Discussions on Water Meters & Safety, County-Owned Buildings

5/21/18 Caucus

PERTH AMBOY – At the 5/21/18 Caucus, after the call to order, the Council immediately went into closed session. They returned approximately 30 minutes later at 5:10 p.m.

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez questioned the agenda item pertaining to the Purchase of Water Meters and Advanced Metering Infrastructure Project. The suggested contractor for this project was Sensus USA, Inc. Gonzalez argued that the Council needed more backup information about this.

Director of Operations USA-PA (Utility Service Associates Perth Amboy) Middlesex Water Company) Luis Perez Jimenez came up to answer Gonzalez's concerns. He stated, "The existing meters are 20 years old. We went to various vendors. The existing vendor we have now does not have tamper-proof meters. We have 1,200 Sensor meters in the system, now."

Council President William Petrick then asked, "Can the existing meters in the system be wired for radio transmission?"

Perez Jimenez responded, "We already have this in place and there's no need to have meters at houses."

Gonzalez still insisted, "We should wait on this until we get a new water company."

Perez Jimenez continued, "The new company coming in can use the new meters which will be installed."

Petrick then added, "We're bringing in a new billing system in-house"

Perez Jimenez then explained there will no longer be a need for meters at houses. "The readings will be power-driven by the water itself."

The meeting was then opened up to the public.

A resident from Prospect Street had a question about Communication No. 10 dealing with the Market Street Bridge Pedestrian Crossing. She asked what is the status and when it will it be fixed. "When will signs be posted for the pedestrians who need to cross the bridge?"

Deputy Police Chief Larry Cattano came up to speak, "There were four signs (advising pedestrians that they need to walk on the other side of the street) posted."

B.A. Adam Cruz then spoke up regarding the bridge on Fayette Street. "It will cost between \$8 million and \$10 million to fix that Bridge. There are people on site who are working on the Market Street Bridge."

The resident then voiced concerns, "Cars are speeding on Prospect Street and no one imposes the speeding laws."

Resident Robert Mesy came up to speak and proclaimed, "We need clean water! People that live in back of me play loud music and park in my driveway. They play their loud music very late at night."

Resident Ken Balut asked the Council if they were informed of the Nationwide Memorial Service to honor firemen. "We pay someone \$75,000 a year to notify you of events. I got the notification on Facebook. You go to private sessions about personnel matters. I hear there's one lawsuit against the police being settled for six figures. And what about our water problems?"

Petrick answered, "Water will be talked about in a private session. The new meters will be installed prior to the new water company coming in. We need to put in new meters because the old ones were being tampered with."

Balut then asked, "How many people were charged for tampering with water meters?"

Resident Alan Silber came up to speak. He questioned the installation of a lawn irrigation system at 56 Brighton Ave. for \$34,700. "That's a lot of money. The one by Waters stadium watered the streets and not the

grass. Do they work on a timer (system)?"

Petrick responded, "It could be on a timer or done manually. If it works correctly, there should be a sensor. In Iselin, I see streets being watered instead of the grass."

Silber then questioned, "Could some people be paying too much (for their water)?"

Petrick replied, "The meter readings will be done through a radio (transmission). This new company who bid can do this."

Perez Jimenez came up to comment, "We are purchasing 5,900 meters. They are tamper-proof. Certain commercial properties such as Crows Nest and some of Trujillo's buildings have certain kind of new meters. The water bills will be monthly."

Perez Jimenez then answered Balut's question in regard to has anybody ever been charged for tampering with water meters. "There is a bar on Hall Avenue that has been charged with meter tampering and also a house. We must have evidence before we can take these persons to court."

DPW Director Frank Hoffman came forward to talk about the Brighton Avenue lawn irrigation system. "There's a timer and it can also manually shut off if its raining. The timer is 15 minutes, then it shuts off. Everything is adjustable." Hoffman also responded to irrigation systems at City Hall and Dalton Field. "We do maintenance at the end of the season on their irrigation systems."

Clearing the Air and Then Some

5/23/18 Council Meeting

PERTH AMBOY – Councilman Fernando Irizarry questioned, "What will happen to our Engineer of 30 years when the new water contract comes through?"

Law Director Peter King responded, "No one knows yet because we are rebidding."

Business Administrator Adam Cruz responded to Irizarry's inquiring regarding to new water meters that are going to be installed, "These readings can be done by scanning."

