# Automated Trash Pickup Presentation by DPW Director Frank Dann and Sanitation Supervisor Hector Palidura October 22 Caucus Meeting

PERTH AMBOY - March 1, 2013 is the rollout date for the new automated trash vehicles to be in place. Three quarters of the City are slated to have the automated pickups in place.

Mailers will be sent to homes to inform residents of the new pickups.

DPW director Frank Dann said that he and Sanitation Supervisor Hector Palidura have traveled to other towns to hear the pros and cons of the automated trash pickups.

At the Caucus Meeting,

there were actual containers present for the demonstration along with a slide show.

Palidura stated, "A lot of residents exceed the limits for allowable garbage. The new trucks will hold thirty-three yards of refuse compared to twenty-five yards of the old ones. We will get more money back for recyclables. Each container has a serial number that will be encoded in our computers to let us know who the containers belong to. Plus the containers have a ten year warranty. The containers must



be placed on the street side of

the curb. And there must be a three foot space to allow the claws of the truck to be able to pick up the garbage containers. The lids must be closed. The instructions how to use the containers will be in English and Spanish."

There was concern by the Council Members and those in the audience when it was shown on the slide that the garbage containers must be placed at the curb on the street side. This would cause a parking problem since the houses are so close together.

Dann said, "The cans would be for residential areas because the business section would bring up a whole set of problems. These cans will be free to the residents. It is a costly program but the City can reduce staff."

With that said we would like to commend Mayor Wilda Diaz and her administration for keeping the residents well informed prior to the hurricane (in spite of some government departments downgrading it to a Tropical Storm) slamming into the tri-state area.

Some of the e-mails sent from the administrators to our paper included information about shelters which also took into consideration those residents who have pets.

Anyone who walked on Smith Street going towards the Waterfront when the complete power was out will know what I mean.

If your City Administrators did not keep the residents up to date in the days preceding Sandy, then perhaps you should have your voices heard in full force at your next Council Meeting. The Council Chambers should be packed to full capacity. If you choose to not attend and let things go as status quo, then you have no right to complain.

PERTH AMBOY - Business Administrator Greg Fehrenbach addressed the concerns of resident Stanley Sierakowski at the October 22, 2012 Caucus Meeting. This had to do with the Caucus and Council Meeting that was held on the same date of October 10, 2012.

Some portions of the meetings were interrupted and when the meeting resumed it was not broadcast in its entirety. Sierakowski said that instead of the meeting being picked up where it had left off in its place was a local event not having to do with the meeting at all. "95% of the Caucus was broadcasted. I was cut off when talking about the Chief. When the screen came back on Balut spoke for a short period of time, then the screen went blank. Then something totally different came on. Board Meetings are broadcast all the time, even meetings that are a month old."

Fehrenbach said, "Not all employees connected with PA-TV are residents of the City."

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez asked, "So you could not call any custodians available to open the High School to gain access to the PA-TV office to correct a glitch in the system for emergency purposes?"

At one point George Bonilla who tapes the Council Meetings was called forward by the Council to answer a question.

Bonilla said, "There had to be someone available who has knowledge to operate all of the computer systems."

# Joe Vas Appeals Denied Court of Appeals, 3rd Circuit

PERTH AMBOY - Joe Vas lost all of his arguments that he raised on appeal in the United States Court of Appeals, Third Circuit. The case was heard before circuit judges Sloviter, Rendell and Hardiman.

Vas was sentenced to 78 months imprisonment, a fine of \$73,200 and the restitution of \$90,000. This was handed down to him when Vas was convicted of mail fraud, misapplication of funds involving a local government receiving federal

funds, making false statements to federal law enforcement agents and making contributions to a federal candidate through straw donors

Vas based his appeal in part on allegations that there wasn't sufficient proof to show guilt beyond a reasonable doubt. All of Vas' arguments were shot down. In sum the Circuit Court rejected the suggestion that there was a miscarriage of justice and all of Vas' appeals were denied.

US Department of Labor approves Disaster Unemployment Assistance

The U.S. Department of Labor announced that it approved Governor Chris Christie's request for eight (8) New Jersey counties to qualify for federal Disaster Unemploy-

ment Assistance as a result of the destruction caused by Hurricane Sandy.

