Discussions Continued: City's Purchase of High Street Property, Change Orders, Contract in Question

9/10/18 Caucus & 9/12/18 Council Meeting

PERTH AMBOY - At the 9/10/18 Caucus, there was a discussion regarding R-390-9/18 Proposal awarding a contract to Topology New Jersey for General Planning Services between the City of Perth Amboy for the period covering January 1, 2018 to December 31, 2018 in an amount not to exceed \$17,499.00.

Acting Business Administrator Greg Fehrenbach stated, "This was not brought up to you by the previous administration. The purchasing agent and I agree that it's for professional services for you to vote on."

Resident Ken Balut came up to speak, and said that he believed that the Council was not given any answers regarding this resolution and it was a sidetracked deal.

Fehrenbach stated, "Since it was a proposal that was received, there were no requirements needed."

Another discussion was on R-396-9/18 - Authorizing a change order No. 1 to the contract with Honeywell International Inc. reducing the agreement for the Energy Saving Improvement Program in the amount of \$51,721.00.

Fehrenbach said he reviewed this with Danny Cleaver from DPW and DPW Director Frank Hoffman. "It's supposed to be doing what it's purpose is for. There is no guarantee that you will get a refund if you don't the agreed upon savings. All I can tell you, is that the guarantee doesn't exist. The administrator and attorney should have been responsible to put that guarantee in. The Purchasing Agent and CFO had no input on it. I don't know if there was an analysis if having a guarantee would be worth it.'

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez then made a comment, "We (the Council) may have voted a guarantee down because we felt it was not cost effective."

Ken Balut talked about this contract during the public portion. "I said it was a bad deal. Who negotiated this? Mr. Fehrenbach has to come back to fix bad deals made by others who were running the ship. All of

this needs to be investigated. I bet money (contracts) were given to PAC money contributors."

Fehrenbach stated that he agreed with Mr. Balut regarding R-396.

During the 9/12/18 Council Meeting, Resident Stanley Sierakowski had a comment to make regarding Communication No. 1. Jeffrey Rauch, Engineer advising Council President William Petrick that the approximate cost of the demolition of Knights of Columbus Building (High Street) is between \$40,000 to \$60,000. This amount does not take into account if there are any asbestos or any USTS.

Sierakowski said, "The cost will probably be between \$80,000 to \$100,000 if asbestos has to be removed."

Petrick responded, "The City has not signed a contract (to purchase the property) yet."

Sierakowski then suggested, "It would be better to make this into an office building to attract professionals instead of a parking lot."

Petrick then stated, "Before the City can consider purchasing the building, the Council wanted the cost of demolition in case the City did purchase the property. In regards to making it a parking lot, you have to consider the neighborhood, which has a lack of parking now."

Resident Vince Mackiel asked about any progress that was being made on the Market Street bridge. "People that use the train are of lower income bracket. The County said that the bridge can't be repaired. Couldn't you have a temporary bridge? Is there an ordinance to put crosswalks in place? Transit should be able to do something temporary. The County should sent a letter, or maybe the City should. The City should also send an apology to the (Perth Amboy) Republican Party for being prevented from having a table at family day. You should also talk to Buckeye regarding the pipeline."

Fehrenbach responded to Mackiel, "The Police and Public Works looked at installing crosswalks. Because of the rise on the bridge, it was not safe to do so and barriers were put in instead. Transit did not respond immediately to us. The structural texture of the bridge is in question. When transit finally did respond, they recognized their responsibility. They will be sending out engineers."

Resident Linda Ferreira, who lives in the Budapest Section said, "There's no communication when it comes to having street cleaning. Signs were installed, but people have no idea when they are supposed to be getting the cars off the street for cleaning."

Councilman Joel Pabon responded. "Public Works said that once they finish the Budapest Section, they will have a regular cleaning schedule."

Resident Sharon Hubberman, who is also the Perth Amboy Republican Chair came to speak about Family Day. "The person who made the decision for us (PA Reps) not to be allowed to participate that day was the Mayor. She likes to talk about women's rights. The Mayor picks what she wants to support. We're not going to hear about the important issues. Her team is in place for distractions only. Why do I have go to Federal Court to fight?" Hubberman continued, "What is the requirements to run for election in this town? I have their (Working For You) voting records. One candidate has been voting in Carteret. Political Parties are a protected class. We have more in common than differences with the Democratic Party."

Council President Bill Petrick then asked if there was a way to have the Council make decisions for people who want to have walks or any similar activities when it comes to using the City's facilities.

