Mayor Wilda Diaz Announces Perth Amboy Fire Department Class Upgrade

Press Release 2/26/18 PERTH AMBOY – Mayor Wilda Diaz announces a class upgrade for the Perth Amboy Fire Department to Class 3 from their previous Class 4 Fire Department ranking issued by the Insurance Service Office, Inc.

"I want to congratulate Chief Edward Mullen and the members of the Fire Department for their Class 3 upgrade. Our administration has worked diligently towards replacing outdated apparatus and increasing staffing to best serve our community. These individuals place a great deal of work, training and care to keep the residents of our community safe and I am proud to see that they have been recognized for their advancement and efforts," said Mayor Wilda Diaz.

The rating upgrade is a result of improvements inclusive of, increased staffing levels and training requirements, upgrades to the Police Department's 9-1-1 Dispatch Center, new fire apparatus, the certification of Fire Officers as Fire Investigators and upgrades to the City of Perth Amboy's water mains.

The Public Protection Classification rating is based off of a survey and is used by insurance companies to determine which properties will receive coverage and what prices to charge for both personal and commercial insurance. As a result of the upgrade, taxpayers may see a decrease in the fire portion of their property insurance premiums. The new Class 3 rating is effective June 1, 2018.

Breakdown of CDBG Monies, Businesses Question Ordinance & Active Shooter Training

2/21/18 Council Meeting

SOUTH AMBOY - Council VP Christine Noble gave an update on how she along with other committee members decided how the CDBG funds of \$40,650 requested should be used. "We must reapply every year for these grants. We requested \$20,000 to be used for the Business District (part of that total includes \$1,500 for print material) and materials for improving the exterior of businesses. \$7,500 were requested for the City/Arts District. This will be for marketing purposes and programs. \$5,000 would be targeted for the New Jersey Fresh Produce for Seniors. The summer recreation programs would receive \$5,000 which would include a 6-week program which may include a field trip. \$3,150 will be used for our first August 7th National Night Out. This would be used to promote the event and for supplies."

After Noble's report, there was a question on Resolution R-40-2018 Authorizing the release of a performance bond for Raritan Point, LLC.

City Engineer Mark Rasimowicz explained that this was for a Force Main Trench for a road opening. "The trench is in the northbound lane and it is a county road."

Councilman McLaughlin had a question regarding an item on the bill list. He asked why the Aide to the Mayor needed a lanton

Mayor Fred Henry explained that the Aide may have to do City work at home, and any other City Employees who may have to do the same have a laptop.

Council President Mickey Gross then asked for Council Comments.

Tom Reilly spoke first and said that he and fellow Councilman McLaughlin met with the First Aid Squad. "It seems as if there are certain businesses that are always calling the

Squad. We need an ordinance to help them. I also met with Rico, who owns a barbershop on Broadway, and also with other business owners. There's a concern about businesses on Broadway with windows that are covered up. One of those businesses has a locked door. We don't know what's going on and this has to stop. It's hurting the downtown."

Councilman Brian McLaughlin then spoke up. He reiterated Reilly's thoughts when it came to the First Aid Squad, "They need help. We're asking people to please join them. My son just joined the Cadet Unit."

Councilwoman Zusette Dato spoke about the tragedy in Parkland, Florida and the sadness, grief, and shock of this shooting. "The students (from that community) are gaining attention and momentum."

Council President Mickey Gross then spoke about the City's First National Night Out coming up in August and how he was pleased that the City is doing this. He also wanted to thank Jay Elliott from Code Enforcement. His department is setting up a bedroom in one of the schools so that the parents can see where kids hide their stash. Gross recounted going to a County Meeting a couple of years ago. Someone at that meeting talked about a big sub-

stance problem in South Amboy. "That remark really threw me off."

City Attorney John Lanza thanked Councilman McLaughlin for his efforts in getting involved in the First Aid and other City Organizations.

Council President Gross spoke again because he wanted to thank City Engineer Rasimowicz for getting grants for the City. He also recognized the work of Firefighter Phil English.

Mayor Henry then spoke about the mass shooting in schools and other venues. "Some politicians only think about terrorists (foreign) and not homegrown terrorists. I fear for my daughter who is a teacher. Who thought we would see students covered in blood. Forget the wall and protect our children."

