or you can rent a bike during your visit. Bike rentals are available during peaks season as weather permits. Always call ahead for the best service. The MUP is for everyone, so please use it with courtesy. Whether you walk, bike or rollerblade, stay on your side of the yellow line. Keep an ear out for people who wish to pass. Keep pets on a short enough leash that they stay with you on your side of the trail.

Birding: Sandy Hook is a prime spot for birding. Try Plum Island, the Spermaceti Cove boardwalk, the Horseshoe

A scope will be set up to view raptors, marsh birds, and migrating song birds.

Camping: Overnight tent camping is available at Sandy Hook. Reservations are available at www.recreation.gov under "Camp Gateway".

Canoe Cruises: This ranger led water program will resume in the summer of 2019. Rangers lead a two-mile paddle for visitors age 14 and older to explore Sandy Hook from the ideal vantage point of the water. This 2.5-hour tour is of the bayside waters of Sandy Hook and Skeleton Hill Island. Reservations are necessary. Please reserve by visiting www.recreation.gov or calling (877) 444-6777.

Hiking: Trails begin at the Spermaceti Cove Lifesaving Station and at Area M near Nine Gun Battery. Walking along the ocean beaches is permitted. Some areas are closed during the spring and summer due to shorebird nesting.

Picnicking: The North Beach Observation Deck has tables and a view of the New York Harbor. Guardian Park has picnic tables, shelters and grills. Grilling is only permitted in Guardian Park.

Pets: Pets are not permitted on ocean side beaches from March 15 to September 15. Pets are allowed on bay side beaches year-round, but always must be leashed.

Multi Use Trails - The Multi-Use Pathway (MUP) is a five mile paved trail that starts at the park entrance and ends in Fort Hancock at the ferry dock in front of the Chapel. It is shared by hikers, bicyclists, and in-line skaters. Hikers can also enjoy the Old Dune Trail that begins at the Sandy Hook Visitor Center and South Beach Dune Trail that winds to the north end of the trail and continues to Atlantic Drive. Refer to the park map for more information.

Fishing - Fishing is permitted at all beaches except when lifeguards are on duty. An annual pass for nighttime fishing can be purchased at the Ranger Station or Visitor Center. Surf fishing is permitted at all beaches, except: at oceanside beaches when lifeguards are on duty, and; when sections of the beach are closed to protect nesting shore birds (typically March to September). When areas of the beach are closed due to safety concerns. Salt water fishing in New Jersey requires a permit from the state

free. The New Jersey Saltwater Recreational Registry Program is part of an improved data program to help protect long-term sustainability of recreational fishing. Annual passes for nighttime fishing can be purchased from the park. Unless otherwise stated below, payment is permitted by cash, credit, check or money order. Your Social Security number is required on all checks. Due to changes in staffing over the seasons, the times and places to buy annual fishing passes vary as well. For more information, please e-mail us. Fish Smart, Eat Smart is a guide for eating fish caught in New Jersey coastal waters from the New Jersey State Department of Environmental Protection, Division of Fish and Wildlife. Please read this before eating what you catch.

Kayaking: Kayaking programs are available at both the Jamaica Bay and Staten Island units between Memorial Day and Labor Day.

Staten Island: In Staten Island Unit's Great Kills Park you can join a ranger Fridays-Mondays, 10:30- 4 pm. You must be nine or older and higher than four feet tall.

Jamaica Bay Kayak Trail: The seven National Park Service kayak launches in Jamaica Bay are open. Bookmark this page for links to upcoming programs, tide charts and float plans. The kayak launch sites within Jamaica Bay offer opportunities for every level of paddler. Whether you canoe, kayak, or row, you will find launch sites and trips that meet your skill level. Before you launch, please download the Jamaica Bay Kayak Trail Map for important safety and regulatory information.