Irizarry then had a question regarding resident's concerns about the proposed units being built on the St. Demetrios property. "I want to know if they will only be for people of Greek ancestry?"

King responded, "They can't do that."

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez spoke up and asked, "Were the 25 signatures on the petition (saying that they do not approve of the plan) forwarded to St. Demetrios Church? I went to the presentation. If people could see it, I think they would be pleased with the project. Only two people from the neighborhood were there."

Resident Ken Balut came up to speak and asked Council President Petrick if he was aware of the ceremony at the Fire Department. He stated that some of the administrators or directors were not there.

Petrick responded, "The Fire Chief said it was very small and informal and only the onduty firemen participated. They pulled out a fire truck during the ceremony." (See the Perth Amboy Fire Department's Facebook Page for more info.)

Balut continued, "It's incompetent not to know the numbers (dollar amount the Schools and City are getting from PILOTs.) The administrators don't know. You couldn't read the numbers that were on the OPRA request information. You just give money to the rich. You get PACS from the rich money and give them the money back."

Alan Silber came up to speak and told the Council that someone sent him a picture from Facebook showing him a picture of the Mayor and a City Employee in Puerto Rico. "Who paid for the trip? How much was the trip? And how many days were they there?"

Council President Bill Petrick responded, "We didn't get any information on this."

Silber continued and asked about the policy on nepotism. "You didn't know about the change and was it changed back to the original (ordinance)?"

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez responded, "I am meeting with the attorney about this. There may be some additional changes added."

Silber than asked, "What about cronyism? It's just as important. People were hired who are relatives of friends of the Mayor. What about our City's website?"

Petrick said, "I don't think anything has changed."

Silber concluded remarking, "It's (the website) been a year. Maybe he's working on the next

Adam Cruz spoke up to answer Silber's question about the Mayor and City Employee's trip to Puerto Rico. "There was no cost to the City."

Resident Vince Mackiel came up next to speak about the water issue, "3 out of 8 wells were affected. If we have a drought or any other unusual weather conditions, are there any other water sources options?"

Petrick replied, "We can buy water from Middlesex Water Company. They already supply water to Woodbridge. There is incomplete data on the water safety issues."

Mackiel continued, "I know there are a lot of important industries that stabilize our cities."

Petrick said, "BASF is remediating the Plume. They will do an experimental process which the US-PA and NJDEP will monitor and provide us with expertise."

Mackiel then asked, "Are businesses going to be connected to this? 30 years ago, the City lost 1 million gallons of water a day because of one business. Everyone should have to abide."

Petrick then stated, "Businesses and residents will get new meters, accept for businesses that will need special meters."

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez then added, "Even churches pay water bills. Depending on the type of business, they may need a different size meter."

Parish Council President of St. Demetrios Greek Orthodox Church, Perth Amboy, Judge Marina Corodemus came up to speak. She first thanked Councilman Fernando Irizarry for the prayers he said at the beginning of the meeting, "We pray for those not truthful about the church. We are putting back the community center and we are abiding by the Fair Housing Laws - Municipal, State, and Federal. I don't need anyone coming up here to read the laws to me. People spread falsehoods. How miserable and soulless to attack a church? We invited the Council and Citizen Groups to come to a meeting. Religious and ethnic groups were invited to our church to see our plans. I've spoken about our plans. Why do some people hate the church? We could be in court filing defamation of character charges. I don't know what more can be said. It will be a green building and you'll be getting revenue. This will not be attacking the school system. There will be 24 2-bedroom apartments that are pre-fabs."

A Resident from Kearny Avenue came up to speak, "The people talking against the church are a bunch of liars. They're racists. Many Greeks are in this town. 3 or 4 white people are racists. We have been here 100 years. We never made any problems. The Mayor does good things. Don't listen to them (the liars)."

Resident Dot Daniel came up to speak, "I have many friends from the Greek Church. We need proper housing for all. The Seniors are always asking me for help with housing. We haven't had vouchers for years. 95% of people in housing units have jobs. Some two jobs. Seniors

have contributed (for years) and are in need of housing. They (St. Demetrios) are doing the right thing."

Resident David Caba came up to speak, "I was asked to go to a Freeholders Meeting concerning the (County) park. It's been 4 years. We (the PAHS Baseball Team) are in the County Championships for the first time. Maybe other towns have championships because they care about their youth. Look at the developers who abandoned projects. The real estate is rebounding and maybe that's why Kushner wants to come back. He still hasn't fixed Rector Street. I will ask about that park. Build a soccer field and restaurants at the Waterfront."