Law Director King responded,
"If a group is using the City's facilities, then the administration
has to decide."

Resident Maria Garcia said, "I'm happy to see Fehrenbach. For 29 years, Sunshine Alley (Kearny Avenue area) has not been fixed as promised."

Residents Praise City Officials for Recent Clean-Up 9/18/19 Council Meeting

SOUTH AMBOY - Multiple
residents attended last Wednesday's council meeting to thank
Mayor Fred Henry, Business
Administrator Glenn Skarzynski, and the entire city council for quickly addressing the
rat problem that was affecting
South Amboy.

City officials have been proactive in making sure property owners are keeping their residences clean following reports of rats in the city, and on Wednesday the council passed an ordinance that will give South Amboy better ways to track abandoned properties owners and ensure the properties are being kept clean and tidy.

South Amboy has also been testing a new bulk garbage pick-up plan that allows residents to throw away unlimited amounts of trash one a month rather than limited amounts of trash once a week. Skarzynski reported that the experiment has been very successful, and he hopes to continue with this plan moving forward.

"The rodent situation is completely under control, it's an ongoing process," Skarzynski said. "I'm very happy to report that both Jay Elliott from Code and Lee Lloyd from Health have been doing the heavy lifting on this. They are out there every day."

"My instructions to them are to take whatever steps necessary to clean up properties that owners aren't handling, and that is inclusive of large tracks of undeveloped land," he continued. "We've identified the owners and we're moving forward with getting those cleaned up as well."

Each resident that spoke during the public portion of the council meeting came to the microphone and thanked Mayor Henry and Business Administrator Skarzynski for their dedication to the problem.

"I want to thank Fred and Glenn, thank you very much for coming out last month and addressing the situation with the rodents, I really mean that because I have not seen any since," Resident Ken Feeley said

"Glenn, I can't thank you enough," Resident Beverly Samuelson said. "it took four years of me complaining and you came along, and you did it...thank you very much."

Councilman Tom Reilly was also happy to see the abandon properties ordinance get past by the rest of the council.

"You look around the town, there are certain areas that we really need to attack, and abandoned homes are one of them," Reilly said. "I applaud the rest of the council for introducing that and getting that passed."


All council members were in attendance for the council meeting. The next city council meeting will be held on October 17th at 7:00 p.m.

Fehrenbach responded, "I have a vague memory of that. I would rather look at the record than speculate."

The Council voted as follows: for the consent agenda, R-375-9/18 thru R-384-9/18 and R-386-9/18 thru R-400-9/18 was moved by Councilman Fernando Irizarry and seconded by Councilman Helmin Caba. R-385-9/18 was voided.

Late Starter R-401-9/18 Authorizing the renewal of a certain 2018-2019 plenary retail consumption license. The necessary fees have been paid, therefore be it and it is hereby resolved that the following plenary retail consumption licenses are hereby granted and effective September 13, 2018: Royal N Inc., T/a The Courthouse Inn, 417 Fayette St.; T&A Discount Liquors, Inc. T&A Discount Liquors & Wines, 439 Convery Blvd

During the Council Comments, President William Petrick went first and read a statement (See the 9/19/18 Issue of the Amboy Guardian p.7.). In his statement, he addressed disparaging remarks made against him by someone on Facebook.

Helmin Caba spoke next. "I have never seen or witnessed what you've (Petrick) been accused of." Caba then asked about a religious organization who requested to use Rudyk Park for an event in 2019. They haven't gotten an answer yet. "What is the process for using the City's property?"

Law Director King said, "There's an ordinance: 343-3 which addresses that situation and I will make a copy for you which was amended."

Fehrenbach also responded,"I will check this for Caba. I'll look at the whole process and I've been talking to Mr. Ortiz (Director of Recreation)."

Councilman Caba said, "I would like to thank the Perth Amboy and Sayreville Police for an incident that occurred on the Victory Bridge."

Councilman Fernando Irizarry spoke next and thanked Petrick for the statements that he made. "We have disagreed, but he (Petrick) has never made any bad comments. He has integrity and is important to this community. I hope he continues on."

Irizarry also wanted to know what happened about informing the Council about any City events such as flag raisings. He also questioned the cost of putting up flagpoles (at the International Park).

Fehrenbach responded, "All flagpoles (for the International Park) are paid for by the City and the organization raising their flag sends out the invites."

Irizarry asked about the \$26,000 that was in the budget for flagpoles.