In order to launch after-hours in Jamaica Bay, or to park at kayak launch facilities at Riis Landing and Rockaway Point, you must first obtain a permit at the Ryan Visitors Center. Permits are no longer required, dawn to dusk, at Plumb Beach, Floyd Bennett Field Seaplane Ramp, Mill Basin, Canarsie Pier, and the North Channel Bridge. which has a versa bucket attachment that is not made by the Jesko Company that we need." He then went on to talk about purchasing a roll-off reeving system for one of the trucks. "What we have now is one roll-off that is 26 years old and another one that is 12 years old. The roll-offs put the containers down. The purchasing of this new equipment is to combine things. It can be used for all 4 seasons."

Council President Bill Petrick then asked if the old equipment was washed after each use.

Hoffman then went on to explain, "I don't know what was done before I was here. All I can tell you is since I've been Director, I've made sure that every time the equipment was used it was washed down." Hoffman then went on to explain that the total cost of all the equipment that they requested to purchase comes to about \$238,000.

Councilman Fernando Irizarry had a question regarding R-278 – Authorizing the 2018-2019 renewal of an inactive plenary retail consumption license to Aris Lounge, LLC, T-A 829 Lounge effective June 13, 2019. Irizarry stated, "I'm concerned because of this establishment having prior problems."

City Clerk Victoria Kupsch explained, "This is a pocket license that hasn't been used since the last problem. They might try to sell the place. As a matter of fact, there is a pending sale. It's the same location as before, but it will be a different ownership."

Council President William Petrick spoke up and asked if there could be restrictions when it reopened.

Law Director King spoke up and explained, "There's going to be new owners. You can request restrictions of the new owners, even though the problems were under the old owners.

Before the public portion opened up, Business Administrator Carr told the Council that the City can save over \$75,000 on our Stop Lost Insurance Plan.

The Meeting was then opened up to the public. Resident Ken Balut came up to speak. He asked, "How long are you going to have the situation with

Irving Lozada being appointed as the Code Enforcement Director go on? You finally had a crime press release after we talked about getting rid of the Public Information Officer." He then read some of the statements that the Mayor read during her State of the City. "We still have rich companies that got PILOTS totally between \$75 million and \$100 million in PILOT money. I would also like to see the School Board Tax levy for the last 3 years." He then talked about the presentation given earlier by the Perth Amboy Youth Alliance Group. "They gave a very thorough report." He then mentioned that the City should run the YMCA. "The government gives Harbortown money and now we want to give Harbortown money to have a Fun Day. We are getting beat up in taxes."

Resident Alan Silber came up next. "A year and a half ago, we were told the tax burden would be lifted off of the taxpayers. Now, we have a 5% increase. Our former B.A. Fehrenbach was appalled when he came back. Ordinances were changed and relatives and campaign managers were hired. Does each employee have to have a title?"

Council President answered, "There are general titles such as Clerk or also maybe Clerk 1 or Clerk 2."

Business Administrator Carr then elaborated, "One person can have two titles depending on the job and the department they are in."

Silber continued, "I'm looking at Financial Disclosures (pertaining to some of the titles)."

Carr answered, "We have working titles and civil service titles. Civil Service Clerks can work in different departments."

Resident Vince Mackiel came up next. He talked about Buckeye. "They have a tax appeal in the legal court and also before the Federal Government Security Committee."

Council President Bill Petrick responded, "One doesn't impact on the other."

Mackiel continued, "We have to make sure that Buckeye is taxed properly. He then went on to talk about the water situation in Perth Amboy. "I don't accept the version that went on YouTube. I talked about the se-

IMPORTANT MESSAGE FROM MIDDLESEX COUNTY WATER:



We would like to state that the water being provided to Perth Amboy residents meets all State and Federal Drinking Water standards. Drinking water treatment is a very complex process. As a result, Perth Amboy contracts expert and licensed operators to help navigate new water regulations and treatment options. Perth Amboy, like many of America's historic cities has water and wastewater infrastructure challenges and we have been working towards these important upgrades. We have invested over \$17M towards infrastructure upgrades and improvements. We take the integrity of our water and wastewater infrastructure very seriously.