Council President Petrick told Caba, "Permits are in place and there should be a ground-breaking in the fall."

Councilman Joel Pabon spoke up, "We didn't ask you to go to a Freeholders Meeting."

Irizarry then also spoke up stating, "We have not approved the 600 (Seagate) units."

Caba responded, "I didn't say you approved 600 units."

Petrick spoke up again and said, "The playground, parking lot, and a soccer field were supposed to be a part of that park, but a cleanup has to be done first."

When it came to Council Comments, Gonzalez asked to put in the agenda to have runoff requirements for elections. "They used to have it, but it was eliminated. Every major city has been represented by the majority of voters. Maybe it's because we have been controlled by one party."

City Clerk Elaine Jasko responded, "It was done to save money."

Councilman Gonzalez stated, "Politicians in charge did it to benefit themselves."

Councilman Irizarry asked that there be a dedication by rider for a Resolution (how PILOT money should be delegated).

Petrick responded, "It was done, but needs to be put on by the Council."

King told the Council, "It was tabled."

Irizarry continued and talked about the fences that were on one of railroad bridges, "They look like prisons."


Cruz responded, "They were installed by the City for pedestrian safety."

Council President Petrick added, "NJ Transit put up additional fences to keep out dumping."


Irizarry then said he wanted to recognize two First Responders who prevented a suicide.

Joel Pabon said, "I want to thank the Greek Church for coming here to clean up some issues. I also want to thank Ms. Rivera for giving us the update on the upcoming (County) park. Parks don't make championships. When I was growing up, we didn't have great parks, but we played in those parks. Parks have improved dramatically. There are million-dollar parks

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












Same Old Tired Excuses

I usually do not write about local politics or affairs, but in this case, I'm going to make an exception.

I've lived on Inslee Street since 1959, so I know a little about this neighborhood, and in particular about this street. I'm not talking about the people, who have changed drastically over the years. In fact, there are only two other people who have lived here a little longer than I have. However, the one thing that has not changed is the sanitary sewer system, that is until the city separated the sanitary system from the storm water system, more on that later.

The sanitary sewer in the street has been consistently backing up since the late seventies. For those who do not know, the sanitary sewer is the big pipe under the street that all the poop, pee, drainage from your sinks and washing machines go. When these big pipes get clogged the nasty stuff cannot flow and ends up in some people's basements.

Yep that nasty stuff coming into you house is somebody else's poop and pee. This water is full of germs, disease, and smells really bad.

Well, in my part of "Budapest" this has been happening consistently since the late seventies. Most of the time I or someone else would call the city, and the big truck comes, clears the line, and everyone is happy, well almost everyone. The people who have to wash out and disinfect their basements aren't too happy. When I came home to find two feet of water, with turds floating in it, in my basement, I was not happy to say the least. This was back in the early eighties. I complained to the city and even sent them the bill for cleaning up my basement. The answer I got then is that the city cannot be held responsible for something that is essentially, an act of God. I think the lame excuse given was a tree branch getting caught in the sewer during a heavy rain, at the time the sanitary and storm sewers were one in the same so this was possible however improbable. In addition, it had not rained for

two weeks before.

Then came the monumental project of separating the storm and sanitary sewer. The reason being that the city was paying to have storm water treated at the sewerage treatment plant, not to alleviate the "backing up" problem, although I was told this should eliminate the "backing up problem", Not.

Now whenever the city came out to clear the blockage they always went, and still go, to the same manhole to clear it. I suggested to one supervisor, years before, that being it always blocks up in the same place maybe, just possibly, there is something wrong with the pipe in that area. I even suggested putting a camera down there and look. When you find the problem, fix it. Simple, right, nope, I forgot I was dealing with the city. The workers know there is a problem but are powerless to do anything but kick it up to their superiors. Then come the same old tired excuses. People putting things down the

Know the IRS's "Dirty Dozen" Tax Scams

While most people should file a tax return by April 17th, you Every year the IRS releases its "Dirty Dozen" list of the year's most prevalent tax scams. They include ploys to steal personal information, talk people out of money, or engage in questionable tax activity. Here are some of the top scams:

• Phishing.