When it came time for Public Comments, the first speaker was Kelly Wiley. She came to speak on behalf of the Frog Hollow Club. She started out by saying, "I'm glad to see Police Officers at our schools." She then talked about some of the complaints she had about the Woodmont Company. "That company put handicapped parking signs on our (Frog Hollow's) fence. There was a lock

on our property. Woodmont needed to work on a sewer grate and they broke that lock to get to it. We need a copy of their insurance for our records. They (Woodmont) are impeding us from getting into our property in the winter. We are trying to be good neighbors. They are trespassing on our property, but they eventually fixed the gate and lock. "

Gross responded and said he talked to Woodmont about being a good neighbor (to the Frog Hollow Club).

Wiley continued, "They (Woodmont) have wires hanging on our property and they were fresh to us. Fire trucks will have difficulty getting through the back of the Frog Hollow Property with these wires hanging down."

The next person to speak was a Resident at 236 John St. She wanted to know if the Art Gallery had any specific hours.

Mayor Henry responded, "They're posted on the door."

She then asked about the work being done at the Pump Station on O'Leary Boulevard, "Is the City paying for that work?"

Henry responded, "Yes, because it is City property."

The Resident then complained about a big green box with wires extruding from it, "It's also obstructing the sidewalk."

Henry responded, "I know about the box, but it's not preventing people from walking on the sidewalk, but I'll look into it."

The Resident then complained

about all of the congestion because of the parking situation by Harbor Lights.

The Mayor responded, "We can request a traffic report."

The Resident responded, "So far, no one has gotten hurt." She then asked if the Manhattan Beach Project is still paying a management fee to the City.

Henry responded, "They owe the City backpay which they will be paying. The Manhattan Beach Company also appealed their taxes."

Businesswoman Amy McLaughlin came up to speak about a business whose windows are covered up with black curtains. "What goes on in these places?"

Council President Gross responded, "They make apps."

Amy McLaughlin responded, "It looks bad."

Mayor Henry responded, "Code Enforcement, Zoning, and the City Attorney said this is OK. I talked to the building owner and the Master Plan will address this. A sign was put up on the building and then it was taken down. They also have an electric car charging port which is free for cars who require one."

Councilman Reilly also addressed this issue. "There is an ordinance in place that a business can't have a cafeteria on the first floor."

Amy McLaughlin then remarked, "You're not required to have signage, then?"

Resident and Firefighter Phil English then came up to speak. He asked what the local government is doing regarding any plans in instance of an active

shooter. "Have our Police had active shooting training?"

Henry responded, "I'll have to check with the Police Department."

English then told the Council that he and other members of the EMT went to a free out-ofstate training on how to respond to a terrorist attack. He indicated that since the training did not cost anything, the Police should go. "The training is great, and it's very vital."

A resident from George Street came forward and said, "You should have a Police Representative at the Meeting to answer these questions. We've had several auto break-ins. My brother's van was stolen. The citizens need to be alerted." She warned everyone to put your lights on and lock the doors of your car and house. "Our cable channel has nothing on it. I will volunteer to put flyers in mailboxes (to alert people about what's going on)." She then insinuated no crime is reported in the City. "The City is very different now than in the 1940's and 1950's."

The last Resident to speak was Kim Sieber. She suggested that the Council look at the Sayreville Facebook Page, "Which is amazing. Follow their example."

Council President Mickey Gross wanted to let the Residents know, "Events are posted on the City Facebook Page. This also includes incidents and crimes that have occurred."

Councilman McLaughlin spoke up and said, "This needs to also be put on our TV chan-

Dean Schomburg, (grandson of Alfonso), plus friends, relatives, and staff from PRAHD were present to congratulate her on her many achievements and community involvement. She was presented with awards from the Freeholders and the City of Perth Amboy.

Of all the speakers, Sheriff Scott herself was the most compelling. The reason we have a picture of the students above. Sheriff Scott recalled that she was about that age when she was introduced to politics by her father, Mr. Lincoln. Her

I owned the Maid of Perth Antique Shop on Front Street during the 1990's. Initially, it was a popular destination, and we sold local memorabilia, nautical antiques, vintage postage cards, and gifts. I also served as President of the Perth Amboy Chamber of Commerce and was on the Board of the Perth Amboy UEZ for several

The historic ferry slip on Front Street has been restored, as a Maritime Museum with

Visitors' Center, and we had a Fishing Party Boat docked at the Marina which offered daily trips and Sunset Cruises.

However, my Antique Shop could not continue to "stay afloat" after the Perth Amboy Chamber of Commerce was dissolved for reasons that I will never understand in a city the size of Perth Amboy, the Maritime Museum and Visitors' Center is NEVER OPEN, and the Fishing Party Boar is no longer docked here.