The City of Perth Amboy and its licensed operator, Utility Service Affiliates-Perth Amboy (USA-PA), have been transparent with residents regarding Total Trihalomethanes or TTHM's. As stated in a letter released in late February,

TTHM'S are present in any drinking water using chlorine as a disinfectant. They form when chlorine reacts with naturally organic matter within the water. TTHM's are problematic only if the levels exceed the maximum contaminant levels (MCL/Mircroliters) of 80 parts per million (ppm) for a person drinking 2 liters of water per day over the course of 70 years. The only reason the system was out of TTHM compliance was due to a mechanical failure of the primary well, which has since been repaired. TTHM levels have since returned to normal. However, because the regulations are based on a running four quarter average, we issued written notification to residents explaining what had happened and will be issuing a repeat notice because several rounds of sampling are required due to reporting being based on annual average reporting.

As for the 1,4 Dioxane results, USA-PA has been transparent regarding this finding since 2016 and published these results in 2016 and 2017 in their yearly water quality reports. Currently 1,4 Dioxane is not regulated because the United States Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) and New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP) have not determined at what level it might be harmful. The Company responsible for the spill (BASF) has installed treatment to minimize impact to groundwater. The City has been working with USA-PA, the USEPA, Perth Amboy, BASF and the NJDEP in optimizing available water sources. We continue to test our water supply to ensure clean and safe drinking water for our residents.







In addition, an excerpt of the Declaration of Independence is read at the bell ringing ceremony.







The medal is awarded to those who distinguish themselves through conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of life above and beyond the call of duty. Perth Amboy Community Activists Submit Recall Notice of Mayor Wilda Diaz

Press Release 6/5/19

PERTH AMBOY, NJ - A day after the Primary Elections, three Perth Amboy community activists submit a notice of intention to recall elected official Wilda Diaz from the office of Mayor. The recall notice was filed with the City of Perth Amboy Clerk's office this afternoon. What sparked the recall was recent news received by many city residents that they have been exposed to dangerous contaminants in their drinking water. The City's municipal drinking water is managed by a share partnership between the municipality, and a firm called Middlesex Water Company, in which a subsidiary firm, USA-PA operates and manages the City's drinking water. This initial public and private water partnership started during the term of office of previous Mayor Joseph Vas, and has been continued under the term of office of current Mayor Wilda Diaz.

Similar to a notice sent to Flint, Michigan residents, which faced a water crisis, Perth Amboy residents received a notice that TTHMs are in their drinking water. Further, at a presentation conducted by the EPA at the City Hall Council Chambers on May 22nd, residents were informed that three of the City's water wells have

been contaminated by plumes of 1-4 Dioxane. The EPA presentation held on May 22nd was an informal public presentation which highlighted the cleanup of a contaminated Super Fund CPS/Madison site, which is currently on a National Priorities List (NPL) and located in Old Bridge, NJ. The Runyon Watershed which holds the City's water wells is located downgradient to the contaminated Superfund site. The official EPA public meeting was previously held on May 8, 2019 at the Old Bridge Municipal Complex.

"It is unconscionable to hear that our water utility has been mixing clean water with contaminated water and serving that water to the Perth Amboy public," said Sharon Hubberman, a Perth Amboy Resident, Community Advocate, and Former Perth Amboy Mayoral Candidate, "Listening to this news at our last council meeting was not only disconcerting. but it troubles me deeply that our residents have been exposed to such dangerous toxins in our drinking water. Clean water is a fundamental right, and we must safeguard it and be good stewards of it, because without it, we cannot have life. We must put our Perth Amboy Residents First and we want Clean Water NOW."

Miss Hubberman joins Maria Rodriguez, a retired business owner and Former Perth Amboy Board of Education Candidate, and Jesus Varela, a community activist, and Former Assembly candidate, in the Committee to Recall Wilda Diaz from the office of Mayor. "We must take action Now to prevent further harm to our people," said Jesus Varela, "Our children deserve better."