Fehrenbach responded, "The CFO Goldy set aside \$26,000 for this purpose. I will find out where the money came from for the Peruvian Flag Raising."

Irizarry then asked, "Who made a decision to give the money from the Taste of Perth Amboy to the Homeless Initiative instead of the Library? Apparently, someone thinks the Library has enough money. What is the Homeless Initiative?"

Irizarry then asked, "What's going on with the bus parking on Sayre Avenue? This company keeps getting extensions (to park on that property). What is that property zoned for? An ordinary person would not be given this courtesy. I think the court is violating the law. If we look at an ordinance involving festivals, the administration is supposed to respond (to the applicant's request) in 45 days."

Council President Bill Petrick requested that the Law Director look to see if the Council can take action regarding the Sayre Avenue Property.

Councilman Joel Pabon spoke next. He addressed Council President Bill Petrick stating, "I reached out to you first when I read about the derogatory comments made about you. It's a shame when someone accuses another person of untruths, which says a lot about you. The Petrick family has been in business for at least 100 years serving the people of Perth Amboy."

Pabon then wanted an update on what's happening with the tennis courts. He also mentioned 89 Lewis Street which has a lot of cracks in their foundation.

Fehrenbach responded, "I C talked to the contractors and lez engineers. There was a change ing.

order of \$122,000 for additional stones. A resident's property infringed on the City's property. Certain DEA issues have to be resolved, and they have not yet released the funds. The engineer for the contractor and our City Engineer said that the Change Order amount would be \$32,000 instead. There has been a revised work schedule for the tennis courts. They're still working on the rest room facilities, grading, paving, and the color coat (weather permitting). The weather can't be less than 50° F. The color coat has to wait until next spring, but other work can proceed."

Councilman Joel Pabon then made comments regarding a problem by the train station. "There's a big tree on the southbound side where people do their business at night. I'd like to see that tree taken down. School busses are now parking by the Cornucopia."

He also asked for an update on Water Stadium.

Fehrenbach responded, "An architect had been hired to do report that was delivered to you."

Petrick then said, "It was delivered and stopped there. It may have been through email. It's City property."

Fehrenbach then requested that all the reports be sent to him so that he and Kenny Ortiz can talk to the Board of Education to resolve this issue." Fehrenbach also addressed the Victory Bridge Pier and the Dog Park which needs funding. "The original funding did not come through. The NJDEP Green Acres Grant is expiring soon. We need to complete other projects first."

Councilman Pabon said, "I don't remember that the City had to do a match for the funding."

Council President Bill Petrick then said people had complained to him because they were told by the police they could no longer fish under the Victory Bridge which they had done so for years.

Deputy Police Chief Larry Cattano responded, "There is an ordinance that fishing is not permitted in that area."

Councilman Fernando Gonzalez was not present at the meeting.

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

We got to see the dark side of our "sleepy little hamlet". The drug addicts, the alcoholics, the homeless, and the illegal housing, which still exists today. We were the "grunts on the ground" so to speak. This was our way of serving our community.

To defame this mans character is an abomination. He is neither a racist nor a misogynist. I will tell you what else he is not. He is not a puppet or a yes man, which is the type of person our current mayor seems to want surrounding her. I guess when you cannot argue the issues successfully throw mud is the lesson now a days.





man then spoke, "I am happy to report that we had a very successful school opening thanks to the staff. I had a meeting with the Leadership Team who are dedicated to help students fulfill their dreams. The Freshman Academy on Seaman Street is due to open February 2019. The Health & Science Academy is due to open in two weeks. We're dedicated to providing an opportunity to help students succeed and contribute to society. Change has to happen in all positions in May and June."

Board Member Lissett Lebron had a question about approval for a Dual Language School to conduct an Afterschool Supplemental Tutoring Program under the supervision of Dr. Jose Santos and also for approval for the James J. Flynn School to conduct a Before and After School Enrichment and Supplemental Tutoring Program. Lebron asked if the similar programs will be offered to all schools.

Dr. Vivian Rodriguez replied, "Others were already approved previously (in other schools)."

Ms. McAdam had shown a slide presentation which was a self-assessment for determining grades under the Anti-Bullying Bill of Rights Act. She responded to a question on of the Board Members asked in regards of what activities will take place this year addressing bullying. McAdam said, "In October, there will be a "Week of Respect" Presentation done in an assembly. We will have responses in classrooms in how we should relate to one another. The staff will look at conflict resolutions and we will be dealing on lessons on anti-bully-

Tashee Vasquez told the parents in attendance that there are a lot of revised policies that will be on the website.