Fake emails or websites claiming to represent the IRS, for the purpose of stealing personal information. The IRS will never try to contact you via email about a bill or refund.

• Phone scams.

Scammers impersonating IRS agents over the phone. These impersonators may threaten you with arrest if you don't make immediate payment for fake tax bills. Don't fall for it - the real IRS makes contact via a letter, and never threatens or demands immediate payment.

• Identity theft.

Using a stolen Social Security number to file a fraudulent return and claim a refund. The IRS said it is making great progress on reducing this scam as identity theft reports are down 40 percent from a year ago.

• Fake charities.

Some fraudsters use the mask of charitable activity to get you to donate funds to fake organizations. Only donate to legitimate charities, which are listed in the IRS database.

• Inflated refund claims.

Many taxpayers are wooed by tax-refund services offering payouts that seem too good to be true. Cheap tax-preparation services that promise unrealistic refunds are illegal and often get taxpayers in trouble.

Padded deductions.

The IRS is focusing on identifying tax returns that try to reduce tax by overstating deductions such as charitable deductions or business expenses.

• Falsifying income to claim credits.

Improper use of the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC), meant for eligible low-income taxpayers. The IRS has been cracking down on EITC fraud in recent years.

• Abusive tax shelters.

Some fraudsters peddle complex tax avoidance schemes known as tax shelters that they portray as legal tax strategies. Make sure you get an independent opinion on any complex tax schemes.

• Frivolous tax arguments.

Frivolous arguments to avoid paying taxes (for example, arguing a personal vacation is a business expense) can be penalized by up to \$5,000 per tax return.

• Offshore tax avoidance. Using offshore bank accounts and complex international tax structures to avoid paying taxes is still a common scam on the radar of IRS auditors.



Mayor Diaz then came up to speak, "We are rezoning the business district and are eliminating the Waterfront part. We need to concentrate on our business district, and I want to thank the Council President for coming to those meetings. People agreed to just concentrate on the business district." The Mayor also was happy to report that Duke Realty, which is handling the E-Port Logistics Center announced that one company in Amboy is taking one of the buildings. She also stated there's a second company coming in that is European, and they want to hire Perth Amboy residents. "Look at the Remediation on State Street. We have taken steps to make sure residents get hired. By the end of the year, two buildings will be filled. Job Fairs are being held."

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez said, "I want to address a couple of problems. The building at the corner of Fayette and Goodwin Streets that has the mural painted on the side is in bad shape."

The Mayor responded, "That is a County building and we're trying to get control of that."

Gonzalez responded, "The business next door to that building can use it. We seem to be the last ones on the County's mind. There's also a building on the corner of Herbert and Smith Street that's very ugly."

The Mayor responded, "These are also County buildings."

Gonzalez stated, "I will go to the next County Meetings to complain. That area has been that way for 40 years."

The Mayor responded, "Remember, that the area (where BRIDGE is now) was in bad shape for 20 years. Now, look what's happening. Look what

Duke Realty did with getting businesses at the BRIDGE building."

Councilman Joel Pabon talked about an incident that happened over the weekend, "Between 10 p.m. and 3 a.m. there were horns blowing loudly at the Waterfront. There were military helicopters flying. They were flying low and flying loud. Nobody knew why they were here. There should have been something posted. This was done for 3 days in a row." He was also grateful that some of the roads were repaved.

Deputy Chief Cattano came up to talk about the military aircraft. "They were on a planned government mission and their pattern included flying from New York State to Jersey. They were military planes. The United States Coast Guard had a blast for fog warning that occurred every 60 seconds."

B.A. Adam Cruz again talked about the bridges that are being repaired, "We have owned the Fayette Street Bridge since 1929 and it's deteriorating rapidly. We closed one side of the pedestrian (walkway). We applied for a grant which we didn't get. There's \$400,000 set aside for design. Until then, we are on our own and may have to bond money to pay for a new bridge."

Councilman Gonzalez questioned the amount of \$44,000 for new LED lights for the Smith Street area.

Hoffman came up to explain, "This is a verbal quote and we don't have the money in the budget."

Gonzalez then suggested, "Let's talk to the BID about using some of their surplus money for the lights."

Hoffman then reminded the Council, "We also have to talk to PSEG who we have a contract with."

Councilman Caba spoke up and said, "I thought that BID was for this (helping to pay for the lighting)."