"Someone has to watch out for us," said Maria Rodriguez, "There is no transparency regarding our drinking water because the City does not hold monthly public meetings regarding our water. A lot of our residents' concerns have been ignored by Mayor Wilda Diaz, and any issue regarding our water is a serious matter."

Once the notice of intention to recall Diaz is approved, the committee will be collecting petition signatures from City Residents over a period of 160 days. World War II - 75 Years Ago

Units of the U.S. Army's 27th Infantry Division on June 16, 1944, land on Saipan and advance on Aslito Airfield, in the south. The Americans repulse several Japanese counterattacks that night. In Europe, 95 German V-1 "flying bombs" cross the English coast from launch sites in France before 6 a.m., with a total of 244 reaching England that day. The German press calls it the "beginning of the day of vengeance." In Italy, the British Eighth Army continues its advance, while forces of the U.S. Fifth Army capture Grosseto. Great Britain's King George VI visits with the troops in Normandy.

On June 17, Hitler meets with Field Marshals von Rundstedt and Rommel in occupied France. Both officers seek permission to withdraw to a more-defensible position inland, but Hitler refuses to allow a retreat, arguing that the V-1 bombing of Britain will force it out of the war. Cutting its ties with Denmark, the government of Iceland establishes the Icelandic Republic.

On Saipan, the U.S. 4th Marine Division reaches the east side of the island on June 18. The Americans then begin pushing northward: the 2nd Marine Division in the west, the 4th Marine Division in the east; the Army's 27th Infantry Division, having captured Aslito Airfield, moves up the middle. The island of Elba, in the Mediterranean, is liberated by Free French 9th Colonial (Senegalese) troops. In Finland, forces of the Soviet Leningrad Front break through Finnish defensive positions and advance toward Viipuri. In Rome, Ivanoe Bonomi replaces Pietro Badoglio as prime minister of Italy. In China, the Japanese capture Changsha, in Hunan Province.

The Battle of the Philippine Sea begins on June 19. Concerned that American control of the Mariana Islands would put bombers in range of the Japanese home islands, the Imperial Japanese Navy launches a major counterattack. Committing all of its major ships and hundreds of carrier-and land-based aircraft, IJN plans to destroy the American invasion fleet in the vicinity of Saipan, crippling the U.S. Navy. (The Japanese force: 9 carriers, 5 battleships, 13 cruisers, 31 destroyers, 24 submarines, 6 oilers and 750 aircraft; the U.S. Fifth Fleet: 15 carriers, 7 battleships, 21 cruisers, 68 destroyers, 28 submarines and 900 aircraft.) On the first day, the Japanese lose two fleet aircraft carriers to torpedo attacks by U.S. submarines. In England, the Air Ministry releases the first official details on the German V-1s — range: 150 miles; speed: 300-350 mph; armament: a 2,000-lb bomb. British anti-aircraft gunners start calling the missiles "doodlebugs," a common name for a variety of flying insects.

The British take Perugia, Italy, on June 20. In India, the Japanese continue their withdrawal from Imphal. In Occupied Poland, the Nazis begin mass exterminations at the Auschwitz concentration camp.

The Battle of the Philippine Sea concludes on June 21 — a resounding success for the Americans. The Japanese Imperial Navy's carrier arm is annihilated, losing a total of 600 aircraft, three fleet aircraft carriers and two oilers against U.S. Navy losses of 100 aircraft. The air-to-air portion of the battle becomes known as "The Great Marianas Turkey Shoot" for the ease with which Japanese planes have been eliminated. The Red Army captures Viipuri, Finland.