There are no valid reasons for additional businesses on Front Street. We presently have two fine dining restaurants, a Bait and Tackle Shop, Ice Cream parlor, and Food Truck at the Marina. Parking and traffic are at capacity.

We need to do more to support he businesses on Smith Street. People from out of town are reluctant to drive through the business district. We do not need empty storefronts, neon lights on the signage, mattresses propped up against the stores, or people selling items from card tables set up on the sidewalk. We have to strictly discourage jay walking and vehicles double parked. And we desperately need the train station upgraded so that we have an elevator to take us down to the boarding area instead of having to descend 26 steps.



was surprised, but didn't deter her from her decision.

She remembered being interviewed for her first job in law enforcement. The man who interviewed her was smoking (in a place where smoking wasn't allowed). She could tell by the look on that person's face that he really wasn't taking her seriously at first. She was the only girl and had five brothers who she could go toe-to-toe with. Although she is small in stature, she passed the required agility test without a problem.

When she finished the interview, she so impressed the person, he had no choice but to say, "You're hired."

As we said before, she talked the talk and walked the walk. She accomplished each goal she set for herself, rising from the ranks of a Police Officer, to working as a Sheriff's Officer, to becoming the Middlesex County Sheriff.

She learned through her parents at an early age how important it is to respect others. That attitude came back through the respect that others had for her.

My late father, Rockwell Maxwell used to always say to us, "If you want to have friends, show yourself to be friendly."

Sheriff Scott also acknowledged her extended family who were in the audience, such as the McCoy's who were very prominent in Perth Amboy. She also called out the names of some classmates in attendance, colleagues, and the Democratic Party who believed in her.

Scott said while growing up in Perth Amboy, she did not experience prejudice. The first time she became aware of prejudice is when her father took the family on a trip and they stopped in Virginia. Her father told the family to wait in the car while he went into a place to bring something back to them to eat. That's when she noticed there were water fountains labeled "black" and "white."

She couldn't understand this because the water was coming from the same source. Along the way, there were similar signs.

Mildred was the first African-American and first woman elected as the Middlesex County Sheriff. This was a huge accomplishment and one that she deservedly earned.

Here's hoping one day that we don't have to preface a title with an ethnicity, gender, or religion.

There was a comment in referencing to why February was chosen as Black History Month. Some suggested it was because it's the shortest month and the accomplishments of Black Americans are being shortchanged. This is not the case.

The precursor to Black History Month was created in 1926 in the United States, when historian Carter G. Woodson and the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History announced the second week of February to be "Negro History Week". This week was chosen because it coincided with the birthday of Abraham Lincoln on February 12 and of Frederick Douglass on February 14, both of which dates black communities had celebrated together since the late 19th century. (www.asalh.org/)

Dean Schomburg recalled how his late Aunt Delores supported his grandfather, Arturo's work and she became his (Dean's) guiding light. "She wrote a family tree and kept all correspondence that my Grandfather had. She passed away in 1984. My grandfather, Arturo collected every piece of information regarding accomplishments of African-Americans. He collected over 10,000 books. His legacy is assured. With the Schomburg Center, his work will always shine."

As with the first 4 recipients of the Schomburg Award, Sheriff Scott's story is something to inspire all, no matter what race or gender you are. Follow her road map and you'll be fine.

Wild, Ancient, Hidden, Gorgeous IRELAND

A Photographic Journey with Joel Simpson

WOODBRIDGE TOWNSHIP - On Monday, March 12 at 6:30 PM join professional photographer Joel Simpson of Joel Simpson Photography for a virtual tour of Ireland, both the Republic and Northern Ireland at the Woodbridge Main Library.

Ireland, exudes authenticity: its landscape, alternately lush and stark; its prehistoric, ancient and Medieval sites; its small towns and villages; the rich geology of its breathtaking, rugged coastlines and interior wonders; its "haunted" ruins; its spectacular flora-and its reassuring lack of commercialism. You'll see the same scenes today that inspired early 19th Century plein air painters from all over Europe: the same towns with overgrown riverbanks, the ruins of castles, abbeys and churches, the cows and sheep in the fields, the narrow, winding roads flanked by stone walls and covered with hanging wild flowering plants or bowering trees.

The weather is famously changing, making for interesting skies, with intermittent rain and sun during the course of a day.

Photographer Joel Simpson drove around the whole island in two different rental cars, seeing both well-known sites and little-known ones, and making discoveries on his own that were not in the guidebooks. He flew his drone many times,

coming home with aerial views and movies of ancient sites and spectacular coastlines.