During the New Business, it was discussed that for the executive session, the Board Attorney will come back with proposed language on what information they can tell those in attendance as to what information can be given to the public before the Board goes into closed session.

Junior Iglesia asked for an update on the new high school.

Board Secretary Derek Jess responded, "There's no groundbreaking, yet. We have to look at the education specifics for the building design and advertise for bids. After the designs and constructions are met, we'll have to interview those who put in a bid and score them. The construction was pushed back because of contaminated soil. We're looking at maybe 2023. Whenever a new school is being constructed, there always is additional time built in."

Board Member Lissett Lebron encouraged the parents to meet with their children's teachers, the administrators, and all staff involved in your child's educa-

Tashee Vasquez said, "The Board of Education is working with the administration and OEM for any weather-related emergencies. Keep the people of North Carolina in your prayers."

Board Vice President Milady Tejeda thanked all who came to the Convocation at the beginning of the school year. "I'm very proud of the district."

Board President Ken Puccio remarked that the football team had an impressive opening win. He urged all to cheer on all of our sports teams.

During the public portion, Dr. Walden from the Jewish Renaissance invited the Board Members to come to an office in the High School that has an inspiration chalk board wall. Students can come in and write inspirational thoughts. She also mentioned that Suicide Prevention Month is September.

Are You Sharing Too Much Information Online?

In today's digital age, it is impossible to avoid the internet. Even if you don't have a computer and actively avoid social media, there is information about you in some corner of the web. Here are some tips to help you manage your digital footprint:

- Actively manage your security settings. Every app, social media site and web browser have multiple layers of privacy and security settings. When you download a new app or register with a new site, don't simply trust the default settings. Look through the options yourself to ensure you are comfortable with the level of privacy. One thing to watch for with apps on your phone is location settings. Some apps will track your location even when the app isn't running.



Take everything you know about children's television and forget about it. That's Mister Rogers' Neigh-

In the new documentary, "Won't You Be My Neighbor," about Mr. Rogers, we learn about one of the guiding forces to many children and helping their development. The documentary covers interesting aspects that you didn't know about the children's television personality. Fred Rogers was going to become a minister but took a vacation before being ordained. He then discovered a little thing called television and decided it could be a great tool for childhood education. Before returning to the Seminary, he got involved in public television in Pittsburg. He was the first to do an educational kids' program without fancy masks and jumping through hoops. He introduced everyone to Daniel Tiger, who in many ways was his alter ego. Mr. Rogers voiced all 10 puppets including King Friday, X the Owl, Lady Elaine Fairchild, Henrietta Pussycat, etc.

We also find out a lot about Mister Rogers backstory. As a small boy, he was very ill and spent a lot of time inside while everyone else was playing. When he developed Mister Rogers Neighborhood, he tackled hard subjects that no other television show would touch with a ten-foot pole. These subjects included racism, death, war, assassination, etc. As a Minister, he preached in his own way. He felt that children needed to hear the truth about these subjects and he never talked down to kids.

PERTH AMBOY - During the program, Mayor Wilda Diaz and Congressman Frank Pallone recounted the experiences they had when they visited Puerto Rico. (See Dec. 13, 2017) issue of the Amboy Guardian.). Two of the most moving speeches were made by Yaitza Domenech, Puerto Rico Resident displaced by Hurricane Maria Translated by Tashee Vasquez. Ms. Domenech had to describe the devastation on the island to her four children, all who are special needs, three who are blind. She was very grateful that she was able to find the needed assistance (placing children in school, finding an apartment) with the help of Tashee Vasquez when she relocated to Perth Amboy.

Even though I could not understand what she was saying, you can tell by the tone of her voice how grateful she was that she made the right decision coming to Perth Amboy. The second person who spoke passionately was Perth Amboy Police Sergeant Ralph Pineiro. He, along with other officers of Perth Amboy went over to help residents of Puerto Rico. "There were about 150 officers from New Jersey which included State Troopers who flew down to Puerto Rico to help distribute supplies to the residents. When we were on the airplane looking at Puerto Rico, as we got closer to the ground, it looked almost like ground zero. Upon our arrival (myself and other officers from Perth Amboy), we were met at a hotel by the New Jersey State Police who had to go over safety procedures with us. We could not even see our relatives who live in Puerto Rico, which was hard, because I have 8 aunts over there. Each officer worked 14 hour shifts for 14 days. I remember seeing long lines for people just to get ice. There was an old lady in a wheelchair who had waited in hours for ice. By the time she got to the front, the allotment for the day was gone. I had to beg them to give me some ice to give to her. We were given MRE's (meals ready to eat). I remember instances where people would beg us for food and we would give them our MRE's. I'm still in touch with some of the officers I met from New Jersey when I was there. Before leaving, I was able to contact 3 of my relatives."