On June 22, the Soviets begin "Operation Bagration," a huge offensive intended to clear German forces from Belorussia (White Russia). The action begins with assaults by the Soviet 1st Baltic, and 3rd, 2nd and 1st Belorussian Fronts against Army Group Centre on a 450-mile front. Soviet forces amount to 124 divisions, 1,200,000 men, 5,200 tanks, 30,000 guns and 6,000 aircraft. Against this, the Germans can field just 63 divisions, including 900 tanks and 10,000 guns. The *Luftwaffe* launches a surprise night raid by 60 aircraft on the U.S. 8th Air Force's shuttle base at Poltava, in Ukraine, destroying 44 B-17s and 500,000 gallons of fuel. In the U.S., President Roosevelt signs the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944, known as the "G.I. Bill," which will provide funds for housing and education after the war for returning U.S. servicemen.

In India, the British 2nd Division and the 5th Indian Division on June 23, 1944, meet on the Kohima-Imphal road, which is now completely clear of Japanese, lifting the 88-day siege of Imphal. In Europe, the Allies drop 1,100 tons of bombs on Cherbourg, France. The communist-organized sabotage group, BOPA, part of the Danish Resistance, attacks the Riffelsyndikatet arms factory in Copenhagen.

The Soviets report major advances against Army Group Centre on June 24. Hitler orders all but one of the five German divisions of the LIII *Korps* that are encircled at Vitebsk, Belorussia, to fight their way out. In the Pacific, Japanese bases on Iwo Jima, in the Volcano Islands, and Chichijima, in the Bonin Islands, are attacked by American carrier-based planes.

On June 25, the Battle of Tali-Inhantala begins in Finland, between Finnish and Soviet forces. It is the largest battle to take place in the Nordic countries, with 150,000 Red Army troops facing off against some 50,000 Finns and 4,000 Germans. In France, three divisions of the U.S. First Army's VII Corps penetrate the suburbs of Cherbourg.

In Poland, 25,000 German troops on June 26 surround the survivors of the Battle of Porytowe Wzgórze in the Solska Wilderness near Lublin. Some partisans manage to escape, but around 1,200 Polish fighters cannot break out and, after suffering some 400 killed, surrender. Some are executed on the spot, some are tortured for more information on resistance activities and the rest are shipped to concentration camps. Cherbourg, France, is liberated by American troops. In the Marianas, the fight for Saipan goes on. A small Japanese convoy heading for the island carrying reinforcements is turned back by the U.S. Navy. In response to recent incidents of sabotage, the Germans introduce a curfew in the Copenhagen area, making it illegal to be out in the streets between 8 p.m. and 5 a.m. In response, hundreds of thousands of Copenhagen citizens begin a massive general strike. German occupation authorities cut water, gas and electricity supplies to the city. In New York, the three city-based teams — the Yankees, the Dodgers and the Giants — play a unique, three-way baseball game at the Polo Grounds to raise money for War Bonds: Each team takes a successive turn at bat and alternates playing in the field. The final score: Dodgers, 5; Yankees, 1; Giants, 0. The game raises nearly \$4.5 million.

The Red Army destroys the trapped German LIII *Korps* near Vitebsk, Belorussia, on June 27. Further gains are reported by the Soviets to the south of Vitebsk.

The Soviets take Mogilev, Belorussia, on June 28, and cross the Berezina River, a tributary of the Dnieper, surrounding most of the German Ninth Army. Having overseen the loss of 300,000 men of his 700,000-man force, Field Marshal Ernst Busch is sacked by Hitler as commander of Army Group Centre and replaced by Field Marshal Walter Model. In Vichy France, Minister of Propaganda Philippe Henriot is assassinated by members of the French Resistance. In the U.S., Thomas Dewey, Governor of New York, and John Bricker, Governor of Ohio, win the Republican nominations for President and Vice President, respectively, at the party's convention. Dewey vows to "bring an end to one-man government in America."