You'll see all this and more in his 90-minute slide show. Ireland is an easy country to visit (although sometimes the roads get very narrow.) He'll also talk about important practicalities, itineraries, and things to watch out for, including how to do it on your own and how to do it on a budget. In addition he'll give some photographic advice. Questions are, as always, very welcome.

New Jersey native, Joel Simpson, has been photographing since he was a teenager in the 1960s. In addition to being a 35mm amateur for most of his life, he gained a doctorate in comparative literature from Brown; taught college English, French and Italian; pursued jazz piano for 22 years and created prize-winning multi-media music software that sold worldwide.

An inveterate traveler, Simpson has lived in France, Italy, and Germany. He combines an artist's eye with the curiosity of an amateur scientist, history buff and anthropologist.



The ambiguous gun laws of today did not exist. Guns were much more accessible than they are today.

The term "assault rifle" was not heard of, although they did exist and were available to the civilian population in semi-automatic, even then civilians were not allowed to own fully automatic or machine guns. Then they were just rifles not "Assault Rifles".

Some schools in NJ and other states had shooting teams that competed against each other just like football and baseball teams. Some kids even brought their rifles and ammunition with them on the school bus. No one gave it a second thought, because using them on their fellow classmates wasn't thought of.

So, what changed? Why do some kids want to murder their fellow students in today's day and age?

What has changed children's minds and attitudes that move them to murder?

Take for instance the Columbine murders, (I refer to this tragic incident not because it was the first or worst, because it was neither, but because it seems to be the one most remembered and referred to).

Columbine led to many studies into the motives and reasons for this behavior. Things like bullying, music, video games, gun control, social climate, Goth culture, mental illness..., were studied by a multitude of experts with no conclusive re-

Another example is an 18-year-old who was living in North Carolina with his parents and was obsessed with Columbine. The kid had a history of mental issues and even tried to commit suicide on the anniversary of the Columbine murders. He convinced his mother to drive him to Littleton so he could video tape the high school where the murders took place. Then he asked her to drive past the house where Eric Harris used to live, and she did. Before they left Colorado, he bought a black trench coat. Hello, mom! Knock-knock, anyone home? Apparently not. A few months later he shot and killed his father then went down to a local school and shot and wounded two students.

It seems whenever you mention parenting, parents jump on their high horses and take offense. Not my sweet child, we're good parents. That may be, but are you involved with and pay attention to your offspring. And I don't mean taking him/her to their soccer game and going to PTA meetings. Do you know who your child is talking to on their electronic device, more importantly, what are they talking about? That's not to say that your child is a potential murderer, but studies have found that, in most of these murders, students knew in advance that something was odd about their fellow classmate, but either said nothing or thought nothing of it.

If you hear or see, for instance, the names Klebold or

Harris or any other mass murderer come up in casual conversation between your child and his/her friends, it's time to pay attention.

Then the excuse of privacy and giving your child space comes up. Well how much space and how much privacy? If eavesdropping on your child bothers you, get over it. It might save his/her life or the life of someone else's child.

Then there are the parents who own firearms. Many of the school murderers were minors. How did these minors get their hands on a gun? They got it from their own homes or the home of a friend. Hey parents, WAKE UP, if you have firearms and children in your house your responsibility has just quadrupled. You do not put a loaded gun in a shoebox and keep it in the closet where you are sure your child will not get his hands on it. That's just stupid and irresponsible.

Tom's Tax Tips

Taxes and Virtual Currencies: What You Need to Know

Virtual currencies are all the rage lately. Here are some tax consequences you must know if you decide to dip your toe in that world.

The IRS is paying close attention

The first thing to know is that the IRS is scrutinizing virtual currency transactions, so if you live in the U.S. you'll have to report your transactions in Bitcoins and the like to the IRS. Despite some early misconceptions, virtual currency transactions can be traced back to their owners by governments and other cyber sleuths.

In fact, the IRS just won a case late in 2017 against the prominent virtual currency storage company Coinbase, allowing the agency to access records of more than 14,000 customers and assess back taxes on those who haven't properly reported their transactions.

If you decide to use or hold virtual currencies, carefully report and pay tax on your transactions. Act as if you are going to be audited, because if you don't, you just might be!

It's property, not money

Note that the IRS doesn't consider Bitcoin or other virtual currencies as money, because they aren't legal tender. Instead, they are considered property. That means that if you are paid in Bitcoin, you will have to report it as income based on its fair market value on the date you received it.