BID Chair Barry Rosengarten came up to speak, "We (the BID) are in favor of getting downtown lighting, but we haven't talked about any payment for this. We can discuss this at our next BID Meeting."

Environmental Engineer Howard S. Matteson, (PE, BCEE, Senior Project Manager from CDM Smith) and Luis Perez Jimenez came up to speak about the City's water.

Matteson said, "There are low levels of dioxins, so you can minimize blending. It's a known contaminant. The Runyan well is treated before the water is distributed. The Human Health Department extrapolated in order to see what the cancer risks were. The Human Health Criteria was redefined. Your drinking water is safe. Perez can choose which well to take water from to use, but the water was always blended."

Perez Jimenez then spoke up, "3 of the 8 wells are affected by the plume."

Matteson said, "We are using advanced oxidation: ozone and pre-ozone."

Petrick asked, "Are the chemicals broken down?"

Matteson responded, "Yes, and you (the City) will be the first to try this process."

Councilman Gonzalez then questioned, "Are there any companies that left behind these contaminants?"

Perez Jimenez responded, "There were two companies."

Law Director Peter King ended the conversation and said, "BASF acquired those properties that will do the cleanups."

Councilman Fernando Irizarry was absent due to a death in the family.

This Week in World War II 75 Years Ago

On May 28, 1943, in the Aleutians, Japanese forces on Attu Island, reduced in number to about 1,000 from their original 2,500, launch suicide attacks against the U.S. troops fighting them.

The RAF on May 29 launches a major raid, comprising 719 bombers, against Wuppertal, Germany, dropping 1,900 tons of bombs. The resulting firestorm kills some 3,450 civilians and leaves 118,000 homeless. The RAF claims that half of Wuppertal has been "wiped off the map." In Asia, the Japanese offensive along the Yangtze River in China is stopped in the Ichang area, roughly 700 miles inland from Shanghai.

In the Aleutians, organized Japanese resistance on Attu Island ends on May 30. The fighting comes to a halt with only 29 Japanese soldiers left alive of the 2,500 that had been on the island originally. The others not killed in the battle committed suicide as the fighting tapered off. A search of the island finds no survivors. U.S. forces incur 561 fatalities and 1,136 men wounded of the 12,000 involved.

On May 31, American B-17 bombers strike Naples, Italy. In Asia, Chiang Kai-shek claims that three Japanese divisions have been surrounded on the Yangtze River near Ichang. In Scandinavia, the Danish Resistance blows up a railroad-locomotive shed at Tønder, on the border with Germany, as sabotage mounts despite appeals for a halt by King Christian X, the Danish monarch.

On June 1, the United Kingdom's Foreign Minister, Anthony Eden, announces that British Empire casualties in the first three years of war are 92,089 killed, 226,719 missing, 88,294 wounded and 107,891 captured. The British actor Leslie Howard, flying back to England from a five-week lecture tour boosting the Allied cause in Spain and Portugal, is killed when his DC-3 airliner is shot down by *Luftwaffe* fighter planes over the Bay of Biscay. (Although it was initially believed that the target was Howard's manager, Alfred Chenhalls, who bore a passing resemblance to Winston Churchill, historians now feel that Howard was the actual target. Alerted to Howard's presence on the Iberian Peninsula by German agents, Nazi Propaganda Minister Joseph Goebbels likely ordered Howard's plane shot down to silence the outspoken, anti-Nazi actor.)

Japanese forces are reported on June 2 to be in full retreat along the Yangtze River, in China. In Europe, the Red Air Force bombs Kiev, Ukraine, and Roslavl, a road and rail hub in Russia. Meanwhile, the *Luftwaffe* bombs the Russian city of Kursk. Liquidation of the Lwów Ghetto in Occupied Poland is completed, with the last of the remaining Jewish residents deported to the nearby Janowska concentration camp. At one time, Lwów had numbered 160,000 Jews among its residents.

Rival French leaders Gen. Charles de Gaulle and Gen. Henri Giraud on June 3 agree to share the presidency of the French Committee of National Liberation, formed in Algiers, Algeria, to organize and coordinate activities dedicated to liberating France from Nazi Germany. In China, the Battle of West Hubei ends in a draw. The Chinese suffer more casualties than the Japanese, but the Japanese withdraw from the field without pursuit. In Occupied France, the Resistance destroys 300 tons of rubber tires at the Michelin plant in Clermont-Ferrand.