—In Belorussia, some 70,000 troops of German Army Group Centre that are encircled near Bobruisk, near Vitebsk, surrender to the Red Army on June 29. The Soviets report that 16,000 Germans have been killed and 18,000 captured near Minsk. In the Ryukyu Islands, southwest of Japan, the Japanese troop transport *Toyama Maru* is torpedoed and sunk by the submarine *USS Sturgeon*. Some 600 Japanese personnel survive, but over 5,400 soldiers and crewmen die in the sinking, making the incident one of the worst maritime disasters in history.



MIDDLESEX COUNTY - Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) of Middlesex County is seeking volunteers to advocate for children in foster care. On any given night, about 250 children from Middlesex County are sleeping in foster homes or other out-of-home placements due to abuse or neglect. Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) are working to serve more of these children each year.

CASA volunteers are appointed by a judge to speak for a child's best interests. They meet with the child and learn about their circumstances, then share information and recommendations with the judge. CASA volunteers come from all walks of life and diverse backgrounds, with no special experience or education needed. Applicants must be at least 21 years of age, pass background checks and have compassion, objectivity and commitment to children.

CASA volunteers work closely with an abused or neglected child or sibling group, advocating for their best interests. Essentially, CASA volunteers "speak up" for these children in the court, making sure they are safe and well-cared for, are getting the services they need and are placed in a permanent, safe, nurturing home as quickly as possible.

4 Key Elements Of Great Business Books

Your bookkeeping system is the financial heart and lifeblood of your business. When set up and operating properly, your books help you make smart decisions and seamlessly turn your financial data into useful information. Here are four key characteristics to build and maintain a healthy bookkeeping system:

1. Select the proper accounting method. There are two different methods for recording transactions: cash-basis and accrualbasis. In general, cash-basis records a transaction when payment is made where accrual-basis books the transaction upon delivery of the good or service. Cash-basis is easier to track and a useful option for smaller businesses and sole-proprietors. Whereas larger businesses who buy from vendors on account (accounts payable) generally use accrual-basis accounting.

Selecting the proper method affects any related financial transactions and how your financial statements are displayed. A correct approach will also include consideration of outside factors, including: IRS rules (businesses with more than \$25 million in gross receipts must use accrual-basis), bank covenants, and industry standards. Once a choice is made, it can be changed but it must be properly reported to the IRS.

2. Create an account structure that fits the company. Every business has a chart of accounts included in their bookkeeping system. These accounts sort the business's transaction data into six meaningful groups. They are assets, liabilities, equity, income, cost of goods sold and other expenses. Each group will often have numerous accounts and sub-accounts associated with them.

Having the right mix of accounts created and grouped in an organized fashion will help you properly classify transactions and prepare usable financial statements. The proper account structure for your company will mesh with your specific information needs.

3. Enter accurate and timely transactions. The value your data provides is dependent on each transaction being recorded correctly and on time. Entering transactions in the wrong account can cause major issues down the road. Financial reporting that is delayed can hide problems that need immediate attention. Some transactions are relatively straightforward, and some are more complex (like payroll, accruals and deferrals).

It's important to have someone who understands both your business and the accounting rules enter your transactions in a timely fashion. In addition, a good month-end close process that involves reviewing each account, will find mistakes from the initial entries.

- **4. Establish financial statements for decision-making.** The main financial statements are the income statement (income expenses = gross profit), the balance sheet (assets = liabilities + equity) and statement of cash flow. Each statement has a specific purpose:
- **1. Income statement.** The income statement shows company performance for a select period of time; typically monthly with a full year summary. At the end of each year the income statement restarts.
- **2. Balance sheet.** The balance sheet displays a company's overall health as of a certain date. It is perpetual. This means it doesn't end until the business is closed or sold. It includes one line that summarizes the current year and prior year results from the income statement.
- **3. Statement of cash flow.** This statement summarizes the inflow and outflow of cash. It ensures you know whether you have enough cash and the pattern of your cash position over time.

If properly executed, your bookkeeping system will turn out accurate financial statements that can be used for several tasks - financial reporting, budgeting, forecasting, raising capital, applying for a loan, tax reporting and decision making. 