And, if you sell Bitcoin, you have to pay tax on your gain using the cost (basis) of when you received it. The IRS has said that if Bitcoin is held as a capi-

tal asset, like a stock or a bond, then you would pay capital gains tax. Otherwise, if it is not held as a capital asset (for example if it is treated as inventory that you intend to sell to customers), it would be taxed as ordinary income.

Example: Craig Crypto bought a single Bitcoin on Dec. 29, 2016 for \$967. After holding it as an investment (capital asset) for a year, Craig sold his Bitcoin for \$14,492. He reports and pays 15 percent tax as a capital gain on his profit of \$13,525.

Be aware of the risk

In addition to the increased oversight by the IRS, virtual currencies are at risk of virtual theft with no recourse to a government agency like the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, which insures U.S. bank balances. Do your research on storage and security before you invest. And if you need help with any tax questions related to virtual currency, don't hesitate to call.

This Week in World War II 75 Years Ago

Gen Hans-Jürgen von Arnim's Fifth Panzer Army launches a five-day counterattack in northern Tunisia on February 26, gaining some ground. British Eighth Army commander, Gen. Bernard Montgomery, issues the plan for "Operation Pugilist," intended to smash the Axis's Mareth defensive line in southern Tunisia. In Poland, the Auschwitz concentration camp receives its first shipment of Romani (gypsies) deported from Germany.

In Germany, Gen. Heinz Guderian on February 27 is appointed Inspector-General of Armored Troops and is given wideranging powers to strengthen the *Wehrmacht's* tank arm. On the civilian front in the Third Reich, "Operation Factory Action" begins as the last 8,000 Jews in Berlin are to be gathered up for deportation. Most are factory workers, who until now had been exempted from deportation. Within 24 hours, those rounded up are on their way to Auschwitz.

SS United Victory, the first Victory Ship class of cargo vessel, is launched in Portland, Oregon, on February 28. Nine Norwegian commandos successfully climb down the steep gorge on one side of the German "heavy water" plant at Telemark, Norway, and work their way up a 500-foot, almost-sheer rock face to reach the plant on the other side of the gorge. Undetected, they gain entrance to the facility and successfully set and detonate their explosives, ruining the plant. All the commandos escape safely, without taking or inflicting any casualties. Germany's atomic-weapons development program is set back years by the attack.

On March 1, the Allies launch "Operation Cartwheel," a two-pronged assault on Japan. One prong, led by Adm. Chester Nimitz, will push through the central Pacific, while the other, under Gen. Douglas MacArthur, will maintain the pressure on New Guinea and the Solomon Islands. The plan is that the two prongs will isolate and neutralize the powerful Japanese base at Rabaul, on New Britain, and will come together in the Philippines and Formosa. In the U.S., the Office of Price Administration begins rationing canned and bottled fruits, vegetables, soups, baby foods and dehydrated fruits. Canned meats and fish are already generally unavailable. The Royal Air Force and the U.S. Army Air Forces conduct a 30-minute bombing raid on Berlin, killing 486 people and injuring over 370 others.

A major Japanese effort to reinforce troops at Lae, New Guinea, is dealt a shattering blow on March 2 at the Battle of the Bismarck Sea. A convoy of eight transports and four destroyers — carrying 6,900 soldiers (a division) — is mostly destroyed by U.S. and Australian land-based bombers and attack aircraft; the USAAF's B-25 Mitchell bombers are especially effective. Only around 1,200 Japanese soldiers reach New Guinea. In Berlin, 1,500 Jewish men, women and children are deported to Auschwitz concentration camp; 1,350 of them are executed upon arrival.

On March 3, at 8:17 a.m., air-raid sirens sound throughout London. While trying to enter the Bethnal Green Underground (subway) station — a designated air-raid shelter — 173 Londoners are killed in a crush on the blacked-out stairwell. In the darkness, a woman carrying a baby trips and falls three steps from the bottom. Unable to see, people following her fall over them until there is a tangled pile of over 300 bodies. Those on the bottom, mostly women and children, are crushed and asphyxiated. Another 90 are seriously injured. It is believed to be the largest single loss of civilian lives in the United Kingdom during the war.

The 50th trainload of Jews departs from France for the Majdanek and Sobibór concentration camps in Poland on March 4. In Los Angeles, the 15th Academy Awards ceremony is held. The movie "Mrs. Miniver" is named Best Picture, and its star, Greer Garson, wins the Oscar for Best Actress.