This special assistance program pertains to people in and around portions of New Jersey that were declared a federal disaster area, including Atlantic, Cape May, Essex, Hudson, Middlesex, Monmouth, Ocean, and Union counties. Federal Disaster Unemployment Assistance (DUA) is available for persons, including self-employed individuals, who were living or working in the affected counties at the time of the disaster, and who are unemployed as a direct result of the damages caused by the storm.

At this time, the assistance is available only in connection with those areas declared a federal a disaster area, including Atlantic, Cape May, Essex, Hudson, Middlesex, Monmouth, Ocean, and Union counties. Additional counties may be added to the disaster declaration following continued damage assessments by local officials, representatives of the New Jersey Office of Emergency Management and the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

Individuals unemployed because of the disaster that began on Oct. 28 should FIRST file for unemployment insurance benefits through the Internet by going to www.njuifile.net.

The Internet processes claims faster. However, if needed, people may also file a claim by telephone by contacting the state Department of Labor's Re-employment Call Centers

A 30-day deadline ending December 3, 2012 is in effect for filing claims resulting from Hurricane Sandy.





### **Movie Review: The Colour**

There is no greater horror in the universe than awaiting the release of a long-promised Lovecraft film. I'm speaking specifically about the H.P. Lovecraft Historical Society's long delayed adaptation of The Whisperer In Darkness, whose teaser trailer has been bopping around YouTube since 2007. The HPLHS did such an amazingly faithful job of bringing The Call Of Cthulhu to the screen back in 2005 that, with it, they immediately established themselves as the absolute authority on the translation of Lovecraft's writing to celluloid, a feat which considered possible. Granted, they may not be as commercially well known nor as financially successful as the works of Guillermo del Toro or Stuart Gordon, but where those guvs relied on over-thetop cosmic splatter and CGI tentacles to draw in the diehard fans (not that there's anything WRONG with that), the HPLHS quietly retreated into the past, using the techniques which would have been available in Lovecraft's time and altering nothing for the sake of audience appeal. Somehow, I think Howard would have approved Die Farbe Herr Director Sean Branney (The Color), the most faithful adaptation yet of Lovecraft's story The Colour Out Of Space. An elderly man has gone missing. Following a scanty trail of clues, his adult son John follows him to Germany, fearing for his safety and wanting only to bring him home. Upon his arrival in a small village, John literally bumps into a lifelong resident, one Armin Pierske. who remembers John's father from the final days of WW2. Eager for any information regarding his father, John sits himself down and listens to the long, harrowing and quite frankly - unbelievable tale that Armin has to tell, a tale that begins well before the war with the fall of a comet. Harmlessly slamming into the countryside of southwest Germany, the comet leaves a sizable crater and attracts a team of scientists as well as curious farmers. The comet is abnor-

mally hot, appears to be hollow and is rapidly shrinking. Samples are taken and tested, but nothing much comes of it. Soon, the space rock is gone, seemingly melted away into the soil below. Soon thereafter, rumors begin to circulate about the Gartener family, a father, mother and three sons who maintain a farm in the bottom of the valley. Summer has brought them a bumper crop, but the fruits prove to be rancid despite their healthy appearance. The winter snows do not stick to the ground around their farm. It is whispered that the trees seem to move their branches, even when there is no breeze. Concerned, Armin pays the family a visit, only to find that the insects have swollen to three times their normal size and that Frau Gartener herself has gone quietly mad. The eldest son soon follows. Then the youngest disappears. Everyone in the valley begins avoiding the family, as if their misfortune and madness is contagious. And it may well be, as Armin slowly comes to



realize that whatever the comet carried with it on its descent to earth has worked its way into the well water and is taking over all who ingest it.

Filmed in black and white and primarily spoken in German (thank god for subtitles), it is obvious that Die Farbe did not have a huge budget to work with. Effects are minimal and the cast is utterly unknown. I should point out that these are all good things, and work very much in the films favor. There is no CGI to rely on, no name actors to carry it. Rather, the filmmakers do the unthinkable: they create a genuine atmosphere of unimaginable dread and unspeakable horror,

using shadow, suggestion and rare splashes of that Nameless colour in a few select frames. In short, they did a damn good job. Die Farbe is subtle in its mounting horror, nurturing a dark dread deep in your bowels with every shot. Leave it to the Germans. We know how to gross you out on the deepest psychological levels.

Lovecraft worshippers and devotees of German Expressionism alike, take heed: seek out and view this film at your earliest possible convenience. It's a dark, noisome little gem that will squirm into your subconscious and lay its eggs in your sanity.