The ceremony concluded with the wreath presentation and the raising of the Puerto Rican flag.

This Week in World War II 75 Years Ago

Now back in northern Italy, Benito Mussolini on September 24 announces the establishment of the Italian Social Republic, with himself as head of state and prime minister. Although il Duce declares Venice as the capital, his office and other government bureaus are in the small town of Salò, on Lake Garda in Lombardy, midway between Milan and Venice. The "Republic" cedes direct control of some of its northern areas to Germany. The Salò Republic, as the German puppet state is often called, relies on the Nazis for funding. In Papua New Guinea, Australian troops capture the airport at Finschhafen, 60 miles east of Lae.

On the Eastern Front, the Red Army takes Smolensk, Russia, an important city west of Moscow, on September 25. Other elements of the Red Army reach the outskirts of Kiev, the capital of Ukraine. The German High Command issues orders for the removal from military service of any person who has two Jewish, or otherwise non-Aryan, grandparents.

Maj. Herbert Kappler, the SS officer in charge of Germanoccupied Rome, delivers an ultimatum on September 26 to the city's Jewish community: Deliver 220 pounds of gold and 110 million Italian *lire* to SS headquarters within 36 hours or face deportation to concentration camps. Upon an appeal for help from Israel Zolli, Rome's chief rabbi, Pope Pius XII orders the Vatican treasury to provide the remainder of gold needed to meet the ransom demand. In South America, the U.S. Navy establishes a base of operations at Natal, Brazil.

The second of two heavy air raids against Wewak, Papua-New Guinea, is conducted on September 27 by the 5th USAAF, with 64 Japanese planes and seven ships destroyed. Over 100 Japanese planes had been destroyed during the first attack, in the previous month. In the Solomons, the Japanese begin withdrawing from Kolombangara. In Europe, elements of the British Eighth Army capture Foggia, in southern Italy, and its surrounding airfields without resistance. This puts Allied pilots within range of southern Germany, Poland and the Balkans.

September 28 marks the second day of the so-called "Four Days of Naples." Residents — angered and frustrated by continual, heavy, devastating Allied bombing raids over their German-held city and anticipating the approach of the Allies — rise against their occupiers. The uprising — by members of the Italian Resistance along with ordinary citizens — results in fierce fighting. Some 170 Resistance members die, along with up to 560 civilians, versus 55-95 Germans killed. The Wehrmacht was withdrawing from Naples anyway, but the uprising hastens the retreat and prevents the Germans from posting a rearguard defense against the Allies, who arrive on October 1. In Occupied Denmark, Georg Duckwitz, a German diplomat, secretly warns Danish Resistance leaders of an SS order to shortly begin arresting and deporting the kingdom's Jews. Over the next weeks, Danes assist most of the country's 8,000 Jews in eluding arrest; Danish fishermen ferry over 7,200 Jews and some 800 non-Jewish family members to neutral Sweden, where they are given safe haven in an arrangement made by Duckwitz with the Swedish government.

In Italy, the Allies take Pompeii, between Salerno and Naples, on September 29. Aboard the British battleship *HMS Nelson* in the Grand Harbour of Valletta, Malta, Italy's prime minister, Marshal Pietro Badoglio, and U.S. Gen. Dwight Eisenhower, Allied commander of the Mediterranean Theater of Operations, secretly meet for the signing of a full and final armistice between Italy and the Allies. The two also discuss war plans.

Sumner Welles, friend and confidante of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, resigns abruptly as Undersecretary of State on September 30. Officially, the reason given is policy differences between Welles and Secretary of State Cordell Hull over relations with pro-Axis governments in Latin America. The actual reason is the threat by former ambassador (to the Soviet Union and to France) William Bullitt — who hungers for Welles's job — to expose Welles's homosexuality. FDR never forgives Bullitt, banning him from holding any further government post and even refusing him permission to seek a commission in the U.S. Army. (Bullitt ends up joining the Free French forces under de Gaulle.) On the Eastern Front, the Red Army has pushed the Germans back to the Dniepr River and has established five bridgeheads across the river in its push westward.






